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COUNCIL UPDATE

The Congregation Council met on Monday, September 19, 2005 in the Crossways room. They:

- ❖ heard Pastor Elkin describe the function of the Society of the Holy Trinity and how it benefits the work of the pastor.
- ❖ moved unanimously to commend Raymond Bohartz, Jr. to Sugar Valley Church of the Brethren.
- ❖ moved unanimously to issue letter of transfer to Pastor Susie Burd Hill to her new parish in Illinois.
- ❖ moved unanimously to accept the recommendation of the Executive Committee that was developed after a series of meetings in the past month with representatives of Stephen Ministry, the Mutual Ministry Committee, and Bishop Main, advising that the Pastor and the Mutual Ministry Committee adopt a new approach to their relationship
- ❖ heard reports from the standing committees, and added questions and comments.
- ❖ noted that Susan Newcomer will be speaking with the Stephen Ministers and any other interested persons on September 22 on the subject of autism.
- ❖ reviewed the "handles" from the Transformation project, noting those things that have been done and the number of projects remaining that need a person or persons to undertake them.
- ❖ noted that the fall stewardship emphasis has not yet been developed, and that work on this is needed immediately.



The Council will next meet on October 17.

“BEAR ONE ANOTHER’S BURDENS” (CONTINUED FROM SEPTEMBER *LION*)

Why do we have Stephen Ministry? People sometimes may ask or think, why do we need Stephen Ministers—don't we have pastors to provide caring ministry? Our pastors are like firefighters—when a crisis happens, they rush to the scene to put out the fire. But shortly after that, another fire will break out in our congregation, and they'll rush to that scene. They still will provide care to the victims of the first fire, but their time quickly becomes consumed by the second, third, and fourth fires. This is on top of their other duties as pastors.

This is where Stephen Ministers come in. The pastors will always be our firefighters, but Stephen Ministers are people who come in after the fire is put out (and sometimes before) and help the victims sort through and clear the debris and begin to rebuild. Stephen Ministers continue to give care as long as needed during the rebuilding process—one month, two months, six months, possibly a year or more. They provide the steady, consistent one-to-one follow up care that our pastors want to, but simply cannot provide.

We Are All Called to Care

We have Stephen Ministry because God calls every one of us to love and care for one another. Remember the story Jesus told in Matthew 25, when the people asked, “Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and wel-

come you or naked and cloth you? When did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?” Jesus wasn't telling that story only to pastors; he was speaking to all of us.

Putting Spiritual Gifts to Use

The Holy Spirit has blessed us all with gifts for ministry. Stephen Ministry provides a place where those who have the gifts for caring ministry can put them to use in a meaningful way.

The Needs are There

Why did Sir Edmund Hillary climb Mount Everest? Because it was there. Why do we have a caring ministry to meet people's needs? Because the needs are there. Sometimes the needs are quiet and can go unnoticed. Sometimes people think, “My need isn't important enough—I'll go it alone.” Or we want to look the other way just as the three men did who preceded the Samaritan on the road to Jericho. The needs are there—people's hearts are wounded, their lives broken. They are in need of Christ's love and healing. Stephen Ministry helps our church meet the many needs that are out there.

Reaching Out With Christ's Love

Stephen Ministry can be a wonderful outreach of Christ's love both our own members and to the community. In the second chapter of his epistle, James tells us, “Faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead.” He says we need to be “doers of the Word, not just hearers.” Just talking about loving and caring for one another doesn't automatically make us a loving and caring congregation. We need to be doers! Stephen Ministry is a wonderful way to be doers of the Gospel. We can knock on the door of an unchurched person and say, “Jesus loves you,” and they *might* listen.

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But if we meet their needs for care during a difficult time in their life and let them experience Jesus' love and forgiveness working through a Stephen Minister, they *will* listen.

Fulfills the mission of Our Congregation

Stephen Ministry also fits in with the mission of our congregation. The basic objective of our Social Ministry Committee states that its purpose is to proclaim Jesus Christ to each other and to all the world by providing the opportunities to share God's love. To this end the Committee will address social needs by leading the congregation

in extending Christian compassion and helpfulness to the ill, aged, orphaned, and persons of all ages in need.

