A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

The Reverend Kenneth R. Elkin

"I am the vine, you are the branches," Jesus reminds us in the Gospel of John. We're stretching that a bit with our illustration this year with not just a vine but a tree...and not just any tree, but a dogwood tree. Its leaves have their life because they are connected to the tree, and by their work they support the work of the tree. They support the growth of new branches and leaves and the production of the unique flowers of the dogwood. These flowers have long been regarded as reminders of the crucifixion of Christ Jesus, since they have two long petals and two shorter petals, "nail" marks at the ends of the petals, and darkened edges or splotches like dried blood. We might think of the faith of St. Paul: "I preach only Christ and him crucified" as the commission for our lives as well. How is it that we as the people of God in St. Mark's are growing and flowering? How are the leaves of our lives contributing to the tree of the church of Jesus Christ which is our life together? How are we showing the world the beauty of the new life in Christ Jesus made possible by his death and resurrection? How is that vision of the final future shaping our decisions and actions in these turbulent days? We Christians should be directed by the future of that resurrection, not just by the past!

Therefore, we're hoping in this annual report to make it more than merely a listing of last year's events, but also to have in these pages some "new shoots", some fresh ideas to test, as well as recycling ideas from earlier days. There is an old saying that wherever God builds a church, Satan builds a chapel right next door. So to use our natural image today: wherever the tree of the church is

growing, a poison ivy vine is sprouting right alongside and threatening to choke it! We have both growing and weeding to do, with the Word of God as both the hoe and the fertilizer.

The following numbered points are a roughly chronological summary of some of the events during the past twelve months. For those places where you would like to hear more detail, the curious are warmly invited to ask.

- 1. Two days following our last annual assembly, the Pastor left for Spain, a direct flight to Barcelona, a fast train for Pomplona, and shortly afterward he set out on the pilgrimage route, the Camino Santiago de Compostella. Walking is a very individual thing, but acquaintances are made at the stopping points. This particular loose group was made of up persons from Holland. Belgium, Korea, Italy, Spain, Australia, Canada, US, and more. Some walk utterly alone, while others tend to walk in pairs, at least part of the time. Pastor paired up with a journalist 25 years younger. Pastor's goal was to reach Burgos, but that was one day's walk too far, so he got a local bus and went there in order to see the great cathedral and environs. Total amount walked was just over 100 miles. Then the fast train took him back to Barcelona in about 6 hours.
- 2. Participated in the parish picnic on June 3.
- 3. Officiated at funeral or memorial services for eleven members and nine non-members during the period May 2012—April 2013.
- 4. Led the meeting of the parish staff almost every Wednesday throughout the year.
- 5. Had wedding planning sessions for several couples in advance of their wedding services.
- 6. Officiated at five weddings.
- 7. Led one of the shops each night in Vacation Bible School.
- 8. Filmed 35 short subjects about the Camino Santiago.
- 9. Participated in regular monthly sessions of Stephen Ministry;
- 10. Attended Council meetings and committee meetings throughout the year.
- 11. Led catechetical make-up sessions.
- 12. Served as an overnight host for Family Promise here at St. Mark's.
- 13. Hosted a luncheon for those faithful workers who have helped to fold and collate the Lion for a number of years.

