# The Lion of St. Mark's

JULY 2007

A summary of some of the Council's conversation about the INTER-FAITH HOSPITALITY NETWORK also known as FAMILY PROMISE:

"I'm nervous about being the first congregation to sign up to be a potential host for the Network."

"I'm proud that we are agreeing to be first, and hopefully encouraging others to follow."

"It bothers me that there are so many things about the proposal that we don't know yet."

"Of course there are lots of things that we can only ask and answer further down the road. There is no guarantee about anything."

"Will we be able to find all of the needed resources?"

"I'm confident that when it is the right time to ask, that we will come up with the people and things that are needed for the project. We can draw on our own members, friends from other congregations, and perhaps even some of our college student friends. It will all come together, when the time is right."

"Is this the right obligation?"

"I'm convinced that we have an excellent site in St. Mark's, this is the time to step forward, and we're the people who can get things started."

As is evident in these exchanges, the discussion covered much ground and a variety of viewpoints. At length, the Council did vote affirmatively on the proposal to host Family Promise, hospitality for temporarily homeless families. Lycoming Centre Presbyterian Church has also signed its intent to be a host. The whole proposal can only move to action when we are able to sign up 13 congregations to be host.

The core-committee will be busy in the summer and fall reaching out to any congregation that will listen in order to turn this possibility into a reality.

### The Last Visitation

On Sunday July 8, Bishop A. Donald Main will be at St. Mark's for the final time as Bishop of the Upper Susquehanna Synod. He will be preaching at the 8:00 and 10:30 service that day.

In addition, the Bishop will be leading a forum during the 9:00 hour. The subject of the forum is very open, and depends upon your questions to him about his years of service as Bishop, what the office of the bishop entails, what has been the best or most difficult things, his future plans, etc. etc. The only kind of thing one cannot ask Bishop Main is what Bishop-Elect Driesen will say or do about any particular subject. Please do come to the Forum in the Crossways room (or the courtyard, depending on the weather).Bishop Main has served the Upper Susquehanna Synod for 20 years, since the inception of the ELCA. Prior to that, he served as Pastor of Zion Lutheran Church in

### **The First Days**

The Upper Susquehanna Synod in Assembly on June 16 elected The Rev. Robert Driesen as the second Bishop of the Synod. Bishop-Elect Driesen has served as Pastor of Messiah Church, South Williamsport for 20 years, and will assume his new duties on September 1. His first parish was Sidman-Elton now in the Allegheny Synod. Prior to attending seminary at Gettysburg, he was a public school teacher in Baltimore County MD for seven years.

Pastor Driesen has been a favorite teacher in our annual Lay School of Theology sponsored by the Lutheran Shared Ministry and held each October here at St. Mark's. For a number of years, his sessions have regularly garnered the highest attendance and the most interest.

Another of his ongoing responsibilities has been his service as the ecumenical officer for the Synod, so he has cultivated well-established relationships with a number of other church bodies across the years.

As September 1 approaches, Messiah Church will begin the process of discussing what should happen next in pastoral leadership in that parish. We pray God's blessing on them as one chapter closes and another opens.

#### CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY NEWS What to do? What to do? That is the question that comes to mind in those rare times when someone has a medical emergency during one of our worship services. The appropriate responses are: 1. Make sure that someone has notified one of our medical professionals. To do this, get the attention of one of our Ushers whose job it is to know where such persons are seated. The list of doctors and nurses with photos is always posted in the narthex. 2. Please do not approach the person yourself unless you are immediately beside him or her and can support the person until our medical persons give direction. Then please distance yourself so that they have room to work. As our medical persons evaluate the situation, they may ask that 911 be called. Do not presume this on your own; wait 3. for specific medical direction. In most cases, the Ushers will make the call; other persons should not do so unless specifically directed to do it. In one case, three different persons took it upon themselves to call, so that we had three teams of responders for a single situation! This is a danger to the responders and to others who may need them elsewhere. 4. The Pastor will make the judgment whether the service needs to be halted to allow the emergency personnel to do their job appropriately. The pastor may ask us to be seated, to join in prayer, to sing a hymn, or to vacate a certain area if need be. The pastor may ask for the assistance of the Stephen Ministers if there are other family members involved who need assistance. It is important to remain as calm as possible, allow those with specific training to do their jobs, and be constant in prayer for the ill person, the congregation, and the responders. July 1	<ul> <li>True or False * Answers below</li> <li>1. Children should never light or play with fireworks.</li> <li>2. Adults should always keep a bucket of water handy in case of malfunction or fire.</li> <li>3. Adults should read and follow all instructions before using sparklers, caps, etc.</li> <li>4. Adults should be sure all people are out of range before lighting and items.</li> <li>5. Sparklers burn at high enough temperatures that can cause serious burns.</li> </ul>
July 8	<b>Did you know</b> That hand sanitizers contain a high concentration of alcohol? With their fruit scents, these can pose great danger to children or toddlers who may lick the product off their hands. Ingesting the cleanser can lead to illness and require a trip to the Emergency Room!
July 15	It is that time of year when fresh produce abounds! Be careful and wash all fruits and vegetables thor- oughly with cold running water. Do not use soap or chlorine mixtures in attempts to clean the produce.
July 22	The combination of warm weather and sweaty shoes and socks provide the perfect breeding ground for athlete's foot. After bathing, be sure to dry feet thoroughly, particularly between toes (you can even use your hair dryer on low heat). If possible, wearing sandals may be best! (Ladies, it sounds like a shopping trip may be in order!)
July 29	Follow this shadow rule for sun protection in the summer: If your shadow is shorter than your height, it's sunburn time! In most parts of the country, this test will show that you can still get burned between the hours of 3 p.m and 4 p.m. The sun is closest to directly overhead – and therefore strongest – about 1 p.m. (Daylight Saving Time). Protect yourself with sunscreen and clothing during the three hours before and after this peak time. ( <i>Wellness Made Easy, UCLA, Berkeley, 2005</i> )

