

June 2012 Synod Assembly Report



The 25th annual Upper Susquehanna Synod Assembly took place on June 15-16, 2012 at Selinsgrove University. Three St. Mark's delegates were among the 253 voting members of the Assembly.

Attending for St. Mark's were current and immediate past Congregation Council presidents Ray Huff and Gary Weber, and Pastor Elkin. For our delegates, the Assembly was both fascinating and frustrating.

The high point of the Assembly was the ordination service for Pastor Gary Shumway. He was called as a second career to serve God in a new way. Pastor Shumway will serve several Jersey Shore congregations.

The business of the Synod was conducted by Bishop Robert Driesen during 5 plenary sessions taking place during the 2 day gathering. Each day allowed for work sessions, with the individual delegates choosing the topics. A new feature of the Assembly was to gather several church delegations into small groups to discuss ideas for improvement.

In addition to the Ordination service on Saturday, Holy Eucharist was celebrated on Friday. Rev. Donald McCoid, an ELCA representative preached the sermon.

At the business sessions, the delegates received reports from the Bishop and the various Synod organizations and officers. The reports on the health of the Lutheran churches in the Synod were not good. Last year, the Synod was struggling financially, which required mid year adjustments to the budget. A somewhat improved picture later in the year allowed for some of the budget cuts to be restored. Mission support is down, with fewer churches supporting missionaries. Seven churches closed or disaffiliated from the ELCA. Most significantly, the delegates received a report that half of the churches in the Synod are having financial difficulties. Membership continues to drop at many churches.

It was disturbing, then, that the only new initiative put forward at the Assembly dealt with the natural gas industry in Pennsylvania. The delegates debated and then approved establishing a Synod task force to study "horizontal slickwater hydraulic fracturing." A second resolution declaring the Synod's support for a moratorium on issuing new permits for hydraulic fracturing passed on a vote of 110 to 92. Finally, the delegates passed a memorial to the ELCA encouraged national action on the same issues. St. Mark's delegates voted against each of these resolutions, believing that they were an unwarranted distraction from the conduct of the necessary business of the church.

In the small group session, St. Mark's was paired with Messiah of South Williamsport. We batted about the possibility of a Saturday service. Discussion focused on a single service shared by multiple

congregations. We also discussed ways to reach out to gas workers migrating into the area.

The hallways were filled with many interesting displays and offerings. The delegates were tempted by popcorn, free pens and tee shirts, and lots of reading material.

All-in-all, a fascinating yet frustrating experience.



Step Forward, Please!

There are several posts that need new leaders. Might you be the right person to serve in one of these capacities?

Greeters Coordinator – Part of our Hospitality is greeting everyone as they enter the church for worship. The coordinator arranges the list of persons who take turns at the door each week.

Flower Delivery Coordinator – The altar flowers have brought beauty to the nave and glorified God, and then they can also bring joy to someone who is ill or lonely at home or in the hospital. The coordinator manages a list of persons who can take a few minutes to deliver flowers and a greeting in the name of our Lord Jesus.

Hospitality Coordinator at 10:30 – This person manages the list of persons who provide the refreshments following the 10:30 service and encourages the conversations to continue.

Prayer Venture card sender – This person sends postcards each week to remind persons that we are naming them in prayer each day in Morning Prayer and inviting the congregation to remember them at home as well. The cards, the list, and postage are provided; you provide the effort to send the cards and perhaps add a personal note if you wish.

Then the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" As soon as Simon Peter heard him say, "It is the Lord,"


he wrapped his outer garment around him and jumped into the water.

Crop Walk 2012

According to records, this year will be UCLC's 33rd walk. During the past 32 years the Greater Williamsport Walk has collected \$731,090.79. The Trout Run Walk has collected \$42,471.82 since their beginning. And through Lycoming County, in Williamsport - Trout Run - Jersey Shore - Hughesville - Muncy - Montgomery we have raised \$1,002,087.28 to help CROP stop hunger!



Thank you for doing your part in fighting hunger both locally and globally. 25% of the money we collect comes back to our community and is distributed equally to the American Rescue Workers Food Pantry, the Sonlight House of Muncy, the United Churches Food Pantry and St. Anthony's Center. The other 75% is distributed by Church World Service nationally and internationally to help people who are hungry. We have taken a local allocation for the past 15 years, which has brought a total of \$57,490.80 back into our community. Other walks in our county have added to this total! Together, we can make a difference!

