"Be My Valentine"

This is a phrase that conjures up a lot of different images associated with the celebration of Valentine's Day: Cards with hearts and little poems on them; candy and flowers given to someone you love; and images of cupids flying around shooting their arrows of love into un-suspecting youths; young and old alike expressing their affection for their sweethearts. February 14th for many means cards, candy, flowers, and cupids.

Our forebears in the faith would be surprised at what Valentine's Day has become: the commercial huckstering, the use of pagan symbols such as cupid, etc. At an earlier time, it was a day to remember and celebrate the life and death of a Christian martyr.

The legends have so greatly multiplied about Valentine so that we are no longer sure what parts of the stories are fact and which are elaborations. But for a moment, let's use the legends as they have been passed to us, for the reason that they were developed – to encourage us in our day to face our problems with courage and faith.

According to church tradition, Valentine was a priest near Rome in about the year 270 A.D., and was imprisoned during this time of persecution of those who refused to worship the gods of the Roman state.

While in prison Valentine continued to minister. He witnessed to the guards. One of the guards was a good man who had adopted a blind girl. He asked Valentine if his God could help his daughter. Valentine prayed and the girl was given her sight. The guard and his whole family, 46 people, believed in Jesus and were baptized. Because these people had come to know Jesus, Valentine praised God right there in his prison cell. When the emperor heard about this he was furious that Valentine was still making converts even in prison, so he had Valentine beheaded.

The Bible Says: "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. "(John 15:13) God showed us this love by coming in Christ to die for our sins. And St. Valentine demonstrated this love when he died for his friends. This is the kind of love that Valentine's Day is really about.

"Be my Valentine" is not a casual throwaway line. When it is spoken truly, it is a earnest request that someone give you the love and encouragement that you need, in the name of Jesus. What a special request this is! May you give it and receive it generously.

Family Promise of Lycoming County



Family Promise, the process of faith communities assisting in temporarily housing homeless families, is still in the organizing phase here in Williamsport, and it is moving with success in many communities nationwide. In the past year 13 new community affiliates opened, bringing the total to 136 communities around the nation that are benefiting from this hands-on ministry in 148 networks comprised of 5,000 congregations, making use of 120,000 volunteers! What a wonderful effort.

Here in the Williamsport area, we have begun a new year and with a fresh start and are continuing to look for a few more host congregations to reach at least our magic number of 13 (and a spare or two would be even better!) You'll be hearing shortly about our first fund-raising efforts, as well as our continuing friend-raising work. We will need support of all sorts as we move ahead. Church Council members will be receiving the latest newsletter from the national Family Promise organization that currently is celebrating its 20th year of service to the nation, service that began in nearby northern New Jersey.

We know in these difficult economic times, the need for this ministry is even greater than it has been. Let's look for the chances we have to speed the formation of our local Family Promise organization. Ask questions about it. Talk about it with friends in other congregations. Begin to set aside money for this work. Offer prayers of thanksgiving and intercession on behalf of the persons we need to be assisting. Keep talking.



"Girls on the Run" is coming to Messiah Lutheran Church in South Williamsport! Girls on the Run is a character development program for girls in grades 3 through 5 that incorporates running into a variety of lessons designed to prepare young girls to face the challenges of adolescence with confidence. The program provides girls with the tools they will need to make healthy choices and emphasizes self-esteem and concern for the community while maintaining fitness. Girls will discover their *inner* beauty and learn to like themselves the way they are as they become strong from the inside out.



Messiah has the unique opportunity to offer the first faith-based version of this program in our area. Besides the normal Girls on the Run Curriculum, a prayer and devotional has been added to each session to help the girls connect their faith to the everyday life. Faith plays an important part in standing up to peer pressure and making healthy decisions. The lessons the girls will learn are things that are not always covered in the classroom, and the girls will have an opportunity to make new friends with whom they can share their faith. 

