- ◆ discussed a multi-year plan for re-leathering portions of the organ


## Parish Register

## Iron Chef Williamsport 2013 a great success!

The kitchen, the Fellowship Hall, and the hallways at St. Mark's were full of activity on Sunday March 17 as the 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Iron Chef Williamsport event was in full operation. More than 30 persons were involved as staff for the event and 108 persons were guests for the meal that was served in Fellowship Hall from the steam tables in Middle Lounge. The entertainment for the evening was a cooking contest that took place in our church kitchen. The challengers from Lycoming Center Presbyterian Church, led by Pr. Jerry Fourroux, tried valiantly, but did not overcome our home team of Pr. Elkin, Kathy Eshelman, and Todd Smith. The one-hour contest of cooking skill was projected to the large screen in Fellowship Hall and also made available online. The purpose of all of the exciting activity was to raise funds and friends for Family Promise of Lycoming County, our local affiliate for aiding homeless families. Through dinner guests and patrons of the event, we raised more than \$5,000 for the cause and raised the consciousness of many persons regarding the problem and how we can be of assistance. Mike Caschera returned as our master of ceremonies this year and we added a "roving reporter" (or rabble rouser) in the audience! Bernadette Jones was able to talk to and with guests by means of a second camera and special electronic switcher obtained with the aid of Keith Wood of Thrivent Financial for Lutherans.

What a staff we have! Our youth plus four from Lycoming Center were the servers for the meal, with Sara Jones as head waiter. They competed with each other in "Tips for A Promise" to raise additional funds for Family Promise from the guests at their assigned table. The winner this year was Josh from Lycoming Center, who received a special gift as thanks for his diligent work. Evan Barone collected the most of St. Mark's youth. All of the youth did very well throughout the evening.

Working right behind them was the kitchen cooking and plating staff, led by Bob Jones and Nicole Walz, respectively. Our guests enjoyed a wonderful meal of tomato bisque, sliced tenderloin of beef with Cabernet sauce, southern style green beans, and smashed sour cream & chive potatoes, with a chocolate indulgence for dessert. Lou DeSeau did a yeoman's job leading the set-up and clean-up for the event!

We received wonderful assistance from old friends, Carlos Saldivia and the crew at First Contact; Ed Ploy of PC Handyman; Williamsport Country Club's Nicole Walz, Logan Hinkley and Angela Hess; Peter Zerbe; M&T Bank; and Mike Caschera, who did a bang-up job of keeping everyone informed and entertained.

## Seeking the Peace of the City

We started our mission trip worshipping right here at St. Mark's with Pastor Elkin commissioning our team as short term missionaries in New York City. On Monday morning after getting up at 4:30, we were on our way to St. Paul's house, a soup kitchen in the heart of Times Square, where we led a worship service, served breakfast and cleaned up. We sang songs, and students read some scripture. It was a blessing to hear some of the guests singing along with us. For our worship, we focused on the following verses:

**Jeremiah 29:11** *For I know the plans I have for you, declares the LORD, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope.*

**Psalms 139:13-14** *For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well.*



Our talk was "You Matter to God", and no matter what situation you find yourself in, God is with you. He will never leave you because you matter to Him. We moved on to our next activity which was a prayer walk through the city. We started in Battery Park and learned of the history of New York, we prayed for our diverse cultures as we faced Ellis Island and the Statue of Liberty. We prayed in the financial district for our nation and condition of our economy. We prayed for the different neighborhoods, mainly Chinatown, Little Italy, and Harlem and for the diversity that exists in each. We prayed for peace in the city and in our nation.

We also participated in an urban plunge experience where we explored the neighborhood of Harlem. I have to say that I was pleasantly surprised. The media depicts Harlem as a dangerous, drug infested neighborhood, but I saw it as a clean, friendly environment where the residents are very proud of their culture, know each other, and feel safe. We were told that people either smiled, smirked, or grinned at you as you passed them. They said, "It was a lot more than they would have gotten from someone in midtown." They told us that Harlem was their home and they were very happy there.

After our plunge, we worked in the New York Common Pantry and served over 300 guests dinner. I think the hardest part of working in the pantry was serving families with small children. Homelessness hits families as well and that is something I really haven't thought about. By the end of the first day of serving, we were tired, but happy. Our faith was stretched, and we learned a lot about ourselves, about each other, and about the commitment it takes to serve unselfishly on a daily basis. I saw growth in the students that I hadn't seen before. Each of them had led a prayer for the group, and for some of them that was a huge step in their faith.

On Tuesday, we spent the morning helping the staff at a women's shelter, preparing their facility for a state inspection the following day. We inspected and changed mattresses, and cleaned and sanitized the rooms for their 150 guests. We met a resident named Barbara, who was very glad we had come to help clean her home. Her toothless smile warmed our hearts.

We ended our time of service in New York with a scripture reading of Jesus washing the disciples' feet. We then took turns washing each other's feet. It was a humbling experience for us and served as a reminder that our service didn't end when we got home. I hope it is just a beginning of the students' commitment to being Jesus' hands and feet wherever they go.

