## Using our Time Well

Have you noticed? Each of us has exactly the same number of hours in every week! What is different is how we choose to use those hours.

Holy Week begins on April 1 this year. All members of the parish are challenged to devote some of our precious hours in this week to come together and help each other hear the Good News of Jesus in worship, study and fellowship.



### Sunday, April 1, Sunday of the Passion—Palm Sunday

After the bittersweetness of the procession with palms, we focus on the whole Passion-story, this year reading from Luke. We all have parts to read and ponder.

This year we have as our guest musicians the Chamber Choir of Lycoming College under the direction of Dr. Fred Thayer. They will be singing the *Chichester Psalms* of Leonard Bernstein beginning at 10:15 A.M., and also Dr. Thayer's own composition *Agnus Dei* during the Holy Communion meal.

*Do this in remembrance of me*; and it can also refer to the command to ...*love one another as I have loved you*.

We have opportunity to gather for study of the Psalms at 6:31 A.M., for Morning Prayer at 9:00 A.M., for the Holy Communion in the chapel at 12:00 noon, and again in the Nave at 7:30 P.M.

### Wednesday, April 4, The Passover Seder

Although the center of our story is Jesus, it begins with God's earlier saving actions in the Exodus. We retell this part of our heritage in story, song, scripture, and symbolic foods at table in Fellowship Hall beginning at 6:15 P.M. Since a served meal is part of this event, reservations are necessary. Please telephone the church of- fice not later than Monday morning, April 2, or even better, put the reservation slip in the offering plate on April 1.



We also have the opportunity to gather for Morning Prayer as we do each weekday at 9:00 A.M.

### Good Friday, April 6

The community service will be held at noon, beginning with the procession around the center city for those who wish to participate. All may come and go as their schedule permits.

We also gather for Morning Prayer at 9:00 A.M. and for the Vigil at the Cross at 7:30 P.M., a time of thoughtful reflection on our sin and Christ's redemption.

### Holy Saturday, April 7

We gather at sundown, 8:00 P.M. for the most important service of the entire year, the Great Vigil of Easter. The entire sweep of salvation history is celebrated, from the beginning of creation to its heavenly culmination, and centering on our Lord's resurrection. Everyone is most strongly urged to take part. All the senses are used, we use many ways to tell the story, everyone has a role. The participants in *The Way* renew their baptismal promises, and the Easter celebration begins.



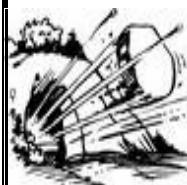
### Maundy Thursday, April 5

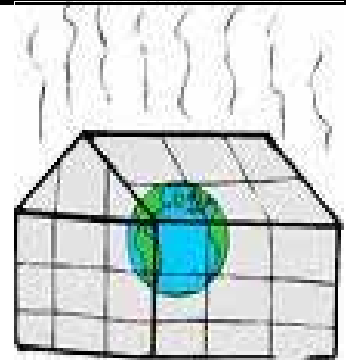

## Bishop Transition For the Upper Susquehanna Synod Questions & Answers

Bishop A. Donald Main has announced that he will not be available for re-election to the office of Bishop of the Upper Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

### How does the synod go about electing a bishop?

An election process will take place during the Synod's Annual Assembly, June 15 & 16, 2007 at Susquehanna University. Rostered leaders and congregational voting members will be asked to participate in the election process. A bishop's "term" extends for a period of six years.

### How long will Bishop Main continue to serve as bishop?

Bishop Main will continue to serve the Upper Susquehanna Synod in his official capacity until September 1, 2007. The bishop elect will begin service on September 1, 2007 and will be installed on Sunday, October 21. Bishop Main may be asked to assist the next bishop in his or her transition into the new role.

### When can we say thanks and farewell to Bishop & Mrs. Main?

A special retirement service is being planned for Bishop Main Saturday, August 18 at Zion Lutheran Church in Sunbury, P A at 2:30 p.m.

### Will Bishop Main be able to keep the preaching commitment or appointment that we've made?

With a few exceptions, if that appointment for preaching commitment is before September 1 the answer is probably, "Yes." After September 1, the answer may be, "No." He will be in communication with you regarding these matters.