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"To watch over mouth and tongue is to keep out of trouble." (Proverbs 21:23, NRSV)

Though this verse from Proverbs likely implied that we should continually guard ourselves from the kind of sin caused by verbal attack, it also seems appropriate to use when referring to good dental health. February is Children's Dental Health Month. An October 2008 report out of the University of South Carolina (*www.newswise.com/article/view/546350/*), indicates that nearly 25% of our nation's children had no dental care in the 12 months prior. Colorado University's *Health Sciences Update* (www.cumc.columbia.ed/newsreleases/Febexp.html) also reported that "more than 51 million school hours are lost each year to oral health related illness" – making it the leading cause of missed school hours, in addition, more than 33% of low income children ages 2-9 have at least one decaying tooth that goes untreated. They also noted that "tooth decay is the most chronic childhood disease" – five times more prevalent than childhood asthma. But why worry – most of these statistics include baby teeth - they will just lose anyway – so it's no big deal, right? Wrong.

Enamel formation begins within the womb, and is very sensitive to changes in the health and well-being of the mother. We've known for many years that certain types of drugs, for example Tetracycline, have adverse effects on the infant's unerupted teeth. We have also learned that a form of severe gingivitis (inflammation of the gums) can release bacteria into the mother's bloodstream, stimulating the release of prostaglandin (a fatty-acid type hormone), which in turn, can lead to premature birth and low-birth-weight babies. This simply reinforces the need for good pre-natal care (both with the physician and the dentist as well), use of prenatal vitamins as directed, and good nutrition throughout the pregnancy.

A child's primary [baby] teeth are important for numerous reasons – for the development of speech, for guiding the growth of the jaw, they are vital for eating and good nutrition, they "hold space" for permanent teeth, and contribute to self-esteem. Tooth decay occurs when the tooth's enamel is destroyed by acid-producing bacteria that thrive on carbohydrates (sugars and starches) and erode the enamel. Regular brushing and flossing help decrease the harmful bacteria that leads to decay.

When should you begin brushing? Pediatricians and dentists recommend that you "brush" the gum areas after feeding, even before the first tooth has erupted. This can be done safely using gauze. Begin regular dental check-ups after the first tooth has emerged – this helps to establish a healthy and less threatening pattern of preventive care. Once teeth have erupted, use a special infant's soft bristled brush and water. Swallowing fluoride toothpaste can itself have adverse dental affects, so stick to using a non-fluoride toothpaste until the child understands how to spit when brushing (around age 3). It is also important that parents supervise brushing until the child's motor skills are mature enough to enable him/her to reach all tooth surfaces (around the third grade) and to use floss successfully. Flossing should begin as soon as two teeth have emerged side-by-side.

To protect from "baby bottle mouth" – a sever form of tooth decay - infants should not be given milk, formula, or juices by bottle when in their cribs. Only water should be given at those times, and only as needed. Be aware that if you obtain your water from bottled sources, most do not contain fluoride. It is important you share this information with your child's doctor and dentist, so fluoride can be obtained through other avenues. Your dentist may also suggest that your child have a "sealant" applied to his/her teeth. This liquid applied to the tooth surface, fills in the pits and grooves of the tooth, where food and bacteria can accumulate. Good preventive care also includes having your child wear a mouth guard when involved in "rough play" such as baseball, football, basketball - those times when mouth injury is common.

If you, as a parent, do not have dental insurance, contact your state's SCHIP program (State Children's Health Insurance Program) through your state's Department of Health, and learn how you can access funding for care – many states have at least one program or plan in place to cover dental services for children. In addition, colleges and universities that train dentists and/or dental para-professionals, may offer free or greatly reduced preventive care services to community members.

Parish nurses - if dental care is scarce in your area, you may find yourself needing to advocate on behalf of parent and child to obtain appointments for dental care. You may need to offer transportation, or child-care – or perhaps provide gentle app-pointment reminders – all identified barriers to children receiving the care that they deserve. Never assume that children are receiving dental care education via their schools. Proactive dental health education is often among the first curricula cut when anxious school administrators attempt to balance yearly budgets. Instead, consider partnering with local colleges and universities that train students. Arrange for or provide educational opportunities for your congregation's pre- and after-school programs. Invite a community educator from your local hospital, dental clinic or Department of Health to speak to parents about the importance of preventive care, or invite them to provide a table during a congregational event. Teach proper brushing to children during church gatherings, such pot-lucks or vacation Bible school. No matter how you look at it, the statistics [above] are appalling. No child should be without adequate dental care.
