Pastor Elected

Pastor Elkin was elected to serve a second threeyear term as Dean of the Susquehanna Chapter of the Society of the Holy Trinity, at the chapter's Advent retreat on December 7



The Susquehanna Chapter has about 30 members who live throughout central PA. The Chapter meets in local retreats three times each year, and then joins with 20

other chapters in the national retreat in Mundelein IL each September. The responsibilities of the Dean are to arrange and plan the program and facilities for the retreats, preach and preside at the

communion service at each retreat, and meet in late January with all the Deans and officers of the Society to guide its work.

The election to the office of Dean is by pure ecclesiastical ballot. This means that there are no nominations, no campaigning, no speeches. The chapter hears scripture, prays, sings a hymn, and then holds a ballot. This procedure is repeated until there is a unanimous result. In this election there were five ballots.

We congratulate Pastor Elkin on this honor.
