# **CONSECRATION SUNDAY**

# We offer with joy and thanksgiving what you have first given us: signs of your precious love.

These, or similar, words are repeated each Sunday after the offering. We may just say them; we may think about what we are saying, or we may earnestly pray in thankfulness to our God for all that He has done for us.

It is time to put those words into our hearts and into action. Consecration Sunday is October 20 this year. We understand the concept that, from a biblical perspective, financial stewardship is not money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, we know that financial contributions are a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes. Since this goes against our natural tendencies to want to regard everything as our own possessions, we must continue to think about this and make it a part of our life a bit at a time. Consecration Sunday is a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving. Again, we are responding with joy and thanksgiving.

Every attendee and member, who completes an Estimate of Giving Card, does so voluntarily while attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday, October 20. We urge everyone to attend, even those who are hesitant to complete a card, because the procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend worship on Consecration Sunday, October 20. In the coming weeks, please think prayerfully about the blessings God has given to you, and about how you are called to share those blessings.

The other part of the event is the celebration meal that follows each worship service on October 20. At services on October 6 and 13 we'll be asking for your reservation for the breakfast following the 8:30 service or the lunch following the 10:30 service on Consecration Sunday. It is important that every member take part.

Our friend Pastor W. Stevens Shipman will again speak to us on how Stewardship (our works and efforts) coincides with what we do after we say "We believe...". Stewardship is, indeed, our faith in action. Let us be thankful for all of our blessings..

Last year's CROP Walk brought over thirty churches, synagogues, and organizations together for this worthy cause. Thank you for doing your part in fighting hunger both locally and globally. 25% of the money we collect comes back to our community and is distributed equally to the American Rescue Workers Food Pantry, the Salvation Army Food Pantry, the United Churches Food Pantry and St. Anthony's Center. The other 75% is distributed by Church World Service nationally and internationally to help peo-

ple who are hungry. We have taken a local allocation for the past 14 years, which has brought a total of \$61,861.80 back into our community. Other walks in our county have added to this total!

# John Bower Basketball League



#### The Adventures of Donna in France, Part 3

Donna Zierdt Elkin was in Bron, France in May and June caring for grandson Eliot while daughter Katy and son in law Esteban were in rehearsals for the baroque opera Don Quixote. The June and August issues of the Lion carried her initial reports, and her adventures now conclude:

The Fanfare was an important part of the evening for me. It is here that I was honored to participate in the production. Last winter I transcribed much of the early manuscript into modern notation in the computer for Katy to arrange. I was then also asked to arrange and perform in the Fanfare. I will always be grateful to Le Tendre Amour for this opportunity. The cast could not have been more welcoming and kind. This was the kind of experience I will never forget.

The fanfare above the entrance to Fort Bron bids the people to come inside for the evening's activities. Katy and I arranged a melody from the opera to make a short fanfare that could be performed by the entire cast. I borrowed a flugelhorn that rode in my suitcase to France. Ironically, it was made in Switzerland, which is where my plane landed in May. Katy used an alto sackbut, a Renaissance trombone, but which is a tricky horn to play. Most people don't know that my accomplished oboist daughter started her instrumental career on trombone before moving to oboe. She bought this sackbut just for this production.

After donning my costume, I climbed the hill before the others. That gave me extra time to climb slowly. I was using my husband's metal walking sticks with sharp tips to grab the ground. I needed them for the steeper parts of the climb. Most of the actors and musicians were very young and athletic. There was only one other person who needed a stick to safely negotiate the climb.

When I was at the top, I waited behind some bushes so that the audience, waiting on the bridge, can't see me. I can hear a rumpus below as a bear is chased through the crowd in a crazy start to the evening. This bear would make appearances here and there all evening, even showing up on the opera stage. I wished I could see the chase.

By now, the rest of the cast had arrived and was waiting to go with me past the bushes and into the open area above the bridge. First on are the Duke and Duchess. They waved to the crowd in a royal manner. The Duke had a long, curly wig. Think of Handel's wig, but in brown. The Duchess was carrying a parasol. They looked like they are out for a royal stroll. Next all the cast, in costume, joined them in a long line stretching across the entire front. Luckily, the drummer, Katy, and I marched up the hill a bit to stand behind the cast. I'm glad of that, because I was more than a little frightened to stand at the edge of the wall where the others are. It is quite high and there is no railing on the fort. The drummer played an authentic looking field drum, with skin head and rope tuning. He tuned it to the tonic of the key the brass use, and needed to make constant adjustments to keep it there. He did it quietly and with great speed so the audience never heard that happening. He, like many others here, are amazing musicians. I know he had 6 instruments with him, and played even more in the opera, including soprano bassoon, recorder and some stringed instrument.

We played the fanfare twice, with the cast tootling along on copper colored megaphones. One of the actors introduced the evening with a short speech. Of course, I have little idea of what he is saying, since it is in French. But the drummer, a Brazilian, who speaks French as well as his native Portuguese, understood and knew when to start the drum roll for the last playing of the fanfare. After which we do a precision turn and marched off in step. After getting to the bushes, I grabbed my walking sticks and wait to go last, carefully and slowly, down the hill.

Twice I was able to attend the opera production which ended the evening. I sat front row center both times, always, it seemed, surrounded by audience who only spoke French. I spent the evening in awe and laughter, even without knowing the language. I did read the libretto a few time before attending. The story takes place later in Don Quixotte's adventures, when he meets a duchess who is determined to lure him out of his code of chivalry. She does not succeed, and, through many adventures and temptations, Don Quixotte never strays from the knight's code of honor.

The stage action, utilizing the Schwarstein actors and circus performers along with the musicians of Le Tendre Amour, was full of surprises. Katy has sent us a DVD of the opera, and in viewing it I have noticed things I missed on those evenings in the live performances. It is impossible to describe it all. Heavenly music, interesting instruments, acrobatics, slapstick, crazy scenery, a giant, a dragon, and the famous bear all make their appearances. The DVD was recorded by Athos Productions and I will show that to anyone interested. Although all in French, I will do a running commentary and translation with my libretto in hand.

#### The Adventures of Donna in France, Part 3, Continued

This is Baroque Opera at its most interesting. Don't be frightened by the word "opera." The over 16,000 people attending the production this summer were very happy with what they saw. Le Tendre Amour has brought Baroque opera to a new audience!

Pastor Elkin joined Donna in France for a short time, and had an additional set of adventures which he will be glad to relate upon request. Among them is the trip home:

Allow plenty of extra time, because one never knows what will happen. And even then, there can be problems to conquer. To start our trip home, we arrived early at the train station, but ours and only ours out of the dozens of trains that morning, was LATE. Lots. And then it stopped one station short of Geneva and everyone got off. We were mystified by this, but tagged along and discovered that we needed to go to the far end of the platform and join another train for the final part of the trip. I got there, with the luggage, and Donna got as far as the doorway when the door started to shut. We pulled her aboard as the train started off. Five of us never did get a seat but stood with our luggage on the train doorway until we got to the airport. The only good thing was that with Donna's foot problem we were able to skip the main security line and a cart whisked us around the outside of the airport and we got on the plane ahead of some other folks. Whew! Then in D.C. our plane was delayed 5 hours because of weather. Watching the lightning in the distance was exciting as we landed in Philadelphia. But at length, we were safely home.


