The Importance of Family Promise: the Interfaith Hospitality Network



"I had known a particular youngster as an excellent student for more than four years. Then suddenly his attitude, behavior, and work at school changed dramatically. We could not figure out what was happening until finally we discovered that he and his family had lost their home and were living in a car under the bridge. I wish that were the only such situation I have known."

These were the heartbreaking words of a Williamsport school teacher at the forum held on Sunday May 20, 2007 here at St. Mark's. We were talking about the proposal to establish a Hospitality Network affiliate here in Williamsport, a coalition of congregations who will take up the responsibility of offering temporary shelter to homeless families and assist them in getting on their feet again.

"Is this really needed in our area?" is one of the first questions that is regularly asked. One night last winter a census was taken of all of the churches and institutions on one particular night. Each respondent was asked how many homeless persons they were aware that very day. The total number was many dozens more than anyone expected. Of the total, a significant number were families in crisis. We can't do everything, but we can do something. A few single men can be housed at the American Rescue Workers. A few women can be sheltered at the YWCA. But what about families? There is no place for them at all.

"But surely there is something else going on in the community, isn't there?" Habitat for Humanity is one part of the puzzle. They are building homes with persons who have employment and a relatively stable situation. Journey House is in the process of being renovated by New Covenant UCC with input from many community resources. It will be for people who have things in gear and are on the way to self-sufficiency, perhaps awaiting a chance to get into a Habitat house. But that still means that there is a large need for people who have just fallen into crisis because of an illness, job loss, or other problem that causes them to lose their home. This is where the Hospitality Network can step in.

"How many churches need to be involved?" We have said that we will move forward with the proposal when 13 congregations agree to be hosts. It will not be less than 13, but could be more!. We want each congregation to host not more than four times a year. And we will need many other congregations who will be willing to support the work with finances and volunteers.

"What does hosting entail?" A host congregation provides room for family units to be and sleep together. We provide a supper in the evening and breakfast the next morning, and help them to pack lunches for the day. We are companionship in the evening, and two persons remain in the building overnight to for safety and security. The Network provides transportation to the day's activities and school.

"Are we in the right place to be involved?" Our location is ideal: we are close to bus service, the job center, courthouse, and other things that might be needed. We are very visible in the community and widely known. We have room. And most of all, we have the compassion of Christ as our guide and example.

Come to the next forum to be held in St. Mark's on Sunday June 10 at 9:15 A.M. in the Crossways Room. A brief presentation begins the hour, and then the floor is open for questions and discussion.

Should we be a part of the Network? Yes. Could we do this? Yes.

Will we do this? The Council will be asking many more questions and considering it formally on June 18.

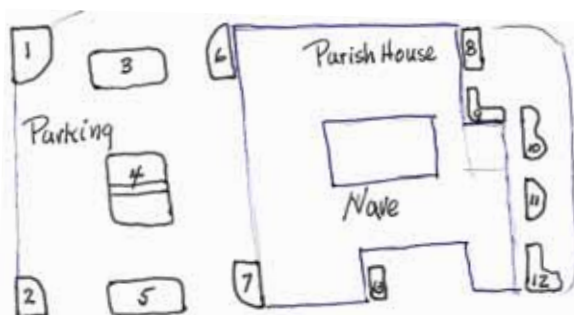

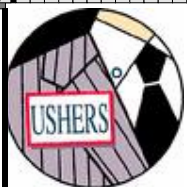

Nurse's Notes

- June 3** It's that time of year when some of use enjoy getting out and getting our hands dirty by gardening. Did you know that using a push-mower burns 420-480 calories per hour – as much as you would playing tennis. Spading, tilling, raking improve muscle tone and strength. Even the less strenuous upkeep – weeding, trimming, raking – can burn about 300 calories an hour when you work at a constant pace.
- June 10** It's time to get out the sunscreen! Dermatologists now recommend using one with an SPF 30. It does not matter whether you use a lotion, spray or stick, just be sure to apply it correctly. If using a lotion, that means about 2 tablespoons or the equivalent of a shot-glass from head to toe. Save 1 teaspoon for your face. Sprays seem to be popular, and most are now designed so they can be sprayed up-side-down, making it easier to reach the hard-to-reach spots. Reapply every two hours and immediately after swimming.
- June 17** Wow – this makes me feel better! A recent (June 2007) note in *Prevention Magazine* indicates that those of us who “inhabit a moderately messy space” are typically more creative than those who are very organized. Tidying-up once a week will keep the messiness manageable (and less distracting!).
- June 24** **Fact:** Every 100 pounds of trash contains approximately 35 pounds of paper! If 11 million folks all used 5 fewer sheets per week, we could save 317,000 trees per year!