- 14. Assisted the Property Committee in dealing with a number of contractors for the various projects around the property this year, including the drainage problems in the courtyard, the organ repairs, the sound system, electronic adjustments, tower and spire repair, and nave lighting.
- 15. 9/10 led the session for Penn College students "Where in the world is Camino Santiago?"
- 16. 9/24 9/28 trip to Mundelein, IL for the annual gathering of the Society of the Holy Trinity; five pastors drove together to minimize costs, 200 were in attendance, 15 new members were received including Pr. Letscher of Montoursville, and Pr. Hathaway who was pastor of the congregation that Pr. Elkin served as organist while in graduate school at Wittenberg University in Ohio in 1971, a hymnfestival was enjoyed at a local church, the Senior of the Society, Dr. Frank Senn, was elected to a three-year term. The preaching, prayers, singing, conversations, presentations,all excellent.
- 17. School of Religion in October: Led sessions on Genesis with 11 participants.
- 18. 10/5 stayed overnight as hosts with Pr. Spearly at Trinity U.M. Pennsdale for Family Promise.
- 19. 10/7 welcomed retired missionary Bette McCrandall to St. Marks
- 20. Prayed at Life Chain
- 21. Bible studies continue most Wednesdays at 11:45, working on Psalms.
- 22. The 6:31A.M. Bible study continues, working on Genesis.
- 23. various Milestone ministry events during the year, such as 11/04 New Driver milestone, with Riley Weber, 11/25 celebrated First Communion for 4 youth and they also received Bibles
- 24. 11/04 assisted with Pack and Wrap, with the shoe-boxes for needy kids, worldwide.
- 25. 11/28 gave a presentation on Camino Santiago for the Ecumenical Luncheon at Pine Street
- 26. 11/30 and 12/1 participated in the performances of "A Christmas Carol" raising funds for UCM.
- 27. 12/3 and 12/4 to Danville and served as Chaplain for the Susquehanna Chapter of the Society of the Holy Trinity meeting, preparing and leading 5 worship services; also, was elected by unanimous ecclesiastical ballot to serve as the Dean of the chapter for a three-year term, beginning immediately.
- 28. 12/4 drove our group to Selinsgrove for the

- annual Christmas party for the 19 residents of CM-6
- 29. 12/9 organized and led the three groups of carolers who delivered cookies and sang with shut-ins around the parish in the afternoon.
- 30. 1/5 led one of the sessions at the 15th annual catechetical day-retreat for four of the LSM congregations held this year here at St. Mark's, with 43 persons participating. My session was on icons, and each participant decoupaged a small icon to take home. We also went on a brief "field trip" to Holy Cross Church and spoke with Fr. Kovalak there.
- 31. 1/12 attended the Authorized Lay Worship leader initial session as mentor for our four candidates
- 32. 1.25 met with representative concerning pictorial directory
- 33. 1.28 departed for the Society of the Holy
 Trinity leadership retreat at an Anglican retreat
 center near Charleston S.C. 24 persons were in
 attendance from across the country, the deans of
 all the chapters and the senior of the society.
 The hours were prayed, plans were made for the
 year, there was time for quiet, and also time for
 conversation.
- 34. 2.10 participated in Hobby Day displaying and conversations.
- 35. 2.10 attended the gathering of Council members with Bp. Driesen at Brick Church
- 36. 2.18 led the day-retreat for the Society of the Holy Trinity at Trinity Church, McClure: preaching and presiding at Eucharist, chairing the meeting, and hosting the speaker.
- 37. Regular Lenten series was held: Mid-day Prayers, Evening Prayer, with meals and fellowship, scripture focus this year on Luke 15
- 38. 20 Sessions of *The Way* were held through the year, concluding on April 21.
- 39. Spoke on WRAK with Ken Sawyer and on KISS-FM with Gary Chrisman about Iron Chef and Family Promise
- 40. 3/9 Guided three catechetical students and parent on foray to Harrisburg to explore church art and architecture and how it influences the life of the parishes.
- 41. 3/17 Iron Chef competition with Lycoming Centre Presbyterian Church, full house of diners
- 42. Led our full Holy Week schedule:
 - 3/27-Seder meal with more than 60 participating
 - 3/28-Holy Communion in the chapel at noon

and in the nave at 7 PM

3/29-Good Friday Community service in the nave at noon

Tenebrae service in the nave at 7 PM 3/30-decorating the nave, egg hunt and children's breakfast.