**Here are some of the thoughts that the students had about the mission trip:**

*This past week going to New York City and working with the homeless population was an amazing and eye opening experience. It was humbling to look at the city and its people through the eyes of our heavenly father and strive to treat everyone as if they were Jesus and to whole heartedly and selflessly serve. It can be difficult to step outside your comfort zone and live in community but it also brings you closer to God and each other when we are pushed to our limits and that's all we have to fall back on. I feel very blessed to have been able to serve in the city to spiritually grow and serve.* **Ali Dincher ~ senior**

Spending three days in New York taught me not to take what I have for granted, because thousands of homeless people would prefer just a small piece of my life. I learned that you shouldn't reject someone because they are different, for we are all children of God. In the end, I felt content and happy with what I did during the week. God always ensures his servants never work alone. You never know who God will throw in your way, but you must always be ready to open up when He does. **Colin Foreman ~ senior**

*I went on the mission trip to New York City with UCM. I had a lot of fun, but also learned a lot about the homeless population and about other cultures. It was a unique experience that not many people have the chance to do and I would recommend this trip to anyone. It was an eye opener to the world outside your own.* **Victoria Frick ~ junior**



In regard to this weekend full of faith, fellowship, and fun, Sara, Jerod, Christina, Grace, Ezra, Morgan, and Evan responded to the following questions (in no particular order):



***Describe one thing that you accomplished or learned, or that made an impact on you this weekend.***

- ◇ I learned that we are God's children and that he loves us no matter what other people say to us.
- ◇ I learned that we are all favorites of God: each of us is his.
- ◇ I learned some new verses. I learned more about God while having fun.
- ◇ Something that made an impact was listening to all the stories of all these people who struggled with so much in their life. But they found their way to God and He was there with them through it all. It made me realize how much he cared and that as long as we believe in Him, He would make sure we get through it all right.
- ◇ How everyone wasn't afraid to sing or dance



### The Scholarship Program:

The St. Paul Lutheran Church Scholarship Program was founded by the congregation of the former St. Paul Lutheran Church in Williamsport, Pennsylvania. St. Paul Lutheran Church, prior to its closing, established this special scholarship program to benefit Lutheran students in Lycoming County, Pennsylvania, in perpetuity.

### Eligibility:

Eligible candidates will be graduating seniors of a high school, or a high school graduate equivalent, located in Lycoming County, Pennsylvania. Candidates must be members of a Lutheran church, and eligible candidates also include those individuals who were members of St. Paul Lutheran Church in Williamsport, Pennsylvania, at the time of its closing. Candidates must be attending, or plan to attend in the 2013-2014 academic year, an institution of higher education (academic, technical, or vocational). Eligible candidates must also have a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale and demonstrate involvement in church and community. Candidates may reapply in successive years for scholarships available from this program.



### Scholarship Awards:

Scholarships awarded in 2013 will be available only for the 2013-2014 academic year. Scholarship awards may be used only for educational expenses, including tuition, books, laboratory expenses, or other education-related expenditures that are approved by the Foundation.

### Selection of Recipients:

The number of scholarships awarded, the amount of the scholarship awards, and the selection of scholarship recipients will be determined by the Foundation.

### Application Process and Deadline

Students who wish to apply to the scholarship program must complete an application and required letters of recommendation and submit materials **postmarked no later than April 15, 2013**, to:

## Catechetical Trip to Harrisburg

Earlier this year, due to circumstances beyond our control, St. Mark's trip coordinator (Bernadette) was unable to follow through (because of her busted arm) with the original plan to take the confirmation class to Johnstown. Pr, Elkin and Michele leaped valiantly into the gap and within a couple days put together a trip to Harrisburg to observe the art and architecture of various religious houses in that area. So, on Saturday, March 9, 2012, Evan, Ben, and Stefan, together with Pastor Elkin and Gary Weber, visited various churches, a cathedral and a synagogue. Here is a portion of what they had to say about their adventure:

**Evan Barone** writes: *I saw many unique churches while I was on the confirmation trip. One was St. Anne's church; it was amazing. There were tons of icons on the wall. Icons are considered windows to heaven. You could tell which person was Jesus, because there was IC and XC on him. Another way you could tell it was Jesus was because he wore blue and red. You could tell it was Mary because she had stars on her forehead and shoulders. There was incense to remind you of the prayers going up. There were doors to the apse and Mathew, Mark, Luke, and John were on the middle door. There were two deacon doors one on each side. The nave is considered a ship to heaven. It is heaven on earth.*

**Ben Haussmann** writes: *On our catechetical trip we studied architecture of different churches, and what the church is trying to show about about God - is He powerful, holy, peaceful, etc. The church I'm doing my report on is St. Patrick's Cathedral. This particular church is trying to show how powerful God is. For example, some of the organ pipes were trumpet enchamade which means that those organ pipes were horizontal like a trumpet. They were also as loud as a trumpet. The organ was on the balcony and all of its pipes were visible unlike St. Mark's organ pipes. The sound from the organ was very, very loud showing how powerful God can be. This church has stained glass almost everywhere you looked, and if you didn't see stained glass you would see something painted or stenciled on the wall. There were also symbols for prophets and symbols for God all over the place. The Romanesque style was found in the church as well. Romanesque means round arch. I learned a lot on this trip, but one thing that stuck out is that the Bishop's chair is called a cathedra. You know the Bishop's chair is the Bishop's chair by the coat of arms on it. This church was my favorite church out of every one we visited.*

**Stefan Weber** writes: *The church I am writing about is called St. Michael Lutheran Church. It was once a German church but, it changed a little bit ago. The only German thing they do now is on Christmas Eve they sing the first verse of Silent Night in German. They have two bibles that were donated to the church by two German pastors. The church had two big towers on each side of the front of the church. Unfortunately, part of the church's front caught fire and burned down. Their sanctuary was made of almost all marble. That describes the church, St. Michael.*


