Recognizing Good Work!

A working policy adopted by the Congregation Council, presented for information to the congregation:

We share the leadership of worship among many people, including musicians, speakers, actors, artists, and others. What are appropriate ways to express our appreciation for the diligent work of all of these persons?

- 1. In order to facilitate this expression of appreciation from time to time, the pastor will invite persons to join him in greeting people at the door. He will call the congregation's attention to this with a verbal announcement similar to the following: "During the social time following the service, please express your appreciation to those who have led us in (word, speech, art, or music, etc.), especially _____ who joins me at the door today."
- 2. When the number of persons to be acknowledged is too great for them to easily meet everyone at the door, during the announcements at the close of the service the pastor may invite the congregation to respond as follows: "The members of the congregation are invited to express their appreciation to those who have assisted in leading our worship today in (word, speech, art, or music, etc.), both verbally and with applause at this time."
- 3. It is our intention that the worship service itself not be interrupted by applause. The focus during worship is on the Lord God and the proclamation of God's Word using all of the persons and means at our disposal; the focus is properly on the message and not the person.
- 4. A distinction is made between concerts and programs on the one hand, and services of worship on the other. In our situation, applause may be encouraged during the first, but not during the second.

Christmas Message from Presiding Bishop Mark Hanson.

"The Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory..." (John 1:14).

We live in a visited world. On that holy night twenty centuries ago, God visited the world in the miracle of Bethlehem. Held in Mary's arms that night was the revelation of steadfast, unbounded love for all humanity. The birth of Jesus disclosed God's saving will and eternal desire for reconciliation and peace. In this season of Christmas, we encounter again Jesus, sent from God for our salvation. As the Word is proclaimed in both simple buildings and cathedrals of grandeur, we receive the good news of God's love in Christ Jesus for the whole earth. We witness the mystery of rebirth in the waters of Baptism and rejoice as new ones are embraced by the community of faith. As bread is broken and wine poured in the Eucharist, we give thanks for the real presence of Christ in our midst.

We gather with the whole Church for the celebration of our Lord's Nativity. In our gathering, however, we hear the sounds of discord throughout the world. From divisions caused by walls of separation, from the struggles of many for survival from disasters, devastation, hunger, and poverty, from the dread of rampant disease and the spread of HIV and AIDS, from war and the threat of war, even with nuclear weapons, from broken relationships in homes and hostilities within communities and countries, we seek rescue. We yearn for the gracious, healing, and reconciling Word of the Prince of Peace.

We hear the angel say, "Do not be afraid." With that message of courage, we realize as believers that we are never alone. We have been claimed by God and made a part of the household of faith.

So we join with the whole Church on earth, lifting our voices with renewed hope. In so doing, we join the grand anthem: Joy to the world, the Lord is come! Let earth receive her king....

Our Footprint on Earth

Tread lightly, we are told, and we tell others the same. Take only photographs and leave only footprints, we advise one another, when we take a walk in the woods. Thus we encourage being responsible toward the earth.

Yet we can be more precise and ask just how we sustain the environment. Can we seek to use no more than we contribute? Can we contribute more than we use? This is the question posed to us,* and we are asked to meet that challenge by making a pledge to be more responsible, to take less, to leave less of a footprint.

One analysis of the estimated environmental "legacy" a First World nation person born in 1916 and having died in 1990 would have left as his/her "footprint" is as follows:**

- 580 tons of carbon dioxide from breathing
- 159 tons of carbon dioxide from driving
- 575 pounds of chloroflourcarbons (CFCs)
- 860,000 gallons of methane (from cattle raised for food)
- 93,000 gallons of oil burned for domestic use
- 40,000 gallons of gasoline burned
- 4 million gallons of water used in the home •
 - 700 tons of mineral resources including 50 tons of metal
- 864 tons of topsoil eroded
- The weight of 4 Statues of Liberty discarded of household trash, including
 - 9000 aluminum cans
 - 7000 plastic bottles
 - 4800 disposable diapers
 - 15 tons of paper
 - 16 tons of yard and food waste
 - 300 pulp trees cut down for paper subsequently discarded 51 tons of toxic waste released

Consider this in your daily thanks and gratitude. Consider what it means for the long term sustainability of our earth. Consider how you can reduce your impact.

Nurse's Notes

December 3	Ladies, have you ever given a thought to where your purse has been throughout the day? Women carry them everywhere, and throughout the day they sit on restaurant floors, car mats, and yes bathroom stalls. Recently an informal experiment involving cultures obtained from purses, took place in Utah. The results were eye-opening! The purses contained pseudomonas, staphylococcus aurous, salmonella and e-coli, all of which can lead to serious illness. So ladies, you may want to think twice about sitting your purse on a table-top, countertop or desk!
December 10	Is holiday stress getting to you? Borrow a little wisdom from McDonalds'. Grab a few sticky notes and write on each, "You deserve a break!". Now place them at eye-level on your computer, your fridge, your car – anywhere you spend a lot of time and will notice it. Then take a non-caloric break! Several months ago, I had the privilege of meeting two women whose insight and passion in their faith touched me deeply. I asked them to put into words, the blessings and frustrations inherent to parents who are raising children who are differently-abled. Following are the words of Linda Baker and Kellee Rumbough.

WHERE 2 OR MORE ARE GATHERED IN MY NAME

My friend Kellee & I are on fire with Jesus' commission to His followers, found in Ephesians 4:15-16: "grow up in all things into Him, who is the Head, Christ, from whom the whole body joined & knit together by what every joint supplies, according to the effective working by which every part does its share, causing growth of the body for the edifying of itself in love." We are drawn to the words, "whole body"; the repeated use of the word "every"; the phrases, "effective working" & "causing growth of the body". Why? We are members of a group that no one asks to join, well almost no one. As members of this group, we find worship in a church, any church, any denomination, very difficult, awkward, unwelcoming, frightening, tense. Our families carry the label, "special needs". One or more of our children are atypical or different then the other kids, even if he or she doesn't look different.

Our family has 5 human members & 2 canines. All three of our children fit into a different special needs category. Our now adult son has ADD (Attention Deficit Disorder), our twin teenage daughters are each affected with different forms of cerebral palsy. Our youngest daughter exhibits mental retardation with brain damage that affects her speech as well.

Attending church & worshipping with any meaning for any of us was possible when the adults [in our family] outnumbered the children. Once our daughters were born, church attendance was just that, *at*-*tendance*. Sunday school was possible as long as I was our daughter's aide & could carry her up & down the stairs, as she is in a wheelchair. Our church family supported us valiantly in prayer throughout the early years.

Joshua 1: 9 was the first of many bible verses that I taped above my kitchen sink. "*Have I not commanded you? Be strong & courageous. Do not be terrified; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go.*" It has taken me 17 years to truly reconcile myself & my family to the meaning of this verse; to really **LIVE** this verse, every day, including Sunday.

Kellee & I have begun a Special Needs' Ministry at our church. Our pastor shares our vision of a 1 to 1 buddy to be available & ready for every special needs individual who enters our church. We are in the planning stages: meetings with church staff, discussions with the local Ministerium members regarding resources & referrals, surveying our church family for volunteers to be buddies & for members who need buddies. Our church, through our ministry, wants a complete, developed, mature body of Christ in our community. We do not want to keep missing the gifts that each unique person, created in Jesus, a new creation, has to offer for the growth of God's church. *Note*: In the note which accompanied this article, Linda writes, "*My children are my gifts by being in my life, a sentiment that I believe most mothers share. Special blessings they have demonstrated to me are their uniqueness, as people. Another universal mother sentiment, I believe.*"
