Hospitality & Homelessness

The April Council meeting began with a 6-minute video of the events of Genesis 18:1-15. Abraham is resting in the shade of his tent during the heat of the day when three strangers appear. Hospitality is offered to them without question. Food, drink, conversation, and shelter are are prepared and given, until the visitors are ready to go on their way again. It was an obligation to do this; in that harsh climate, people have to depend upon others for survival. In addition, Abraham receives a great blessing in the course of the conversation.

Have things really changed that much? We are actually even more inter-dependent than we were generations ago. None of us can manage life in our complex society all alone. Disasters come upon us suddenly, our bank accounts can be quickly drained, and even more importantly, our spirits can be sapped by the crisis. We need help from each other!

It has been discovered that one of the pressing local needs is for emergency shelter for families that are in such a crisis. A few single men may be able to stay at the American rescue Workers facility. Some women may be sheltered at the YWCA. But what about families that do not have a home because of a job loss or a catastrophic illness that has struck? There is no place in the area for them to go to keep the family together and to work together toward solutions. Several of our members who work in social service jobs see the need for a local response to this problem.

Congregations in the area are beginning to investigate the problem and some possible solutions. The Shepherd of the Streets often hears from the family at the beginning of the crisis and may offer the first assistance. The apartments that are being renovated by New Covenant UCC will be available for families that are well on the way to renewed self-

sufficiency with a potential Habitat house or some other arrangement. It is those in-between that are most in need. Fifty or more persons on a given night are without a home in the Williamsport area. At least some of those are families including children. Do we want to think that children are having to sleep in cars, move every few days from one place to another, or be in even less savory surroundings?

Can we do something toward handling this problem? The Council has been considering whether we can be one of the host congregations for the program called *Family Promise*. Thirteen or more congregations are needed to each offer food and shelter for several families for one week each quarter of the year. We have a marvelous building; we do have room! We are in a great location, close to transportation and civic services. We have persons who can offer a meal or companionship. The question that the Council is considering is whether we have the will to undertake a portion of this project.

A half-dozen individuals from St. Mark's have been attending the initial organizing meetings of *Family Promise* that have been held over the past three months. There are many questions to be asked and answered. There are many persons and resources that have to be located and enlisted. Slowly we will keep working until the "critical mass" is achieved and the project can begin.

The Council invites members of the congregation to gather on Sunday, May 20 or Sunday, June 10 at 9:00 A.M. in the Crossways room to gather basic information about the proposed project. If many of us each do a little bit, we can together make a large impact on this problem. Come and find out how!

We were recently visited by a dental team from the States, led by Dr Bob Zimmerman and which included Carl Heiber who has now visited us twice and been such a delight to us. The team was a tremendous blessing of help to our local community, which is a cluster of muslim, rural villages outside of the city of Tanga where life is tough and folk are very poor. Their visits have

been a witness to the love of God and the way in which His people are willing to give of themselves.

It was particularly poignant this year as there has been significant opposition to us as our Christian witness in the area has become more overt and there are those who would like us to be gone. Carl brought with him a load of writing pads and pencils which we are told come via yourself. Please accept our thanks for these gifts which we have been able to pass out, especially to village leaders and teachers who struggle even for small items like those.

We are trying to give our very small emerging Christian community a sense of being part of the world-wide church family and so visits like that of the dental team help to develop that understanding. We thank God so much for the servant-hood of those who give up their time and money to come and serve with us amongst the Digo People. We thank God too for those who supported the team in prayer, and perhaps in other ways too.

May the Lord bless you as you serve him in the States. We so love the Body of Christ and thank God for His wisdom in giving us different jobs to do in different needy places, all for His glory.

Hello from near Tanga, Tanzania! I hope that you and your family are doing well.