### Will other members of the synod staff be leaving or staying?

The call to ministry as Assistant to the Bishop, currently held by Pastor Daniel May, officially ends with the term of our current bishop. There exists the possibility that readjustment of staffing within the synod office could occur, dependent upon the outcome of the vote by the annual assembly on recommendations of the synod's Strategy for Mission Task Force, or the desire of the bishop-elect. Should adjustments occur, the Transition Task Force will attempt to see that support for all staff - present and future - be provided during the time of change.

### What is the process for electing a new bishop?

The synod's election process for a bishop is defined in USS Constitution section **S9.04** and the rules of procedure to be adopted by the Synod Assembly. Briefly, this process may include:

- Nomination of candidates by written ecclesiastical ballot Three fourths of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election on this first ballot
- Three fourths of the legal votes cast on the second ballot shall be necessary for election.
- The third ballot shall be limited to the seven persons (plus ties) who received the greatest number of legal votes on the second ballot. Biographical information, as well as brief presentations will be provided by each candidate prior to the third ballot; two-thirds of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election.
- The fourth ballot shall be limited to the three persons (plus ties) who receive the greatest number of legal votes cast in the third ballot; opportunity shall be made for these three persons to interact with voting members in a forum setting, prior to the fourth ballot; sixty percent of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election.
- On subsequent ballots a majority of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election. These ballots shall be limited to the two persons (plus ties) who receive the greatest number of legal votes on the previous ballot.

### Who makes decisions about the bishop election process?

The Synod Nominating Committee administers the election process up to the election by the Synod Assembly (S70.40.41, S9.04.01-03). The Synod Assembly Election Committee is responsible for the preparation, distribution, collection and counting of ballots (S7.40.21). The synod Executive Committee determines when and where the Synod Assembly meets (S7.15).

### Who is eligible to be elected as bishop?

Any ordained pastor of the ELCA is eligible for election, regardless of whether that pastor is a member of this synod (see S8.11). This includes ordained pastors who have retired from ministry or who are on leave from call.

### How can I get answers for my questions and concerns?

Information on the transition and election of a new bishop will be distributed in synod publications, on the synod website ([www.uss-elca.org](http://www.uss-elca.org)), through mailings to congregations, bulletin inserts, at conference and synod meetings. Synod elected leaders and staff will try to make information available in a way that is accurate, helpful, and timely.

### Questions and concerns that require individual attention can be addressed to:

Bishop Main regarding personal schedules and future plans after February 18, 2007. Synod Vice-President, Michael Schrey, Executive Committee, and Synod Council members can answer questions regarding synod transition issues.

### Feeding the Soul of the City

I have thought many times about going on a mission trip to help others. Just recently, I was given a very unique opportunity. The students in the United Campus Ministry group at Penn College were going to Washington D.C. to work with the homeless. While we were serving dinner to them back in January, they were discussing the trip. I mentioned that it was a wonderful way for them to spend spring break and they would learn a lot from it. Heather Wagner, the coordinator said they were looking for another chaperone. God had very special plans in mind when we started a partnership with Penn College.



While we were in D.C., we stayed at the Pilgrimage, a part of the Church of the Pilgrims, whose mission it is to work with and serve the homeless. They coordinated and scheduled our jobs. We were sent to the D.C. Central Kitchen on our first day. This organization prepares and serves 4,500 meals everyday. They receive food donations from hotels, restaurants, Embassy dinners and anywhere else they can. We worked in the kitchen helping to get this massive amount of food ready. What impressed me the most was not only the organization of the kitchen, but also the friendliness of the staff who works with volunteers like us on a daily basis. Many people that worked there were formerly homeless themselves. The kitchen provided training for these people so they could get back on their feet, learn a skill and become productive members of society.

We also worked in the Food Bank, a massive 48,000 sq. ft. facility that took in the salvage from grocery stores in the area. You know what I mean by salvage; the ripped packages, dented cans and other products that grocery stores cannot sell. Our job was to clean, sort, and tape up the ripped boxes so they can be shipped to people who truly needed them. I was amazed at how much salvage there was and it made me think of all the food we waste everyday.

One part of our day was spent working with the Community Group Home that worked with the elderly. We were sent to scrape wallpaper and clean up a dear woman's house so that she could keep the home she had lived in for years.

