Two Processions

There were two processions going on in those days in Jerusalem.

Jesus and his disciples come from Galilee in the north down to Jericho and then make the tough climb up through the barren hills to Bethany and then to the Mount of Olives overlooking the city of Jerusalem from the east.

The last portion of the journey was the route that tradition held would be the one taken by the messiah when he finally arrived.

One procession cared only about the pleasures of the moment.

The other procession cared about matters eternal.

The one procession claimed it had complete power.

The other knew it had power, but chose to use it in a very different way.

The one has the power to kill; the other has the power to make alive.

The one has the power to hate; the other has the power to love that overcomes hate.

Two processions still continue today.

The traffic of the one moves even faster past St. Mark's in all directions.

The other procession moves more slowly,

at the pace of a conversation at a sickbed,

at the pace of a loving hand of assistance,

at the pace of opening a scripture lesson for study and reflection with another,

at the pace of song and prayer and thanksgiving and the Great Banquet.

Two processions still continue today.

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


We will begin by having breakfast with the Pastor and then we will have our Easter Egg Hunt.

Our Catechetical Trip

They do know how to cover ground! On Saturday, March 3, 2012, our catechetical students traveled to points southeast (see compass) where they visited visit Augustus Church in Trappe, Pa, Hopewell Furnace, and Ephrata Cloister...well, we'll let them tell you about it:



Evan Barone: The church we went to is the oldest church in Pennsylvania. The people that went there were first using a barn. The pastor for the barn moved west. Then they needed a new pastor. They got turned down a couple of times. Then a Lutheran pastor from Germany said yes. His name was Henry Melchior Muhlenberg. 15 months passed before he reached the congregation. They were extremely anxious to build a church. Then they began to build one in 1743. The first service was on September 12, 17464. That is how it started.

Ben Haussmann: This is about our confirmation trip on Saturday, March 3, to Hopewell Furnace, which was our second stop. Hopewell Furnace is a place where they made iron in the 1800s. They made iron by putting charcoal, iron ore, and limestone together into the furnace and melting it. Charcoal was made by stacking wood in a certain way and then piling leaves and dirt over the wood. The pile was then burned slowly for about 10 days. These were the steps to create the molten iron. This molten iron could be used to create stove parts, cannons, or pig iron. The stove parts would be made in a sand mold. Once the parts cooled, they would put the pieces together. Most of this work was done by men, but there was plenty of work for the women and kids, too! This was only our second stop on our confirmation trip, but Hopewell Furnace was my favorite part!

Dawson Owen: I went on my first confirmation trip. The third place I went was to the Ephrata Cloister. I enjoyed the movie I saw. It was about the founder's life. I went inside the founder's house. I learned what life was like around the mid-1700s. The men and the women in that place had different jobs. I had a fun day with my confirmation class.




On March 24, we went bowling!!



Vierne, Debussy, and Wagner

If you want to hear organ music of Classical period, you will hardly find any significant pieces. The classic period is the worst era in terms of existing repertoire of organ music, since piano was the highlighted and favored instrument among keyboard instruments. Does anyone notice there isn't much organ music available even in romantic period to compare with prolific numbers of other instrumental genres? However in romantic period of organ music, one cannot overpass great influence of French *Symphonists*.

The symphonic school of nineteenth-century in French organ was encouraged by the orchestral organs of Aristide Cavaillé-Coll. His company built organs from about 1840 until 1900 and exerted much influence upon the work of organ music of the period through composers such as Franck, Widor, Vierne, Guilmant and more. One might call them **symphonists**, because their sound pursues the orchestral effect, which made it possible by organs that Cavaillé-Coll built.

Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937) and Louis Vierne (1870–1937), two famous French symphonists, are much different composers. Widor tends to write more conservative and architectonic style as opposed to Vierne's chromatic style which well sought out through his harmonic and contrapunctal devices. Despite lack of tangible evidence how Wagner's chromaticism reflects on Vierne's music, I am convinced that the strong, all-pervading influence of Wagner's dramatic chromaticism changed Vierne's musical concept like all turn of the twentieth century composers though he was anti-Wagnerian. If he were to be classified, however, I would call him a impressionist in organ music. He lived in the cultural background of Paris in his time, ground zero for the styles of impressionism that were revolutionizing both art and music.

Louis Vierne was born legally blind and had a difficult life losing his brother and son in the time of World War I. His music is often unacknowledged source for much of modern organ music, yet he always blended modernistic with traditional and romantic elements. His harmonies became more and more extreme as the years passed, exploring tonality to the limit but never fully leaving it. He strides the boundary between the romantic and modern worlds, which gives him a unique appeal and place in history. Like Stravinsky's Rite of Spring or twelve-tone music by Schoenberg, his music is old now in the twenty-first century but still refreshes us because of its unique undefeatable musical persuasion. Unlike radical composers such as Messiaen, structure remained very important to Vierne. As his sight diminished due to the cataract, his tonality and harmony reached to the edge.