Nurse's Notes

- May 6 Turtles and other reptile "pets" can pose a health risk especially to infants, children, preg nant women and people with compromised immune systems as they may serve as natural "hosts" to the bacteria Salmonella. Infection can lead to severe illness and in some cases, death. Through hand washing, including cleaning under fingernails is necessary after han dling these reptiles, their water bowls, or their cages! GI symptoms usually appear 12-36 hours, but can begin anywhere from 6-72 hours after exposure.
- May 13 In addition to celebrating "Mother's Day", celebrate "Women's Day" by acknowledging and thanking all the women who have played an important role in making you who you are today the sisters, aunts, teachers, & Sunday School teachers!
- **May 20 FYI for golfers:** By walking the golf course, and carrying your own bag, you can get a rea sonably good workout. Playing an 18-hole course can cover about 5 miles and help you burn an estimated 500 calories! (Wellness Made Easy, UC Berkley, 2005)
- May 27 For those taking up biking or planning to buy a bike for a child, here are some tips to insure proper 'fit'. Handlebars, saddle, and wheels can all be adjusted to match your size and rid ing ability, but the frame has to fit from the start. According to the folks at UC Berkley, to find the proper frame size, straddle the bike and stand flat-footed: on a regular bike, there should be 1-2 inches of clearance between your groin and the top tube. On a mountain bike, it should be 3 inches or more. (Wellness Made Easy, UC Berkley, 2005)

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"My eyes are ever toward the Lord, for he will pluck my feet out of the net. Turn to me and be gracious to me, for I am lonely and afflicted. Reliever the troubles of my heart, and bring me out of my distress. Consider my afflictions and my trouble..." (Ps. 25:15-18a – NRSV)

This is only one example of a prayer of lamentation – its author wounded and in search of help from God for his troubles – feels "lonely and afflicted". These same words could easily describe a form of illness that an estimated 6 million men suffer from – depression. According to statistics from the CDC, National Institute of Mental Health, Mayo, and Cleveland Clinics, this is approximately half the rate of depression among women. But many researchers question if these statistics are indeed accurate, or are they only the tip of an iceberg? Why? First, men are less likely to discuss the way they are feeling, and second, due to the fact that some of their symptoms may not be "typical" (crying, sadness, loss of interest in past enjoyable activities) – a man's depression may be overlooked or even misdiagnosed. These men, and the people who love them, are the target of this month's article. That said, before you read any further, I'd like to share a quote from the National Institute of Mental Health, "Depression is a serious but treatable medical condition – a brain disease – that can strike anyone, including men" (http://menanddepression.nimh.nih.gov)! Depression is not a character flaw, nor a sign of weakness, but a treatable disease!

According to the Cleveland Clinic (www.clevelandclinic.org/health), "some mental health care professionals suggest that if the symptoms of depression were expanded to include anger, blame, lashing out, and abuse of alcohol, more men might be diagnosed with depression and treated appropriately." Untreated, the root-cause of the symptoms soon spills over into personal relationships, workplace performance, and even physical health.

When they do visit their healthcare professional, men with depression are more likely to focus on physical complaints, such as: headaches, digestive problems, chronic pain, feeling tired, irritable, having trouble sleeping, leading to delay in treatment or misdiagnosis. Other indicators may include: family history, anger and frustration, losing weight without trying, risk-taking behaviors, inability to concentrate, isolation from loved ones, alcohol or substance abuse or thoughts of suicide. Being honest with the family health-care provider is the first step toward effective treatment. Accurate reporting will help the provider rule out other potential causes of the symptoms such as: viral infection, side affect of medication, thyroid disorder, low testosterone levels, or the presence of heart disease or stroke. Once these sources have been eliminated, the next step would logically be depression screening by the physician or a behavioral health professional. The folks at the Cleveland Clinic estimate that "more than 80% of people with depression – both men and women – can be treated successfully with antidepressant medication, psychotherapy or a combination of both". With treatment, negative feelings and beliefs should begin to fade, and allow you to reclaim your life once again!

If this sounds like you, or someone you love, and you are unsure of where to go for help, talk to someone you trust for example, a doctor, your parish nurse, a social worker, or religious leader. Ask his/her advice on how to seek treatment, and with the aid of the Holy Spirit, may your prayers of supplication become those of thanksgiving, "I will extol you, O Lord, for you have drawn me up ...I cried to you for help, and you have healed me" (Ps. 30:2-3, NRSV).