IMPORTANT CONSUMER ALERT BIBS RECALLED BY WAL-MART

The US Consumer Product Safety Commission has issued a consumer alert regarding a potential risk of lead exposure from baby bibs with cracked or peeling vinyl surfaces (see below). Wal-Mart is voluntarily recalling these items and can be contacted at 1-800-WAL-MART (1-800-925-6278). *The original recall was for the state of Illinois but has since expanded nation-wide!*

CPSC recommends that parents and caregivers discard bibs that are in poor condition to avoid potential exposure to lead from swallowed vinyl. CPSC Hotline: 800-638-2772.

Recovery Crews Needed for Flooding in Southern WV

Long Term Recovery Committees will soon be forming in the counties of Boone, Cabell, Kanawha, Lincoln, Logan, Mingo, Raleigh, and Wyoming where flooding occurred in mid-April. Major/minor damage was sustained by 250 homes. Of these, many will belong to households who are uninsured or otherwise unable to fend for themselves.

CLP-LDR is currently in the process of assessing the unmet needs and obtaining financial assistance for recovery. As summer progresses, work crews will be needed to help these households repair and rebuild.

Please consider forming a crew for a week of work in these southern counties of WV. It's a lot closer than Biloxi, and the need is just as great!

Lay Ministry Institute

The newly formed Lay Ministry Institute of our synod is still seeking candidates for its flagship class of Authorized Lay Worship Leaders, Authorized Lay Evangelists and Authorized Lay Catechists.

The innovative Christian education program is now enrolling adult students for a two-year program which will begin this fall. The classes will produce Authorized Lay Worship Leaders, who serve in their home congregations, and others, leading worship and presiding over the Eucharist. Authorized Lay Evangelists will use their innate ability to tell God's story and reach out to people everywhere. Lay Catechists will be trained in Bible, theology, history, Lutheran practice and education.

The classes will mirror the Upper Susquehanna Synod's highly successful Authorized Lay Worship program, which has been part of the Synod for a decade and graduated nearly 60 individuals who are available to serve in a leadership role. The Lay Ministry Institute grew out of the former Authorized Lay Worship Committee.

Classes will meet one Saturday per month and students will learn from the most esteemed and respected professors from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg, along with some of the best nationally known evangelists and a number of the modern church's best thinkers.

Candidates must be recommended by their local pastors, pay \$950 tuition, complete and pledge adherence to the ELCA's Vision and Expectations statement, complete an application and be interviewed by the LMI's admission committee.

Throughout the program, repeatedly, students will be evaluated by their mentor's and the Institute. Ultimately, students will complete the program and receive their Authorization at the Upper Susquehanna Synod's assembly in 2009.

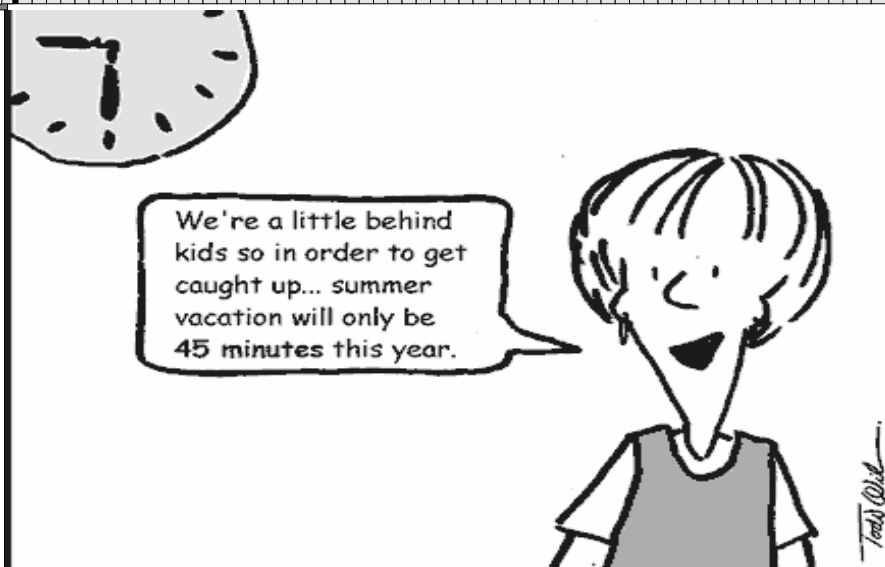
Clothing Sale Update

HOUSING NEEDED FOR FLS INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

As most of you know, Ken and Beth Shafranko hosted two Chinese boys last summer for a couple of weeks through the FLS (Foreign Language Studies) Homestay Program. The FLS Homestay Program combines a student's Intensive English study with the experience of living with an American host family. Says Beth, "We had them for two weeks and it would have been fine to have them for the whole summer... We learned so much from them about their culture... It was a good experience and the boys still keep in touch with us."

