





This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin.



ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING


The **ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING** is scheduled for **Sunday**, **December 10**, **2023**,

What Do I Owe the Lord? (Romans 4:7-8)



Unlike most of our great great grandparents, we live a life of financial indebtedness. According to an article on the Ramsey Solutions website, 77% of American households have at least some type of debt at an average of \$58,609 per adult. This debt includes credit cards, student loans, auto loans, and mortgages. The definition of debt in its simplest terms means owing

someone payment for any reason. Without the present financial system, most of us could not afford a house, car, or many of the other possessions we have. When it comes to the spiritual, we serve God with an unpayable indebtedness. The price that was paid for our sin by Jesus when He was crucified, can never be repaid by human merit (Eph. 2:8-9; Titus 3:4-5). Even though it cannot be repaid, we owe the Lord a life of worship and service because He forgave us and saved us from everlasting destruction (2 Thes. 1:8-9). Unfortunately, we sometimes place our loyalties to the people in our lives more than we do to God and when we do, we're no longer worthy of Jesus (Matt. 10:37). We must constantly remind ourselves that:

- We owe Him more than we owe our parents
- We owe Him more than we owe our children
- We owe Him more than we owe our friends
- We owe Him more than we owe our employer
- We owe Him more than we owe ourselves We sing the old song, "He paid a debt He did not owe, Christ Jesus paid the debt that I can never pay." And for that, we owe Him everything!

COMMEMORATIONS

Clement, Bishop of Rome, died around 100



Thursday, November 23, 2023

Clement was the third bishop of Rome. He is best remembered for a letter he wrote to the congregation in Corinth, still struggling with the same problems that led to Paul's letters to them. As did Paul, he focused on the need for love among Christians.

Miguel Agustín Pro, martyr, died 1927



Thursday, November 23, 2023

Pro grew up in a time when the Mexican revolutionaries accused the church of siding with the wealthy. He became a pastor, and worked on behalf of the poor and homeless. Falsely accused of throwing a bomb at a government official, he was executed, but not before

crying out "Long live Christ the King!"

Justus Falckner, died 1723; Jehu Jones, died 1852; William Passavant, died 1894; pastors in North America Friday, November 24, 2023

Not only was Falckner the first Lutheran ordained in North America, but he published a catechism which was the first Lutheran book published on the continent. Jones was the Lutheran church's first African American pastor and carried out missionary work in Philadelphia which led to the formation there of the first African American Lutheran congregation (St. Paul's). William Passavant helped to establish hospitals and orphanages in a number of cities and was the first to introduce deaconesses to the work of hospitals in the United States.

Isaac Watts, hymnwriter, died 1748



Saturday, November 25, 2023

A great hymnwriter in the English language, Watts as a youth was critical of the quality of the metrical psalter of the time. He wrote about 600 hymns—many based on the psalms.

A National Day of Thanksgiving (USA)



Thursday, November 23, 2023 Celebrated on the fourth Thursday of November, our National Day of Thanksgiving (Thanksgiving Day) encourages all people to "give thanks" for all blessings and gifts they possess.

A Brief History of "Thanksgiving Day" Thanksgiving Day has been an annual holiday in the United States since

1863.

There are claims that the first Thanksgiving Day was held in the city of El Paso, Texas, in 1598. Another early event was held in 1619 in the Virginia Colony. Many people trace the origins of the modern Thanksgiving Day to the harvest celebration the Pilgrims held in Plymouth, Massachusetts in 1621. However, their first true thanksgiving was in 1623, when they gave thanks for rain that ended a drought.

In the second half of the 1600s, thanksgivings after the harvest became more common and started to become annual events. However, they were celebrated on different days in different communities and in some places there were more than one thanksgiving each year. George Washington, the first president of the United States, proclaimed the first national Thanksgiving Day in 1789.
