A Divine Experience

You are cordially invited to the 17th Annual benefit organ concert, *A Divine Experience*, on Sunday, November 12, 2006, at 4:00 p.m., in St. Mark's Lutheran Church, 142 Market Street, Williamsport, PA. The program includes the *world premiere* of a new organ duet commissioned especially for the concert, *A Leap of Faith* by Bill Reichenbach. Our special guests, *Stained Grass Window*, delight audiences with down-home bluegrass music. Tickets are \$8.00/individual or \$15.00/family. Other tax-deductible sponsorships are: Friend (\$25-49), Giver (\$50-74), Contributor (\$75-99), Supporter (\$100-249), Donor (\$250-499) and Benefactor (\$500+). Concert proceeds support dialysis patients of the Susquehanna Valley. Dialysis is a life-sustaining treatment that, despite technological and clinical advances, requires patients to spend three hours a day, three days a week, connected to a machine that cleans their blood. The treatment is rigorous for the patients and their families.

Last year, concert proceeds permitted Susquehanna Health and North Central Pennsylvania Dialysis Clinics to distribute a unique dialysis cookbook designed to help patients maintain the special diet they require. In the very first year, distribution exceeded 240 cookbooks, necessitating a second order be placed to meet ongoing demand. Your contribution will continue to provide this educational material. Susquehanna Health and North Central Pennsylvania Dialysis Clinics are constantly augmenting educational, psychological and social programming, thereby strengthening the physical and mental well being of patients and their families.



This year, concert funding will support new initiatives as well as ongoing projects. The inpatient dialysis services at The Williamsport Hospital & Medical Center have increased by more than four times the number of treatments each month. This increase requires renovation and expansion to improve patient comfort and privacy. Your contribution will help fund these improvements to the inpatient unit. Concert proceeds also help to provide the "extras" that sustain dialysis patients throughout the length of their treatment.

This concert is our labor of love because we understand the issues that dialysis patients throughout the Susquehanna Valley face each day. With your help, the physical discomfort, psycho/social impact of treatment can be minimized for the nearly 200 patients per month receiving care. We ask you to give generously and make a tangible difference in the lives of those with kidney disease. We simply can't do it without you.

It is one of the most feared mental disorders because of it's gradual, yet relentless, attack on memory not to mention the physical and behavioral deterioration.

This annual "Alzheimer's Awareness Candlelight Vigil" helps to raise Alzheimer's awareness in our community about the importance of finding treatments, preventions and ultimately a cure for Alzheimer's Disease. This is an opportunity to honor loved ones who have lost their battle to this debilitating disease and to recognize those still suffering with it. Please come and take part in this meaningful service. Support family members, caregivers, volunteers, advocates and anyone who has made a difference for those suffering from Alzheimer's Disease.

From within our own congregation, Bob and Anne Miller have been coping with the effects of Alzheimer's

since before Anne was diagnosed in 1998. Several years before she was diagnosed she began to lose her memory. Shortly after being diagnosed she chose to retire from the career she had enjoyed for almost 20 years. As Anne's functional level has declined Bob has adjusted his daily routine to be able to care for her. Since Anne is no longer verbal Bob has learned how to read Anne's many non-verbal cues to understand her needs. Bob states that as long as he is able to take care of her, Anne will continue to live at home with him. Anne also has a caregiver 5 days a week during the day allowing Bob to continue to work. Bob is quick to recognize the love, encouragement and support they receive from the congregation as vital to his success as a caregiver.

#### **Music Notes**

(Summarized from the November 1969 Parish News)

On October 17, 1969 the ten bronze bells cast by the Petit & Fritsen Company of Aarle-Rixtle, Holland, were installed in the bell tower of our new church. Cast in bronze on the exterior of the bells are the following inscriptions along with the weight and pitch tone of each bell:

1100 lb. 'A' bell. "Gloria Patri" "In the beginning, God..."

760 lb. 'B' bell. "Gloria Filio" "I know that my Redeemer liveth."

530 lb. 'C sharp' bell. "Gloria Spiritui Sancto" "The Spirit of Truth...shall testify of me."

