Early Joy



Easter this year comes as early as it can possibly occur on the calendar, and will not do so again for decades in the future. Early we remember Jesus risen from the dead. Early we anticipate his rule and the fulfillment of his promises.

Saturday, March 15 Palm-Cross-making

Our Holy Week begins with that annual puzzle of making the palm-crosses that we wear on Sunday. Come, learn the tricks of the task, and engage in conversation at 9:00 A.M.

Sunday, March 16, Sunday of the Passion—Palm Sunday

After the bitter-sweetness of the procession with palms, we focus on the whole Passion-story, this year reading from Matthew. We all have parts to read and ponder.

Wednesday, March 19, The Passover Seder

Although the center of our story is Jesus, it begins with God's earlier saving actions in the Exodus. We retell this part of our heritage in story, song, scripture, and symbolic foods at table in Fellowship Hall beginning at 6:15 P.M. Since a served meal is part of this event, reservations are necessary.

Please phone the church office not later than Monday morning, March 17, or even better, put the reservation slip in the offering plate on March 16.

We also have the opportunity to gather for Morning Prayer each weekday at 9:00 A.M.

Maundy Thursday, March 20

The Thursday of the Command (mandamus – mandate – Maundy) which can refer to several things: to the command to wash feet *even as I have done to you*; it can refer to the mandate of Holy Communion *Do this in remembrance of me*; and it can also refer to the command to ...*love one another as I have loved you*.

We have opportunity to gather for study of the Psalms at 6:31 A.M., for Morning Prayer at 9:00 A.M., for the Holy Communion in the chapel at 12:00 P.M., and in the Nave at 7:30 P.M.

Good Friday, March 21

The community service will be held at noon, beginning with the procession around the center city for those who wish to participate.

All may come and go as their schedule permits. We also gather for Morning Prayer at 9:00 A.M. and for the Vigil at the Cross at 7:30 P.M. The Kantorei will be leading our thoughtful reflection on our sin and Christ's redemption.

Holy Saturday, March 22

We gather at sundown, 8:00 P.M. for the most important service of the entire year, the Great Vigil of Easter. The entire sweep of salvation history is celebrated, from the beginning of creation to its heavenly culmination, and centering on our Lord's resurrection. Everyone is most strongly urged to take part. All the senses are used, we use many ways to tell the story, everyone has a role. The participants in *The Way* renew their baptismal promises, and the Easter celebration begins.

Easter Sunday, March 23

The joy that began with the Vigil continues in festive liturgies at 8:00 and 10:30 A.M.

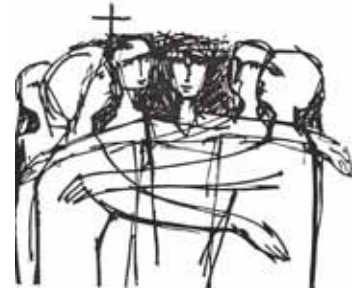

New Windsor Trip

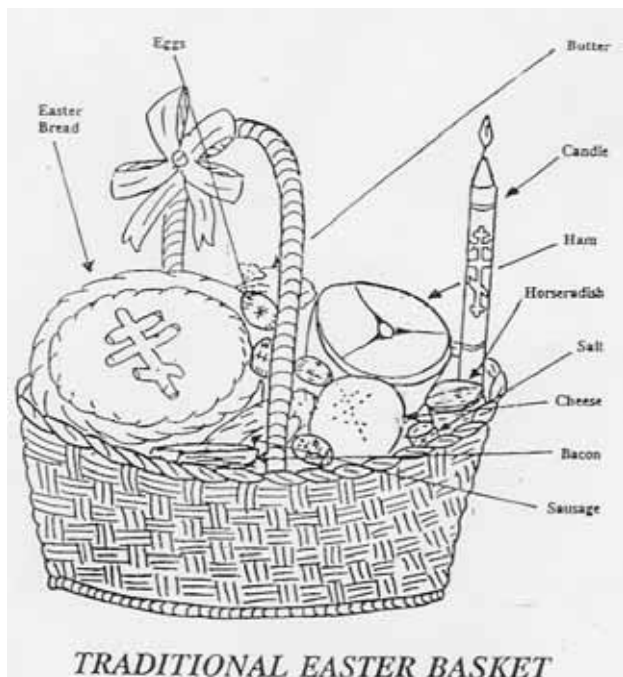

Orthodox Easter Basket

Each year a few persons have prepared an Easter basket of a different sort, one which contains the various foods that will become part of the feast on Easter day. We set these baskets apart with prayer at the close of the Easter Vigil service.

