

# MISSION AT THE CROSSROADS



It is a good time for the members of St. Mark's to do some intensive thinking about our work together as people of God in this congregation. We need to evaluate the things that we have been doing, discern the strengths of the parish and what has been working well and also note the continuing challenges and opportunities for ministry that are yet to be met, and plan how best to approach them.

To accomplish this, the Congregation Council has selected a resource called *Mission at the Crossroads* as the process for us to use. This resource was developed last year by the ELCA and the Seminary at Gettysburg for use especially in the congregations of central PA. At various points in the process, it will involve a


To help facilitate the process, we will have the assistance of Mrs. Beth Yenchko, deployed staff from the ELCA with her office in Gettysburg. Her title in this process is called "companion." She will help us frame the questions, gather the results, and outline the plans. She met once with the Council last year for her to get a flavor of the congregation and give us a taste of the process. Now we are ready to move forward together. It is sure to be a thought-provoking and lively time over the next several months.

The first gathering will take place on Wednesday, May 17, 2006 in Fellowship Hall. The Leadership Team appointed by the Council with Nancy Larson, Secretary of the Congregation as the Chair of the Team, will meet at 6:00 with Mrs. Yenchko, and the general gathering of Council, committees, other leaders, and any other curious members of the parish will be at 7:00 P.M. Don't wait for a special invitation: any member is welcome to come that evening and get aboard the first stage of the process. If participation on that particular evening is not possible, there will be subsequent times to be involved also. To make the evening even a bit more pleasant, we'll enjoy dessert together at 6:45 as we prepare to begin. The Leadership Team will be setting the schedule for additional gatherings, and will announce it in the next Lion. Questions about the process can be addressed to the chair, Nancy Larson, and each Council member also has a packet of information available. A telephone call to the church office answering machine would be helpful so that adequate arrangements can be made.

### COUNCIL UPDATE

The Congregation Council met in regular session on April 17, 2006 in the Crossways Room, and they:

- --Accepted Melvin and Melinda Wentzel as new members of the congregation, by transfer and affirmation of baptism at the Easter Vigil.
- --Noted the acceptance of Steven Eyer as a member of the congregation by the Sacrament of Holy Baptism as an adult at the Easter Vigil.
- -- Granted letter of transfer to Eric Hieber to River Road Presbyterian Church, Richmond Virginia.
- --Granted permission to the Synod Cantor, Donna Zierdt Elkin, to hold a workshop for musicians from around the Synod at St. Mark's on May 6.
- --Received as study information recently available materials concerning stewardship.
- --Noted the congregational picnic planned for June 4 in the Montoursville Park.
- --Approved the additional nomination of Beth Shafranko to be added to the ballot for the Annual Congregation Assembly for a two-year term on Congregation Council.
- --Received regular reports from pastor, officers, and committees.
- --Approved the purchase of a printed resource for a series of gatherings on Sunday mornings beginning July 16, intended especially for parents.
- --Moved to select the date of May 17 for the initial meeting of the planning and evaluative process called *Mission at the Crossroads*, and to appoint Nancy Larson as chair of the process and to establish a group of six persons to serve as the leadership team for the venture.
- --Expressed thanks to members concluding terms of service on the Council: John Burkholder, Dorothy Berndt, Frank Doebler, Robert Miller, and Deborah Maggs. Deb will be on the ballot for election to a second term.
- -- Moved to call the Annual Congregation Assembly for Sunday, May 21 following the 10:30 service in the Nave; with reports due to the office by April 28, and the booklet of reports to be in print and available for inspection by everyone on May 7 and 14.
- --Concluded the meeting, as is our custom, by moving to the chapel and singing together the office of *Prayer at the Close of the Day*.

### Dr. Barlow's Mossy Foot Project

Mossy Foot (Non-filarial elephantiasis) is a debilitating condition found primarily in rural districts on people that work in soil of volcanic origin. This condition causes swelling and ulcers in the feet and lower legs. This deformity, swelling, repeated ulceration and secondary infections make people with Mossy Foot social outcasts equivalent to those with leprosy.

The afflicted are deserted by their friends; their hope of marriage and employment is lost because of fear of others contracting the disease. Currently there are 152,000 registered Mossy Foot patients in Wolaitta (Ethiopia.)

Dr. Nathan Barlow spent sixty years in Africa treating this disease. He continued to treat patients until his death in 2004. His son-in-law and daughter, Jim and Sharon Barlow Daly, have assumed the responsibility of managing the day-to-day operations of Dr. Barlow's Mossy Foot Project. A donation from us will enable this vital work to continue in the name of our savior, Christ Jesus.