-Great Vigil of Easter 8 PM

3/31-Easter Day services

43. Presided at two Holy Communion liturgies each Sunday, led Morning Prayer most weekday mornings throughout the year, led Evening Prayer and Mid-day Prayer during Lent, encouraged the Council members to lead Prayer at the Close of the Day at Council meetings.

Additional items beyond the congregation:


- 44. Met with the CROP walk planning committee, looking toward the event held on October 14, which began in our south parking lot.
- 45. The Hometown Heroes event was held on July 14 at 11:00 A.M. on the Mulberry civic green.
- 46. Synod Assembly was held in June, with pastor and delegates attending.
- 47. Hosted the gathering of Lutheran Shared Ministry at St. Mark's several times during the year.
- 48. City pastors meet for breakfast at St. Mark's monthly.
- 49. Pastor meets with other ministerial colleagues occasionally.
- 50. Served as vacation substitute for the Shepherd of the Streets at several times during the year.
- 51. Served as volunteer observer for food safety at swim meet in order to meet city health regulations.
- These and many other activities, conversations, discussions, telephone consultations, visits, and other events were done in an average of 260 hours or more each month in ministry responsibilities.

Looking ahead:

- 1. It is time to start a new series of the Divine Drama Bible Study for the many persons in the congregation who have never thought through the basic course.
- 2. It is also time to offer a second course for those who have had Divine Drama and would like to delve deeper into God's Word. This is the source of guidance for all that we say and do.
- 3. It is time to resume videotaping of Biblical study topics to go online.
- 4. It is time that every person who wishes to be known as a member of St. Mark's will desire to

- be together in worship somewhere in the body of Christ every Sunday unless impeded by grave illness.
- 5. It is time to begin a new Stephen Ministry training group.
- 6. It is time that members will recognize their responsibility to share with family, friends and neighbors the joy they feel in connection with the Lord Jesus, and invite them to worship, study and serve with us.
- 7. It is time for additional persons to be identified for participation in *The Way* for the new season.
- 8. It is time for conversations to begin with neighboring congregations about the shape of ministry in our area in the years to come.
- 9. It is time to share the joy and the information gleaned from foreign travel with the congregation and others who might be curious or interested.
- 10. It is time to recognize and celebrate the good things that our members are already doing, and encourage their expansion in the name of the Lord Jesus.

WORSHIP AND MUSIC

The purpose of the Worship and Music Committee is to proclaim Jesus Christ to each other and to all the world by Word and Sacrament in and beyond the congregation. To this end the Committee shall see that the worship of God is conducted in good order in accordance with the Bible and the Lutheran tradition.

The Worship and Music committee, in an oversight capacity, continued to be very busy again

this year within the congregation, as well as in the community. Some of our oversight responsibilities include: Acolytes, Altar Guild, Assisting Ministers, Children's Church, Columbarium, Communion, Greeters, Lectors, Nursery, and Ushers.

We are blessed and were very pleased to have Jungwha Kim as our Music Director. Jungwha was a student at the renowned Juilliard School of Music, and she continues to dazzle the congregation with her skill and perfection with our organ. In addition, she continues to receive accolades with her intricate music selections and training of her musicians. She has proved to be a wonderful choir director; bringing out the best in the St. Mark's choir. It seems as if she is intent upon us raising increasingly creative and wonderful music to heaven.

The Altar Guild was extremely active again this year with their rigorous scheduled activities to keep the church supplies and articles in proper order. Additional communion assistants, lectors, greeters, acolytes, and assisting ministers were introduced this year. These volunteer positions offer continued service opportunity for our congregation, and provide much needed help to enable the church to function in good order. More opportunities continue to exist for assistance in several areas.

Non-perishable food, flowers, quilts, clothing, and financial contributions were disseminated to support various community, and global efforts. Outreach programs helped in our community by providing home communion for those people unable to attend regular church services; caroling was also available for the disabled at Selinsgrove Center, and parishioners in our community.