Any person who would like to take part in the custom may get a list from the Pastor of the typical items to be included in the basket.

The custom developed over the centuries especially in the orthodox countries of eastern Europe, but has since spread widely.

Nurse's Notes

- March 2** **Video games are not all bad ...** the video game, *Dance Dance Revolution* allows you to burn up to 270 calories in a half-hour session – equivalent to a fast walk or jog. Getting to the highest level could allow you to burn 400 calories in 45 minutes as you match your footwork to the on-screen prompts. (*Prevention*, March 2008, pg. 106.)
- March 9** Have you switched to using those funny-looking, corkscrew shaped compact fluorescent bulbs yet? They use up to 75% less energy than traditional bulbs, and appear to last longer as well. What you may not know is that the bulbs contain an average of 5 milligrams of mercury (about the size of a ballpoint pen tip). Mercury is a hazardous substance, so use caution when discarding used or broken bulbs. Check with your closest municipal landfill regarding disposal, or the EPA at www.energystar.gov/ia/partners/promotions/changelight/downloads/FactSheetMercury.pdf. To date, the only recycling site is the retailer, IKEA.
- March 16** Hosting the Easter dinner this year? Check out the lower calorie versions of traditional foods at <http://www.webmd.com/food-recipes/guide/health-cooking-easter-passover-recipes> (even green bean casserole!).
- March 23** We have received the gift of grace through Christ, who came that we might have abundant life, and it is only through this gift that we can begin to experience true health and wholeness – in body, mind and spirit. In your prayer time, ask for God's guidance and wisdom in addressing the things that stand in your way of achieving balance, health and wholeness. Easter blessings!
- March 30** Still tempted by Easter candy ...those jelly beans in the bottom of the basket ...? One small jelly bean contains 4 calories – 100% carbohydrate (just over 2 grams). You will need to walk for one minute to burn off the calories consumed in one bean. At that rate, you may want to eat them "on the run"!

coming Street into offices, warehouse space and a store for building materials.

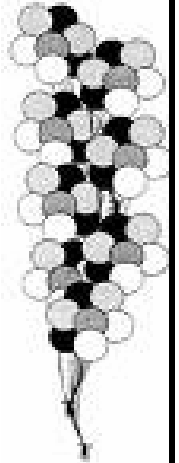

Missionary Musings & Requests for Prayer

From Pr. Ron Shellhamer:

Last June Pr. Ron Shellhamer of Shamokin walked onto the stage at our Upper Susquehanna Synod Assembly and was greeted with a call to serve as a missionary in Liberia. There continue to be significant dangers in such an undertaking, and we need to remember him and his family in our prayers. Here follows a portion of his first letter to us:

As I begin God's time of service in Liberia, I send you greetings from the village of Totota, a Liberian city of 5,000 residents. Totota is located in the tropical rainforest of Liberia's interior. The 3 hour drive along one of the main roads which leads out of the coastal capital of Monrovia is about 70 miles in length. Travel in Liberia can be hard and difficult as many of the two lane roads are unpaved. Even the ones that are paved often have potholes which lead to inevitable travel delays.

It is on the sprawling Totota campus where two soccer fields fill the landscape with children and teens playing and residential homes lining the periphery that the Louis T. Bowers Lay Leaders and Minister's Training Center received a fresh start in January, 2006. New curriculums offer diverse residential courses and outreach programs. The Center is a community based facility which is open to various groups for study and retreat.

Through a joint partnership between The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Bavaria (BLCB), the Danish Evangelical Mission (DEM), the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), and through the cooperative invitation of the Lutheran Church in Liberia (LCL), my arrival included warm greetings from the current class of 38 Deaconesses, Deacons and Lay Evangelists who were in session at the time. As I joined in the lecture series, as their new teacher, areas of study at The Center include Biblical Interpretation, Lutheran Theology and Doctrine, Lutheran Liturgy along with an assorted array of other courses (i.e.: Preaching and Sermon Preparation).

In Liberian culture and tradition it is customary that when a guest arrives, one is greeted with the same warmth and generosity as we might greet a loved one or friend who travels from afar to be reunited in family. I was greeted with like gestures of hospitality and welcome. The Liberian people are very intentional about this.

From Carl Hieber:

As Carl Hieber is participating in the dental mission to Tanzania, we can assist with prayer. Here is a summary of the prayer requests. Full details are posted on the office hallway bulletin board, and on-line at our website, stmarkswilliamsport.org.