440 lb. D' bell. "Come before his presence with Thanksgiving."

310 lb. 'E' bell. "I will set up Shepherds over them."

225 lb. 'F sharp' bell. "In memory of St Mark's Service Men., "Proclaim liberty throughout the

land, unto the inhabitants thereof."

190 lb. 'G' bell. To all who make music "Soli Deo Gloria"

165 lb. 'G sharp' bell. In honor of St. Mark's men.
147 lb. 'A' bell. In honor of St. Mark's women.

121 lb. 'B' bell. In honor of St. Mark's children.

#### THANKOFFERING SUNDAY - November 19, 2006

What Are "Thankofferings?"

Thankofferings are offerings given as an expression of thanks along with a prayer. There are moments in our everyday lives when we are particularly thankful to God. 
#### Oh Pastor, Where Art Thou?

#### Digging Up Ancient Tiberias

An International Team Begins Ten-Year Project



Tiberias was an important cultural center during the Roman and Byzantine periods. In the third century A.D., Tiberias became the seat of Jewish political, religious ad cultural activity in ancient Israel. The Palestinian Talmud was compiled and edited in Tiberias, and Jewish institutions there thrived until the tenth century. Though inhabited predominately by Jews, the city also hosted sizable Christian and Muslim communities.



The team began by re-exposing parts of the ancient city that had been excavated in the 1950s by Bezalel Rabani, who died before publishing his results. Among the buildings uncovered so far is a large bathhouse with a polychromatic mosaic floor from the sixth century A.D. Hirschfeld and Galor's team also uncovered an 18-foot bronze chain from the Fatimid period (969-1069 A.D.) next to colored glass fragments, suggesting that they had been used to decorate a monumental building. Hirschfeld and Galor also unearthed an Abbasid-period (650-868 A.D.) installation for making pigments; chemicals from the site are being examined by scientists at the Weizmann Institute. -M.S.

#### A Land of Renewed Hope: Reflections on Recent Journey to Liberia

"I'm going to have a rigorous agenda — introducing structural change. The renewal of Liberia means a new political order, a new social order, a new economic order. It involves far-reaching reforms — constitutional reform, land reform, judicial reform, civil service reform, and decentralization of power." — President-elect Ellen Johnson-Sirleaf

Courage, conviction, and renewed determination are just some of the ways to best describe the words of Madam Ellen, newlyinaugurated president of Liberia. With a renewed sense of hope and motivation, this is what a recent visitor to Liberia sees today.

Yes, peace is fragile. There is much to be done in order to restore and rebuild a nation and its people after fourteen years of civil war which left no one untouched and no institution unharmed. But there is joy and enthusiasm. Realistic optimism is the venue for the day. It's heartwarming to see smiles again on the faces of the average person. Patience, hard work, and understanding will remain key ingredients in the recipe of hope which is the first step in the long process of leaning into the future.

The same enthusiasm seen in the faces of the average citizen is observed in the two one-week seminars I participated in with colleagues Pr. Al Swingle and Pr. Detlef Huckfeldt in January 2006. We team-taught in the small village of Totota, about a two-hour drive from Monrovia into the interior of the country. The second week we were joined by the same number of deacons and deaconesses.

As team teachers we surveyed Holy Scripture, Lutheran theology, and the Lutheran liturgy, with its application in the West African context. There was lively discussion, good conversation, fine food and fellowship, along with educational evening programs. We learned from each other. We were all teachers and students, speakers and good listeners, as we shared stories while sharing life in the Spirit, because no one present took for granted the truth that it was God who brought us together.

With other travelers from around the world, the United States,

and the Upper Susquehanna Synod, this was my third visit to Liberia. It was a joyful experience to witness the country beginning to reemerge from civil strife. With other global agencies, the ELCA in cooperation and partnership with the Lutheran Church in Liberia, remains committed to supporting programs in revitalization, reconciliation, and trauma healing.