NEW GUIDELINES FOR <u>ALL</u> KITS



Do not enclose Kits or any of its contents in plastic bags.

Fabric Kit

School Kit

- 4 70-sheet notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper approximately 8" X 10½"; no loose-leaf paper
- 1 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters and inches
- 1 pencil sharpener
- 1 blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- 5 unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band
- 5 black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink); secure together with a rubber band
- 1 box of 16 or 24 crayons
- $1 2\frac{1}{2}$ " eraser

1 sturdy drawstring backpack-style cloth bag approximately 14" X 17" with shoulder straps (no standard backpacks)

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new & in good condition. Remove any excess packaging, pack all items in bag and close.

Layette Kit

2 lightweight cotton t-shirts

2 long- or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet)

- 2 receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, up to 52" square
- 4 cloth diapers, flat fold preferred
- 1 jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby cap 2 pairs of socks
- 1 hand towel, dark color wrapped
- 2 diaper pins or large safety pins

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. Gently used, clean items (no stains or tears) or new. Wrap items in one of the receiving blankets and secure with diaper pins.

2 pieces of cotton or cotton-blend fabric (no knits or 100% polyester). Each piece should match one of the sizes below:

∘2¼ yards of 60" wide fabric, or

- •3 yards of 44" wide fabric, or
- •4 yards of 36" wide fabric

2 spools of neutral-colored all purpose thread, 250-300 yards

Fabric should have no stains or holes. Pieces do not need to match in size or color/pattern. Fold thread and one piece of fabric inside second fabric piece and tie with yarn, sturdy string, ribbon or a strip of fabric.

Personal Care Kit

- 1 light-weight bath-size towel (max. 52" X 27"), dark color
- 2 bath-size bars (4 to 5 oz.) of soap, any brand, wrapped
- 1 adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging or sealed in
- a business-size envelope
- 1 sturdy comb, remove packaging
- 1 metal nail clippers remove packaging

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new and in good condition. Wrap all the items in the towel and tie securely with ribbons or yarn.

Health, Healing & Wholeness

The fifth chapter of Mark contains the stories of two miracles, the healing of the bleeding woman (Vs. 25-34) and the raising of Jairus' daughter (Vs. 21-24; 35-43). Both serve as a testament to the power of Jesus over sickness and death. They are not just stories about healing, but also the power of personal connection to others. Coming to truly know one another as the church – the body of Christ – can be intimidating, even frightening, yet that is exactly what he is calling us to do – to plant ourselves at the intersection of human contact and healing. Ann Weems, in the book *Reaching for Rainbows* (Westminster Press, 1980) says it better than I ever could, so this month's article, is her poem titled "Touch in Church"....

What is all this touching in church? It used to be a person could come to church and sit in the pew and not be bothered by all this friendliness, And certainly not by touching. I used to come to church and leave untouched. Now I have to be nervous about what's expected of me. I have to worry about responding to the person sitting next to me. *Oh, I wish it could be the way it used to be;* I could just ask the person next to me: How are you? And the person could answer: Oh, just fine, And we'd both go home . . . strangers who have known each other for twenty years. But now the minister asks us to look at each other. I'm worried about that hurt look I saw in that woman's eyes. Now I'm concerned. because when the minister asks us to pass the peace, The man next to me held my hand so tightly I wondered if he had been touched in years. Now I'm upset because the lady next to me cried and then apologized And said it was because I was so kind and that she needed A friend right now. Now I have to get involved. Now I have to suffer when this community suffers. Now I have to be more than a person coming to observe a service. That man last week told me I'd never know how much I'd touched his life. All I did was smile and tell him I understood what it was to be lonely. Lord, I'm not big enough to touch and be touched! The stretching scares me. What if I disappoint somebody? What if I'm too pushy? What if I cling too much? What if somebody ignores me? "Pass the peace." And mean it. Lord, I can't resist meaning it! I'm touched by it, I'm enveloped by it! I find I do care about that person next to me! I find I am involved! And I'm scared. O Lord, be here beside me. You touch me, Lord, so that I can touch and be touched! So that I can care and be cared for! So that I can share my life with all those others that belong to you! All this touching in church -- Lord, it's changing me!


