CONTINUING ON THE WAY

How are we shaped as members of the church of Jesus Christ? The best way we can formed is in an apprenticeship process; we learn best by talking with, studying with, working with an experienced Christian. That is the essence of the process at St. Mark's that we call *The Way*.

Now preparing to start its eighth year, *The Way* is how persons can investigate the things that really matter in a thoughtful, intense, but gentle way. Persons in *The Way* process are regular in worship, involve themselves in some aspect of Christian Education, and meet together frequently to talk out the things that we are experiencing with a mentor and a small group.

The numbers were recently added up and it was discovered that 59 current members have been involved as a candidate or mentor (or both), and in addition 15 persons who have since moved on to other congregations have also benefited from the process. It must be clear that this is having a profoundly positive effect on the congregation, as persons discover that questions about the faith are welcome and expected, and that *The Way* is an excellent place to work on some answers to the big questions of life and faith.

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DID YOU KNOW?

An ELCA periodical *Seeds for the Parish* reports that a researcher, Thom Rainer has discovered some important things. After interviewing thousands of persons, he found that:

- Most unchurched persons prefer to attend church on Sunday morning if they were to attend.
- Most persons are not anti-church or anti-religion.
- Most Americans have never been invited to church ever!
- 82 percent of the unchurched are at least "somewhat likely" to attend church if they are invited.
- 2 percent of church members have ever invited an unchurched person to church.

Help Needed for Unborn Twins!

A local family in need has contacted St. Mark's for help. The mother is pregnant with twins and is at high risk for pre-term labor. She has been put on bed rest for the duration of the pregnancy with a due date in October although most sets of twins are born prematurely. The family is requesting help for the babies.



Donations of disposable diapers in sizes from newborn to bigger sizes and baby wipes are being accepted. Monetary donations will also be accepted. Checks can be made payable to St. Mark's. These funds will be used to assist the family with transportation in the event the babies are born at Geisinger Medical Center or for other needs of the babies.

Family Promise Looks Promising

The Family Promise steering committee is happy to report that other congregations are preparing to join us as potential host congre-gations in the Family Promise network of hospitality for homeless families in our com-munity. St. Mark's has been joined by Lyco-ming Center Presbyterian Church as the first two host congregations. Another congregation is on the verge of action, and several others are looking toward action in September. More than a dozen congregations have sent repre-sentatives to one or more of the steering committee meetings. We have prepared a group of persons to visit 45 pastors and share information around the community during August. The network is growing slowly.

Catechetical Camp Concludes

Catechetical Camp was held on July 16-18, a very busy 3 days. There are two more events that the Pastor will be doing with our five students.

The students will be working on a short written project in the next several weeks, and also pairs of students will spend a day with the pastor to get some idea of some things that go on in the parish at times in addition to Sunday mornings.



New Windsor Time

Curiosity, learning, service, fellowship, adventure, fun, and food all

wrapped up in a single day in the company of Christians from all around north central PA. How can anyone resist? Come along on the trip to the New Windsor Service Center in Maryland on Monday, September 10 and discover all sorts of things.

Where do the school kits, soap, quilts, etc. go that we gather over the year? How do things get prepared for shipment to places where they are needed all around the world? How can I help disadvantaged craft workers to make a living wage in their own lands? All these questions and many more can be answered by joining this day-trip.

We leave by car-pool from St. Mark's parking lot at 6:10 A.M. and meet the bus at Shamokin Dam. After several hours of activity at the Service Center, we enjoy lunch in the cafeteria there. First-time travelers can then have a guided tour of the entire facility, and we offer a bit more service-time. Then we start for home, usually stopping just for fun at a famous garden center along the way, and also for supper at Old Country Buffet in Mechanicsburg. We arrive home about 8:43 P.M.

You've been hearing about this for years. Make this the time to see for yourself. The cost for the bus and lunch is \$29, with a check payable to Christ United Lutheran Church. Give it to the pastor, who will forward it on to the trip organizers. Don't wait; sign up now.

Nurse's Notes

August 5 3 Warning Signs of Stroke

- 1) **Crooked smile** have person smile or show his/her teeth. If one side doesn't move as well as the other, or seems to droop, that could be one sign.
- 2) **Arm drift** have the individual close his/her eyes and ask them to hold their arms out in front for about 10 seconds. If one arm does not move, or one arm begins drifting down more than the other, this may be a second sign.
- 3) **Slurred speech** Have him/her say, "You can't teach an old dog new tricks," or, some other simple, familiar saying. If the person slurs the words, get some words wrong, or is unable to speak, that is a third sign of a possible stroke.

