




SYNOPSIS OF THE MINUTES OF CONGREGATION ASSEMBLIES

The **Annual Assembly** of the congregation was held on Sunday May 20, 2007 following the 10:30 service.

- 1. Elections for five Council seats were held, all nominees being elected.

- 3. The booklet of reports of pastor, officers, committees and organizations of the church was received as it had been printed and distributed in the two prior weeks.
- 4. Committee chairs and the parish musicians were thanked for their service.
- 5. The meeting was adjourned without further business.

A **Special Assembly** of the Congregation was held on Sunday, December 9, 2007 following the 10:30 service for the purpose of action on the 2008 budget. It was approved by voice vote as presented.





A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

The Reverend Kenneth R. Elkin

The following is a sampling of the Pastor's activities, gleaned in semi-chronological order from the regular reports given to the Council during the year.

- 1. Pastor met with a new group of persons who began service as Communion visitors.
- 2. Pastor led the Wednesday Bible study time that concluded a study on the geography of the Holy Land during the spring. They explored C.S. Lewis' *Screwtape Letters* in the fall, and have begun enjoying *Pilgrim's Progress*.
- 3. Pastor served as accompanist for Donna's elementary school concerts in December and again in the spring.
- 4. Through the year, the Pastor met with a number of couples planning for marriages.
- 5. Pastor led the Thursday morning Bible study, which has been working on the Psalms, one each week.
- 6. Pastor led the Crossways group as they finished Paul's letters from prison during the spring. In the fall, they examined the Apostles' Creed, line by line. In the winter, they explored the work of Martin Luther and the first 20 articles of the Augsburg Confession of 1530
- 7. *The Way* for 2006-2007 concluded on Sunday 5/27, Pentecost.
- 8. *The Way* for 2007-2008 began in September and concluded on 5/12, Pentecost. Pastor Elkin and Bob Schultz continue to be the leaders for this wonderful effort to mold and encourage discipleship.

- 9. Pastor and Bernadette had a series of contacts with Carlos Saldivia of First Contact Graphics culminating in a filmed interview with the Pastor. Small portions of the interview will be readied for placement on our website and YouTube. Last summer, a postcard was developed, printed, and sent to each pastor in the Upper Susquehanna Synod (except the most local ones) and to selected Lutheran pastors in the central region of the state, concerning our availability to serve local college students. First Contact also recast our Holy Week newspaper ads.
- 10 Pastor and Becky Miller Pryor gave an interview to Lou Hunsinger concerning Family Promise for the Webb Weekly.
- 11 Pastor and Jane Larson began the new Stephen Ministry training group on June 21 and continued on 17 Thursday evenings after that. The new group of five Stephen Ministers was commissioned on November 4. New and current Stephen Ministers were honored at a luncheon for them and their spouses on Sunday after the liturgy on November 4.
- 12 Pairs of catechetical students were with the Pastor on July 31, Aug 1, and Aug 2, to get more of a flavor of what happens in the life of the parish besides Sunday morning. They were very busy days, and the students were able to help with a number of tasks as well as engage the pastor in conversation.
- 13. Pastor Elkin served as the chief organizer for the summer forums held each Sunday morning at 9:15. Topics included:
 - 6/10 Family promise
 - 6/17 Archaeological digging in Israel
 - 6/24 Carl Hieber's medical mission
 - 7/01 Carl Hieber, part II
 - 7/08 Bishop Main
 - 7/15 Archaeology, part II
 - 7/22 Dr. Smith, Shepherd of the Streets
 - 7/29
 - 8/5 & 8/12 Martin Luther film
 - 8/19 & 8/26 readers' theater
- 14. In October, Pastor engaged in an archaeological trip to the island of Menorca, off the coast of