Kris Randall from Australia and his aunt Liz Cooper (sister of Lois Randall) from Nebraska, stayed at Phebe Hospital. Liz taught classes for the nursing school, with a special emphasis on diabetes. Many Liberians develop diabetes due to years of malnutrition during the war.

Kris taught computer classes. Students of the beginners' class had never worked with a computer before. Insufficient literacy

posed an additional challenge. The two other classes worked hard to advance their computer skills.

Together with Rev. Al Swingle of Washington DC, two USS pastors, Rev. Ron Shellhamer and Rev. Detlef Huckfeldt, conducted workshops for pastors, deacons, and congregation leaders. A oneweek workshop for about 70 pastors of the Lutheran Church in Liberia was held at the Lay Ministry Training Center (LMTC) in Totota. A second workshop was held for about 70 deacons.

Rev. Jesse King, head of the LMTC and Rev. Finn Hougard LMTC consultant of the Lutheran Church in Denmark had called

#### Evangelical Lutheran Worship Introductory Events Planned

I've been asked this question a few times, so perhaps others are wondering also about registration, and can we register at a different event than the one in our own conference.

- You may come to any event in any conference
- Registration was left to the host pastor for the purpose of having a count for lunch. Please call the church where you would like to go to the workshop and ask if you need to register. (Local Contact numbers are in the September issue of Seeds for the Parish)
- 3. Several months ago, we had to estimate how many would come to each workshop site. As you may imagine, this was a trick question. So, we guessed. However, if I find out from the host pastor that many have registered for lunch, then I will juggle books from other sites to try to accommodate the crowd. What a wonderful problem to have!



- 4. I have received a directive from Chicago last week that if there are not enough books available, one of our team will take names and addresses of those not receiving a copy, and one will be ordered for them at no extra cost. If there is a large crowd and not enough books, we will just share during the training event.
- "Walk-ins" are welcome at each site. If there is not enough lunch for walk-ins, they can adjourn to a fast-food place. We would, however, expect and hope that you would return for the segments that follow the meal.
- So, please come to the workshops, bring your choirs, your kids, your friends and all who have an interest in worship.

Gathering music and liturgy for the ELW was a five-year process. It involved collecting information from many theologians and musicians, along with responses from people who submitted feedback from the Renewing Worship volumes and from churches which served as test sites for two new settings of liturgy, including

the pastors and deacons together and made sure that food and lodging was arranged.

Due to the war, few leaders of the church had the opportunity to receive a good formal education. Pastors and deacons want to learn Lutheran theology but lack the resources. Not even Luther's Small Catechism is available. The Kpelle translation is out of print.

Pr. Huckfeldt introduced Lutheran history and theology and taught classes on the *Small Catechism*, which the Upper Susquehanna Synod gave to the pastors. Pr. Shellhamer taught about Lutheran worship. Pr. Swingle lectured on the theology of the cross. He served in Liberia from 1963 to 1977 and speaks Kpelle.

We got the chance to visit his former parish in Parakole. In the sixties the town was accessible by airplane and had about a hundred houses. Today Parakole can only be reached after a five-hour walk on jungle paths, crossing the St. Paul's River in a dugout canoe. Only a few houses had survived the war. Not many people had returned to their homesteads that have been destroyed twice during the war.

Only two people were old enough to remember Pr. Swingle. Parish workshops were held at St. Andrew's Lutheran Church, Salala and in Sanoyea Lutheran Church. Prs. Shellhamer and Swingle had to return earlier, which gave Pr. Huckfeldt a chance to join the work team at Curran Lutheran Hospital. six in this synod.

The new worship book, Evangelical Lutheran Worship, is about who we are as Lutherans; it is about a church that is the Body of Christ and is therefore many colors, languages, styles, backgrounds, and pieties. It is about worship, about disciples connected, claimed, gathered and sent. The title of the book speaks about the book: Evangelical — reflecting our commitment to proclaim the good news; Lutheran — true to a confessional and reforming identity; Worship — ten settings of the liturgy, hymns and songs, all 150 Psalms translated by Hebrew scholars into poetry that is meant for singing. Included in the book are expanded prayer resources, a service of healing, Luther's Small Catechism and more.