See that the individual receives help as soon as possible – time is vital in survival and in lessening a stroke's effects.

August 12 Health & Safety for Gardeners

- Protect your hearing when using machinery. If you have to raise your voice to talk to someone who is an arm's length away, the noise can potentially harm your hearing.
- Drink plenty of water throughout the day to replace lost fluids. Don't wait until you are thirsty to drink.
- Pay attention to signs of heat-related illness: extremely high body temp, headache, rapid pulse, dizziness, nausea, confusion.

August 19 Do you use the computer a great deal? Check yourself of proper hand positioning when using your keyboard. Keep your wrists in as neutral a position as possible – not flexed downward or extended upward. To check, place your wrist, palm down, or a flat, hard surface. Place a Band-Aid lengthwise over the top of your wrist, and then move to your keyboard and type. If the Band-Aid stretches or goes slack, your wrists aren't in a neutral position. (*Aching Hands: Strategies for Strong, Pain-free Hands*, Harvard Healthbeat Supplement, February 2007)

August 26 Choosing a Mental Health Provider. As much as we would like it not to be, today's reality means that your health insurance coverage may dictate which types of mental health providers you may use. Your insurance company, Medicare or Medicaid can tell you what types of mental health providers they cover and what your benefit limits may be. Additional factors include:

- The severity of your symptoms in general, the more severe the symptoms, the more expertise and training to look for in a provider.
- The type of problem Ex. parenting problems are best handled by family therapists; relationship issues by trained marriage or family therapists.
- Whether or not medication is needed. Psychiatrists are trained in prescribing medication for behavioral health needs.
- If you are unsure of how to go about setting up an appointment, speak to your doctor, your pastor, or your parish nurse for advice in locating services that are a good fit for you.

Liberia

Right after synod assembly Bishop Main and Dr. Bob Bradford with their wives left for a visit of our companion synod, the Lutheran Church in Liberia. They visited congregations and schools along the road from Monrovia to Konia, Lofa County. The group stopped at the Lay Ministry Training Center in Totota, where Pastor Shellhamer is going to teach, at Phebe Hospital near Gbanga, and at the Lutheran Training Institute near Salayae. Under the leadership of Esther Thomas 233 students, mostly ex-child soldiers (There are estimated to be about 20.000.) now in their late teens and early twenties, learn sustaining agricultural livelihood. Much progress appeared to be made in Curran Lutheran Hospital that is now completely roofed, has the beds from Lewistown, PA and a staff of Liberian physicians. The ELCA is working on hiring a surgeon.

The group noticed road improvements done by the Chinese, and saw re-roofed churches, and a lot of Lutheran Schools already finished and furnished with Upper Susquehanna desks and others still in the process of being

COMMUNITY SERVICE, A THANK YOU, AND A GREAT TIME

As many of you may know—or just now are finding out—we are working very hard to move St. Mark's into the 21st century by developing a video outreach; website, blog and e-mail communications; a postcard campaign to college students and new residents—the possibilities are endless.

Carlos Saldivia, executive producer of First Contact, has been consulting with us and helping us to develop these instruments to spread the word about God and our mission in His name. He is donating his time, resources and knowledge—some of you met him recently when he spent a day as a "fly on the wall" here at St. Mark's. Carlos and crew have been working extensively in the Williamsport area for 2-3 years now: filming commercials, pro bono, for the Williamsport Symphony Orchestra; assisting students with senior projects, and, among myriad other things, filming the definitive documentary, Michael Pilato: Mural Canyon, about the Inspiration Lycoming Mural on West Fourth Street, across from the Community Arts Center.

The Williamsport-Lycoming Arts Council has taken the production of this enterprise under its wing as a not-for-profit organization. Last year, with one week's notice, we staffed the concession stand through borrowed time slots at the Little League World Series as a fundraiser for the documentary. With such short notice, everyone was very overworked, but extremely motivated, and enjoyed high morale.

This is a plea to anyone who can give four or more hours of their time to work the concession during the days noted below. There is a special need for during weekday "business hours." What follows are excerpts from a recent e-mail from Carlos, asking for aid:

"Based on our performance, we (Williamsport-Lycoming Arts Council) earned our own spot...we were the first ones called to pick the days we wanted for this year's LLWS. HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

In ancient times (Leviticus 13-15), the term leprosy was used to describe a number of skin infections – some of which were highly contagious. It was the responsibility of the priests to determine if the offending agent was serious enough to warrant quarantine outside the camp, and to determine, if and when, the individual was to be allowed back into the fold once again. Today, isolating someone with an infection is not a common occurrence – yet in the some difficult to treat cases, it may be utilized as a last resort.

