- If you are the one who has suffered the loss, it will be tempting to shut yourself away from persons and activities. Resist it as much as you can. Allow others into your life; they are trying to figure out how to be helpful to you!
- If you sense that someone you know has been away from church for awhile, encourage him or her to discover that Advent is a great time to begin again to hear the Good News of Jesus Christ together with the rest of us here in St. Mark's.
- Mark your calendar to reserve the afternoon of December 18 for a series of activities. We'll be erecting and decorating the large Christmas tree in the nave after we share in a sandwich lunch. Then we can join those who are gathering for the annual Remembrance Service in the Nave at 4:00 P.M., to console and encourage those who have suffered losses.
- Set aside some time to travel with us to the Selinsgrove Center to provide a Christmas party for some of the residents there. Such joy we can share with a modest effort! We leave from the church at 6:00 PM on Tuesday, December 6, and return home by 9:00 PM.

I'm sure you get the idea that the **best gift is** yourself!

The Congregation Council met in regular session on Monday, November 21, following a delicious dinner hosted by the President and spouse, Bud and Joyce Hershberger, at the Women's Club building. The Council:

-- received the regular reports of officers and committees.

--heard the positive report from the preliminary results of Consecration Sunday.

--noted the continuing discussion about Holy Communion.

--reviewed the extensive list of activities under the leadership of our Youth and Family Ministry coordinators.

--took note that the Finance Committee has set aside \$600 in Welker benevolence funds toward the Liberia container shipment costs of \$8,000.

--realized that two of our computers had to be permanently retired and replaced.

--rejoiced that Bernadette Jones, having completed the probationary period, has been raised to the job rate of pay.

-- approved a budget for 2006 in the amount of \$331,906

--moved to call a Special Congregation Assembly for December 11 following the 10:30 service for the purpose of considering the 2006 budget presented by the Council.

HEALTH, HEALING AND WHOLENESS

As I write this article, heading for the far side of forty, I am reminded of a Japanese concept that I learned several years ago; Wabi-Sabi. Wabi-Sabi is a way of life, which sees beauty in things, which are imperfect, humble, modest, perhaps unconventional. What a grace-filled term! Ask me what I would like for Christmas, and it would be Wabi-Sabi – gaining maximum pleasure from minimum objects. It would mean that I shift focus from the razzle-dazzle of a commercial Christmas, and center on the modest, humble beginnings of the Christ; the Messiah born in the unconventional setting of a Galilean stable.



I once read a story of a group of kids putting together a Christmas play. To show the radiance of the newborn Jesus, a light bulb was hidden in the manger. All the room lights were to be turned off, so only the brightness of the manger would fill the set. But the young man controlling the lights got flustered and confused, and **all** the lights went out. It was a tense moment for the director, broken only when one of the "sheep" in a loud stage whisper, said, "**Hey! You switched off Jesus!**"

So how *do* we capture the essence of simplicity so we don't "switch off" Jesus? For starters, how we as adults in a child's life, parents, grandparents, neighbors, aunts and uncles, celebrate the season has enormous impact on a child's view of Christmas. Here are some concrete suggestions that might help keep the light on Christ:

- Bring the child to church, so that he/she comes to understand the concept of Advent. Remember that faith is caught, not taught.
- Prepare for Jesus birth with advent candles or an advent calendar. There are many great Advent books with family meditations ask you pastor to recommend one to you.
- Give gifts to others have you ever noticed how excited a child gets when they have the opportunity to *give* a gift to someone? Take this one step further after Christmas by asking, "What did you *give* for Christmas?" rather than, "What did you get for Christmas?"
- For children and adults alike, check out alternative opportunities for giving, such as SERRV International Heifer International, which allows you to purchase a live animal that will then be given to a family in need from somewhere around the world. Or how about your local food bank, Habitat for Humanity; or this year, your church disaster-relief fund?
- If you enjoy nativity sets, buy one which the children can *play with* talk about Mary, Joseph, Jesus, and the shepherds.
- Read and share stories. Kids of *all* ages enjoy having someone read to them (Even those on 'the far side of forty!'). If you haven't already, make reading the Christmas story from the Gospel of Luke a family tradition before exchanging gifts.
- Develop unique family traditions. I read of a family who sleeps under the Christmas tree once each season. The author stated, "It's a warm time to be together, talk and snuggle!"
- * Share your holiday with someone who does not have family a friend, neighbor, co-worker.
- * Take a meal to someone who is homebound better yet, stay and eat it *with* them!
- Offer respite for someone who is a caregiver so he/she can shop, worship, get a haircut.
- Here's hoping that you and your loved ones enjoy a Wabi-Sabi Advent and Christmas! So... "Ring the bells that still ring; Forget your perfect offering; There's a crack in everything; That's how the light gets in!" (Author unknown)