Host families responsibilities include taking the kids to Wegman's around 7:00 every morning, where a bus picks them up and takes them to Lock Haven University for the day. The students are delivered back to Wegman's around 6:00 each evening. Hosts are to feed them dinner and breakfast and give them a place to sleep. There is a current need of housing for 250 students. Dates for which host families are needed are as follows:

Students with Spanish as their native language:

Group 1: June 25 - July 24

Group 2: July 1 - July 28

Students with Chinese as their native language:

Group one: July 15-July 21

Group two: July 22-July 28

There is a possibility that St. Mark's will receive a referral fee of \$100 per host family that signs up because of us. This applies whether they host a one-week student or a one-month student.

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

The first five chapters of the Old Testament are bursting at the seams with the genealogy of Abraham and his descendants (*Genesis – Joshua*). Indeed the entire Bible is a snap-shot frozen in time connecting the 'old' Adam' to the 'new' Adam (in the person of Christ). Some are comical (imagine Noah's neighbors coming home to find this huge boat parked in the drive, or Noah attempting to assign clean-up after the animals – especially the elephants); others more poignant (Ruth, after the death of her husband, left with her mother-in-law to try to carve out an existence) – all connected.

They say that when a butterfly flaps its wings in Chile, thunderclouds begin to form across Indiana. Scientists remind us what we already know - that all things are woven together in God's world. So when we say we are a church "family", we are being more honest than we sometimes realize! As in any family, there are squabbles and disagreements, intermingled with love, respect, and anger. We can become so enmeshed in the lives of one another that we don't recognize that, like that butterfly in Chile, what we do as individuals can have a huge impact on fellow members of the body of Christ – for better or worse. In counseling terms, these interconnections are known as **systems**. Family Systems Theory suggests that individuals cannot be understood in isolation from one another – that we are interconnected and interdependent to the people around us.

Think of a child's mobile – when one object is bumped or tugged, all other parts of the mobile react to try to bring the entire mobile back into balance. The same can be said of actions within our congregations. If you want to stir things up, propose some kind of change! Change is unsettling – it 'throws us off' balance, and sometimes we have the automatic reaction to want to pull things back to the way they always were – back to when we were comfortable. That's when we hear those famous (or infamous) seven words – "But we've always done it that way ...". Our automatic response to that which causes us discomfort is to react – sometimes inappropriately. Rev. Dr. Peter Steinke suggests that it is at those times we resort to using that part of our brain which is like that of a snake – and we all know what a snake does when disturbed – it reacts!

However, that which sets us apart from reptiles, and other animals, is the part of our brain which allows us to reason. Unfortunately, we don't always see that part of the brain being utilized – think of road rage, or the person who decides to settle an argument with fists or a gun. Psychologists and social scientists tell us that we have shorter and shorter attention spans, and that we want a 'quick fix' or instant gratification. If that is true, than we are making snap decisions, not allowing our brain to take in the information necessary for us to behave in an informed, 'well thought out' way.

Somehow I don't see Christ modeling that kind of behavior for us. Instead I believe he approached his life and his death in a purposeful manner – after all, it took him three years to apprentice twelve ordinary men and establish his ministry. We also see that he took intentional time for prayer, periodically pulling himself away from pressing, hectic crowds. He even took his time when he learned that one of his best friends – Lazarus - was dying, and chastised his mother for trying to force him to turn water into wine by saying, "My time has not yet come." (John 2:4, NIV)

Another commonality between family and congregational relationships is our tendency to depend on certain (and often unspoken) roles and rules. Look around your congregation and ask yourself, "Who is the congregation's matriarch or patriarch?" "Who are the people who need to be won over whenever the leaders want to try something new?" "Who takes the role of 'the responsible one' – 'the scapegoat' – 'the lost child' – 'the peacemaker'?" What are the unspoken rules for behavior? "When people are angry with one another, does the church family provide a safe place in which to express this anger, or is anger something we 'keep to ourselves' and allow to fester under the surface?" "How are decisions made – who has input and who is expected to 'just go along'?" "Are children to be seen but not heard?"

Yes, when we say our congregations are 'just like a family' we just might be more truthful than we realize ... for good ... or bad!
