# Mission at the Crossroads Update

On the evening of December 6, about 25 members of the parish met to review the work of Mission at the Crossroads thus far and to initiate the next steps. After an enjoyable potluck meal, we received a copy of all of the raw data that has been gathered over the past 6 months, especially taking note of the dreams and obstacles raised by nine different groups of members in October and November.

The various comments were gathered into four natural groupings. Each person present was asked to



chose the area that most interested him or her and to choose from among those similarly interested persons one who would be the convener of that group. When we next gather on January 17, each of the groups will begin its conversation with those dreams, and at length propose goals for us as a whole congregation. These goals will be then start wending their way through wide-ranging conversations in the committees, council, and the whole congregation, toward the acceptance of some of them for our work together in the Gospel through the coming years.

It has to be a long and careful process so that we are sure that what we propose will be based upon scripture and congruent with the faith and traditions of the as being aware of the complex world in which we live gathering insights from as many of

church, as well as being aware of the complex world in which we live, gathering insights from as many of the members as who wish to participate, and inviting the acceptance of the results by all.

Whether or not you have been involved in the earlier parts of the process, all members are welcome to attend on January 17. We begin by sharing a potluck meal at 6:15 P.M. and then move to the four interrelated interest groups: (1) Dreams for Growth and Diversity, (2) Dreams for Evangelism –a spirit of contagious enthusiasm for sharing Good News, (3) Dreams for Youth, Christian Education, Music, and Related programs, and (4) Dreams for Change and Preserving Traditions. Copies of the raw data reports are available to any member on the table in the Front Lounge or by request through the office.

#### **IN MEMORIAM**

#### Celebration of Life Service Saturday, January 20, 2007 2:00 p.m St. Mark's Lutheran Church

(Following the service, there will be a light meal and a time of fellowship.)

The Rev. Dr. Walter L. Brandau, 76, passed from this life and into the presence of the God he so faithfully served on Dec. 7, 2006 at Hospice House Woodside, Pinellas Park, FL.

Pastor Brandau was born March 19, 1930 in Hazleton, PA, the son of Martin E. Brandau and Dorothy Richards Brandau. He was baptized into the Christian Church at Trinity Lutheran Church in Hazleton, PA. He married Shirley Jean Welker of Sunbury, PA at Zion Lutheran Church where she was serving as the office secretary.

Pastor Brandau was ordained through Gettysburg Theological Seminary in 1954 and Chicago Seminary in 1966. He was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Divinity from Susquehanna University in 1981. Prior to St. Mark's, he led St. John's Lutheran Church of Espy and Hidlay Lutheran Church of Bloomsburg, PA., Holy Trinity Lutheran Church of Berlin, PA, Trinity Lutheran Church of Milton, PA and Mt. Calvary Lutheran Church, Johnstown, PA. Pastor Brandau was called to be the pastor of St. Mark's in 1984, and he served the congregation until his retirement in 1995.

Pastor Brandau's work at St. Mark's brought on an improvement in Sunday School enrollment while adding more young families to the membership. He was instrumental in updating the church facilities and area around the church, the establishment of the East parking lot and the renovation of the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the Parish House & library. He developed innovative approaches to his ministry for children, including using hand puppets and dramatics to illustrate Bible stories. His portrayal of Martin Luther in a dramatic setting was much admired. Members of St. Mark's remember him fondly as a warm and Godly Pastor.

Pastor Brandau was a member of various Synodical Committees and served on Tressler Lutheran Social Services' Board. He was a member of the Rotary International and was their group study leader to India. In addition he was a Boy Scout leader in various communities. He held a strong concern for social ministry and participated in flood relief efforts in stricken communities in Florida, South Carolina and other areas.

He loved to spend time with his family, travel, camp and hike, paint, quilt and enjoyed wild flower photography. Pastor Brandau, along with Clyde Peeling owner of Reptiland, Williamsport, traveled to Ecuador to study reptile habitats in the Amazon Rain Forest. He was a pianist and organist.