### **Volunteer Opportunities:**

- Worship leaders from area churches volunteer to provide a brief worship service in seven nursing homes in our county and in two area high-rise apartments for the elderly and disabled, as well as three services in the county prison each week. They also provide one service each month in three assisted living centers. Both clergy and active lay persons within area churches provide the leadership for these 648 services each year.
- **Broadcasters** write and record a fifteen minute news show highlighting events and developments in the world of religion. News releases are collected by the broadcaster and by the United Churches office from which each broadcaster chooses their own material and tapes the show which is broadcast over WRAK (1400 AM) on Sunday mornings at 9:15 A.M. Both laity and clergy participate in providing this service.
- Shepherd of the Streets has the opportunity for both clergy and laity to volunteer. Opportunities for clergy to provide counseling as an associate shepherd. Opportunities for laity to serve as a receptionist or as an office volunteer. Opportunities for everyone to be a mentor or to provide transportation special skills as needed.
- The Food Pantry volunteers provide donations and staffing. Donations of non-perishable food items are always needed. Volunteers are needed to: stock shelves, make appointments for clients package food, provide office duties, provide janitorial duties, help with food deliveries.



#### Food Pantry Update

Every member of St. Mark's has something to teach our young people. It im-





### HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

#### (W)Holy, (W)Holy, (W)Holy Wholistic Wellness Article - July 2007

The Bible contains many references to the ways in which God desires us to care for children: "...*it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs,*" (*Matt. 19:14, NRSV*); "Before I formed you in the womb, I knew you, and before you were born, I consecrated you," (Jeremiah 1:5, NRSV), and who can forget old Zechariah's proclamation upon seeing the baby John, "And you child, will be called the prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways ..."(Luke 1:67, NRSV) – (this awesome passage always leaves me with chill-bumps!). Children are precious – consider this - the most powerful gift we've ever been given, came to us in the form of a tiny, helpless infant – our Lord!

In his gospel, Mark quotes Jesus as saying, "Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs." (Mk. 10:14b, NRSV). We've been given the sacred responsibility of bringing our children to Christ, so they may learn of his saving love. Part of that responsibility to children is in keeping them safe both outside and within the walls of our congregations. One of the ways in which we do this is in establishing policies and procedures to safeguard interactions between children and adults. Here are just a few examples of steps some congregations are taking to protect those whom God has chosen - even before birth:

- **1.** Educate the congregation to the fact that screening procedures not only protect the children in the church's care, but its staff members as well!
- 2. Expect or develop a screening process for paid workers and volunteers who are in regular contact with children and youth. This should include not only the church's programs, but also programs which utilize the church facilities for meetings throughout the week. Screening might include: a written application, carefully documented reference checks, personal interview, criminal record checks, and regular staff training.
- **3.** Establish a threshold of <u>at least</u> six months of active participation and/or membership in the life of the congregation before assuming a leadership role with children/youth.
- 4. If it is impossible to have 2 adults present for each classroom, have doors open, unlocked, or classes held in rooms in which the doors contain windows.
- 5. Have children use the buddy system for group activities.
- 6. Abusive language and physical punishment are never appropriate and are grounds for immediate dismissal.
- 7. There should be no "secret" activities or organizations within the church we want children to feel they can come to us if there are ever any "secrets" they've been asked to keep which cause them discomfort.
- 8. All allegations of abuse are to be taken seriously. Learn proper reporting procedures, and report inappropriate activities to the pastor. In PA, contact ChildLine at 1-800-932-0313. (other states, check with your state's Department of Welfare or your local Child Protective Services unit for the appropriate phone number initiating investigation).
- 9. All documentation is considered confidential and is to be maintained in a secured area.
- **10.** Educate mandated reporters in regard to their responsibilities, and to your state, county and denominational reporting procedures.
- 11. Without regard to any allegations made, the accused must be separated from the accuser immediately.
- 12. Do <u>not</u> interview the child document what the child shares with you, but leave questioning to the **proper authorities.** Well intentioned questioning could cast doubt on whether or not the child's statements or accusations were a result of coercion, and be inadmissible as part of legal proceedings.

I've only scratched the surface of considerations in regard to the issue of child and staff protective measures. No one likes to consider the possibilities that abuse and neglect occur – sometimes even within the walls of our congregations. I hope you will give some consideration to the pro-active steps listed above, and then contact your church, denominational leaders and your insurance carrier regarding assembling a plan of your own. For many, summer signals a break in children's programming – an good time to educate, evaluate, and begin the fall with a new plan for addressing this important issue.
