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For a Deeply *Thoughtful* Lent This Year...

The Road to Coronation will be the theme of the gatherings on Wednesday evenings in Lent at St. Mark's this year. We will focus on the different ways in which the Gospel writers have told the central story of Jesus' journey to the cross and resurrection. Each of them has emphasized a different aspect of the story; each of them contributes important insights for knowing the Lord Jesus. We'll also explore how later interpreters have pointed

to the same truth through the visual arts.

Lent begins with **Ash Wednesday**, **February 9**, with services of **Holy Communion** at 12:00 in the Chapel and 7:00 in the Nave.



On this solemn day, we acknowledge the depths of our estrangement from God, and hear the word of hope: "Dust you, dust redeemed by the cross of Christ."

On subsequent Wednesday evenings we use the following schedule:

- (1) We gather for potluck supper and conversation at 6:15 in Fellowship Hall.
- (2) We have a brief study-time at the table at 7:10 on the theme.
- (3) We move to the Nave to sing Evening Prayer at 7:30, and are on our way home at 8:00 P.M.

It is a wonderful time of mutual encouragement for the family of faith. Mark your calendar and plan on participating!

Morning Prayer continues to be sung each weekday at 9:00 A.M. All are welcome to participate. As well as naming many needs from around the community, it is our intention to name in prayer each member of the congregation in the course of the 40 days of Lent. Stop in and become a part of the church gathering for prayer. It helps to frame the rest of the day in an excellent context.

- [↑] Due to Harriet Fornwalt's illness, Lois Smith will be co-chairing the Parish Life Committee with Dick Lakey.




- ↑ Noted that our John Bower Basketball teams are doing well.

Matters of the heart: February is American Heart Month. Here is a reminder which bears repeating. Symptoms of heart attack in women, may differ from the "typical" crushing pain in the chest. Symptoms to be aware o include: shortness of breath with or without chest pain; flu-like symptoms: nausea, clamminess or cold sweats; unexplained fatigue, weakness or dizziness; pain in upper back, shoulders, neck or jaw; sudden feeling of overwhelming anxiety. Never drive yourself to the ER if you think you may be having a heart attack. Call 9-1-1 so proper treatment may be implemented immediately.



Dry chapped lips? Don't lick your lips – when saliva evaporates, it removes any natural oils that you have on your lips. Smooth on a heavy-duty lip balm that has ingredients such as avocado oil (relieves the chapped lips) and shea butter (helps prevent moisture loss). Stay away from matte lipstick formulas, which can be very drying. Instead, stick to lip gloss or a tinted balm. (Prevention, February 2005).




Are you looking to get WILD about God?

HEALTH, HEALING AND WHOLENESS

I get to meet the most delightful people! This month's article comes to you from Dr. Bruce Romanic, a physician friend who recently answered God's call to Diakonal Ministry. I asked Dr. Romanic to write an article that speaks to the concept of wholistic health – promoting wellness in body, mind, spirit, and in relationships with others. Below are his observations and thoughts on that delicate intersection between science and faith ... I look forward to hearing more from Dr. Romanic as he pursues this new path that God has placed before him!

"Praise the Lord and take your Digoxin" Word and Service in Medicine Bruce M Romanic, M.D. January 2005

Stat! MRI Scan, surgical scrubs and handsome George Clooney in 'ER'; these are some of the more predominant images of medicine today. A fast paced high-tech culture of curing disease. Thus, it is true, medicine has made significant strides in diagnosis and treatment for the benefit of many. Yet for many of us the daily existence and reality of medicine, and life, remain as true today as they were for the French surgeon Ambroise Pare over 300 years ago when he said "The task of medicine is to cure sometimes, to relieve often, and to comfort always". Our fast paced culture and technology has concentrated directly on 'cure and treat'; sometimes, however, at the expense of comforting.

The notion of comfort just does not sit well with me as a physician of physiology and quantification. When sitting knee to knee with a person in congestive heart failure I am considering their fluid status and medication options, for example, should they be on digoxin. Their comfort cannot be quantitated or written as a prescription, it can only be enfolded in our presence together. I cannot cure their problem. I can work out treatments for the physiology: diuretics, ACE inhibitors, and digoxin, but their pain is their own. I cannot cure their pain, but I can - I must - comfort them by being present and walking with them. Their pain is theirs alone, but with our presence, in His presence, they can be assured that their suffering is not theirs, alone.

Diakonal ministry is called to Word and service. Medicine has afforded me the training and execution of sound science in dealing with curing and treatment; I am equipped to do fairly well in the service part of my call. However, where most of us live - where our anxieties confront us – where we have no technology to lean on is in comforting. Ironically, this is precisely where we spend most of our time, and it is where we are commanded to be; "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another" [John 13:34]. Hence, being equipped to serve is important and certainly is the human skill part of a physicians call. Finally though, the execution of this call is in the proclamation of His Word through service to my neighbor ...

To love as I am loved.

Thank you, Dr. Romanic! A peaceful and blessed Lenten journey to all!