- January 7 It's the dawning of a new year, so don't forget to schedule important exams with your physician, dentist, eye doctor, and other specialists!
- January 14 Time for some household safety checks! Clean out your medicine chest; discard any out dated medications don't risk your safety over expired products. Ladies, how about replacing any eye make-up older than 6 months, as well as those bath "puffs" you use for bathing they are breeding grounds for bacteria. Replace tooth brushes older than 3 months.
- January 21 Here's a high fiber alternative to tomato or cream sauces on pasta: toss the cooked pasta with canned or homemade lentil or other bean soup. This is a quick version of the nutri tious pasta-and-bean dishes popular in Italy. Or, puree the soup before adding to the pasta!
- January 28 Use elastic exercise bands if you want to increase strength, but are intimidated by the idea of lifting weights, or do not have access to weightlifting equipment. The long, wide bands provide resistance needed to work your muscles. They are cheap, easy to carry around, and versatile they can even be used by those who are wheelchair bound. According to the 2000 Census, 55% of Williamsport's residents live in rental units and 35.2% of those renters live below the pov-

erty level. The median total family income in Lycoming County is only \$34,016, 18% lower than the average for our State. The people most negatively affected are our children. According to the State Department of Education, 24.7% of the children in Lycoming County live below the poverty level. Studies show that in school these children do not perform as well and exhibit greater behavior problems than children in homeowner families.

# HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"Normal is just a town in Illinois." I heard that statement recently, and had to chuckle, but then I found myself asking, what <u>is</u> "normal?" When used in the context of mental health, sometimes the answer can be pretty clear, the affected person may hear voices, have hallucinations, or may have grandiose ideas that he or she is the leader of a foreign country. But often times, the issue is not readily evident.

One of the primary influences in determining what is normal or acceptable, is the culture and values of the world around us. What may seem to be bazaar behavior to us may not be considered so in another country or culture. In addition, research and medicine both impact our definition of normal, and although there may be no definite blood test or x-ray that may determine mental health, many disorders do indeed appear to be connected to biological or brain chemistry.

Mental health professionals are trained to define mental disorders by determining signs, symptoms and/or impairment to one's ability to function on a day-to-day basis. Signs are objective observations, such as agitation, rapid breathing or heart rate. Symptoms are more subjective, such as how the individual feels - sadness, anger, hopelessness. Combined, signs and symptoms may appear as: behaviors (ex. repeated hand washing), feelings (ex. sadness), thoughts (ex. thinking that the TV is controlling the mind), physical responses (ex. sweating, heart pounding). This information is gathered through a variety of approaches, which are likely to include: the patient/client's own perceptions, other's reactions or perceptions, cultural norms, or statistical values (gathered through various verbal or written tests). Additional factors include:

How long have the symptoms been occurring? How severe are the symptoms? How upsetting are they to you? How do the symptoms affect your life? Still, a precise definition of normal mental health is not possible at this time (MayoClinic.com).

Many people suffer in silence, because biases against mental illness and lack of awareness are among the obstacles that affect willingness to seek care, thus limiting access to treatment. Insurance coverage for mental health issues does not equal that of biological illnesses, further affecting treatment. Yet mental illnesses are a major public health concern. They adversely affect functioning, economic productivity, the capacity for healthy relationships and families, physical health, and the overall quality of life. They cut across racial, ethnic, and socioeconomic lines to affect a significant proportion of communities worldwide. It's been estimated that one third of the homeless in America, suffer from mental illness. In addition, the prevalence of dementia is rising as people are living longer, adding to the need for more resources.

Both genetic and environmental factors influence one's vulnerability to mental illness. Traumatic events throughout one's lifetime, including childhood abuse or neglect, major losses, violence, military combat, and dislocation (as among the urban homeless or wartime refugees) are known to threaten mental stability. Non-traumatic stressors, including unemployment, bereavement, and relational or occupational problems, can impact mental health. Nutritional deficiencies (such as vitamin B12), infections (such as syphilis and HIV [human immunodeficiency virus]), and heavy metal poisoning (such as lead) can all cause psychiatric syndromes. Substance abuse may be precipitated by, or worsen healthy functioning.

In the majority of instances, treatment is available. As communities of faith, it is our responsibility to advocate for, and promote the development of mental health practices. It is a social justice issue. Christ did not turn his back on those who "suffered from an evil spirit" - he didn't shrunk away, but instead of-fered a healing hand. For "*Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.*" (*NRSV, Mt. 25:40*)


