Why should I use any of my time in our work together in St. Mark's congregation?

Part of that serving involves encouraging each other to discover how we can better use all of our resources: time, abilities, possessions, and finances. The most visible way we do that each year is our process called *Consecration Sunday*. The Council has set the date of Sunday, October 21 for this event this year. Our guest on that day will be The Rev. Gordon Smith, Pastor of St. John Lutheran Church in Bloomsburg PA, a strong and encouraging speaker who will lead us in opening our hearts and minds to the Word of God. We will all have an opportunity to prayerfully offer our estimate of financial giving cards for the coming year at the end of the service, and then to move to a catered celebration brunch in the Fellowship Hall following the 8:00 service, and a celebration lunch following the 10:30 service. At the conclusion of each meal, the total of estimates presented at the services will be announced.

Look and listen carefully to the announcements that will be made in the coming weeks, and set aside the date of October 21 for these important events.

September 2

It is state fair time! You would need to walk one mile (12 city blocks) to burn 100 calories. Here is the distance you would need to walk to "burn off" your favorite midway foods:

- * Carmel Apple - 3 miles * Funnel cake (6") - 3 miles
 - * Large corn dog - 4.5 miles * Soft drink (32 oz.) - 2.5 miles
 - * Cotton Candy - 1.5 miles * Sno-cone - 2.5 miles
 - * Soft pretzel - 3 miles * Fried candy bar on stick - 3 miles

September 9 Better-for-you Recipe Substitutions

Substitute half of butter/margarine with applesauce, mashed banana or prune puree

For one egg, substitute 2 egg whites or ¼ egg substitute

Instead of fruit-flavored yogurt, substitute plain yogurt and fresh fruit

For dried bread crumbs, substitute rolled oats or crushed bran cereal

A common side effect to some psychiatric medications is dry mouth. Listed are a few simple remedies:

- © Take frequent sips of water throughout the day
- © Avoid coffee, tea, sodas, alcohol - all increase frequency of urination and cause further dehydration
- © Keep water by your bed to sip during the night
- © Drink water with meals
- © Use sugar-free candy or chewing gum to increase moisture
- © Consider using a humidifier at night when heat is on in your home

If symptoms continue, tell your doctor. Dry mouth can increase your risk of cavities, so pay attention to good oral hygiene.

September 23 10 Great Health Foods

1. **Apples** - loaded with soluble fiber that helps lower cholesterol, and a great source of Vitamin C
2. **Almonds** - packed with nutrients, fiber, iron and calcium and protein
3. **Blueberries** - rich source of phytonutrients to help prevent urinary tract infections; also thought to improve memory
4. **Broccoli** - good source of calcium, potassium, folate (iron) and fiber
5. **Red beans** - good source of iron; low-fat and low calorie protein and fiber source
6. **Salmon** - heart healthy source of Omega-3 fatty acids; good source of protein
7. **Spinach** - high in Vitamins A & C, as well as iron, calcium and iron
8. **Sweet potatoes** - high in beta carotene; may slow the aging process and reduce the risk for certain types of cancer; low in calories - one small = 54 calories
9. **Vegetable juice** - great source of lycopene, which may reduce risk of heart attack and prostate cancer
10. **Wheat germ** - highly concentrated source of niacin, thiamin, riboflavin, Vitamin E and several minerals.



A Message from Bishop-Elect Robert Driesen

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As I prepare to become the second bishop of the Upper Susquehanna Synod, I urge you to pray for me and all those affected by the transition we undertake. While I continue to seek the counsel of many, I share with you my understanding of my new role, and my initial, tentative thoughts regarding my vision for the mission we share.