- Spain. A first century BC Roman town and military camp is the excavation site. A one day side-trip to Granada for Pastor and Katy was added in order to see the Alhambra. The trip was described in pictures at Luncheon Fellowship and again on Wednesday evening November 14 at 7:00 in Fellowship Hall. The Pastor wishes to express thanks to the many persons who accepted and continued in responsibilities during the pastor's time in Spain. All of our planned activities continued without interruption.
- 15. Pastor and several members offered time at the concession stand at Little League on behalf of the Arts Council mural project, in return for Mr. Saldivia's kindness in helping us develop the postcard.
- 16 The "75, Single, and Still Praising God"
 Milestone was well-received by the more than
 20 honorees on August 26. Thanks are due to
 Bob and Bernadette Jones, Sharon Comini,
 Becky Miller Pryor, Lois Smith, and others who
 helped to plan and execute the event, as well as
 youth servers Declan and Sara Jones, Sara
 Larson, and Marc Kinney.
- 17. The In-Between breakfast was held on September 2 in Fellowship Hall, in-between summer and fall, and in-between the services. Good food and good conversations.
- 18. Pastor often has the pleasure of giving tours of the nave, including to two children who had questions about the meaning of the church windows.
- 19. Pastor welcomed Sister Henry Lambert to the Luncheon Fellowship on September 19, and led a question and answer time with her.
- 20. The catechetical group added first-year participants, and met the third Sunday each month through May. The method of the meeting of mentors with students while the pastor meets with parents has been very successful.
- 21. New Worship Task Force met and agreed to a schedule of a Service of Word and Prayer on the first Sunday of the month and a Service of Word and Praise on the third Sunday of the

- month, The first of these was held on November 4^{th} . Others were postponed until this coming summer.
- 22. Pastor and Bernadette met with three students for three sessions to prepare for First Communion which was celebrated on November 18.
- 23. The parish welcomed Bishop Driesen on December 2 at worship, at a forum, at lunch, and with the Council. He helped us celebrate the Third Grade Bible Milestone.
- 24. Pastor helped to lead the group of persons who took a Christmas party to a room of profoundly disabled persons at the Selinsgrove Center on December 4. We should do something for residents and staff at some other season of the year also.
- 25.Pastor and Council members and spouses were the guests of Bud and Joyce Hershberger at a dinner held at the Women's Club on December 5.
- 26. Pastor and the members of *The Way* got together on December 15 and baked 60 dozen cookies which were given to shut-ins, a few to the members of the group itself, and to the congregation at the first service on Christmas Eve.
- 27. Pastor presided at the Remembrance Service held on Sunday, December 30. More than 50 were in attendance and expressed appreciation for this event. Our special thanks to the Burkholders who continue to make the beautiful keepsake ornaments we give to each person naming a loved one.
- 28. Pastor helped to facilitate the Bread-Baking event led by Katy Elkin on January 2 in the church kitchen. Fourteen persons (the absolute maximum) took part and had a great time.
- 29. Pastor worked with three boys in preparation for service as acolytes.
- 30. Pastor led the Wednesday Lenten series of meal, worship, and study, at noon and evening, this year under the theme *Where Jesus walks; where we walk*. Each week's study-time had a different focus.

Ash Wednesday –In deep conversation with the Father. The sermon centered on Jesus' prayer with the Father, and our prayer following that model.

Second Wednesday – At the place of Baptism In study-time we viewed photo of places of Baptism in Israel and the wild variety of shapes of fonts in the ages of the church, and discerned the theological message of those shapes and configurations.

<u>Third Wednesday</u> – *In hometown* We viewed a brief video about Sepphoris, a Roman town very near to Nazareth, and discovered the possibility that Jesus had a more cosmopolitan background than we usually imagine; and then thought about our own hometown.

<u>Fourth Wednesday</u> – *At work in daily life* We viewed photos of daily life in Jesus' day, daily life in Israel these days, and thought about our own roles in daily life today.

Fifth Wednesday – In conflict We participated in a simulated archaeological dig at tables in Fellowship Hall, finding shrapnel from bombs landing on our imagined site near Ashkelon in Israel this week, and also digging to find remnants of conflict from a Roman camp 2,000 years ago. We went home with a series of questions for reflection on what we would feel, what we would do, and what scripture resources we might use if we were in Ashkelon today, if we were in that Roman camp 2,000 years ago, and as we live here in Williamsport today.

<u>Sixth Wednesday</u> - *On the way of the Cross*We examined our series of watercolors of the way of the cross, with their many connections to the Bible, and meditated on our own lifepath.

<u>Wednesday in Holy Week</u> - *In the meal of the covenant* We keep the Seder, the remembrance of the Passover.

- 31. Pastor met with fellow members of the Society of the Holy Trinity for overnight retreats in May and December and a one-day retreat in March.
- 32. Pastor and Bernadette led the catechetical trip to Gettysburg on March 15. About 20 persons took part in the venture. We were hosted by Seminarians Matt and Lisa Schuster, graduating in May, and preparing for ordained ministry in the Upper Susquehanna Synod.

