


Doesn't the new year when school returns? Not in the middle of

This is our 40th year of walking in Lycoming County to help end hunger!

These walks all happen rain or shine. The reason being that we walk in solidarity with those who have to walk for their food and water ... rain or shine! Our world is filled with people in need. Disasters seem to be everywhere - Rain - Hurricanes -Floods - Fires! One minute people are OK and then they are in extreme need.

Our goals this year include 200 walkers and \$15,000 in money raised. Please know that every dollar makes a difference. 25% of the funds we raise support local hunger agencies. This year the agencies we have chosen to receive these funds are the Son Light House Food Pantry, Muncy; The New Love Center, Jersey Shore; Sojourner Truth Ministry, Williamsport; and the United Churches Food Pantry, Williamsport.