A bishop, like all pastors, is to represent Christ to the church, just as all the baptized are to be the image of Christ both within the church and to the world. Preaching, presiding at the altar, and teaching are, first and foremost, the ministry of the bishop. Like pastors in the local community, the bishop presides over the sacraments, preaches the Gospel, absolves sin, and provides oversight; but in the bishop's case this is oversight over a larger jurisdiction, the synod. This oversight consists in seeing that all the baptized—ordained, commissioned, consecrated, laity—are, indeed, images of the Christ they incarnate, that the Word they proclaim and the sacraments they administer are Christ. To this end, it is the bishop who ordains new pastors, who listens to them, counsels them, and, when appropriate, defends them and/or disciplines them.

Pastor to Pastors

Pastors and their families need a pastor. The bishop is called to be that pastor, to comfort them at times of sorrow, to rejoice with them during times of gladness, to challenge them when complacent, to join with them in the mission we share. I hope to elicit the help of our conference deans and all of you in keeping me informed of the joys and concerns of our pastors. Surely, next to preaching, presidency, and teaching, the care of pastors and congregations is my priority. I realize, of course, that the demands of my office may overwhelm and prevent the attention I seek to provide to all my various responsibilities; but, if our new structure is fully implemented, I can assure you that one of my assistants will share the responsibility for caring for our rostered leaders, and the other will assist in the care of congregations.

Congregations need a chief pastor, a bishop, who constantly reminds them that while the church resides in their local communities, the church also transcends their local communities. We confess one, holy, catholic, and apostolic church, not a multitude of independent churches focused solely upon parochial concerns. Together, we will be about what the church is doing in the world: the hungry will be fed, the lonely will be visited, justice will be sought for and with the poor, the sick will be healed, the homeless housed, the spiritually hungry will be comforted.

Great Treasure

We live in a beautiful region of the Commonwealth with majestic mountains, clean streams and rivers, quality education, arts and culture, and an abundance of recreational opportunities. In short, we share an exceptional quality of life! Whether it is the Little League World Series in South Williamsport, Buggy Days in Mifflinburg, the McClure Bean Soup Festival, or Wellsboro's Mountain Laurel Days, our roots are deep and our commitments to family are strong. Nonetheless, we also know the heartbreak of broken-

ness. Too many of our children leave the area to find jobs elsewhere, especially those who are college-educated. Our industrial resources have either left or are in decline. The retired seek a more comfortable life either as "snow birds" or permanent residents in the South. I assure you, however, that this is neither a cause for pessimism nor explanations available to provide us with excuses for our struggles. The Gospel is the gift of God's Spirit addressed to us—our hopes and our fears. We have inherited a great treasure but one that is living and continually confronts us with the need to address the reality in which we find ourselves.

The most important quality of a bishop in the 21st century, therefore, is to be mission-driven. Ninety-five percent of membership in America comes from parishioners transferring from one congregation to another. We need leaders that will spend more time teaching pastors and all the baptized to become more concerned about people who are lost or last, and people who aren't in a relationship with Jesus.

Reaching Out

The Upper Susquehanna Synod has lost a significant number of members. The question is not only why—because the answer to that question may do nothing more than provide us with useful excuses—but also what should we be doing to reach the significant number of people in our communities who have never known Christ or who are members of the church but who no longer know what it means to be Christian and who have little understanding of the Gospel or the commitment required by the baptized life.

The church faces a potential leadership crisis in the retirement of a significant number of its current pastors within the next ten years. The bishop, pastors, and all the baptized, can play an important role in challenging capable persons to discern the possibility of a call to leadership within the church. Youth ministry needs to focus on creating leaders for not only the world but also the church. Our camps, campus ministries, and congregations need to identify persons for the ministry and to provide children and young people with the opportunity to serve as leaders in all areas of the church's life—from Synod Council and committees to congregational ministry, including greater roles in worship.

