But, given the unprecedented nature of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, they have provided quilts, School Kits, and Health Kits to survivors of the devastating hurricanes. Please make up the kits described in the Narthex. They are sorely needed.

School Kit

- 2 spiral bound notebooks (8"x11" lined, 70 pgs.)
- 1 pair blunt metal scissors
- 1 12" or 30cm ruler
- 1 pencil sharpener
- 6 pencils w/ erasers
- 1 2 1/2" eraser
- 12 sheets construction paper
- 1 box of 16 or 24 crayons **Pack in cloth bag and secure
- with cord or rubber bands**

2 shirts

- 2 gowns or sleepers
- 2 receiving blankets
- 4 cloth diapers
- 1 sweater
- 2 washcloths
- 1 bath sixe baby soap
- 2 diaper pins
- **Wrap in one receiving blanket and secure with diaper pins**

Health Kit

- 1 hand towel
- 1 washcloth
- 1 bar of soap (bath size)
- 1 toothbrush
- 1 tube of toothpaste
- 1 wide-tooth comb
- 1 nail file or clippers
- 6 band-aids
- **Wrap in towel and
- tie with ribbon or yarn**

Sewing Kit

- 3 yards 45" cotton fabric or
- 4 yards 36" cotton fabric
- 1 pack of hand needles
- 1 spool matching thread
- 6 buttons on a card
- Or buttons tied on strir
- 6 buttons tied on string
- **Wrap inside of fabric and secure with yarn or ribbon**

Bath sized bars of soap may also be donated.

REPORT ON THE SYNOD ASSEMBLY, JUNE 16 & 17, 2006 by Bernadette Haas Jones

Milestone Ministry Display: On Thursday, June 15, Sharon and I drove down to Selinsgrove to set up the display for the Milestone Ministry here at St. Mark's. In addition to the display board Sharon created for previous events, we presented examples of our milestones including the Receiving Blanket (newborns); Faith Chest and Baptismal Medallion (Baptism); Prayer Pillow(2-year-olds); All the Languages of the Good News bag, Bible, CD and icon (kindergarten); key ring (new drivers); and framed anniversary tree, certificate and program (anniversary milestone). We also provided copies of a table with information regarding the who, what, when, why and how of our milestone celebrations.

The display generated a lot of interest and questions. It also caught the attention of Marilyn Sharpe (Passing on Faith), which led to a 20 minute conversation with her. She was impressed with our program and mentioned some of our ideas in a later workshop.



Services: Use of the format from the new book of worship was distracting and less than uplifting. However, Dick Hardel and Marilyn Sharpe were extremely inspiring with their sermons. One of the readings and a theme of the weekend was from Deuteronomy: *"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. Keep these words that I am commanding you today in your heart.* Recite them to your children and talk about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you rise. Bind them as a sign on your hand, fix them *as an emblem on your forehead, and write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates."* ~Deuteronomy, 6:5-9

- ✤ Workshops:
 - **Friday:** Attended a Synod finance seminar to get briefed a little on the budget and other concerns of the assembly.
 - Saturday: Attended three workshops:
 - Parenting with Grace: conducted by Ms. Sharpe. The goal is to nurture faith in children in everything we do. Research tells us that only 1 in 10 families talk about faith outside the church walls. The driving question: How do we raise our children to become the adults we want them to be?
 - Splashed with Promise: Dr. Hardel. Encourage talk between the generations of what Baptism means to them, what do they remember, how it was celebrated, and exchanging water stories.
 - The Healing Power of Laughter and Play: Dr. Hardel. The word "clown" is derived from "clod"—clump of earth. Both "human" and "humor" stem from the same root—of the earth. Humor and laughter is what grounds us and frees us and teaches us.

Over all, it was a wonderful, informative and inspiring event. If the opportunity arises, I would encourage our congregation to invite Ms. Sharpe to speak to our families and have everyone possible attend!