33. Pastor presided at our Holy Week services:
Morning Prayer each weekday, Seder, Holy
Thursday Communion at noon and evening,
Good Friday community service, and evening
Tenebrae, Great Vigil of Easter on Saturday, and
our two Palm Sunday and two Easter Day
services; for a total of 15 services from Sunday
to Sunday. Thanks to the many persons who
took on leadership roles and supporting roles in
all of the Holy Week events. We had great
cooperation.


ITEMS OF ECUMENICAL INTEREST

- 1. We welcomed the Lycoming College Tour Choir for a concert on Thursday, May 10 in the nave, in preparation for their European tour.
- 2.. Pastor filled in for the Shepherd of the Streets several days during the year. Pastor Elkin spoke briefly with pastors of the West Branch Conference in regard to making Holy Communion available to our parishes weekly.
- 3. St. Marks was the first congregation to agree to serve as a host congregation for Family Promise. The program cannot begin until we get 13 congregations to agree to serve. At the moment, we have 7, with others expressing interest. [The pastor has had to turn away several families who might well have qualified for assistance under such a program.] Pastor and Becky Miller Pryor have met with folks from other congregations to introduce this including about 20 persons in the leadership teams of St. Matthew Lutheran Church, the American Baptist pastors monthly meeting, etc. We are still searching for the right person to serve as the president of the fledgling organization. In the meantime, Pastor serves as the Vice-president of the steering committee.
- 4. Pastor served as the musician for the regional retreat of the Society of the Holy Trinity meeting in Ligonier on April 30-May 1. Since it was at an Orthodox retreat center, there was no organ. Pastor wrote antiphons and psalm tones, etc. for use with tone-chime accompaniment. The presenter was Dr. Pfatteicher of Pittsburgh, who spoke on the daily prayer offices and more. [He was the author of numerous books, including the *Commentary on LBW, the LBW*

- Desk Edition, Festivals and Commemorations, Commentary on the Occasional Services, etc.]
- 5. Together with Bud and Joyce Hershberger, Pastor attended the West Branch Conference annual assembly at Messiah Church on April 29. Pr. Anke Deibler was elected to be the next Dean of the Conference, and a new structure for the Conference Cabinet was approved. Each congregation's synod assembly voting members will be the members of the Cabinet, which will meet quarterly.
- 6. Pastor attended the Bishop's Retreat held at Wellsboro on April 30/May1. The presenter was Dr. Wengert, from the Philadelphia Seminary, speaking on the continuing significance and applicability of the Small Catechism in today's setting.
- 7. Pastor and Lou DeSeau took part in the working bus trip to New Windsor MD on May 7. It was a very busy and successful day for 37 persons from all around the area.
- 8. Pastor, together with Bud and Joyce Hershberger as voting members, Donna Zierdt Elkin as Associate in Ministry voting member, Bernadette Jones and Sharon Comini workshop leaders, Eric Comini as a visitor, and Sara Jones as a Page, attended the Synod Assembly on June 15-16 at Susquehanna University. The highest profile decision was the election of a Bishop inasmuch as Bishop Main was retiring. Another important decision concerned restructuring of the Synod, as well as usual decisions about budget and ongoing work.
- 9. Bishop Main preached at St. Mark's on Sunday, July 8, and was the leader of the Forum at the 9:00 hour that day also.
- 10. Bette McCrandall, our missionary in Liberia, was home during the summer, and was planning to visit us. However, she was diagnosed with cancer and engaged in a series of treatments. They were successful, and she returned to her work in Liberia in the fall.
- 11. Bishop-Elect Driesen's installation was on October 21 at Susquehanna University.
- 12. Donna held her final workshop as Synod Cantor on October 13.

- 13 Pastor gave a presentation on the Tiberias excavation to an enthusiastic senior group at First United Methodist in Muncy on October 24.
- 14 Pastor gave a presentation on the Tiberias excavation to an ecumenical group at Pine Street United Methodist Church on October 31.
- 15. Pastor gave a presentation on the Adult Catechumenate (*The Way*) to the Conference Cabinet on Thursday, November 1.
- 16. In January, we began to make plans to share arrangements for Consecration Sunday with St. Luke Church next fall.
- 17. Lycoming College Chamber Choir visited on March 30, and performed admirably. A composer in residence from Poland was also present and a work was premiered.
- 18. Pastor led the Bible study with students at Penn College on April 7 and 14 at 8:00 P.M. Pastor used several of our icons to prime the conversation.
- 19. Sharon Comini has been tapped to serve as the interim coordinator for the campus ministry. The predecessor and spouse are moving out of state very shortly. Decisions about permanent staffing will be made during the summer.