Recently we've been made aware of a drug-resistant form of TB – one which does not respond to typical/normal treatment. The presence of new "super-infections" may, in some instances, be linked to our past over-reliance on antibiotic treatments for sore throats, ear infections, colds, etc., or in others, to not taking the entire amount of medication needed to completely eliminate the offending bacteria, thus encouraging mutation (**Note** – *Antibiotics* <u>must</u> be taken as directed by the prescribing physician – typically that involves enough medication for 10-14 days of treatment – hence a note on the bottle to warn the consumer to take <u>all</u> of the medication!). It is through our mis-use of this class of medications in humans and animals, that scientists are now seeing new strains of drug-resistant microbes.

Today, one of these "super-bugs" is methicillin-resistant staphylococcus aureus - more commonly knows as MRSA. For the past two decades, MRSA was most commonly found in hospitals and long-term care settings. Today it has begun to show up in the wider community as CA-MRSA. Staph bacteria are normally found on the skin and in the nose of approximately one-third of the general population, typically causing no symptoms. Active infection occurs when the bacteria enters a cut or minor abrasion of the skin. It often manifests itself as small red bumps that resemble pimples, boils or spider bites, which quickly become deep painful abscesses. It is this deeper infection which poses a hazard to the very young, the very old, or those who have weakened immune systems.

In recent years, a few cases of CA-MRSA have been linked to locker-rooms, gyms, and crowded living conditions, since its mode of transmission is through cuts, abrasions and skin-to-skin contact. In Pennsylvania, it has been linked to the death of at least one college-aged athlete. Athletes are at heightened risk through cuts and scrapes, but also through the sharing of razors, towels, uniforms or sport equipment contaminated with the bacteria.

How can you protect yourself? By using a few common-sense precautions:

- **Frequent and thorough hand washing** your own, and of those who care for you at home, in the hospital, or in other long-term care settings.
- **Insist that professionals wear gloves** when providing wound care or working with catheters, IVs, feeding tubes or other invasive devices!
- **Keep personal items personal** no sharing of towels, razors, clothing and athletic equipment.
- **Keep cuts and wounds** clean and covered with dry, sterile bandages.
- · Wipe surfaces of sport equipment before and after use.
- Use a towel or clothing between your skin and shared seating areas in locker rooms.
- **Sanitize linens and gym/athletic clothes** if you or a loved one have a skin infection, wash towels, washcloths, and sheets in hot water; adding bleach if possible. Whenever possible, wash gym/athletic clothes in hot water as well.
- **Keep a watchful eye** on minor cuts and scrapes, pimples, insect bites or skin irritations particularly on children or the elderly.
- **Tell your healthcare provider** if you have or had a staph or MRSA skin infection.
- And finally, if you are diagnosed with any infection, take medication as prescribed!

Dear friends at St. Mark's Lutheran Church,

PVS General Secretary Eric Corson has informed me that you have made a donation of \$37.50 to Prisoner Visitation and Support (PVS.) I'd like to thank you and to share my perspective on prison visiting.

When I began visiting at the Federal Correctional Institution in Danbury, Connecticut, in February 1979 the U.S. was third in the world in numbers of incarcerated prisoners behind Russia and South Africa. Today our country is first in the world in the number of its citizens it incarcerates and it has 116 federal prisons and hundreds of state and county prisons.

The prisoners I visit, today, at FCI Danbury are women. Many of the women are in prison because their make partners sold drugs and the women just happened to be too close. Most of their sentences are for eight years or more—eight years when their children are in their formative years, growing up without either parent on the scene. When the women are arrested, they must hastily arrange for the care of their children by someone from their family or friends who can take them in.

These women need friends—not connected with the prison—with whom they can share what is in their hearts. That is what PVS does. We provide a friend for a heartsick prisoner to talk with.

Thank you for your generous donation to help PVS find additional volunteer visitors and to support them with the proper training to do their visiting. One of our visitors says in the PVS video, "Prisoners and prisons are not very popular", yet, we are challenged by our faith to visit the prisoners. You by your contribution make this possible. Again thank you.
