Jungwha's Outcry: Treble singers needed!!!

Happy New School Year!!! As we start the new season, I need your help.

Can you think of organ music without the low notes of the pedals? If there is no work for the feet on the organ, I don't want to go to the concert. Thank you very much for our mighty bass in the senior choir, but they don't sing joyously when there are not enough treble singers in women and men. We appreciate foundation of sound from the pedal division of the organ and lower parts of the human voice, but we need sopranos and tenors; someone who will flourish and lead the sound over the foundation of sound. Without them it is like turkey without gravy!

That is our situation in the senior choir at St. Mark's. I cannot express enough the importance of treble singers in the choir. Sometimes I eat plain part of cakes to get to the icing! The treble singers stand out just as icing is conspicuous on a cake. We appreciate the joy and character they bring to the music.

If you can sing higher notes and if you have ever thought of joining choir but are hesitant, I have the solution for you. You will find a place next to well-established singers and follow their lead. When we don't have enough supporting sound, everyone notices difference just as if an organ doesn't have enough high pitch ranks of pipes. It will sound dull.

We like to sing hymns with organ accompaniment because of its brightness and fullness. Our choir would like to sing with human bass and soprano. Organists appreciate the bass section more than any other musicians, because we know the magnitude of it every time we perch on the organ bench. Now the foundation is laid before you, please join us to explore the enchantment of the icing part of the cake!!!

- ♪ You should understand Jungwha's foreign tongue. This might be the hardest part, but you will get there. Maybe not in the beginning.....

Make up a kit for someone who is suffering!

Did you get a bag to fill for a School Kit? You may prefer to make up one of the other kits that Lutheran World Relief distributes. Please note that the guidelines have changed for three of the kits. Soap bars are also again being collected.

PERSONAL CARE KITS (formerly Health Kits) – People who must leave their homes suddenly will want to wash away the dirt and sweat. Wrap the following items in the towel and tie securely.



- 1 bath-size towel (approx 52" x 27"), dark color recommended
- 2 bath-size (4 to 5 oz.) of soap, any brand, in original wrapping
- 1 adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging
- 1 sturdy comb, remove packaging
- 1 metal nail clippers, remove packaging

BABY CARE KITS (formerly Layettes) – To a mother living in poverty, the following items can give warmth and comfort, and soap to keep the germs away from her precious baby. Gently used, clean items (no stains or tears) can be substituted for new ones. Varying the sizes of clothing will help as the baby grows. Wrap all the items in one blanket and secure with pins.

- 2 lightweight cotton t-shirts
- 2 long or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers without feet
- 2 receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel
- 4 cloth diapers, flat fold preferred
- 1 jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby cap (Size up to 24 months).
- 2 pairs of socks
- 1 hand towel, dark color recommended
- 2 bath-size bars (4 to 5 oz.) of gentle soap, in original wrapping
- 2 diaper pins or large safety pins



FABRIC KITS (formerly Sewing Kits) – Sewing is a valuable skill that can lead to an income for men or women. Fold the thread and one piece of fabric inside the other piece and tie with yarn, ribbon, or strip of fabric. (No knits, 100% polyester)

- 2 pieces of cotton or cotton-blend fabric cut into pieces measuring
- 3 yds. of 44" wide fabric or 4 yds. of 36" wide fabric
- 2 spools of matching general purpose thread, 250-300 yds. Each

SCHOOL KITS – School Kits give children in impoverished schools, refugee camps, or other difficult settings some basic tools for learning. Remove excess packaging and pack all the items in the cloth bags that have been provided. Secure with rubber bands.

- Notebooks approx. 8" x 10 ½" with 150-200 sheets (no loose-leaf)
(3 of the 70-sheet notebooks are preferred.)
- 1 blunt scissors (metal blades)
- 6 unsharpened pencils w/erasers
- 1 eraser approx. 2 ½" long
- 12 sheets construction paper
- 1 box crayons (16 or 24)
- 1 pencil sharpener
- 1 ruler (12" or 30 cm.)



SOAP – Soap keeps hands clean, germs at bay, and helps people present themselves with dignity. New bars of any brand in the original wrappers are requested. All sizes are accepted, but bath-size (4 to 5 oz.) are preferred.

CROP WALK

Our community's annual walk to fight hunger, the CROP Walk, is scheduled for Sunday, October 9, 2011 at 1:30 P.M. at the River Walk in Williamsport! This is our first year at this new location. Registration will begin at 1:00 P.M. at our very own St. Mark's Lutheran Church! You will select your River Walk route for a 3, 6 or 10 mile walk or anywhere in between. Thank you to all who walked and donated for the CROP Walk in 2010. Together we raised \$562! Those of us who walked had a great time and we hope more join us this year!