Jesus' Great Commandment and Great Commission

One final reason for Stephen Ministry. Jesus gave us his Great Commandment: "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39) and his Great Commission: "Therefore go and make disciples" (Matthew 28:19). Stephen Ministry is one tangible way we can fulfill Jesus' Great Commandment and Great Commission.

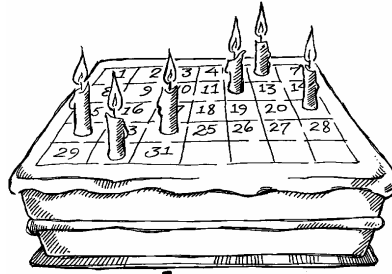

HEALTH, HEALING AND WHOLENESS

(Thanks to Jane Larson, St. Mark's Lutheran Church, for suggesting this month's topic!)

It probably occurs in at least one church, in every denomination, on every Sunday, coast to coast. You see it happening in marching bands, and choir performances, and backyard picnics. It also happens regularly at Red Cross Blood Drives. What is "it"? Fainting ...passing out ... syncope (from the Greek meaning "to cut off") ... you lose consciousness, feel your legs turning into Jell-O...your brain gets 'fuzzy', and some swear they can suddenly 'hear the ocean'.

Fainting occurs when the blood supply to the brain is momentarily inadequate. This loss of consciousness is typically a brief, one time occurrence, yet it is still important to attempt to pinpoint its cause. Triggers can range from simply standing up quickly, to heart or brain disorders, so it is important that any fainting be treated as a medical emergency. Other causes of fainting include: sitting or standing for long periods of time (blood pools in the legs), medication for high blood pressure, drop in blood sugar, dehydration, prolonged coughing, breathing too fast (hyperventilating), or cardiac arrest. Fainting is seen twice as often in adults 70 years and older, and 3-4 times as often in adults age 80 and older.

What should you do? If you feel faint, lie down with your feet elevated. If you cannot lie down, sit down, and place your head between your legs (both positions allow the heart to pump blood back to the heart and brain more easily). If you are in worship, it is fine to remain seated throughout the service. Let someone know that you are not feeling well. Do not drive – have someone else take you home.

If someone else faints:

1. **Position the person on his/her back with legs elevated.**
2. **Watch the airway carefully for blockage or vomiting.**
3. **Follow through on emergency assessment A-B-Cs – airway, breathing, circulation**
If breathing has stopped, the problem is more than a simple fainting spell. Get emergency medical help immediately by dialing 9-1-1
4. **Help restore blood flow.** If the person is breathing keep legs elevated, loosen restrictive clothing (belts, collars, ties). He/She should revive quickly. If the person does not regain consciousness in 1 –2 minutes, call 9-1-1, and keep watch on airway, breathing and pulse.
5. **Make sure he/she follows up with a physician.** The doctor needs to know if there was any chest pain, shortness of breath, palpitations, heart racing, as well as what the person was doing prior to passing out. He/She will then decide if further testing is warranted.

This is a situation, in which, it is better to be safe than sorry! Keep ammonia inhalants (smelling salts) on hand in your first aid kit. Make sure your parish nurse; pastor, staff, and ushers are trained to administer CPR. If you have a pacemaker or an implanted heart defibrillator, be sure someone in your congregation knows about it. If in doubt, call 9-1-1.

If you are prone to fainting, avoid prolonged sitting – get up and walk every 45 – 60 minutes. When sitting, flex and contract your calf muscles to keep blood flowing. If driving a long distance, take hourly breaks – get out and walk around. Ask your doctor if you should consider wearing support stockings/hose to assist leg circulation. Finally, follow his/her advice regarding any medication changes or adjustments.

If a congregation member should faint during a worship service, it is comforting for the worship leader, to lead the congregation quietly in prayer, as trained responders take action.

“When my spirit grows faint within me, it is you who know my way” (Ps. 142:3a, NIV).