Nurse's Notes July 2006

- July 2 According to a recent Mayo Clinic study, the following terms describe the "perfect" doctor: confident, empathetic, humane, personal, forthright, respectful, and thorough [named most frequently]. The quality of the doctor/patient relationship can effect patient compliance, and therefore, outcomes. Continued training and practice in interpersonal skills could have far-reaching affects on patient outcomes. (*Health News: Doctor Perspectives on Medical Headlines*, Vol. 12, No. 5, May 2006)
- July 9 Spinach wins "hands down", as the most nutritious of fresh "greens" for salads. It contains nutrients such as: folate, vitamin A, vitamin C, vitamin K, lutein, and zeaxanthin. Because of its' vitamin K content, check with your doctor if you are on a prescription blood thinner. Vitamin K affects blood's ability to clot.

July 16 When is a headache, perhaps not a headache? The following symptoms warrant medical attention:

- sudden, severe headache (with or without a stiff neck)
- headache accompanied by fever
- convulsions
- headache following a blow to the head
- confusion or loss of consciousness
- a headache along with pain in the eye or ear
- persistent headache after being previously headache free
- a headache that interferes with routine activities
- July 23 Reminder: Containers which contain stagnant water, are breeding grounds for mosquitoes. Regularly empty kiddie pools. Keep gutters and downspouts free of debris. For birdbaths, consider purchasing a "mosquito dunk" – a floating ring that kills mosquito larvae but doesn't harm birds (around \$13).
- July 30 Roughly 75% of American families don't have the national poison control number clearly posted.Write this down next to your phone (800)222-1222. Poisonings account for roughly 1/3 of accidental home injuries.

Host Families needed for students learning English as a second language. These students will be at Lock Haven University from 1-4 weeks depending on their program. A shuttle bus is provided for transportation. Host Families receive about \$100 stipend per week/ per student for most students. Families are responsible for providing a bed, meals and an open heart. You can choose the age (14-19) and gender of the student. Adult chaperones also need housing. And, for every family that hosts a student St. Mark's will receive \$100!

Who among us cannot identify with Paul when he laments, "*I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do (Romans 7:19)*? In the summertime, it is easy to just "go with the flow" when we picnic or vacation. It is at those times when we let down our guard, that accidents happen. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, more than 3.7 million consumers have made unplanned trips to their hospitals' emergency departments ... in just one summer!

We often hear safety tips and warnings in regard to swimming, biking, hiking, picnicking, swimming, etc., and it can be easy to tune them out, thinking, "Yeah. Yeah. Yeah. I've heard this before! I'm careful!" So ... I'd like to devote this month's article to safety issues you may not have heard before! For much more comprehensive listings, check out the websites of the *American Academy of Pediatrics*, and the U. S. Consumer Safety Commission.

- If the outside temperature is 85° or higher, discard all food that has been sitting out for an hour. If the temperature is under 85°, throw it away after 2 hours.
- Never bring charcoal grills indoors [garage]. Burning charcoal produces deadly carbon monoxide.
- If your plans include camping, and you want to heat the inside of your tent or pop-up, use only those portable heaters equipped with oxygen depletion sensors (ODS). Heaters also produce carbon monoxide (CO). One which is equipped with an ODS will automatically shut off if oxygen levels begin to fall in the enclosure. Certain camping lanterns can also cause CO poisoning
- Create three safety layers around your swimming pool a fence, an alarm, and an eagle-eyed adult!
- So-called, "safe" fireworks, such as sparklers can reach temperatures above 1000°, burning users and/ or bystanders.
- "Children who are not licensed to drive a car should not be allowed to operate off-road vehicles. [They] are particularly dangerous for children younger than 16 years who may have immature judgment and motor (muscle) skills." (www.aap.org)
- A cushion of at least 9" of wood chips should be distributed under playground equipment to serve as a shock absorber for falls.
- The *American Academy of Pediatrics* recommends, "communities continue to develop skateboard parks, which are more likely to be monitored for safety than ramps and jumps constructed by kids at home."

Finally, I cringe whenever I drive by a home that has a trampoline in the yard! In fact *AAP does not* recommend the use of home trampolines. Children and adults are sustaining injuries, which range from sprains and strains to broken necks, head, and spinal cord injuries. Kids 15 and under account for two-thirds of all trampoline injuries, and almost 75% of all injuries involved more than one person being on the equipment at one time. According to the University of Michigan C. S. Mott Children's Hospital even adult supervision is not always adequate. Spotters need to be big enough and strong enough to protect the jumper if he/she gets too close to the edge. Though it can be a lot of fun, perhaps this is a piece of equipment better left to professionals.