Sweet Potato Crisp

1 pkg. (8 oz.) PHILADELPHIA Cream Cheese, softened
 1 can (40 oz.) cut sweet potatoes, drained
 3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar, divided
 1/4 tsp. ground cinnamon
 1 cup chopped apples
 2/3 cup chopped cranberries
 1/2 cup flour
 1/2 cup old-fashioned or quick-cooking oats, uncooked
 1/3 cup cold butter or margarine
 1/4 cup chopped PLANTERS Pecans



PREHEAT oven to 350°F. Beat cream cheese, sweet potatoes, 1/4 cup of the sugar and cinnamon with electric mixer on medium speed until well blended. Spoon into 1-1/2-quart casserole dish; top with apples and cranberries. **MIX** flour, oats and remaining 1/2 cup sugar in medium bowl; cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in pecans. Sprinkle over fruit mixture. **BAKE** 35 to 40 minutes or until heated through.

Wild Rice

1 - 2 stalks celery, chopped1/4 cup onion, chopped2 Tbls. Butter

Melt butter in pan, cook onion and celery until tender.

Add 1 cup wild rice and cook for another 3 minutes. Add 1 (14 1/2 oz.) can chicken broth and 1 cup water. Bring to boil, reduce heat and cover. Simmer 50 - 60 minutes or until liquid is absorbed. (If you use a mixture of wild and long-grain rice, this will reduce the cooking time.)

Add:

1/2 cup dried cranberries
1/2 cup chopped dates
1/4 cup of slivered almonds
(you may adjust these measurements according to your preference). Cover and heat for 3 minutes.
Serve.

Pumpkin Torte

Mix together: 2 cups flour 2 sticks softened butter 1 cup finely crushed walnuts Pat in a 13x9 pan. Bake 350 - 15 minutes. Cool.

Beat together: 2-8 oz. cream cheese, softened 2 cups whipped topping (Cool Whip) 2 cups powdered sugar 1 1/2 tsp. vanilla Spread on cooled crust. Chill.

Beat together:

2 regular size instant vanilla pudding
2 cups whipped topping
2 cups canned pumpkin
1 1/3 cups milk
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice

Spread on second layer. Chill. Top with additional whipped topping and sprinkle with nuts.

UNITED CHURCHES HIGHLIGHTS

Pastor Elkin and Matt Fortin attended the 59th annual banquet and meeting of the United Churches of Lycoming County on November 4, held at St. John Methodist Church in Newberry. Some of the highlights:

(1) St. Mark's member **Kathy Kolb** was one of two persons honored with the **Ecumenical Service Award** for her continuing dedication to prison ministry, Lutheran Shared Ministry, Big Brothers—Big Sisters, Child in Our Hands, etc. She and Lou were only briefly in attendance at the event, so that they could get to the County prison for their regular Thursday eve. session.

(2) It is clear that the demands being placed on the **Shepherd of the Streets** and associated ministries is increasing. The Shepherd worked with 4,743 persons in the past 12 months, up from 3,970 in the previous period. They used more than \$182,000 in these situations, and many persons had to be turned away for lack of funds and material resources. [Pastor Elkin filled in for the Shepherd several afternoons during the Shepherd's vacation, and saw first-hand the difficulties and frustrations of not having adequate resources to meet the real needs presented.]

(3) The wide range of activities of the United Churches is reflected in the names of the various committees and agencies: Dept. of Educational Ministries, Dept. of Christian Social Concerns, Dept. of Campus Ministry, Committee for Ecumenical Youth Ministry, Newspaper Sermon Ministry, Church Women United of Lycoming County, Dept. of Institutional Ministries (which held more than 500 worship services in the nursing homes and other institutions during the year), Committee on Prison Ministry, Dept. of Broadcast Ministries, Dept. of Television Ministry, Food Pantry Emergency Fuel Fund, and the Interfaith Dialogue Commission. Whew!

(4) Another of our members, **Bernadette Jones**, was one of the two thespians asked to present sketches of four individuals who have been prominent in the distinguished history of the United Churches.