This book is to be a core resource for worship. It will be a common treasury that reminds us that we are held together in Christ. It is not just for the Upper Susquehanna Synod, or for Pennsylvania, or Region 8, but it is for the whole of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. It may not satisfy the critique of each individual, but it is greater than any individual's preference, it is a book for the church.

#### **Nurses Notes**

**November 5** According to Lona Sandon, a registered dietitian at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center, the sleep disruption that may accompany the end of daylight savings time, can trigger over eating. She recommends you ride out your cravings for a few days, until your body has had an opportunity to adjust. (*Prevention*, October 2006)

**November 12** Got a fat cat? It seems the more humanlike the relationship between owner and cat, the chunkier the kitty – 27% more likely! The researchers suspect that food serves as a means of getting the cat's attention, and suggest swapping treats for more play and scratching behind the ears. (*Prevention*, October 2006)

**November 19** Don't forget ... to prevent food certain types of food poisoning, put that turkey and stuffing into the fridgwithin an hour of serving (With the stuffing removed from the bird!) Thoroughly reheat any left-overs!

**November 26 iPoditis?** It is a good idea to limit both the volume and time spent wearing headphones, but especially earbuds. Experts suggest limiting exposure to sounds of 90 decibels (about the same as a vacuum cleaner or lawnmower) to no more than 1 hour per day. (www.RealAge.com)



#### HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

#### November 2006

"Keep his decrees and commands, which I am giving you today, so that it may go well with you and your children after you and that you may live long in the land the Lord your God gives you for all time."

(Deut. 6:40, NIV)

Thanksgiving is just around the corner. Many of us will be gathering with family, and giving thanks to God for the many blessings we have received from His hand. It will be time to catch up on the latest from Aunt Sue, Grandma, Uncle Ben – time to pass the potatoes, stuffing and pumpkin pie. This year, consider sharing more than just food and news. Thanksgiving is the perfect opportunity to fill in your family health history!

Our family histories may turn out to be one of the most important factors in whether or not we develop certain types of diseases, such as: diabetes, stroke, high cholesterol, cancer, and others. Knowing what we may be more prone to, can be the first step we take in prevention. We may not be able to change your genes, but we can certainly become aware of, and learn to decrease, those risk factors in our lives that may predispose us toward certain illnesses. For instance, quitting smoking if we have had a close relative with oral or lung cancer, or reducing cholesterol if our family is prone to heart disease, getting routine mammograms if we have a history of breast cancer – to name only a few.

According to the US Dept. of Health & Human Services, key features of a family health history that increase risk are:

- Diseases that occur at an earlier age than expected (10-20 years before most people get the disease).
- Disease in more than one close relative.
- Disease that does not usually affect a certain gender (for example, breast cancer in a male).
- Certain combinations of diseases within a family (for example breast and ovarian cancer, or, heart disease and diabetes).

Some diseases, such as diabetes, may follow a generational pattern, putting us at higher risk for developing the disease, or for developing it at an earlier age. It <u>does not</u> necessarily mean that we will develop the illness for certain. Genes are only one factor contributing to disease development.

The best way to learn about your family health history is to talk to your family. Ask questions. Draw a family tree, and record health information – square shapes for men, and circles for women. Take notice if certain diseases occur more often than others. Gather lifestyle information, such as heavy drinking, or smoking. Collect information about you, your children, brothers & sisters, parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, nieces and nephews. Make a note if they are deceased, and if known, the cause of death. There may be some blank areas, or if you are adopted, you may face the added challenge of accessing this information (The National Adoption Clearinghouse is a resource that may be able to help with the process – http://naic.acf.hhs.gov/adopted/search/index.cfm.).

Then, put what you've learned to good use! Once it is collected, share the information with your doctor and your parish nurse. They may be able to make recommendations of things you can do to help prevent a disease. Knowing your family health history is a powerful tool in helping to understand risk. Make copies for your siblings, your children... pass it along ... right along with the cranberry sauce and cornbread!


