Busy Days at Synod

The 29th annual Assembly of the Upper Susquehanna Synod took place at Susquehanna University, Selinsgrove, on June 18-19, 2016. The major business of the Assembly was the election of the third bishop of the Synod.

The process of election has five ballots. The first is a nominating ballot, which resulted in a long list of persons, many with only a few votes. Many of those petitioned to remove their names from the second ballot. The top seven persons went on to the third ballot, and the top three of that group went on to the fourth ballot. At that point the top two persons were exactly tied, and so the fifth and final ballot was left to the twenty persons who had voted for the third candidate to decide which of the two for whom they were going to vote! The result remained very close; if a half-dozen persons had voted differently, that would have been enough to change the outcome! But as it happened, Pastor BJ Collins, who currently serves as the assistant to Bishop Driesen, was elected. Her six-year term begins in September. [Perhaps some will

remember that Bishop Driesen was elected by a one-vote margin in his first election.]

The other usual business of the synod was also handled: there were two ordinations, pastors who had died were remembered, 25 to 55 year anniversaries of service of pastors were celebrated, a budget was adopted, reports from all of the synod-related entities were received, Holy Communion was celebrated, and more.

Pastor Elkin attended, together with Gary Weber and Ray Huff as the representatives of the congregation. They chatted with and sat with the representatives from Redeemer Church during one of the plenary sessions. Anyone who would like to look at the Bulletin of Reports to the Assembly can inquire at the Church Office, and the materials will be gladly supplied.

Items needed for these kits are also listed on handout sheets in the Narthex.

Soap bars (in the original wrappings) can also be donated.

All kits and soap bars are due by September 15th.

Give to others what God has given to you.



School Kit

4 - 70-sheet notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper approximately 8" X 101/2" (no loose-leaf paper)

1 - 30-centimeter ruler, or with centimeters and inches

1 pencil sharpener

1 blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well) 5 unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band

5 black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink); secure together with a rubber band

1 box of 16 or 24 crayons

1 21/2" eraser

1 sturdy drawstring backpack-style cloth bag approximately 14" X 17" with shoulder straps (no standard backpacks)

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new & in good condition. Remove any excess packaging, pack all items in bag and close.



Personal Care Kit

1 light-weight bath-size towel (max. 52" X 27"), dark color

2 bath-size bars (4 to 5 oz.) of soap, any brand, wrapped

- 1 adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging
- 1 sturdy comb, remove packaging
- 1 metal nail clippers remove packaging

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new and in good condition. Wrap all the items in the towel and tie securely with ribbons or yarn.

Fabric Kit

2 pieces of cotton or cotton-blend fabric (no knits or 100% polyester). Each piece should match one of the sizes below:

 $\circ 2\frac{1}{4}$ vards of 60" wide fabric, or •3 yards of 44" wide fabric, or

- •4 yards of 36" wide fabric
- 2 spools of neutral-colored all purpose thread, 250-300 yards

Fabric should have no stains or holes. Pieces do not need to match in size or color/pattern. Fold thread and one piece of fabric inside second fabric piece and tie with yarn, sturdy string, ribbon or a strip of fabric.

Layette Kit

2 lightweight cotton t-shirts 2 long- or short-sleeved gowns or



sleepers (without feet)

2 receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, up to 52" square 4 cloth diapers, flat fold preferred

1 jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby

cap 2 pairs of socks

2 bars of gentle soap (4-5 oz bars)

1 hand towel, dark color wrapped

2 diaper pins or large safety pins

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. Gently used, clean items (no stains or tears) or new. Wrap items in one of the receiving blankets and secure with diaper pins.



A Very Different Ordination



On Saturday, June 18, Pastor Elkin was invited to attend the ordination of a long-time friend, Pr. David Smith, as an Orthodox priest. The service took place in the new little chapel that the mission congre-

gation has built in Beavertown, west of Selinsgrove. The chapel would fit inside our chancel with room to spare, but it was crowded with more than 60 persons who stood for the entire 2 ½ hour service. [There are seldom pews in an Orthodox church.] Their Bishop came from Pittsburgh for the service, and he was assisted by two deacons from State College and three priests, including Fr. Kovolak of Williamsport, and 5 servers. There are no organs in Orthodox churches, but a choir from the parish in State College led much singing. There is nothing trendy about their worship; the service has stayed basically the same (except for being in English rather than Greek) since the 4th century.

It is our custom in worship to try to say something once and say it well; the Orthodox feel much less time-pressured than we do, and may say or sing something multiple times. For example, Pr. Elkin reports that there were at least five different Litanies (responsive prayers) in the course of the service, whereas we western Christians think that one Litany in a service is sufficient.

After being out of touch for a while, Pr. Elkin looks forward to being in contact with Fr. Smith, and hopes to explore the reasons for some of the very different worship customs in which he now participates.

Meanwhile, Down the Street...

As part of his service as Interim Pastor at Redeemer er Church on Washington Blvd., Pr. Elkin is leading worship at Redeemer for 10 Sundays this summer. After the service at St. Mark's is concluded, he jumps in the car and is off to Redeemer. This gives them some continuity during these summer months; in the fall they will return to using a variety of Authorized Lay Worship leaders on most Sundays.

Pastor Elkin hosted a dinner at St. Mark's for the Councils of both St. Mark's and Redeemer on June 2.

It was an opportunity for the members to meet each other and get acquainted. It was facilitated by the St. Mark's members moving to a different table for each course of the meal so as to be able to greet everyone



present. Thanks to Bernadette Jones who assisted Pastor as chef, Donna Zierdt Elkin and Sara Jones who helped to serve the meal, and Lou DeSeau who helped to clean up.

Survey says....



Most of the time, surveys are depressing. They tend to show that our teaching of the faith and learning about it are not working very well. In case a reader does not think that this is the case, here are a few of the results of a survey that was done in 1998 dealing with Lutheran congregations. If it were repeated today, the results would most likely be considerably worse.

- 67% of the people agreed that "most religions lead to the same God." Christians should acknowledge that the God of Abraham, the one who raised Jesus

from the dead, is the true God.

— 60% of respondents agreed that "The main purpose of the Gospel is God's right rules for living." Luther would be disheartened that we get this wrong; the Law presents rules for living while the Gospel is God's forgiveness when we make a mess of things.

— 56% of the people agreed that "God is satisfied if the person lives the best life one can." No, the Lord
 God is "satisfied" with nothing less than perfection; otherwise, Jesus' death and resurrection are robbed of their meaning.

— Only 56% agreed that "Property belongs to God, and we hold it in trust from him." Do the rest think that there could be some ultimate source and owner other than the Lord God Almighty?

— 48% of respondents agreed that "People can be justified before God by loving others." They miss the main point of Luther's reformation, that we are justified or made right with God by a free gift of God, not by what we do or fail to do.

Do we need to spend time teaching and learning the basics these days? Yes, very much so!
