The following was written by our counterpart across the water...the Susquehanna, that is. Kathy Wither is the director of youth programs, confirmation, special events, and the pastor's assistant at Messiah Lutheran Church.

"OUR YOUTH ARE OUR FUTURE - OR ARE THEY?

"I hear it all the time: 'Our youth are our future.' And indeed, there is some truth to this...depending on how you look at it. In theory, today's youth will grow to be tomorrow's adults, and if we do our job well, they will go on to live as faithful disciples of Christ and join us in supporting, the church family. But in reality, not all of our youth will reside in this community or continue to worship at *(St. Mark's).* Some will stay, but many of our young adults will earn college degrees and move to areas that offer more opportunities to put their education to use—and, perhaps, a better paycheck! Some will marry and attend the churches in which their spouses were raised. Whether they stay or go, some will remain faithful...and others will not.

"This past Sunday, six young people committed themselves to confirmation ministry for the coming year. Each of these young teens has been matched with a mentor—an adult who has committed him or herself to building a relationship with the student—a relationship through which the mentors model a life of discipleship, sharing with the students their own faith stories—the struggles, the joys, the revelations that they have experienced on their journeys through life. The aim is to lead the students, through word and example, to become people who embody what it means to be disciples of Jesus in their lifestyle, beliefs, and values. You see, Christianity is not something we strive "to do," but rather *it is a way of life altogether.* Our hope is that the students will grow into a faith so sincere and develop a commitment so deep that *following Christ becomes as natural as breathing.*

"But it doesn't start or end with confirmation ministry. The moment a child is baptized, he becomes one of us, a member of the family of God. So what is our goal, really, when it comes to our youth? *Each of us* is called to pass on the faith, to affirm them as members of the body of Christ, and to give them the skills, insights, and experiences they need to be faithful...not just if and while they are with us...but so that they are equipped to continue in the covenant of their baptisms for a lifetime—*wherever* they may go as they reach adulthood. But for this to happen, they need committed adults in their lives with whom they can build lasting relationships—*now.* If you have a heart for youth ministry, I urge you to get involved. On whatever level you serve, include the youth whenever possible, and let them know that they are valued as fellow Christians.

"Because our youth are not our future - they are our today."

This is so true on so many levels. It distresses us that, this far into the school year, we have not yet filled the roster for Sunday School teachers...despite having it been made as convenient as possible for volunteers. We've been asking for someone to step up as a coach for our basketball team, because, due to life circumstances, our coaches of the past seven years are unable to take it on this year. Our thanks go out to all those who do give their time and energy. All others, please reconsider your commitment to our children. God bless you all, Bernadette & Michele

Council Update


The Council met in regular session on Sunday, October 14, 2012 in Middle Lounge.



Dr Maria Khoury was born in Tripoli, Greece and raised in Denver, Colorado. She is a



graduate of Hellenic College (1982), Harvard University (1985) and Boston University (1992) with a doctor of education degree. On December 31, 2009 she was included on the top four Human Rights Champions list by DC Human Rights Examiner including the Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew and Hillary Clinton.

Dr Khoury lives in Taybeh, Palestine, with her husband, the honorable Mayor David Canaan Khoury and three children Elena, Canaan, and Constantine. Her family is active in St. George Orthodox Church. She is also a fundraiser for a housing project to help sustain the small Christian community living under military occupation. Her articles have been published world-wide in numerous publications and have been translated into several languages. In the Fall of 2011, she was a consultant interviewed by reporter Bob Simon for a **"60 Minutes"** broadcast that incited significant conversation. She is also the author of Orthodox Christian children's books, bringing awareness of the Christian presence and life in the Holy Land. The Khourys returned to the Holy Land in 1995 following the Oslo Peace Agreement.

FAMILY PROMISE HOSTING

We are fortunate to have a dedicated core group of volunteers for our four weeks per year of hosting families with children experiencing a housing crisis. We also receive assistance from five members of First Presbyterian Church. But if any one experiences illness, an unavoidable commitment or an emergency we are hard pressed to cover our responsibilities while the families are in our care.

Our final week of hosting in 2012 is December 23rd to December 30th. This is a very busy time for everyone. I am asking you to make a commitment now to helping in a way that is possible for you.

In addition to our regular slots for van driving, preparing and serving meals, visiting a few hours or sleeping overnight, we need some additional folks to help as follows when our regular volunteers are unavailable.

