INTRODUCTION TO TODAY'S READINGS

Today's gospel opens with further reflection on Jesus' baptism. He is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world and the one anointed by the Spirit. In the liturgy we come and see Christ revealed among us in word and meal. We go forth to invite others to come and worship the Holy One and to receive the gifts of grace and peace made known among us.

THE FIRST READING......Isaiah 49:1-7

1Listen to me, O coastlands,

pay attention, you peoples from far away!

The LORD called me before I was born,

while I was in my mother's womb he named me.

2He made my mouth like a sharp sword,

in the shadow of his hand he hid me;

They said to him, "Rabbi" (which translated means Teacher), "where are you staying?" 39He said to them, "Come and see." They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. 40One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. 41He first found his brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which is translated Anointed). 42He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, "You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas" (which is translated Peter).







*INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Persons may come forward to the chancel to receive Holy Communion. This format will be more "continuous" noting the following procedure:

- Communicants as directed by ushers are asked to come forward by way of the center aisle, take a cup from the tray provided and receive the bread.
- Once receiving the bread, communicants will proceed to one of two stations (left or right) to receive wine from the pouring chalice.
- After receiving wine, communicants will place the empty cup in the designated tray and return to their pew by way of the side aisles.



MARTIN LUTHER KING DAY AND DREAM WEEK

The Martin Luther King, Jr., National Day of Service is a defining moment each year when Americans across the country step up to make communities more equitable and take action to create the 'Beloved Community' of Dr. King's dream.

Dr. King's acknowledgement and fight for systemic change serves as the call to action for the Day of Service.

MLK Day is the only federal holiday designated as a National Day of Service to encourage all Americans to volunteer to improve their communities. During the last quarter-century, the MLK Day of Service has grown, and its impact increased as more Americans embraced the idea that citizenship involves taking an active role in improving communities.

STEP AmeriCorps, Pennsylvania College of Technology, Lycoming College, the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank, and the United Churches of Lycoming County are once again partnering for a week full of events, including a Peace Walk, starting at noon on Monday, Jan. 16. The walk will begin at the Jackie Robinson statue at the corner of Third and Market with a few words from Dr. Nate Woods of Penn College. Participants will depart on an approximately one-mile loop and return to the statue.

COMMEMORATIONS



Martin Luther King Jr., renewer of society, martyr, died 1968

Sunday, January 15, 2023

An American prophet of justice among races and nations, King was an eloquent preacher, a leader of the nonviolent resistance to race-segregated society, and recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964. Born on this date, he was assassinated on April 4, 1968.



Antony of Egypt, renewer of the church, died around 356 *Tuesday, January 17, 2023*

One of the earliest of the Egyptian desert fathers, Antony gave away his sizeable inheritance and became a hermit. Later he became leader of a group of monks who devoted themselves to prayer, worship, and labor.



Pachomius, renewer of the church, died 346

Tuesday, January 17, 2023

Born in Egypt, Pachomius became a Christian while a soldier. He became a hermit (a solitary monk) and organized others into a religious community. His rule for monasteries influenced later ones in both the Eastern and Western churches.



Confession of Peter

Wednesday, January 18, 2023

On this date the church remembers the apostle Peter's great acknowledgement of Jesus as "the Christ, the Son of the living God." His confession serves as a fitting beginning to the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, the week in which we remind ourselves that all Christians are united in their witness of Jesus as Lord and Savior.



Henry, Bishop of Uppsala, martyr, died 1156

Thursday, January 19, 2023

When Erik, King of Sweden, journeyed to Finland for the purpose of converting the people there to Christianity, Henry went with him. Henry is recognized as the patron saint of Finland.



Agnes, martyr, died around 304

Saturday, January 21, 2023

Agnes was a girl of about thirteen living in Rome. The details of her martyrdom are not clear, but she gave witness to her faith and was put to death as a result, most likely by the sword. The church has honored her as one of the chief martyrs of her time.
