Consecration Sunday

Consecration Sunday is October 19 this year. We understand the concept that, from a biblical perspective, financial stewardship is not money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, we know that financial contributions are a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Since this goes against our natural tendencies to want to regard everything as our own possessions, we must continue to think about this and make it a part of our life a bit at a time. *Consecration Sunday* is a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving.

We are not members of a social club who should pay dues, we are followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. We must look into our hearts and ask ourselves: "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card*, does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday, October 19. We urge everyone to attend, even those who are hesitant to complete a card, because the procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend worship on Consecration Sunday, October 19. In the coming weeks, please think prayerfully about the blessings God has given to you, and about how you are called to share those blessings.

The other part of the event is the celebration meal that follows each worship service on October 19. At services on the next two Sundays we'll be asking for your reservation for the breakfast following the 8:30 service or the lunch following the 10:30 service on Consecration Sunday. It is important that every member take part.

Our guest speaker is **Elisabeth (Lisa) B. Schuster**, the pastor of Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church in McClure. As a first-call pastor, the call to ministry is a "second career" for Lisa, as she was a high school English teacher and coach in southeastern PA before attending seminary. While she views baptism as the beginning of her call, she also notes that, while a student at PSU, a literature professor told students that the Bible was the basis of most great European literature and that "an educated person is familiar with the stories of the Bible and should have read it at least once." A few years after graduating from PSU, Lisa took these words as a personal challenge and undertook reading the Bible from cover to cover. Reading the Bible became the impetus for returning to the Lutheran church to worship.

As a member of Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church in New Holland, PA, Lisa served at various times as a member of the church council, choir, youth director, and adult Sunday school teacher. After teaching adult Sunday school for the first time, a retired Lutheran pastor, the Reverend David Hunsberger, told her emphatically that she should attend Seminary. With the encouragement of Trinity's then-pastor, the Reverend Matt Lamb, in 2003, she attended the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg full-time beginning in the Fall of 2004 and, on the first day of classes, met Matthew Schuster. Matthew and Lisa were married in May of 2006. Lisa was an intern during 2006-2007 in the Upper Susquehanna Synod at Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church, Cowan. The Schusters graduated with honors in May 2008, were assigned to the Upper Susquehanna Synod, and were ordained at the Synod Assembly in June. On June 1, Lisa received a call to Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church in McClure, PA and began serving as pastor this past summer.

- heard that nearly \$200 was contributed at the July 4 event for St. Anthony's Center.
- rejoiced that five young members were confirmed on September 7.
- heard that Vicki Hospes will serve as nursery coordinator.
- heard that Brittany Toy and Megan Epplenman will serve as acolyte coordinators.
- heard that a Thanksgiving Day service may be held this year. Planning continues.
- moved to accept the lower bid for sidewalk rebuilding on the north side of the building in order to eliminate tripping hazards and improve easy access. The approved bid was from Mackenzie & Son in the amount of \$2850.

We'd like to have as many interested players come out as possible, so we can get an idea of what teams we can field!!

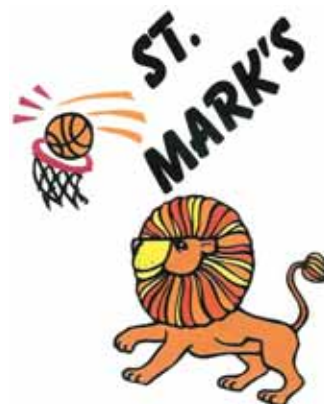
Can we attain an older team this year?? We hope so!

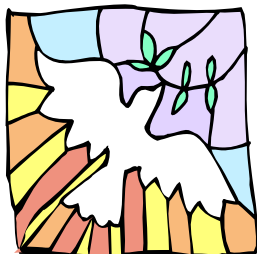

Nursery Policy

Much time and effort has been put into formulating a nursery policy that addresses issues which have been raised during the past year. We wish to welcome all who need the service and provide a safe and caring environment for the children while they are there.

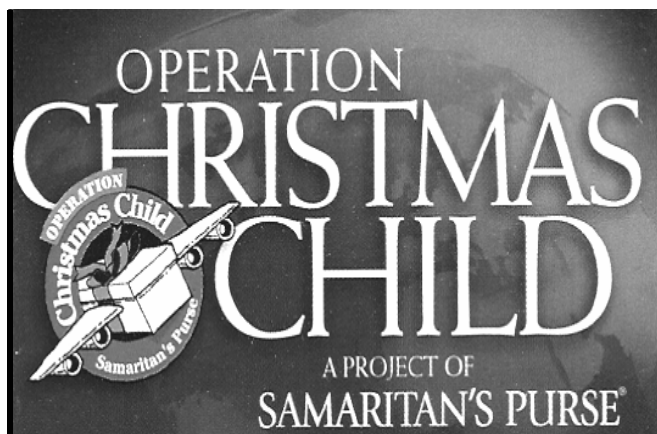
We would also like to remind parents with babies that, as well as a changing table and supplies, there is a crib if you should like to lay your baby down for a nap.