- Additional van drivers. It's a short trip from St. Mark's to Sherman Street.
- Grocery Shopper. We are responsible for providing all the meals for the families including breakfast and lunch that are eaten at the Day Center. A few days before the families come to us, we receive a list of needed supplies for the Day Center. These items need to be purchased and delivered to the Day Center by our first Sunday of hosting. We have a fund to reimburse the shopper for the items purchased.
- Solution Unlock the back door at 4:30 pm. for meal preparers who do not have a key.
- Kitchen Helpers to assist meal preparers with setting out the dishes, etc. If the meal preparers are from another congregation they are unfamiliar with our kitchen.
- Dishwashers for when the meal preparers do not know how to operate our dishwasher.
- Additional evening visitors to chat with folks after supper until 8:30 pm.
- Overnight hosts. With another set of hosts no one who is already staying overnight would need to do two nights.
- We have a great set up/tear down crew. But we need a few ladies to put the homey touch to the bedrooms at the beginning of hosting and assist in storing our items at the end of hosting.
- ♦ At least 3 people to do the laundry at the end of the hosting week. Last hosting week we amassed six garbage bags full of sheets, blankets and hand towels.
- Monetary donations are always welcome to fund our hosting. Checks may be made payable to St. Mark's with the memo line indicating "Hosting Fund."




As before, the proceeds from calendars sold by youth not going on the trip will go to Heifer International.





Health, Healing & Wholeness

"Then I heard every creature in heaven and on earth and under the earth and in the sea, and all that is in them, singing, 'To the one seated on the throne and to the Lamb be blessing and honor and glory and might forever and ever! And the four living creatures said, 'Amen!' " (NRSV; Revelation 5:13-14)

I'll admit, I was a bit skeptical when I first met Guinevere. As soon as she walked into the room all eyes were on her as she eagerly moved from person to person, her blond hair bouncing with every movement. As the support meeting began, she worked her way around the perimeter of the room and came to sit by one of the evening's participants. Periodically, she would look into his face as he spoke about his struggle with mental illness, and every so often, he would pat her on the head. A change came over this gentleman – a calmness that was not present at the beginning of the meeting. Later, the woman who had accompanied Guinevere that evening spoke of their years of partnership, in providing therapy to people of all ages, and in a variety of different settings.

Guinevere is a trained, certified therapy dog. Her handler, a behavioral health therapist, is employed by a local elementary school. Along with Guinevere's job of soothing frightened, sometimes angry children, she was also a non-judgmental listener to youngsters who were struggling with learning to read. Perhaps you have encountered one of Gwenny's colleagues when you've visited a long-term-care facility, or even the local emergency department.

In the past, I wrote of the many health benefits of owning a pet. The positive effects of animal assisted therapy have been studied, and are now generally accepted in medical settings around the globe. So how does a puppy become a therapy dog? It all begins with meeting the basic requirements of good manners and good health. A therapy dog must:

Be at least one year of age Be good around other dogs Listen to their handlers Allow strangers to touch them all over Not jump on people when interacting Walk on a leash without pulling Not mind strange noises or smells Be calm for petting Not be afraid of people walking unsteadily Be currant on all vaccines required by law Have a negative fecal test once a year Be clean and well groomed Pass multiple tests and evaluations "in the field" [supervised visits]

Many people confuse Therapy Dogs with Service Dogs. Service Dogs provide assistance to the differently-abled, such as alerting their human of an impending seizure, bringing or carrying objects for their partner, leading the blind, opening doors, etc.

Therapy dogs are family pets that are trained and registered or certified through therapy organizations, and are only half of the therapy team – the handler is the other half. Unlike service dogs, which are protected by the Americans with Disabilities Act, they are only allowed into institutions by invitation or prior approval.

Therapy dogs can be any size or breed; he/she must be easygoing, patient, and comfortable with strangers. Handlers keep an eye out for signs of stress – excessive panting, tucked-under tail, or erratic behavior – to make sure the dog is not overburdened by his work. The esteemed Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN has utilized therapy dogs since 2002, and has more than a dozen certified dogs as part of Mayo Clinic's Caring Canines program. In an August 25, 2012 article on the subject, they report, "It's [also] important to note that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has never received a report of infection from animal-assisted therapy. (www.mayoclinic.com/health/pet-therapy/MY02122). The dogs make regular visits to various hospital departments and even make special visits on request."

What is it about dogs that create such a powerful effect? No one can say for certain, but once again, dogs prove their worth as good and faithful servants, and beg the question, "Will we see our four footed friends in heaven?"
