School of Religion

School of Religion will again be offered by Lutheran Shared Ministries, a cooperative ministry of congregations of Greater Williamsport. You are invited to attend these classes which will be held at St. Mark's on Wednesdays October 7, 14, 21 & 28 from 7-9 p. m.

Reservations are needed by October 5 (call Sandy at 322-2553 or e-mail her at walkalongtheway@comcast.net.) Arrangements can also be made for childcare at registration. Classes include:

- **Sixty-Six Books in Four Weeks:** "The Book of Faith", as the ELCA calls Holy Scripture, is a library of 66 volumes, written over sixteen centuries with a central theme, "God's love for the world through Jesus Christ." Too often our studies concentrate on a particular volume (or part of a volume) and we lose the majesty and mystery of the total library. This study will explore the totality and discover many interrelationships between the volumes as well as their continuing relevance to our time and their empowering grace in our living. Presented by Pastor Zetto.
- **Ministry to Young Adults:** This forum will involve focused discussion on the topic of relating to and educating young adults. Presented by Pastor Huckfeldt.
- **Can You Dig That?:** Archaeology in the Holy Land is a fascinating activity that can help us to better understand the life and times of people long ago, and also understand ourselves better in the process. They'll use several DVDs featuring experts, and add to it personal photos, video clips, and first-person experiences. It will help the stories of the Bible come alive in fresh ways. 

2010 Liberia Work Project Volunteers Needed

For many years now, the Upper Susquehanna Synod has coordinated the ministry of groups of volunteers traveling to Liberia to work on various educational and/or building projects with our companion synod, the Lutheran Church in Liberia. Volunteers work during the "dry season", between early January and early April, usually for three weeks or more. The expense for those volunteering in 2009 was just under \$3,000—primarily to cover airfare, but also for a visa, lodging and food, local transportation in Liberia, and medical insurance. Volunteers of all stripes and abilities are needed again in 2010, especially for the planned renovation of Day Memorial Church in Millsburg, Liberia. The schedule for the events is as follows:

October 10, 2009 – The Rev. Mary Ann Nelson Loeffe, Aberdeen, South Dakota: Mary Ann has served as the Evangelism Consultant of the Upper New York Synod and a parish pastor. She has a passion for addressing the cultural challenges of sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

May 8, 2010 – The Rev. Larry Clark, Atlanta, Georgia: Larry has served a number of congregations in Chicago and Georgia; he has more recently been Executive Director of the Lutheran Theological Center in Atlanta. Larry has been called one of those "singing pastors" and is excited about spreading the Gospel.

June 12, 2010 – The Rev. Fred Landsberg, Omaha, Nebraska: Fred has been with us in the past and his dynamic presentation challenged those present to be more daring in reaching out in our evangelism efforts. He also shares a wealth of interesting program suggestions to involve and equip lay members for ministry in daily life.

September 11, 2010 – The Rev. Anthony and Kimberly Chatman, Columbus, Ohio: formerly employed by the NFL, Anthony's call to the ministry has brought him to serve congregations in Oklahoma and Ohio. Pastor Anthony has served in the Southwestern Synod working with Mission Developers and the Division for Outreach.

October 9, 2010 – The Rev. Chi-Shih Chen, Chicago, IL: born on Taiwan; president of a corporation; Vice President of American Express; parish pastor at 50+; Pastor Chen brings a broad variety of experience to bear on the evangelistic effort. He has served as an advisor to the ELCA Church Council and is President of the Association of Asian and Pacific Islanders.

NURSERY

We wish to welcome all who need this service and to provide a safe and caring environment for the children while they are here.

We would also like to remind parents with babies that, as well as a changing table and supplies, there is a crib if you should like to lay your baby down for a nap.

For newcomers to St. Mark's and as a review for long-standing members, here is our policy:

- *Volunteers should arrive 10-15 minutes before service begins in order to be ready to greet children and parents.*
- *A log book has been assembled for recording attendance, any incidents/time-outs, who helped, etc.*
- *Parents should sign their child in and note where or how they can be located.*
- *Student assistants will only be in the nursery when needed and then only one at a time. A list of those willing to help will be placed on the wall near the phone. They can be sent for or they can check in with the adult volunteer before service starts.*
- *A more structured hour will be instituted utilizing packets containing Bible stories or video to supplement coloring or other play.*
- *Children will be taken to the Nave at communion to participate in the Lord's Prayer and receive the blessing. They may then join their parents if the nursery volunteer has been notified.*
- *The crib/changing area is ONLY for real babies.*
- *Balls, "outside" toys, and any objects encouraging "high" or swinging play have been removed from the nursery.*
- *Food and any beverage other than water will remain OUTSIDE the nursery.*
- *Proposed behavior/consequence plan:*
- *First Sunday*
 - First problem: time-out*
 - Second occurrence: time-out*
- *Second Sunday*
 - First problem: time-out*
 - Second occurrence: time-out and notify parent*
- *Third Sunday*
 - First problem: time-out*
 - Second occurrence: send for parent to remove child*
- *Fourth Sunday: send for parent and not allowed back for two weeks*
- *Proposed age cut-off from nursery care is fixed at the time of receiving First Communion. Reasoning: If a parent feels their child is ready to receive Communion, the child should be at the worship service, instead of playing, entering the Nave to receive, then playing some more.*

18th annual Life-Chain Sunday, October 4 from 2:30 pm to 3:30 pm on the sidewalks along the Golden Strip


Each year, more than 1,500 people engage in an hour of silent prayer, rain or shine, on behalf of the unborn children in our nation who are at risk of abortion.



