These and many other efforts will continue to be the focus of St. Mark's social outreach in our community.

We have opportunities to reach out to others in the community as well. We have many new neighbors in the community. We have welcomed new members of the community through publicity in the nearby hotels, our Fourth of July programs, and in having community presentations in the church. Visitors get a solid recognition during the service and a written communication of welcome is mailed that afternoon. The feeling is that this is our church, and we want it to be your church as well.

I am continually amazed at the generosity of our members. We have the usual tasks of supporting the physical part of the buildings, the grounds, and the staff. We take care of the day-to-day needs in our finances and we are quick to help whatever cause or need occurs. We are not only givers; we are cheerful givers.

REPORT OF THE COORDINATORS OF YOUTH & FAMILY MINISTRY

*Youth and Family Ministry Coordinators
Bernadette H. Jones and Michele Owen*

The purpose of the ministry of these Coordinators is to proclaim Jesus Christ to each other and to the entire world by planning and administering the total educational program of the parish, as well as its youth and family ministry program. To this end, the Youth and Family Ministry Coordinators supervise educational opportunities, celebrations and fellowship activities for all youth and adults, in and beyond the congregation, in the Christian faith as found in the Bible and the Lutheran tradition.

Sunday Church School:

1. For curriculum, we continue with Augsburg's SPARKS program which is lectionary based. The materials are very "user friendly" and reinforce each Sunday's lesson with the children.
2. Our youth were divided into the following configuration based on numbers, age, and/or grade level: preschool (3-4 year olds—2; grades 3—4; and grade 5.
3. Our middle school class of 6-8 graders continues with the *To Know, to Live, to Grow* program by Augsburg Fortress.
4. The confirmation class includes eight members who meet on the third Sunday of every month with their families, mentors, Pastor and Bernadette. They all have been involved in a variety of service projects.
5. Bob Jones continues teaching the high school class. The curriculum revolves around topics of concern with the students and revisits prayer and parts of the service. The class is consistently attended by 6-8 youth.
6. The monthly rotation schedule for teachers continues to be successful, although volunteers are sparse.
7. Pastor Elkin led the adult class in the Crossways

- room.
8. The Middle Lounge Class for adults was led by Kathy Dancho on a variety of subjects.
9. Vacation Bible School, Gospel Light's *Son West Round-up*, was held in June, 2013. Roughly two dozen children attended, with 14 teen assistants and 11 adults in teaching/support positions.
10. Adult forums were presented in the Crossways Room each Sunday through the summer.
11. We hosted Lutheran Shared Ministry's School of Religion in October.
12. We organized and hosted the Fifteenth Annual Youth Retreat for confirmands in January.
13. The Way, a process of faith formation, under the leadership of Pastor Elkin and Melvin Wentzel continued. Two candidates affirmed their baptism on the Great Easter Vigil, April 19, 2014.
14. Children's Church continued on a once a month schedule during the school year.
15. A joint celebration for all Sunday Church School attendees was held in Fellowship Hall during the Sunday Church School hour at Easter.

Youth and Family Ministry Activities:

1. Passing on Faith remains a keystone of our family ministry at St. Mark's. Milestones celebrated this year: Receiving blankets for newborns; First Communion; Baptismal Lunch with faith chests for recently baptized; Prayer Pillows were given to children ages 2-4; third graders received Holy Communion and their Bibles; The Blessing of the Keys was offered to those youth who became new drivers; "Progressions," the milestone for those young adults leaving for college, the military or business and their parents was celebrated; 70+, Single, and Still Praising God has become an annual event honoring our senior parishioners.
2. The youth of St. Mark's provided the entertainment for their own fundraising dinner in January, as well as cooking and serving for the event. Donna Elkin and Laura Schreckengast took the time to prepare the instrumentalists, while Bob and Declan Jones took charge of the service.
3. The Annual Church Picnic was held at Montoursville's Indian Park.
4. A dinner/pool party was held for first and second year confirmands, their families and mentors in July.
5. A second annual Tweens' Day was held, during which several of our youth went to a member's home to do yard work for them when they could