Here is the policy that was accepted:

1. *Volunteers should arrive 10-15 minutes before service begins in order to be ready to greet children and parents.*
2. *A log book has been assembled for recording attendance, any incidents/time-outs, who helped, etc.*
3. *Parents should sign their child in and note where or how they can be located.*
4. *Student assistants will only be in the nursery when needed and then only one at a time. A list of those willing to help will be placed on the wall near the phone. They can be sent for or they can check in with the adult volunteer before service starts.*
5. *A more structured hour will be instituted utilizing packets containing Bible stories or video to supplement coloring or other play.*
6. *Children will be taken to the Nave at communion to participate in the Lord's Prayer and receive the blessing. They may then join their parents if the nursery volunteer has been notified.*
7. *The crib/changing area is ONLY for real babies.*
8. *Balls, "outside" toys, and any objects encouraging "high" or swinging play have been removed from the nursery.*
9. *Food and any beverage other than water will remain OUTSIDE the nursery.*
10. *Proposed behavior/consequence plan:*
 - a. *First Sunday*
 - i. *First problem: time-out*
 - ii. *Second occurrence: time-out*
 - b. *Second Sunday*
 - i. *First problem: time-out*
 - ii. *Second occurrence: time-out and notify parent*
 - c. *Third Sunday*
 - i. *First problem: time-out*
 - ii. *Second occurrence: send for parent to remove child*
 - d. *Fourth Sunday: send for parent and not allowed back for two weeks*
11. *Proposed age cut-off from nursery care is fixed at the time of receiving First Communion. Reason: If a parent feels their child is ready to receive Communion, the child should be at the worship service, instead of playing, entering the Nave to receive, then playing some more.*

Did You Know You Can Recycle Your Old Cell Phones?

Old and used cell phones can still be useful! The Women of the ELCA are collecting any unwanted cell phones, as well as chargers and other cell phone accessories. About 60 % of cell phones recycled are in working order and can be refurbished and sold. Two-thirds of the funds raised will be distributed to the Women's Funding Network to assist women and children living in poverty. The other one-third is donated to improving climate change programs.



According to the EPA recycling ONE phone eliminates 66 pounds of CO2 from entering the atmosphere! Recycling cell phones lying around could reduce greenhouse gas emissions as well as saving energy to power households with electricity. It would also reduce the amount of hazardous waste being dumped into our landfills.

There will be a container in the Narthex for old cell phones. Be sure the phone is de-activated. All personal information should be removed.

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"When David came to Mahanaim, Shobi..., Machir..., and Barzillai..., brought beds, basins, and earthen vessels, wheat, barley, meal, parched grain, beans and lentils, honey and curds, sheep and cheese from the herd, for David and the people with him to eat." (2 Samuel 17:28)

Talk about eating beans, and you just might set someone into fits of giggles. Most of us have heard the little ditty ... *Beans, beans, the musical fruit, the more you eat, the more you* ... well ... you know the ending! For this reason alone, many folks shy away from including beans in their diet. As you probably have guessed by now, I like to use scripture in these articles, so I pulled out the *Exhaustive Concordance*, fully expecting that the word *bean* would not be present, and lo and behold, it appears not once, but twice in the Old Testament – first in 2 Samuel, then again in Ezekiel! The lowly bean has been vindicated!

Beans come in all shapes, colors and sizes. Ounce for ounce they provide more protein for your money than most other sources, such as, fish, poultry, and red meats, and often play a major role in the diets of many vegetarians. Just one cup of prepared beans will provide more than 1/3 of the daily protein needs of the average adult. Cooked, one cup contains approximately 230 calories, and supplies half of a grown woman's daily requirement of iron. One-half cup satisfies all of a child's daily iron needs. In addition, they are loaded with vitamins and minerals – especially vitamins B & E, calcium and potassium. Dried, they are easy to store for long periods of time (making them an ideal food to distribute at food banks, government subsidized food programs such as WIC, and shipped to third world countries), and almost magically double in size when soaked or cooked. Add to that the fact that they meet our daily need for fiber, and you've got a super-nutritious little vegetable!

So why don't we eat more of them? Well ... there is that little problem of you know ... gas. Gas is formed in the large intestine in the body's attempts to break down a sugar within the bean called oligosaccharide. Our bodies seem to be missing the necessary enzyme needed to complete this part of the digestive process. How can we eliminate bloating and embarrassment? Search the internet and you will discover about as many "cures" for the problem as there are types of beans! Some recommend soaking over night then discarding the water, some recommend both soaking, and cooking the beans then discarding the water, some recommend using rinsed canned beans – the theory being that the oligosaccharides transfer into the water and are washed away. Others recommend simply eating more beans, claiming that your body will adjust to this change in your diet. There seems to be only one fool-proof solution ... using a product containing the enzyme that will do the trick our body cannot ... alpha-galactosidase, otherwise known as the product Beano. Alpha-galactosidase is not appropriate for people with diabetes; it could lead to an increase in blood sugar level. People who have mold allergies may have a reaction to alpha-galactosidase. Alpha-galactosidase may increase galactose levels and therefore should not be used by those who have the genetic disease galactosemia.

Another reason we sometimes shy away from dried beans is the time involved in preparation - soaking and cooking, but boy are they worth it! Check out the tasty recipes in the booklet, *The Bold Beautiful Book of Bean Recipes*, compiled by the employees of the Washington State WIC program. A free copy of the booklet can be downloaded at www.3doh.wa.gov/here/Materials/PDFs/15_BeanBook_E04L.pdf. This resource is used by WIC programs throughout the country.

So... the next time someone tells you that " isn't worth a hill of beans", you can respond, with, "*That is wonderful!*", because now you know what a hill of beans is really worth ...and you can leave them scratching their heads ... as you walk away!
