The congregation is asked to please stand for all hymns and remain standing until the conclusion of each corresponding prayer.

<u>THE SERVICE OF LIGHT</u>

The first part of the Vigil centers on fire and light, the visible symbol of Christ, who proclaimed himself "The Light of the World". On Easter morning Christ arose, resplendent as the dawning sun, thereby conquering death forever. With this thought in mind we assist at the lighting of the Easter Candle, the carrying and distribution of this burning candle through the church, and the Easter Announcement, "Rejoice now..." We anticipate our joyful sharing of Christ's triumph in resurrection.

THE RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL PROMISES

The second part of the Vigil has as its center the mystery of Baptism, by which the light of Christ was first given to each of us. Through Holy Baptism we died to sin to rise with Christ - going down into the font in death in order to come up cleansed from sin and alive to God. The readings show this transformation by recounting Old Testament events that foreshadowed it. The blessing of the baptismal water leads up to renewal of the resolve of the whole congregation to live with the Baptismal promise of the Risen Christ. Then the Litany is prayed, as we ask God to help us keep our baptismal vows.

THE FIRST COMMUNION OF EASTER

With the grand ringing of bells, the chancel becomes a proper setting for Easter joy. We have reached the climax of the Easter Vigil - the **feast of the risen Christ**. As baptized members of Christ's Body, we share the feast of Christ's presence and then leave the church to go and tell the Good News.

THE SERVICE OF LIGHT

In the Chapel

*Gathering The Lord be with you. And also with you. Let us pray. O God, you are like a refiner's fire, and your Spirit kindles the hearts of your faithful people. Bless this flame and those who keep this Easter Festival that, burning with desire for life with you, they may be found ready to take part in that festival of light which has no end; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

May the darkness of our hearts and minds be dispelled by the light of the Christ who rises this night in glory. **Amen.**

O God, bless this lighted candle and those upon whom it may shine, that all who this night shall take part in your holy Mysteries may be filled with your blessing; that as we were once in darkness but are now in the light of the Lord, we may walk as children of light. **Amen.**

Individual candles are lit from the one candle as the congregation moves toward the nave.

***The Easter Proclamation - The Exsultet**

Rejoice now, all heavenly powers! Sing choirs of angels! Exult, all creation around God's throne! Jesus Christ is risen!. Sound forth, O trumpet of salvation, for the triumph of the King. Celebrate the divine mysteries with exultation; and for so great a victory, sound the trumpet of salvation. Rejoice, O earth, in shining splendor, radiant in the brightness of your king! Christ has conquered! Glory fills you! Darkness vanishes forever. Rejoice, O holy church! Exult in glory! The risen Savior shines upon you! Let this place resound with joy, echoing the mighty song of all God's people.

A Reading from Exodus: Exodus 14:10-31; 15:20-21 (Deliverance at the Red Sea)

*Hymn LBW, "Green," 132 Stanzas 1 and 2

Let us pray. O God, whose wonderful deeds of old shine forth even to our own day: By the power of your mighty arm you once delivered your people from slavery under Pharaoh, a sign for us of the salvation of all nations by the water of Baptism. Grant that all the people of earth may be numbered among the offspring of Abraham and may rejoice in the inheritance of Israel; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

A Reading from Isaiah: Isaiah 55:1-11 (Salvation freely offered to all)

*Hymn LBW, "Green," 343 Stanzas 1 and 2

Let us pray. Holy God, you created all things by the power of your Word, and you renew the whole earth by your Spirit. Give now the water of life to all who thirst for you, that, rejoicing in your covenant of mercy, we may bring forth abundant fruit, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **Amen.**

***RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL PROMISES**

It is truly right and proper that we should at all times and places give thanks to you, O Lord, Holy Father, almighty and everlasting God.

(The Pastor touches the water.)


- Your Spirit in the beginning moved over the face of the waters and even now brings about a new creation in the font of rebirth;
- You fashion from our old nature an offspring of heaven;
- You have commanded your disciples to "Go, teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

(The Pastor sprinkles water in the four directions)

• You promise to be present with us so that this clear water may provide a cleansing of body and spirit.

(The Pastor divides the water in the shape of the cross.)

Let the power of the Holy Spirit come down and regenerate by water and word each time we baptize. In this font will every stain of sin be washed away, here begins new life through Christ our Lord.



Family of God: On this most holy night, we recall God's saving actions and keep vigil in celebration of the joyful resurrection. The Apostle Paul says, "We were buried therefore with Christ by baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in the newness of life."

Therefore, people of God:

Do you renounce the forces of evil, the devil, and all his empty promises?

We renounce them.

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father Almighty,

Creator of Heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

I believe in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the Power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into Heaven. And is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

Do you, Megan and Shawn renew your promise to live in this faith and in the covenant of your Baptism, and as a members of the Church and this congregation be diligent in the use of the Means of Grace and in prayer?


THE LESSONRomans 6:1-11

Should we continue in sin in order that grace may abound? By no means! How can we who died to sin go on living in it? Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.

For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin.


For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

***THE GOSPEL ACCLAMATION**





Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.' Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes. But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord:' and she told them that he had said these things to her. The Gospel of the Lord.





For as often as we eat this bread and drink form this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.


Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.


Join our prayers with those of your saints of every time and place, and unite them with ceaseless petitions of our great high priest until he comes as victorious Lord of all.

THE LORD'S SUPPER

If you cannot eat bread, drink only the wine. If you cannot drink wine, eat only the bread.
