We hope you will join us for this exciting step of our Missions at the Crossroads journey!


A Dog-Gone Good Time Planned!

In a world full of chaos and endless activity, God is calling for us to slow down and listen to Him. Intent on making their lives count, millions of teenagers will pause to do that at **See You at the Pole**TM (SYATP) this September.

"Be STILL and KNOW that I am GOD" is the theme for See You at the Pole this year, with the event scheduled for Wednesday, September 27.

The "**Be STILL**" theme is taken from Psalm 46:10, where God says, "**Be still and know that I am God. I will be exalted among the nations**." Many are familiar with this Old Testament verse. But fewer would be aware that in context, the admonition was God's recommended response to the chaos of natural disaster and wartime conflict, two conditions that are as familiar to modern man as to the ancients.

Americans were reeling from the impact of Hurricane Katrina at the time of last

year's SYATP. And in Quezon City in the Philippines, more than 1,200 gathered solemnly at Jubilee Christian Academy, praying for the world in spite of typhoon-driven weather.

See You at the Pole is a student-initiated and student-led movement that started in the Ft. Worth suburb of Burleson, Texas, in 1990. It originated with just one youth group, who met at night at several schools around Burleson during a weekend retreat. SYATP brings students to their school flagpoles to intercede for their leaders, schools, and families, asking God to bring moral and spiritual awakening to their campuses and countries.

In 2005, more than 2 million teenagers met for See You at the Pole in all 50 states. Internationally, reports came in from countries on six continents, including the Canada, Australia, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ecuador, Germany, Ghana, Guam, Hong Kong, Japan, Kenya, South Korea, Malaysia, Nigeria, Norway, Peru, Portugal, Scotland, and South Africa.

Participants don't have to pay anything to participate in See You at the Pole. "And we want to make sure that anyone running a program in the summer has something to hand out, if they need it," noted Billy Beacham, president of Student Discipleship Ministries in Burleson, Texas, which creates all the promotional material for SYATP. "The resources are available for those who want them."

The San Diego-based National Network of Youth Ministries coordinates SYATP promotion. Paul Fleischmann, president of the Network, observed: "Every year, we have seen this day serve as a springboard for unity among teenagers on their campuses. See You at the Pole unites students in prayer at the beginning of the semester. Young people have taken unprecedented leadership through this to have a positive impact at their schools."

Church congregations nationwide will show support for See You at the Pole by sponsoring special "Campus Challenge Sunday" commissioning services September 23-24, the weekend before See You at the Pole. Participants will recognize and pray for Christian students and educators in their congregations. Campus Challenge Sunday resources have been created by the National Network of Youth Ministries to help church leaders plan for this event. See You at the Pole is now held each year on the *fourth* Wednesday of September. This change from its earlier years was in response to the needs of students to have more time to organize See You at the Pole after the school year begins. *There is also more information on the See You at the Pole web site*, <u>www.syatp.com</u>.

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

Genesis 47:28-31 contains a poignant story of the last days of Jacob (Israel) "Jacob lived in Egypt seventeen years, and the years of his life were a hundred and forty-seven. When the time drew near for Israel to die, he called for his son Joseph and said to him, "If I have found favor in your eyes, put your hand under my thigh and promise that you will show me kindness and faithfulness. Do not bury me in Egypt, but when I rest with my fathers, carry me out of Egypt and bury me where they are buried." "I will do as you say", he {Joseph] said. "Swear to me," he [Israel] said. Then Joseph swore to him, and Israel worshiped as he leaned on the top of his staff (NIV). This must have been a difficult conversation for father and son. No one likes to discuss the "what-ifs" in life when they involve declining health and/or the impending death of a loved one, but these kinds of difficult conversations can and should be possible in our homes as well as in our congregations.

Every state has its own laws and guidelines regarding <u>Advance Directives</u> – our wishes regarding medical care when we are no longer capable of making decisions on our own (available at http://www.uslivingwillregistry.com/forms.shtm).

There are several types of Advance Directives. A '<u>Durable' or 'Medical Power-of-Attorney (POA)</u> allows you to appoint someone (sometimes called a health care agent or proxy) to make medical decisions for you, should you be unable to do so. It is typically activated if you become unconscious or incapacitated. It is important to understand that a Medical POA is **not the same** as a regular POA (the kind that allows someone to make your financial decisions). This individual need not be a family member, but should be someone in whom you have a great deal of trust, and with whom you've discussed the types of choices you would want made for you in a variety of medical situations. Avoid choosing someone out of guilt or a sense of obligation.

A second type of Advance Directive, known as a <u>Living Will</u> is a legal document which describes the kinds of medical or life-sustaining treatments you would want if seriously ill or in the end-stages of life. It does not allow you to appoint someone to make decisions for you. A good Advance Directive will allow you to describe the kinds of treatment you would want (Examples: CPR, mechanical breathing, tube-feedings, etc.) – depending upon how sick you are: whether you could recover (Examples: heart attack, accident, stroke), whether you are unlikely to recover, or whether your physicians have determined you could be permanently unconscious.

In addition, there is the <u>Do-Not-Resuscitate Order</u> (DNR) which states that you have requested to **not** receive CPR if your heart stops beating or if you stop breathing. This must be placed in your medical records by your physician. Be aware that in some states, such as Pennsylvania, ambulance personnel are **required** to provide CPR unless given a separate order, known as an Out-of-Hospital Do-Not-Resuscitate Order, which may be obtained from and signed by your physician.

Though in most states, you may create your own Advance Directives, your doctor, the Area Agency on Aging, hospice, an attorney, or AARP, can give forms and/or assistance in doing so. You must follow state guidelines, and be at least 18 years of age. When completed, a copy of your wishes should be given to your family, your physician, your POA and/or your lawyer. Avoid storing it in a safe-deposit box, where retrieval might be difficult. Keep in mind that you *may cancel or change* your AD at any time.

Advance Directives involve deeply personal decisions, so it is important that you have these diffcult conversations with your loved ones, your pastor, your parish nurse, or with your doctor. Please use ithis article as a spring-board for discussing end-of-life issues, and the mystery of life and death in God. May *"the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:7)* as you do so.