Why am I explaining this detailed story of a French composer, Louis Vierne? In my opinion, there are two kinds of musicians; the one with Widor, the other with Vierne. It won't be hard for you to know where I stand. Vierne's music always asks a musical question to convey his compositional intention due to intricate musical language. On the other hand, Widor's music is much simpler. You might remind similar distinction between Ravel and Debussy. Widor is rather faithful composer of the period as opposed to pioneering figure of the new musical genre.

It is my pleasure to study Vierne's music in standpoint of the chromaticism which mainly characterized by Wagner or his contemporary composers, since the opera is not the field I want to go near. Do you love Wagner? Do you also love Louis Vierne's music? Why am I writing this? If St. Mark's people are expecting to hear Widor's Toccata on Easter Day, well you might be disappointed. Although Widor's Toccata is an unforgettable masterpiece, it will stay as Mr. Lakey's trademark. Jungwha wouldn't dare to overwrite Mr. Lakey's musical staple.

Then what goes on? Come and join us our musical feast on Easter Day!

Health, Healing & Wholeness

"For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen?

But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience." (Romans 8:24-25)

We are in the midst of the season of hope. Easter lasts a total of 50 days, ending with Pentecost, and the birth of the church. In celebration, we are surrounded by symbols of hope – colorful eggs, pictures of baby animals, greenery, rain, rainbows, and flowers – signs of re-birth and a promise of life after death.

If we look at the Easter story as recorded by Mark, this promise of life after death was not inherent in the minds of Christ's followers. On the morning of the resurrection, three days after Christ's crucifixion, two women named Mary arrive at the tomb with the ingredients to anoint the body of their teacher and friend. Instead of a body, they see a young man who tells them that Jesus is not there. Hope was not their first reaction! Instead, they are both so frightened that they run back to the village, and tell *no one* about their experience. They were not alone. Two men did not recognize their traveling companion on the road to Emmaus. Others gathered in a room in town, petrified of what would become of them now that their leader had been killed. Then of course, there was Thomas, who refused to believe until he had physical proof. In all cases, these people had to grow into their understanding of hope beyond their limited sight.

Today we have come to understand that hope must be something we cultivate in each other, and that without it, we will not have a fruitful life. It's been said that man can live for about 40 days without food, about 3 days without water, about 8 minutes without air. However, he cannot live more than a few seconds without hope. Psychologist Erick Erikson stated, "Hope is both the earliest and the most indispensable virtue inherent in the state of being alive ... if life is to be sustained, hope must remain, even where confidence is wounded, trust impaired." Closely related to the experience of trust is the capacity to form effective attachments to others, including God. Viktor Frankl, in his book Man's Search for Meaning, noted that prisoners who lost their faith were doomed to die in a short period of time, echoing Proverbs 13:12, where "Hope deferred makes the heart sick."

So how do we cultivate hope? It begins in early childhood, through ongoing loving interactions with responsive care givers. The secure base of the relationship serves as a safe haven to which a child can return for comfort, support, and guidance when he/she becomes fearful during interactions with the world. In time, this safety becomes internalized through the belief that someone will be available – providing hope, and an understanding of being loved. Can't we say the same of our relationship with our Lord?

There are spiritual, physical, and mental health advantages to increased hope. It aids in coping with adversity and leads to improved life satisfaction. Hopeful people tend to make healthier lifestyle choices. Studies have proven that they recover from illness and injury more effectively, and have increased life expectancies. They manifest less depression and anxiety and experience increased positive mental health and personal adjustment. They persevere when barriers arise, and are more effective problem solvers. In addition, they hold positive views of relationships and are open to receive social support. According to psychologist Martin Seligman, one of the most significant findings in psychology in the last twenty years is that individuals can choose the way they think.

How can one develop a hopeful attitude? With time and practice, a new habit of hopeful thinking can take shape. Here are a few tips from the experts at the Mayo Clinic:

- Check your inner voice periodically throughout the day. If your thoughts are mainly negative, try to replace them with positive ones.
- Try not to take yourself too seriously. There are plenty of humorous situations in everyday events even in difficult times.
- Exercise at least three days a week. Exercise releases endorphins in the body that help to positively affect mood and reduce stress.
- Surround yourself with positive, supportive, dependable people who give helpful advice and feedback. Negative people tend to deplete hopeful energy from others.
- Pray, and be gentle with yourself. Some days will be more difficult than others, but get into the habit of not saying anything to yourself that you would not say to someone else. As the Rev. Billy Graham was reported to have said, "I've read the last page of the Bible. It's all going to turn out all right."