- not. They were led by Pr. Elkin, Kirk Owen, and Lou DeSeau.
6. Four of our youth were confirmed on the first day of Sunday School, 2013. A reception for the families was held afterward.
 7. Teen Movie Night continues for our youth on the fourth Sunday of every month. There is a consistent attendance on these evenings.
 8. A group pack'n'wrap for Operation Christmas Child was held in November. Participants packed 65 shoe boxes with small gifts for needy children around the world. Enough money was donated to cover the \$7/box shipping.
 9. Family Advent Wreath Making & Luncheon was attended by over two dozen people on the first Sunday of Advent.
 10. Kids' Night Out was a huge success. Over a dozen of our youth assisted.
 11. The participants attending the Christmas Cookie-Baking event produced the cookies sent for our shut-ins.
 12. Christmas Caroling was conducted by 17 carolers, visiting almost all of our shut-ins who were at home.
 13. The Christmas play, "Open Hearts in Bethlehem," was directed by Bernadette. 13 youth presented it for the family service on Christmas Eve. It was a half-hour play which the children memorized.
 14. Over 150 pieces of winter warmers, scarves, hats, and gloves were collected for those in need. 15 teddy bears were collected and given to local shelters.
 15. Bread-baking this year was led by Pr. Elkin and Bernadette: our kitchen was once again filled with laughter and the wonderful smell of baking bread.
 16. Ed Gair continues crafting our Faith Chests for the Baptism Milestone. We still have a few ornaments and keepsakes for various milestones from John & Ruth Burkholder. Bernadette wood burns details on some and creates others.
 17. We trained three new acolytes in January.
 18. We sent two of our youth to the Youth Quake/Zone event in Pittsburgh over the last weekend in January. They wrote comments and expressed thanks which were included in the March *Lion*. Bernadette and Declan chaperoned.
 19. 39 cans of soup and \$380 were collected for "Souper Bowl Sunday," held in February.
 20. A family skating party was held in February; about 20 attended.
 21. Nursery is once again open for the 10:30 service! Brenda Gair is coordinating the volunteers.
 22. This year's Catechetical Trip was to Gettysburg, where Pr. Elkin's friend, Pr. William Jones, acted as tour guide, focusing on how the citizens of the area were affected by the battle. The students' accounts of some of the sites are in the May newsletter.
 23. A new monthly event was added this year: Second Saturday! This is when cooks of all ages and experience levels gather in the kitchen for a seasonal cooking project. In March, it was soup which was shared for Lenten meals, taken to shut-ins, and carried home by participants. In April, it was Easter candy some of which was later sold by the youth.
 24. The Annual Easter Egg Hunt and breakfast with Pastor Elkin was held on Saturday April 19, 2014: about 50 were served, including those decorating the Nave. The children bagged jelly beans and included a card with a special prayer to hand out to the congregation on Easter Sunday. The 10 youth assisting were especially helpful.
 25. The St. Mark's Old Fashion Church Family picnic is scheduled for Sunday, June 1, 2014.
 26. Bernadette and Michele continue to plan the women's dinner.
 27. Summer Choir Camp will be held in July. The program is yet to be decided.
 28. Nick Buckman and Declan Jones schedule and train acolyte volunteers.
- Outreach/Continuing Education:
1. Flyers for Holy Week services and others for St. Mark's were designed and distributed by Bernadette to the downtown hotels and visitors center.
 2. Bernadette attended Little Lambs Open House with flyers about St. Mark's and Sunday School.
 3. The youth of St. Mark's held a fundraising dinner in December. Part of the proceeds went toward their January trip; the balance is being used for the *Project Heifer* charity.
 4. Bernadette attended a 3-day seminar by Vibrant Faith Ministry (formerly Youth & Family Institute) in June with Kathy Wither (Messiah). At it, they learned about developing, targeting and curating websites for different age groups and the resources available.
 5. Our involvement with United Campus Ministry continues.
 6. Pr. Elkin, Michele, and Bernadette attended Faith

- Formation in the 21st Century workshops.
7. Iron Chef Williamsport, our fundraiser for Family Promise of Lycoming County, raised over \$4500 this year. Our youth servers contributed over \$350 from their Tips for a Promise.
 8. Bernadette is active with Lutheran Shared Ministry.
 9. College care packages are sent to our college students for finals in both December and April.
 10. Gary Weber has been instrumental in getting Youth and Family information on St. Mark's website. To that end, we have provided him with text and photographs of our events.

- coordinators for hosting at St. Mark's. Larue Dieter is the scheduling coordinator. Many members of our congregation have made significant commitments to this ministry which occurs four different weeks per year. This is by far the most significant work of the Social Ministry committee.
2. Hosting the community on our front lawn for the Fourth of July festivities. We provided refreshments, information about St. Mark's, a patriotic program in the Nave and good cheer to more than 400 people. We are the only church in the Center City area to provide outreach to the community on this national holiday. I encourage its continuance.
3. Providing food and monetary donations to St. Anthony's Center.
4. Entertaining the 16 residents of the Selinsgrove Center with songs, a story, and gifts for the residents and their caregivers. It is this chairperson's opinion we are better Christians for making this trip each year to visit with the ladies of CM-6.
5. Providing more than 40 general gifts of sweatshirts, socks, pajamas, slippers, and the like for Christmas gifts to the residents of the Danville State Hospital.
6. Collecting hygiene items and making monetary donations to the Shepherd of the Streets Emergency Fund.
7. Supporting the work of The Pregnancy Care Center, Family Promise and Daniel's Closet by providing clothing and baby items through our association with the Newberry Branch of NGA (Needlework Guild of America.)
8. Being grateful for the assistance of Lou DeSeau in any and all ways requested.
9. Welcoming the ongoing assistance from Gary Weber in posting this committee's activities on our web site.

Pastor and other members of the congregation provide service to our community and beyond by volunteering locally at St. Anthony's Center, Shepherd of the Streets and Daniel's Closet.

The impact of over 7,000 units of women networking together is a powerful expression of faith in action. The Women of St. Mark's continue to be an integral part of this mission to fulfill God's call. They have done so by reaching out to help those less fortunate, both locally and globally.

Under the leadership of Becky Miller Pryor, the annual rummage sale raised \$1,486, which was then donated to twelve charities. These organizations were Shepherd of the Streets, United Churches of Lycoming County, Camp Mt. In addition to the quilts, with the help of the entire congregation, kits and soap were donated to Lutheran World Relief. A monetary collection of \$313 was sent to the synod to purchase blankets in bulk.

Another enjoyable Women and Children's Dinner was coordinated by Bernadette and Michele. The meal was prepared and served by the men of St. Mark's under the supervision of Bob Jones. Les Chanteuses, the Williamsport High School Women's Ensemble, provided excellent entertainment.

The support from the whole congregation of St. Mark's has been heartwarming. All requests for donations of goods or money for our projects have been met with generous response.