- Wed. 2/27 Safe travel as the team of seven leave Dulles for Zurich.
- Thurs. 2/28 Safe travel as the team flies from Zurich to Dar es Salaam.
- Fri. 2/29 Organizing supplies and equipment, meeting local missionary partner, and traveling 5 hours by public bus.
- Sat. 3/01 A safe and effective first day of clinic in Pande, an area where AIDS is prevalent.
- Sun. 3/02 For worship here at home some hours after Carl & the missionary group have worshiped with the Digo people.
They have clinic in the afternoon.
- Mon. 3/03 Pain and suffering are relieved for the many patients in clinic.
- Tues. 3/04 Nurses will be welcomed in local schools to demonstrate good tooth brushing techniques & give out toothbrushes.
- Wed. 3/05 The most critical patients will be helped in this final day of clinic.
- Thurs. 3/06 Remaining missionaries are courageous & bold in Jesus' name to work where the team may have opened doors.
- Fri. 3/07 Part of the team will set up an effective clinic with the Zamoro tribe to do extractions.
- Sat. 3/08 The many exams the team does today will help them to plan their time well in clinic tomorrow.
- Sun. 3/09 Remember the team in worship many hours after they have praised God also. In their clinic today they will be doing some restorations as well as extractions.
- Mon. 3/10 For endurance as the team begins a full week of clinic.
- Tues. 3/11 The team becomes by their example and mercy effective ambassadors for Christ.
- Wed. 3/12 For the health and safety of all the team members.
- Thurs. 3/13 That equipment continues to function and supplies are adequate.
- Fri. 3/14 Post-treatment of patients is completed, and packing is speedy.
- Sat. 3/15 Safe travel from Dar es Salaam, Zurich, and Dulles, arriving home late in the evening.

Immersion and Competitive Mini Grants for College Students

Sponsored by a grant from the Lilly Foundation through Project Connect, a number of Immersion and Competitive Mini Grants are available to college students by application for this summer and the next school year. Immersion and Competitive Mini Grants are for 10 weeks in the summer at 40 hours per week or 40 weeks during the academic year at 10 hours per week. Both are carried out in a congregation under the supervision of the pastor. The purpose of these grants is to help the student further discern his / her sense of call by actively engaging in ministry. Immersion provide an opportunity to experience the day to day life of a congregation as a pastor experiences it. By being involved in an Immersion you are getting to know first hand about the life of a parish pastor. Project Connect provides you with a stipend of \$2,500.

Competitive Mini Grants allow students to design a special project that will take place within a congregation and ultimately help the congregation grow. Amounts of up to \$5,000 can be awarded with up to \$2,500 that can be designated for the student.

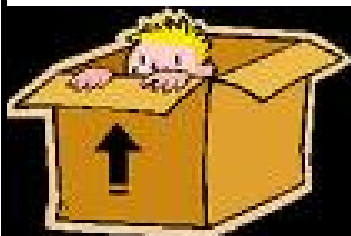
A NEW WAY YOU CAN HELP US FOR VBS!

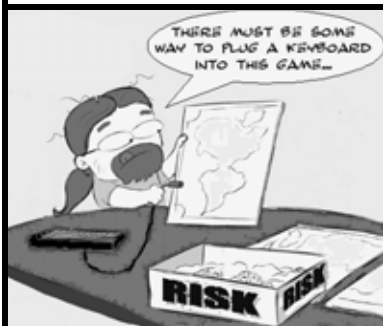

A Simple Choice, A Generous Choice

Often we talk about giving thankfully. The subject today is about giving regularly. *Simply Giving* is a way for us to give our offerings by using electronic funds transfer. Many people are already having withdrawals from a checking or savings account to cover mortgage or utility payments. Now our thankful gifts to God through the church can be regular and "off the top".

There is no cost to individuals or the church. Our friends at Thrivent Financial for Lutherans are picking up all the costs associated with it. We do not have to write a series of checks throughout the year. And we do not have to wonder where we put our offering envelopes each week.

We do not have to have special arrangements with our banks; Thrivent will take care of paperwork for us. Each family that wishes to participate will fill out a single form and attach a voided check. The form will ask the amount the individual or family would like to contribute, and at what interval: weekly, bi-monthly or whatever. As soon as Thrivent processes the paperwork, enrollment can begin.

