MILESTONES

The term "milestone" keeps popping up in conversations around St. Mark's these days. It stems from our participation in the Child in Our Hand workshops over the past several years that have helped us to realize just how important it is to bind together Sunday worship and study to the weekday experience of the life of the faith at home. Milestones are markers along life's way, significant moments that need to be recognized, celebrated, and carried on so that their benefits help to shape all other areas of life.

Some Milestones are things that we have been doing for a long time, such as celebrating Holy Baptism. These things we continue and augment by suggesting other resources. We added to the recent Milestone of giving of a Bible to Third Graders by asking parents, grandparents, baptismal sponsors, etc. to add prayers, messages, and photos to the Bible, underline favorite passages, to the end that the Bible is a personalized treasure for the student. They were very pleased with the gift, and spent considerable time excitedly reading the messages from their families aloud to the Pastor.

A newly-identified milestone is the blessing of young driver and keys as a teenager begins the driving permit process. Prayers are offered for the youth, the family, and the whole community! DIP YOU KNOW...... By Dr. J. Morris Smith Did you know that 55% of Williamsport's residents live in rental units and 35.2% of those renters live below the poverty level. The median total family income in Lycoming County is \$34,016 and that is 18% lower than the average for this state. The people most negatively effected are the children. According to the State Department of Education, 24.7% of the children in Lycoming County live below the poverty level. They do not perform as well in school and exhibit greater behavioral problems than children of homeowner families. (Taken from a recent letter from Jerry Falco, Exec. Dir. for Williamsport/ Lycoming Habitat for Humanity, Inc.)

Did you know that the Shepherd of the Streets receives about 20 calls per week from people being evicted for lack of ability to pay their rent? Did you know that there is no place for us to put evicted families beyond a few days in a motel......no place for them to recover or learn beyond what they currently know, or begin to overcome and move out of the treadmill of loss?

One of the ways we are able to reach out to help the 250+ people who come to our office each month is with personal hygiene items and bedding that you so generously donate. Items we use and continue to need are:

baby powder, baby oil, baby shampoo

Items for Men and/or Women... All in regular sizes

HEALTH, HEALING AND WHOLENESS

Although it contains only thirty-one days – the same as seven other months - to someone suffering from loneliness, January can seem endless! The lights of Christmas have been taken down, untangled, and put away for another year. The wrapping paper has been gathered, and there are no longer any packages which served as visible reminders that someone cared. The ground is now frozen and barren, and when it snows or sleets, we can feel even more isolated, especially as we grow older. And so we sit and wait, for someone or something, which will lift us out of our slump. But what if I told you that life doesn't need to be lived like this?

January brings us once again, to Epiphany – the celebration of the presence of the light of Christ in our lives. We live in a paradoxical society, where we sometimes confuse the concept of loneliness with being "alone". I believe that what we may think is January loneliness is really our adjustment to the sudden lack of over-stimulation produced during the holidays.

For some of us, silence can be very threatening, so we rush to fill the void with *anything* other than the emptiness. If you have ever attended a retreat in which you are required to spend at least part of the time in silence, you may soon come to realize that the sound of silence can seem deafening! Yet we need time alone – it's integral to our development into mature and self-actualized adults.

Constructive aloneness can foster creativity. It promotes insight into ourselves, and allows us to get in touch with, and sort out our feelings – to come to terms with loss, and to assist us in changing our attitudes and perspectives. Learning, thinking and innovation are all facilitated by solitude. Those who elect to take time alone, soon discover that the time apart makes us enjoy our social interactions with others that much more! Yes, loneliness can hurt – but aloneness can heal. It is our human condition to experience the pain of death, departure, breakup and rejection in our relationships, but the light that Christ brings is always available to accompany us through the dark times and experiences. When Hagar and her son were dying in the desert after being cast out by Sarah, God heard. When Elijah sat alone, the Lord encouraged him.

If you are suffering from loneliness, there are choices you can make, and steps you can take to assist you in overcoming or working through your sense of isolation, such as:

- Keeping a journal. Write what you are thinking and feeling get to know yourself more deeply.
- Set aside time for devotion to God. As a wise person recently told me, even the monks had to schedule their devotional time into their daily lives. Reflect on your relationship with the creator where is God lighting your life at this point in time?
- Reach out to others. This is especially important if you have experienced the death of a loved
 one. Others don't always know when the time is appropriate to invite you to participate in life
 again.
- Reflect the love of God. Giving to others can often lead to meeting our own unmet needs, but balance this time, with embracing God's love reflecting inside yourself.
- Get some regular exercise and steady doses of sunlight. Never underestimate the power of endorphins!
- If your loneliness leads to feelings of despair, please seek help. Speak to your pastor, your parish nurse, or a trained professional. Sometimes the love of God needs to be reflected onto you through the loving help and guidance of another.

In the words of St. Teresa of Avila, "Let nothing disturb you, let nothing frighten you. All things are passing, God never changes. Patience gains all things. Who has God wants nothing."