Children's church continues to be held in the Chapel regularly, with very good attendance. Child-sized chairs are there for our very young children church attendees. Due to soaring heating costs, the chapel was utilized more for weekday and evening Lenten services and helped to defray some of our fuel expense. Unfortunately this year, we were unable to staff the Nursery as we have in the past years. Family members may still feel free to stay and utilize it, though.


Grateful acknowledgement must be made for the exceptionally diligent service of our committee membership, the talented choral, solo, and instrumental music and musicians. Without the assistance, leadership and contributions of all of them, our services and praise to the Lord would not be as fulfilling. The committee would also like to express appreciation and thankfulness to Pastor Elkin and Jungwha Kim – their leadership in both areas of worship and music is truly inspirational.

The maintenance of the church organ continues to grow, with age. This year we have experienced deterioration of the leathers in many of the organ chests. This will become a multi-year task to correct, at a rather large cost. We anticipate that this will necessitate not only utilizing organ-specific donated monies, but additional envelope offerings, and a new budget line item developed for this procedure, as it will become an ongoing maintenance concern.

Other challenges for the upcoming year mainly are focused in the areas of volunteerism, meeting parishioners' needs, and increasing congregational membership. It may not be obvious to most people that it truly takes a host of people to keep the church, music, and worship services ministering properly, regularly. This is most evident during the Christmas season and Holy Week, but this need continues every day of the year. There continues to exist numerous opportunities for volunteer ministry here at Saint Marks.

We all have gifts that were bestowed upon us. Please feel free to contact any Worship and Music Committee member, to see if we can help you share your gifts with many, for a most worthy cause – to proclaim Jesus Christ to all, through his Word and Sacrament at St. Mark's Lutheran Church.

However it was not easy year due to losing few ringers out of adult bell choir. Nevertheless St. Mark's is filled with volunteer musicians that I can call substitutes upon their schedules.

Planned budget is required to provide forthcoming repair (leathering pipes) next year.

- ↑ to assist with youth coordinator for VBS, Music Camp, Christmas Pageant, and any possible activities
- ♪ to encourage youth musicians
- ↑ to provide opportunities to guest musicians or groups to enhance our worship and music ministry
- ♪ to recruit and expand our musical groups
- ↑ to find local musicians for July 4th celebration to make a more successful local program

The purpose of the ministry of these Coordinators is to proclaim Jesus Christ to each other and to the entire world by planning and administering the total educational program of the parish, as well as its youth and family ministry program. To this end, the Youth and Family Ministry Coordinators supervise educational opportunities, celebrations and fellowship activities for all youth and adults, in and beyond the congregation, in the Christian faith as found in the Bible and the Lutheran tradition.

Sunday Church School:

- 1. For curriculum, we continue with Augsburg's SPARKS program which is lectionary based. The materials are very "user friendly" and reinforce each Sunday's lesson with the children.
- 2. Our youth were divided into the following configuration based on numbers, age, and/or grade level: preschool (3-4 year olds—2; grades 3—4; and grade 5.
- 3. Our middle school class of 6-8 graders continues with the *To Know, to Live, to Grow* program by Augsburg Fortress.
- 4. The confirmation class includes nine members who meet on the third Sunday of every month with their families, mentors, Pastor and Bernadette. They all have been involved in a variety of service projects.
- 5. Lou DeSeau and Bob Jones continue teaching the high school class. The curriculum revolves around topics of concern with the students and revisits prayer and parts of the service. The class is consistently attended by 6-8 youth.
- 6. The monthly rotation schedule for teachers continues to be successful, although volunteers are sparse.
- 7. Pastor Elkin led the adult class in the Crossways room.