We also had the chance to join about 400 people at a church to sit in on a WIN (Washington Interfaith Network) session with the mayor of D.C. Last year they had invited all the mayoral candidates to discuss their platforms on homelessness before the election. Mayor Fenty had come back to talk about what has been done for the homeless so far. This group raised funds and awareness of the massive homeless problem and not only demanded but got action from the city government. This just goes to show that what seems impossible for man is always possible with God.

The biggest lesson I learned was that we were there to serve, not help the homeless. In an article by Rachel Naomi Remen entitled "In the Service of Life" she said that serving is different from helping. Helping is based on inequality. People being "helped" feel their self-esteem being diminished as they are "helped". Helping incurs debt. When you help someone they feel they need to owe you something back. Serving is mutual. There is no debt. We are served as well as the people we are serving. We do not serve others with our own strength instead we serve from within ourselves with all the experiences that life has given us. Then there is a feeling of gratitude from this service.

What can we do as a congregation to serve those who need our help? What can you do as individual to serve? Joshua 24:15 states, Choose this day whom you will serve...but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord. When you serve others you serve the Lord and I am very thankful for my chance to serve the homeless in Washington D.C.

## Nurse's Notes

I guess that puts it into some perspective, doesn’t it?

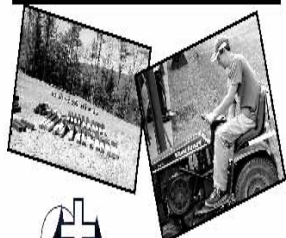

### AFRAID TO FLY? TRY A HOME MISSION TRIP!

*While the need for missions abroad is significant, the need is also very great here!*

*Probably many of you have overheard or been a part of conversations regarding mission trips to the southern United States to help those affected by Hurricane Katrina. The two articles that follow, from Jersey Shore and Bloomsburg, outline opportunities to help those in very real need.*

**Pr. Kerry Auker & Alice Fox of St. John Lutheran, Jersey Shore**, are coordinating a **Mission Trip to Biloxi, Mississippi**, June 25-29. They will be leaving Saturday, June 23, at 6:00 a.m., and staying overnight at Gloria Dei Lutheran Church in Knoxville, Tennessee. Groups will carpool as a group, but the individual cars are on their own to schedule their return. Pr. Auker's car is visiting NASA and the Saturn car manufacturing plant on the way back. Expenses for the travel days would be the responsibility of each individual, plus contributions toward fuel.

In Biloxi, volunteers will be staying in a dorm building or tent (air-conditioned) with beds. Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) has provided a trailer with showers. Initially the suggested cost was \$20/day or \$100/week for accommodations and meals. However, in recent conversation LDR has said that if people do not have the money, they are urged to come anyway, as the need to help Hurricane Katrina victims is still great and the number of volunteers has dropped off significantly.

Initially, the trip was opened to local congregations but response has been limited. St. John has planned several events to raise money to cover those from their church who are going. The next Mission Trip meeting is April 15 at noon.

On their last Mission Trip St. John's Church had about 30 go including three grandparents with their grandchildren and a mix of youth and adults. Children under 16 must be accompanied by a parent and have secured permission from LDR before leaving. If any youth or adults interested in going, contact Bernadette ASAP.

#### **The following is from Mike McCay, Ministries Coordinator at St. Luke's in Bloomsburg:**

"We are partnering with **Bethlehem Lutheran Church in New Orleans** to help rebuild/restore homes in their community. Our hosts can accommodate up to 40 persons. People of all ages are welcome. Skills are helpful but not necessary. We will be staying at the church facility. They have showers, air mattresses to sleep on, and a full kitchen/dining area. We will be responsible for most of our meals. You will need to bring your own linens. Youth are welcome. They must be accompanied by an adult. There are jobs for men and women, young and old. All persons going should have a current Tetanus vaccination.

Tools needed: Those you are comfortable using--especially needed: hammers, pry bars, gloves, face-masks (there will be lots of dust). Tools will be checked as part of our luggage. Each person is entitled to two, 50-pound bags, plus a carry-on bag. It will be hot and humid. Everyone should have hand-towels to contend with sweat. Water: you MUST drink lots to avoid heat exhaustion and dehydration. Cost of air travel to New Orleans is approximately \$ 250 / round-trip per person.