The Role of Mutual Ministry in the Life of St. Mark's


The purpose of Mission at the Crossroads is to help us to plan how best to carry out the mission of our Lord Jesus Christ in this time and place.

Acknowledgment must be made for the diligent service of our committee members, musicians, the behind the scenes helpers, and those who share in worship leadership roles. It takes all of us together to praise God! At a subsequent meeting we decided to postpone the new worship service until at least April when we would have more daylight.


The pre-service music on the third Sunday of the month might be devoted to a hymn sing or other songs of various sorts.


Continuing goals for the coming years are:

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Youth and Family Ministry Coordinators Sharon L. Comini and Bernadette H. Jones

The purpose of the ministry of Christian Education is to proclaim Jesus Christ to each other and to the entire world by planning and administering the total educational program of the parish. To this end, the Youth and Family Ministry Coordinators supervise educational opportunities for all youth and adults in and beyond the congregation in the Christian faith as found in the Bible and the Lutheran tradition.

Sunday Church School:

- We continue to use Growing in Christ, published by Concordia, as the main curriculum for our Sunday School program.
- ➤ Our youth were divided into the following configuration based on numbers, age, and/or grade level: preschool (3-4 year olds); kindergarten—grade 1; grades 2–3; grades 4–5.
- ➤ Our middle school class of 6-8 graders is working in the *Living in Grace* series. This

- will be replaced next year by the *To Know, to Live, to Grow* program by Augsburg Fortress.
- The confirmation class increased in size to ten members who met on the third Sunday of every month with their families, mentors, Pastor and Bernadette. They all have been involved in a variety of service projects.
- ➤ Lou DeSeau and Bob Jones continue teaching the high school class. The curriculum revolves around topics of concern with the students and revisits prayer and parts of the service. The class is consistently attended by 3-4 youth.
- ➤ The monthly rotation schedule for teachers continues to be successful.
- ➤ Pastor Elkin led the Crossways Class for adults. *Crossways* is an in-depth study of the entire Bible.
- ➤ The Middle Lounge Class for high school students and adults was guided by a rotation of leaders on a variety of subjects.
- Vacation Bible School, Great Bible Reef, was held in June, 2007. A total of roughly 40 youth attended.
- Confirmation Camp was held July 16-18, 2007, led by Pr. Elkin, supported by Bernadette and Sharon.
- We hosted Lutheran Shared Ministry's School of Religion.
- ➤ We organized the Tenth Annual Youth Retreat for confirmands in January.
- ➤ The Way, a process of faith formation, under the leadership of Pastor Elkin and C. Robert Schultz continued. Six candidates affirmed their baptism and renewed their membership in St. Mark's on the Great Easter Vigil, March 22, 2008.
- Children's Church continued on a once a month schedule. A Children's Summer Chapel was tried during June, July and August.
- ➤ Joint celebrations for all Sunday Church School attendees were held in Fellowship Hall during the Sunday Church School hour at Christmas Eve, New Year's Eve and Easter.

Youth and Family Ministry Activities:

➤ Passing on Faith (formerly Child in Our Hands), remained a keystone of our family ministry at St. Mark's. Milestones celebrated