- 8. The Middle Lounge Class for adults was led by Kathy Dancho on a variety of subjects.
- 9. Vacation Bible School, Group's *Babylon*, was held in June, 2012. Roughly three dozen children attended, with 14 teen assistants and 17 adults in teaching/support positions.
- 10. Adult forums were presented in the Crossways Room each Sunday through the summer.
- 11. We hosted Lutheran Shared Ministry's School of Religion in October.
- 12. We organized and hosted the Fifteenth Annual Youth Retreat for confirmands in January.
- 13. The Way, a process of faith formation, under the leadership of Pastor Elkin and Melvin Wentzel continued. Three candidates affirmed their baptism and became members of St. Mark's on the Great Easter Vigil, March 30, 2013.
- 14. Children's Church continued on a once a month schedule during the school year. In April, it was planned and led by the confirmands.
- 15. A joint celebration for all Sunday Church School attendees was held in Fellowship Hall during the Sunday Church School hour at Easter.

Youth and Family Ministry Activities:

- 1. Passing on Faith remains a keystone of our family ministry at St. Mark's. Milestones celebrated this year: Receiving blankets for newborns; First Communion; Baptismal Lunch with faith chests for recently baptized; Prayer Pillows were given to children ages 2-4; children in kindergarten and 1st grade received "All the Languages of the Good News" bags; third graders received Holy Communion and their Bibles; The Blessing of the Keys was offered to those youth who became new drivers; "Progressions," the milestone for those young adults leaving for college, the military or business and their parents was celebrated; The Wedding Anniversary Milestone was observed for those couples married for 50+ years; 70+, Single, and Still Praising God has become an annual event honoring our senior parishioners.
- 2. The youth of St. Mark's provided the entertainment pre-show for the LSM's production of "A Christmas Carol" and for their own fundraising dinner in January.
- 3. The Annual Church Picnic was held at Montoursville's Indian Park.
- 4. A dinner/pool party was held for first and second year confirmands, their families and mentors in July.

- 5. A second annual Tweens' Day was held, during which several of our youth went to a member's home to do yard work for them when they could not. They were led by Pr. Elkin and Lou DeSeau.
- 6. Four of our youth were confirmed on the first day of Sunday School, 2012. A reception for the families was held afterward.
- 7. A Prayer Team for the benefit of our children and youth is held the 3rd Sunday of each month at noon. This was developed and led by the Comini's.
- 8. Teen Movie Night continues for our youth on the fourth Sunday of every month. There is a consistent attendance on these evenings.
- 9. A group pack'n'wrap for Operation Christmas Child was held in November. Participants packed 65 shoe boxes with small gifts for needy children around the world. Enough money was donated to cover the \$7/box shipping.
- 10. Family Advent Wreath Making & Luncheon was attended by over two dozen people on the first Sunday of Advent.
- 11. Kids' Night Out was a huge success. Over a dozen of our youth assisted.
- 12. The 12 participants attending the Christmas Cookie-Baking event produced the cookies sent for our shut-ins.
- 13. Christmas Caroling was conducted by 17 carolers, visiting almost all of our shut-ins who were at home.
- 14. Over 150 pieces of winter warmers, scarves, hats, and gloves were collected for those in need. 15 teddy bears were collected and given to local shelters.
- 15. Bread-baking this year was led by Pr. Elkin and Bernadette: our kitchen was once again filled with laughter and the wonderful smell of baking bread.
- 16. Ed Gair continues crafting our Faith Chests for the Baptism Milestone; John & Ruth Burkholder continue with ornaments and keepsakes for various milestones. Bernadette wood burns details on some and creates others.
- 17. We trained seven new acolytes in January.
- 18. We sent seven of our youth to the Youth Quake/Zone event in Pittsburgh over the last weekend in January. They all wrote comments and expressed thanks which were included in the April *Lion*. Bernadette, Bob, and Eric accompanied them.
- 19. The John Bower Sunday Church School Basketball League for our youth began in December

and continued on through February of 2013. Our youth created two teams. Coach Rick Robertson headed the teams with Mike Jensen and Kirk Owen assisting him. Devin participated in his age group with another church.

