PASTORAL ACTS IN 1947

• The work of Saint Mark's begins with its youngest members when they are made Children of God through Holy Baptism . . .

77 children were baptized in 1947.

16 adults were baptized in His Name.

• Young People and Adults come into the fellowship of Christ's Church through Confirmation.

32 were confirmed last year.

- Many new members come to Saint Mark's by letter of transfer . . . 58 last year.
- Altogether 90 new members were received into Saint Mark's during the past year.

MUSIC

Saint Mark's four choirs contribute immeasurably to the joy and beauty of the Services . . . the Senior Choir every Sunday morning, the younger Choirs on special occasions. More than 90 children and 30 adults enjoy worship through participation in the musical program under the direction of Frederick A. Snell, Minister of Music.