- this year: Receiving blankets for newborns; First Communion; Baptismal Lunch with faith chests for recently baptized; Prayer Pillows were given to children ages 2-4; children in kindergarten and 1st grade received "All the Languages of the Good News" bags; third graders received their Bibles; The Blessing of the Keys was offered to those youth who became new drivers; and the Wedding Anniversary (54 to 58 years) celebration. A new milestone was added: 75+, Single and Still Praising God—for our single seniors.
- ➤ We hosted *Captive Free*, with several families providing accommodations. In return, they performed here at a pot luck supper.
- Annual Church Picnic was held at Montoursville's Indian Park.
- Family Programs instituted last summer: St. Mark's Summer Playgroup met at various parks in and around the Williamsport/ Montoursville every other week. St. Mark's Goes to the Movies invited families to go once a week through July to see family-rated (G, PG) films at the Community Arts Center.
- ➤ St. Mark's Church Choir Camp was held for one week last summer. The cast of 36 rehearsed "In the Beginning..." for performance Sunday evening, August 5. 14 additional members and guests assisted.
- ➤ Revolve Tour: This two-day, faith-building, event in Philadelphia was attended by two of our girls, a guest and their mothers.
- ➤ Operation Christmas Child began in November. Families packed 37 shoe boxes filled with small gifts for needy children around the world.
- Family Advent Wreath Making/Luncheon/ Bishop Driesen's visit was attended by over 60 people on the first Sunday of Advent.
- Kids' Morning Out was attended by over a dozen children, including middle school assistants.
- ➤ The five adults attending the Christmas Cookie-Baking event produced the cookies sent for our shut-ins.
- Christmas Caroling was snowed out, but Pr. Elkin and Beth Shafranko visited our shut-ins and delivered their cookies.
- Christmas Pageant: "A Night for Dancing," a celebration of the Christmas story, was

presented by over 40 youth and adults on Sunday, December 24.


- ➤ Well over 100 pieces of winter warmers, scarves, hats, and gloves were collected for the Kid's Clothes Closet. 110 teddy bears were also collected and given to the Williamsport Police Station, the Pregnancy Care Center and the Wise Options for Women shelter.
- ➤ Katy Elkin returned for a day of bread baking with the ladies (and some of our youth!) of St. Mark's.
- ➤ The John Bower Sunday Church School Basketball League for our youth began in December and continued on through February of 2008. 22 youth created two teams. Coach Rick Robertson headed the teams with Jeff Hershey and Kirk Owen assisting him.
- ➤ 146 cans of soup and over to \$31 were collected for "Souper Bowl Sunday", held in February.
- We took three of our youth to the middle school retreat at Camp Mt. Luther.
- > Fun Night continues as a monthly event.
- > The confirmation class went to Gettysburg.
- Bernadette held an egg-dying session for adults and older youth.
- ➤ The Annual Easter Egg Hunt and breakfast with Pastor Elkin was held on Saturday, March 22, 2008.
- ➤ The St. Mark's Old Fashion Church Family picnic is scheduled for Sunday, June 1, 2008.
- Summer Choir Camp will be held this summer. The program is being decided by Bernadette and Dick Lakey.
- Nursery and acolyte schedules continue to be created and followed.
- A meeting of nursery volunteers was held to review and update the nursery policies. A report of this meeting is forthcoming.
- Family hand bell and contemporary choirs continue under the direction of Dick Lakey.

Outreach/Continuing Education:

Synod Assembly: Sharon and Bernadette set up St. Mark's display of our milestone ministry. They conducted a workshop on

- developing this ministry. Sara Jones attended as a page.
- ➤ Bernadette and Sharon attended Little Lambs Open House with flyers about St. Mark's and Sunday School.
- > Several of our youth attended the *See You at* the *Pole* events at their various schools.
- ➤ Sharon and Karen Boone attended the State Sunday School Convention in October.
- We continued involvement with campus ministry this year.
 - Through Penn College we served dinner for their campus ministry group twice.
 - Pans of lasagna were made for a fundraising dinner for their mission trip.
 - Sharon went on the mission trip to NYC with the Penn College UCM group.
 - Penn College students made a presentation about their mission trip during Children's Church.
- Youth and Family information on St. Mark's website. To that end, we have provided him with text and photographs of our events.

In fulfilling those goals many members of the congregation assisted with various activities throughout the year. Our outreach to the community included:


- Hosting the community on our front lawn for the Fourth of July festivities. We provided ed refreshments, information about St. Mark's, and good cheer.



PARISH LIFE COMMITTEE



PROPERTY COMMITTEE

The purpose of the Property Committee is to proclaim Jesus Christ to each other and all the world by promoting the use of the congregation's physical resources in the support of out Christian Mission. To this end the committee arranged for the promotion, protection, maintenance, repair and expansion of church properties. The Committee supervises the use of the same by the congregation and other organizations so that the facilities are adequate for the functions assigned by the congregation.