Bethlehem Lutheran Church is the ONLY African-American ELCA church in Louisiana. It is a neat concept that we share the same faith, same doctrine, same Lord, yet have such diverse cultural identity and customs. What a unique opportunity to encounter fellow believers who can help us experience different tradition and culture, yet have no difference in belief. What a blessing this will be! Interested? *The pastor of Bethlehem Church, Pastor Patrick Keen, will be visiting St. Luke's in Bloomsburg on Sunday, April 15. He will be their guest speaker for all three services, telling them about the realities of a city devastated by natural disaster, as well as the heroism of everyday people sharing Christianity through hands-on outreach.*

*Following services, there will be a covered-dish luncheon of fellowship and interaction with Pastor Keen. Visitors are welcome.*

They said they would like to repeat the experience and the younger kids indicated that it was something that they would look forward to doing when they get older. Great job everyone!!



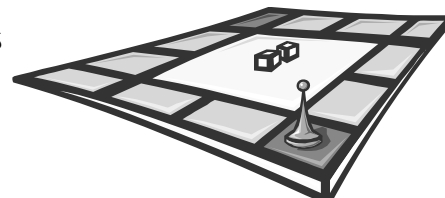
**Wow! It's hard to believe a group could sustain this level of enthusiasm—but we did!!!**

## HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

*"Then Peter came and said to him, 'Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?' Jesus said to him, 'Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.'" (Matthew 18:21-22; NRSV)*

Forgive ... such a small word, yet so hard to comprehend and to put into practice! Though it is changing, there is still relatively little research on the direct connection between forgiving and health – no direct evidence that proves once-and-for-all that holding a grudge leads to long-term health problems. There is however, a great deal of scientific evidence that **does** exist on the health affects of depression, anxiety, and anger – by-products of the hurt and betrayal felt when someone has wronged us – increased blood pressure, increase in heart rate, the release of hormones that trigger out fight-or-flight reactions, headache, stomach problems, sleeplessness – all occurring whenever we allow the painful episode to re-wind and replay over and over in our minds.

We compound these effects whenever we allow the 'things we wish we'd said' to roll across our tongues as we smack our lips at the thought of retribution. The result is that we begin to stew in our own juices. Archbishop Desmond Tutu has been credited as saying that forgiveness is the highest form of self-interest, "I need to forgive so that my anger, resentment, and lust for revenge can't corrode my being." Rev. Dr. Lewis Smedes once said, "Forgiving is the only way to be fair to yourself – without it you give the person who wronged you, the power to continue hurting you in your memory – forgiveness is about helping yourself get free of unfair pain." Forgiveness, as well as its opposites, resentment and revenge, all begin the same way – **with a decision**.

Lest we confuse the two, let's begin by saying that forgiveness **does not** mean forgetting! It does not sanction or justify the actions of the one who has deeply wounded us, and does not release the other person from responsibility - or in some cases, even legal punishment. Those who forgive are not fools – it doesn't mean that the relationship can or even should, go back to the same as prior to the incident. Instead, forgiveness empowers **us** to take responsibility for our own future happiness. The process may not be easy, and likely will not adhere to a set time-table - we may even find we need to work and re-work our way through it. In some cases, forgiving can be extremely difficult, so it may be wise to find someone trained to assist in the process – someone we trust, such as our pastor or a therapist.

The important point is that we don't have to wait for the other party to say they are sorry – we could have a rather long wait - one that leaves **us** stuck with the pain. Instead, with God's grace, working through the process of forgiving empowers us to become the ones who determine when the healing begins; that typically means allowing ourselves to feel the full impact of the pain incurred. Trying to forget and push the resulting emotions out of our awareness, only leads to repressed feelings that can later manifest themselves in other emotional or physical ways (for example, chronic headaches, depression, ulcers or in some extremes, substance abuse).

The bottom line is this; recognizing the fact that we can forgive the person without forgiving his/her actions, takes away that individual's power over us, and in the process allows us to no longer be held captive to the role of being a victim. Worship offers us several opportunities to reflect on forgiveness – during confession, through the creeds, during the Eucharist, and within the Lord's prayer. Through prayer, scripture, and openness to the Spirit, God reminds us that He is there to journey with us to healing and release from the pain that has made us captive. Take the first step in the journey today, by arranging to speak to someone you trust!

***May the peace and blessings of the risen Christ remain with you now and always!***