Last year's CROP Walk brought over thirty churches, synagogues, and organizations with donations totaling \$14,347.91. This year is the 32nd walk and during the past 31 years they have collected \$715,815.30. Thank you for doing your part in fighting hunger both locally and globally. 25% of the money we collect comes back to our community and is distributed equally to the American Rescue Workers Food Pantry, the Salvation Army Food Pantry, the United Churches Food Pantry and St. Anthony's Center. The other 75% is distributed by Church World Service nationally and internationally to help people who are hungry. We have taken a local allocation for the past 14 years, which has brought a total of \$53,739.61 back into our community. Other walks in our county have added to this total!

This is a great event for our youth!

A *Quake* is a Christian weekend retreat for middle school students and their leaders. At these, God builds caring Christian community among youth and adults, personal faith in Jesus Christ, and positive relationships among peers through great music, motivational speakers, small group activities, lessons on life and exciting interaction between youth groups.

A *Zone* is an intense Christian weekend event designed to help high school youth grow in their faith. At these, youth will develop relationships with other high school youth and Christian adults while growing in their personal faith with Jesus Christ. Featured are large group celebrations, nationally renowned musicians, a service project, and awesome late night Christian activities.

What's the difference? Both are centered on Jesus and provide opportunities for faith building. *Quakes* focus on faith in Jesus Christ and building Christian community. *Zones* go deeper by providing opportunities for faith not only to grow, but also be applied. Youth are challenged to discover and put into practice their spiritual gifts, as well as be involved in on-site service opportunities.

If we take a group, we have to register by mid-October. St. Mark's will pay half of the hotel/event fee and we have planned fundraisers for the students to earn the rest. Please note that we will be leaving on a Friday morning...if your school is in session, they will allow an exemption for religious purposes.





Consecration Sunday is October 16 this year. Every attendee and member who completes an Estimate of Giving Card, does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday, October 16. We urge everyone to attend, even those who are hesitant to complete a card, because the procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend worship on Consecration Sunday, October 16. In the coming weeks, please think prayerfully about the blessings God has given to you, and about how you are called to share those blessings.

The other part of the event is the celebration meal that follows each worship service on October 16. At services on October 2 and 9, we'll be asking for your reservation for the breakfast following the 8:30 service or the lunch following the 10:30 service on Consecration Sunday. It is important that every member take part.

St. Mark's and rural churches from the Lock Haven area will participate in a Pastor Exchange on that day. Pastor Elkin will take God's message to Pastor W. Steven Shipman's churches in the valleys, and Pastor Shipman will speak to us on how Stewardship (our works and efforts) coincides with what we do after we say "We believe...". 

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

Last night I watched the movie *Marley and Me* – the story of an incorrigible yellow Labrador retriever, who defied all attempts to become a civilized member of his family. The only thing harder than trying to train Marley, is training a beagle! As the story progresses, we see that what has been said about pets is true – they love you unconditionally! You may have had a lousy day, but your pet doesn't hold that against you. You may have had to scold them, but they forgive in a matter of minutes. When you emotionally invest yourself into relationships with them, their passing is felt as deeply as if they had been two-, rather than four-legged, companions. So, this month's column is dedicated to Marley, and all pets who love unconditionally.

According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC) and the website, MayoClinic.com, pets offer numerous health benefits.

1. "Scientists have found that people who owned dogs were more likely to be alive, one year after suffering a heart attack than were people who didn't own dogs.
2. In comparisons of the heart rate and blood pressure of people without pets versus those of pet owners, people with pets had lower heart rates and blood pressure levels. An added benefit was that people with pets also had less increase in their heart rate and blood pressure when put under stress. Their blood pressure also dropped faster after a stressful event.
3. Studies of older adults have found that those who shared their lives with pets were less likely to experience depression, were better able to tolerate living alone, and were more active than their counterparts who didn't have pets."

Pets can increase your opportunities for exercise and outdoor activities, and your opportunities for socialization.

I'd like to share the following observations someone once made about life lessons from a dog:

- ✧ Never pass up the opportunity to go for a ride with someone you love.
- ✧ On hot days, drink lots of water.
- ✧ When loved ones come home, always run to greet them.
- ✧ Run, romp, and play daily.
- ✧ Allow the experience of fresh air and wind in your face to be pure ecstasy.
- ✧ When someone is having a bad day, be silent, sit close by, and nuzzle them gently.
- ✧ If someone scolds you, forgive quickly.
- ✧ If something you want is buried, dig until you find it.
- ✧ Never pretend to be something you're not.
- ✧ Be loyal.

Will there be pets in heaven? I think so, and to them I believe God will also say, "Well done, good and faithful servant. Well done!"