One of the questions that has arisen about the program is this: What happens when the offering plate comes past me on Sunday morning? Two possibilities: (1) We might use a special envelope and give an additional offering for a special purpose or (2) A new edition of our pew card will soon be printed which will say "Look for my offering through *Simply Giving*." Check that line, add your name, place the card in the offering plate. The money counters will get the card and then check the list that the treasurer will receive each week from Thrivent. Thus each of us can have something to put into the offering plate, and the counters will have a double-check on their work.

Enrollment forms will be available shortly. Richard Wagner, our financial secretary, will be delighted to answer questions about the process, and he will be handling enrollment. Call him at 323-4619

Dear friends at St. Mark's Lutheran Church,

PVS General Secretary Eric Corson has informed me that you have made a donation of \$37.50 to Prisoner Visitation and Support (PVS).

Today, because of laws passed in the mid-1980's by Congressmen who did not want to be considered 'soft on crime', our country is first in the world in the number of it's citizens it incarcerates and it has 16 federal prisons and hundreds of state and county prisons.

The prisoners I visit, today, at FCI Danbury are women. Many of the women are in prison because their male partners sold drugs and the women just happened to be too close. Most of their sentences are for eight years or more—eight years when their children are in their formative years, growing up without either parent on the scene. When the women are arrested, they must hastily arrange for the care of their children by someone from their family or friends who can take them in. The federal government does not help.

These women need friends-not connected with the prison-with whom they can share what is in their hearts. That is what PVC does. We provide a friend for a heartsick prisoner to talk with.

Thank you for your generous donation to help PVS find additional volunteer visitors and to support them with the proper training to do their visiting.

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

Throughout Chapters 7-12 of the book of Exodus, we hear repeatedly how the Pharaoh's heart was hardened by his own will, and on occasion at God's behest. His anger and spitefulness toward the Israelites cost him dearly, in land, water, crops, livestock, citizens, an army, even innocent children. So it was with great interest that I read an August article released by the National Institute of Health regarding the link between hostility and anger and chronic inflammation (www.nlm.nih.gov/medlineplus/print/news/fullstory_52995.html).

For a number of years, scientists have been studying the role of inflammation in the development of heart disease. Though not being able to pinpoint the exact cause, we have known for a while, that those people who are under a great deal of stress and/or who were chronically anxious had an increased likelihood of developing heart disease – in fact we attached the label of *Type A Personality* to them. There may be a reason.

Typically the word inflammation conjures up images of healing wounds, sore throats, or arthritic joints, not heart disease. However there is increasing evidence that chronic inflammation of the lining of blood vessels has a great deal of influence on whether or not patients develop atherosclerosis, perhaps better known in layman's terms as "hardening of the arteries". Hardened arteries can no longer respond to changes in blood pressure, narrow the opening in blood vessels and can lead to memory problems, dementia, stroke, angina or heart attack.

Risk factors such as high blood pressure, obesity, smoking, high cholesterol and recently identified rheumatoid arthritis (www.johnshopkinshealthalerts.com, January 28, 2008), periodontal disease (infection of the gums), and now anger and hostility, appear to initiate a chain reaction within the lining of our blood vessels. Upsetting normal cell function, inflammation, in turn, leads to the production of immune cells that are released to the areas of vessel irritation. Much as they would in fighting off a skin infection, these cells then accumulate in an attempt to heal the damage. Instead these helper cells attract deposits of cholesterol, platelets, and calcium, all clumping together to form a hard substance called plaque. The plaque buildup is what leads to the inevitable narrowing and hardening of the blood vessels. If the plaque ruptures, clots may develop and migrate to the heart or brain causing stroke or heart attack.

There is much more that science has yet to learn about the inflammation process, however in the mean-time, there are some concrete things you can do to lessen the effects of chronic inflammation on your body:

- ♥ stop smoking (your own as well as those around you); watch your weight; get moving/exercise; lower your blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar
- ♥ care for your teeth and gums with regular brushing and regular exams
- ♥ dietary changes – cut out trans fats and saturated fats and replace with olive oil and omega-3 fats from fish; cut way back on refined carbohydrates (white bread, white rice, French fries, sugar laden sodas, etc.); increase your intake of fruit and vegetables; add nuts seeds to your diet; eat dark chocolate (low-fat, low sugar however!); add spices such as turmeric, ginger, garlic, basil and pepper to recipes (these and others have anti-inflammatory properties) (www.health.harvard.edu, *HEALTHbeat*, August 14, 2007)

And finally, as in the case of Pharaoh,

- ♥ reduce your stress (often self-imposed) and reign in anger & hostility by working with your pastor or a trained therapist.