- 20. 38 cans of soup and \$162 were collected for "Souper Bowl Sunday," held in February.
- 21. Bernadette severely broke her arm; Michele and Pr. Elkin picked up the slack for several weeks.
- 22. A family bowling party was held February 23; 20+ attended. The end-of-season basketball party was held in conjunction with this event.
- 23. This year's Catechetical Trip was to Harrisburg, exploring the art and architecture of various houses of worship.
- 24. Michele made available Lenten childcare.
- 25. The egg-dying session for adults and older youth; was cancelled for this year.
- 26. The Annual Easter Egg Hunt and breakfast with Pastor Elkin was held on Saturday, March 30, 2013: well over 60 were served. The children bagged jelly beans and included a card with a special prayer to hand out to the congregation on Easter Sunday. The eleven youth who assisted were especially helpful.
- 27. The St. Mark's Old Fashion Church Family picnic is scheduled for Sunday, June 2, 2013.
- 28. Bernadette and Michele continue to plan the women's dinner.
- 29. Summer Choir Camp will be held in July. The program is yet to be decided.
- 30. Nick Buckman continues to schedule acolyte volunteers.
- 31. Family hand bell choir continues under the direction of Jungwha Kim.


Outreach/Continuing Education:

- 1. Flyers for Holy Week services and others for St. Mark's were designed and distributed to the downtown hotels and visitors center.
- 2. Bernadette attended Little Lambs Open House with flyers about St. Mark's and Sunday School.
- 3. We, again, conducted and hosted the LSM production of *A Christmas Carol* dinner theatre benefitting UCM. Over \$1200 was raised.
- 4. The youth of St. Mark's held a fundraising dinner in January. Part of the proceeds went toward their January trip; the balance is being used for the *Project Heifer* charity.
- 5. Bernadette went to jail for the Muscular Dystrophy Association in February and raised over \$1500 for that charity.

- 6. Our involvement with United Campus Ministry continues.
- 7. Iron Chef Williamsport, our fundraiser for Family Promise of Lycoming County, raised over \$4500 this year. Our youth servers contributed over \$400 from their Tips for a Promise.
- 8. Bernadette is active with Lutheran Shared Ministry.
- 9. Gary Weber has been instrumental in getting Youth and Family information on St. Mark's website. To that end, we have provided him with text and photographs of our events.
- 10. Assistance continues for the YouTube videos

The St. Mark's archives has completed its move to a dedicated Archives room located across from the choir room. For the first time in recent history, all of the physical records have been placed in a single area, appropriate for storage and access of these important records...

There is, of course, a digital storage facility that is equality important for preserving the history of the Church. The stmarkswilliamsport.org Website continues to grow and to provide current news about St. Mark's events and the activities of church members. The site also provides public access to many of the archival materials such as photographs, sermons and other memorabilia. Most significantly, the records, articles and materials that are preserved digitally will always be available, so that the digital collection will continue to grow and be available online.

The process of upgrading the Website, that was begun last year, has been completed. The more


than 2200 pages and 4500 photographs and images that comprise the St. Mark's site have been revised, redesigned and reformatted to meet current standards. Barring some unforseen difficulties with our Web hosting company, this redesign should provide satisfactory service for many years.

One final source of St. Mark's historical data must be mentioned. St. Mark's does maintain an online database of it's member records on Rootsweb. Pastors' records beginning with the founding of the Church have been posted and are periodically updated. A link to this site is located on the Church Website.

Archives projects are anticipated. The new archives room must be organized. An index exists, but must be updated. More of the records must be scanned and organized. A long term project would be to enter the Pastors' records into a data base for indexing.



It is sad to note that our numbers continue to shrink. We invite and welcome younger women to join us. We enjoy fellowship together while fulfilling God's mission. It is a privilege to be a part of an amazing church like St. Mark's. The people have supported us in our projects by donating quilt and kit materials, soap, rummage sale items, and money. We thank you for sharing God's bounty.