Nurses notes

Keeping a food diary for a week or two can help you lose weight, and establish healthier eating patterns. Begin by drawing a graph with the following columns across the top:

- name of food** (be specific, include things such as sauces, mayonnaise, butter, soda, etc.);
- how much** (estimate size or volume);
- time;**
- where** (restaurant, car, room of the house, etc.);
- alone or with someone** (list names);
- activity** (what you were doing at the time);
- mood.**



Record-keeping tips:


Write everything down:

Keep your form with you all day, and write down everything you eat or drink. A piece of candy, a handful of pretzels, a can of soda pop or a small donut may not seem like much at the time, but over a week these calories add up!

Do it now: Don't depend on your memory at the end of the day. Record your eating as you go.

Be specific: Make sure you include "extras," such as gravy on your meat or cheese on your vegetables. Do not generalize. For example, record french fries as french fries, not as potatoes.

Analyze your results with your parish nurse, your doctor, or a nutritionist. What you might learn, may surprise you!



Remember the 30-day rule. It takes about four weeks for the body to adapt to lifestyle changes. That's why people who give up on their fitness programs tend to do so within the first 30 days. So, when the alarm goes off in the morning and it's darker and colder, don't roll over and hit the snooze button. Try to stick with a program for a month. After a month, behavior patterns will have adapted and it will be much easier to stick with it after that. Your body will thank you as you enter the holiday season.

Find yourself waiting around while your child practices soccer or football? Instead of sitting on the sidelines reading a book, take several laps around the practice field. Invite another parent to join you!

Want the taste without the guilt? Try an Apple Pie Smoothie:

Ingredients:

- 1 cup low-fat vanilla frozen yogurt
- ½ cup unsweetened applesauce
- 1 tsp. fresh lemon juice
- ¼ tsp. ground cinnamon
- Dash ground nutmeg
- 2 ice cubes

Directions: Place all ingredients in a blender.
Process until smooth & creamy.
Pour into 2 tall glasses to serve.

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"...the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written: 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor, He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.' And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him." (Luke 4: 17-20).

It's a dirty little secret - one that needs to be brought to the light if we can ever hope to have peace in this world. It causes shame in the hearts and minds of those who are being oppressed – women, men and children alike. It is in our congregations, our communities, and shows no preference to education level, economic situation or marital status. It is estimated that three women and one man will lose their lives to it every day*. It's not just a "family matter"; let's call it what it is – domestic violence - and it is a crime! No matter what problems arise in a relationship, any type of violence is unacceptable! If you or someone you know is the victim of violence, let it be said ... very clearly ... that she/he cannot possibly say or do anything to warrant this treatment from someone they thought they could trust. No matter what the abused has been told, it is not the life that God wishes for them – he sent his own flesh in blood to "proclaim release to the captives ... to let the oppressed go free."

Jesus was also sent to bring "recovery of sight to the blind" – people like you and I who may have turned a blind eye toward abuse/suspected abuse in our families, workplaces or congregations. It is time to stop! "Of all the health and human service challenges we face, perhaps the most devastating, and ironically, the most preventable, is the epidemic of violence sweeping across the nation. Violence is not some mysterious bacterial infection or inexplicable new disease, rather it is a phenomenon for which we are responsible, and we can prevent it. It is time we stopped the denial and claimed our power to halt the bloodshed and save lives." (former US Secretary of Health & Human Services, Donna Shalala) Let's take off the blinders, and look at ways our congregations and its leaders can be sources of compassion and comfort for the abused.

If someone shares that she/he is being abused, believe them. Discuss a safety plan – make it the top priority. Provide him/her with the number of the local shelter for the abused, and/or the number of the National Domestic Violence Hotline: **1-800-799-SAFE(7233) 1-800-787-3224 (for the hearing impaired)** In addition, post the numbers where an abused individual can discreetly pick up the information. (Ex. on toilet tank covers, or the back of bathroom/stall doors)

Maintain confidentiality. Do not share her/his whereabouts, particularly with the abuser.

Support and respect their choices – even if that means returning to the unhealthy situation. They are the best judge of how to survive, and it may take several cycles of the abuse until she/he is ready to get out of the relationship. This is a complex issue, particularly when children are involved.

Pray with her/him. Assure them of God's love and presence, amidst the devastation.

In an acute situation, do not recommend couples counseling, marriage enrichment, or a workshop on communications. This may seem counter-intuitive however, none of these actions will address the immediate problem, and in instances of physical violence, may actually make the situation worse. Put them in touch with local resources who are trained to work with victims.

Speak out – in print, from the pulpit, by sponsoring community education; partner with local resources; make education a part of pre-marital counseling; prepare to be a resource.