The Mossy Foot Project, which provides clinics, supplies, special shoes and socks, is the only one of its kind in Ethiopia. Money is collected from patients if they are able to pay. These payments account for only 1% of total expenses. The other 99% is met by donations from caring Christians.



Treatment clinics are opened with Bible reading and prayer. Medical treatment, shoes, socks and training of some patients will be the means for them to get "back on their feet" and be able to provide for their families.



#### NURSES NOTES, MAY 2006

May 7 Though transmission of the Avian Flu virus (Bird Flu) directly from birds to humans is rare, it is wise to take a few simple precautions. Because the virus can be spread by droplet and via bird droppings or feces, be especially careful when uncovering the family pool, cleaning bird feeders and bird baths. Small particles can be inhaled, so consider wearing protective face covering and gloves when cleaning. Because wild waterfowl can be carriers, try to avoid direct physical contact when feeding ducks and geese. In addition, thoroughly clean soles of shoes to avoid inadvertently bringing droppings into the home.

May 14 Spring is here, and with it pollen and spores, which may have asthma sufferers, reaching for their inhaled medications. If this describes you, here is a gentle reminder to thoroughly clean your inhaler daily, and rinse your mouth after medication use! Ask your doctor or pharmacist to demonstrate how to determine when your medication may be running low.

May 21 Allergy Fact: Did you know that someone with a food allergy can have a severe reaction simply by touching that food? Just one more reason to carefully clean food preparation areas!

May 28 Hesitant to use "cooking sprays" when cutting down on fats? Try this trick: Measure out a half teaspoon of cooking oil (about 20 calories) and apply it to the pan with a clean white paper towel or a basting brush. Use canola or olive oil for extra heart protection!


### Parenting Forum (by the wayside)







### HEALTH, HEALING AND WHOLENESS

As Christians, we recognize that God is the giver of all life, and that each breath we take bears witness to His life-giving and sustaining nature. In Genesis, we hear "...and He breathed into his (Adam) nostrils with the breath of life, and the man became a living being" (Gen. 2:7). Ruach (Hebrew) or ruha (Aramaic) translate as "breath/spirit". Most of us take breathing for granted, easy to do of course, unless you suffer from allergies or asthma.

No one can completely escape from irritants or pollutants, but here are a few strategies you may not have considered, that may lessen their effects:

- During peak pollen or pollution times, try to remain indoors as much as possible.
- Dry clothing in a vented dryer, not on the clothesline.
- ❖ If you use air conditioning in your home and car, make sure to clean filters to prevent the circulation of mold spores. You auto supply store should have products for your car AC.
- ❖ Beware of thunderstorms, why? The wind stirs up both mold and pollen, actually beginning before the storm rolls through via updrafts, which bring pollen and spores up to face level.
- ❖ Pollen counts are lowest 1-2 hours after a hard rain. They are highest at about 6 AM on days with sun and light wind.
- Stuffed animals have long been identified as sources for allergies. Kapok, used as stuffing in pillows, teddy bears, sleeping bags and upholstered furniture, was long felt to be the cause of allergic symptoms. However, the stuffing in itself is not the problem—it is the dust mites and mold spores they harbor. Wash items in hot water (130 degrees) and dry in a vented dryer on a weekly basis.
- If your child has a pet such as a hamster, guinea pig, gerbil, keep the cage away from heating vents or air returns.
- Shower and change clothes after working or playing outside. Also shower and change after grooming or washing the family pet.
- Keep rain gutters and drains free from debris or leaves and insure that rainwater flows away from the house.
- Do not burn trash—recycle as much as possible; put the remaining items in the garbage.

Sometimes our churches inadvertently contribute to allergic sensitivities. How? In larger buildings such as churches and offices, heating, cooling and ventilation systems can be sources of mold, mildew or dust, which are then inhaled. To combat the problem, clean or replace filters regularly, and use a dehumidifier. Good ventilation is also vital when doing renovations, due to formaldehyde-containing bonding agents in carpet, paneling and furniture.

Choose altar flowers carefully. Check with your florist for flowers with little or no scent when decorating your worship space. Many Easter services are missed because congregation members are sensitive to hyacinths, lilies or other fragrant flowers.

Finally, modern soap, lotion and cologne fragrances are more potent than in the past. On a daily basis, the average person may use half-dozen, or more, scented products. Multiple that by many people—in a poorly ventilated room—and it becomes difficult for the allergy sufferer to function. One of the most challenging aspects for the person who is sensitive to fragrances is the lack of understanding by others. The same person, who would be offended by "second hand smoke", may not see the parallel with "second hand perfume". A good rule of thumb, if you can smell the product on yourself, you've probably applied too much.