- 1. The sidewalks at the west front of the property were paved, after considerable negotiation with PennDOT as to details, and additional easements granted. Bushes had to be moved, existing areas graded, tremendous amount of stones and cement waste had to be removed from the area, a thick layer of mushroom soil was applied, and in the fall, part of the area was seeded. Several members put in many hours of work to accomplish this, in addition to a seeding contract that was let.
- 2. Our long-anticipated sealing of the brick on the Parish House was done, and at the same time, a void left by the removal of an old air conditioner was filled.

- 3. The sign that we had in the west front lawn had to be removed, and was refurbished and attached to a sled-type base and placed on the roof of the chapel so that it can continue to beckon passersby.
- 4. Wheels were added to our display panels in Fellowship Hall, making them more flexible, and much more easily movable.
- 5. New storage cabinets were installed in the choir room and a linen closet in the Fellowship Hall.
- 6. Many light bulbs in the nave have been replaced with new technology fluorescents at a great reduction in wattage.
- 7. A new Japanese maple was planted in the west lawn in honor of the 53-57th Anniversary Milestone. This was a replacement for the tree that was lost in the sidewalk rebuilding.
- 8. A new air-conditioner was purchased for the second floor.
- 9. The new landscaping, stone sidewalk, and bench in our northwest bed was done by Tebbs Bros as a gift from Lamar Advertising. We added the bubbling fountain as a memorial.
- 10. Little Lambs completed several painting projects in the stairwells and other areas that they use.
- 11. Carpeting for the North Lounge was purchased and installed, and painting was done.
- 12. The rooftop HVAC unit was replaced.
- 13. Nick Buckman served as temporary sexton due to Lou DeSeau's recovery from surgery.
- 14. The wooden cross on the west end of the Parish House was removed for the sake of sealing the brick, and was refurbished and reinstalled.
- 15. Many small repairs are required around the buildings. Lou DeSeau does many of them.
- 16. A light was installed on the sidewalk canopy facing north to cover the approach to the building through St. Marks Place.
- 17. The office hallway water cooler was replaced from long-standing small memorial funds.
- 18. Surface bubbles on the Parish house roof were repaired.
- 19. The yard sign indicating office entrance was refurbished and greatly improved.
- 20. The office copier/printer was replaced and made available on our computer network.
- 21. The west front doors and windows were replaced with insulated, tinted glass, and with panic hardware. This is a major safety improvement to the nave.

- 22. New door was also installed on the west chapel entrance, with panic hardware.
- 23. Speaker hangers have been installed in Fellowship Hall.
- 24. Negotiations continue with the city concerning the small parcel of land between the Parish House and Via Bella.
- 25. Thirty cubic yards of mulch were applied to our beds this spring by a crew of 26 persons.

Our continuing thanks to those who have helped with so many of these projects, especially Lou DeSeau, Bob Miller, all the committee members, and other volunteers from the parish. Our aim is to develop the property as the most flexible, usable, and beautiful tool for ministry it can be.





STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE



Assembling and knotting is done at church. 81 quilts were completed and sent to Lutheran World Relief in 2007. In the fall we conduct our kit project. School bags are sewn by our members. The whole congregation responds generously by filling the bags with school items and by completing health kits, sewing kits, and layettes. Soap bars and cash donations for purchasing blankets are also collected, which are forwarded to Lutheran World Relief as well. Used clothing that was not sold in our rummage sale is distributed among various local charities.

Under the leadership of Jane Kline and Becky Miller Pryor we held two very successful rummage sales last year. The funds we raised were matched in part by the Care in Congregations program of Thrivent Financial for Lutherans. These resources made it possible for us to send donations to Shepherd of the Streets, United Churches of Lycoming County, Camp Mt. Luther, St. Anthony's Center, Habitat for Humanity, Church Women United, Lutheran World Relief shipping (Project Comfort), ELCA International Disaster Relief Fund, ELCA Domestic Disaster Relief Fund, Liberia Shipping Container, American Rescue Workers, and the Newberry Branch of the New Garment Agency. For our own church we established a contingency fund of \$500 for the purchase of any needed kitchen items.

Our annual social event is our Women and Children's Dinner. It features a catered dinner with entertainment. This year we included boys to Age 12.

Our very small and faithful group continues to carry on our mission but with diminishing energy. New and additional vitality is needed. To this end we are considering a "Service Day" project. However, we would need help from new volunteers in planning and implementing such an event.

God has richly blessed us with a supportive congregation. We are most grateful to the people of St. Mark's for supplying us with materials for quilts and kits and items for our rummage sales.