It is essential for the congregations of this synod to sense their connection to the whole church. Two-way communication is essential. Regular, timely communication from the synod regarding educational and ministry opportunities needs to be improved. The bishop needs to focus on the need to connect with congregations and to listen to their concerns as we shape the ministry of the synod. The new synodical structure would be an important step in this direction. With assistants to the bishop regularly attending conference meetings, the bishop, through them, should be able to both be in more regular contact with the synod's leadership and to hear their suggestions and concerns. It is equally important for those assistants, however, as well as the bishop, to make regular Sunday visits to congregations, to preach, preside and teach, and to develop collegial relations with the members of our congregations.

An Invitation

Join me in the months ahead, as together we move forward as the Upper Susquehanna Synod. God has gifted us with capable leaders, a devoted laity, and willing volunteers. I need all of you, as we continue to dream together, forming our vision of the Upper Susquehanna Synod's mission.

Our Missionary in Liberia

Pr. Ronald Shellhamer is in the process of beginning a two-year commitment as an ELCA missionary to Liberia.

He will have multiple tasks and responsibilities in the role, living in Totota, a two-hour drive into Liberia's interior from the capital of Monrovia. He will serve as a teacher at the newly-established Lutheran Center for Biblical Studies and has been asked to commit one or two days each week at the Gbarnga (pronounced Bong-ga) School of Theology, another two-hour drive from Totota. This latter is an ecumenical seminary and institution for religious studies.

At both schools Shellhamer will teach Old and New Testament, Lutheran Systematic Theology, and Lutheran Liturgy and Worship Practices. He will also travel to remote places and isolated villages from time to time to provide instruction for congregational members and to interact with people at worship and other special times.

His interest began when he visited the country as a short-term missionary in January-February 2002. Shellhamer will return to America for a one-month vacation in 2008 and for three months in 2009. The position can be renewed for another two years at that point, pending personal input and agreement between the ELCA and the Lutheran Church in Liberia.

Liberia endured 14 years of civil conflict, ending in 2003. The Upper Susquehanna Synod is in a companion synod relationship with the Lutheran Church in Liberia.

Up and Down the Valleys

+ **Christ, Milton.**, voted to issue a regular call to Pr. Pat Pittsnogle. She had been serving the congregation under a two-year term call.

+ **Good Shepherd, Berwick**, recently received twenty new members in two separate new member classes. **John Koons** is pastor.

+ **Aaron Werner** will serve **St. James, Rauchtown**, as intern for the coming year. Aaron is a student at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota.

+ **Pr. James P. Bricker** retired from **Trinity, McAlisterville**. The congregation held a thank-you brunch for Pr. Bricker and his wife **June** on July 29. June Bricker had served as organist.

+ **Grace, Berwick**, voted to use a bequest received for "capital improvements" to relocate to a new site. The congregation had four options from which to choose. An offer to donate 6 acres of land for the new site was accepted. Permits and other legalities need to be completed.

+ **Christ's United, Millmont** ("Four Bells") extended a call to **John Yost** to serve as pastor. He began August 1.

+ **Maurice "Chip" Frontz** was honored by **Messiah, S. Williamsport**, for five years of service as associate pastor. Musicians Candace Watkins and Carol Waltz wrote a song in his honor.

+ **Lynette Reitz**, member of **St. John's, Watsontown** (Delaware Run) and member of the ELCA Church Council, was promoted to full professor of sociology, anthropology, social work, and geography at Lock Haven University. Lynette is the daughter of Ruth and the late Pr. George Doran.

+ Forty people (35 from **St. Luke, Bloomsburg**) traveled to New Orleans in June to contribute to the cleanup and rebuilding effort there.

+ **Zion, Renovo**, has entered into a joint ministry with Trinity Episcopal Church. **Deacon Dee Calhoun** is serving both congregations. She will be ordained this fall.

Liberia Update

Bp. Main and Dr. Robert Bradford with their wives visited the Lutheran Church in Liberia, including a stop at Totota where Pr. Shellhamer will be teaching.

Under the leadership of Esther Thomas, 233 students, mostly ex-child soldiers, are studying at the Lutheran Training Institute near Salayae. Curran Hospital is completely under roof and has the beds donated by Diakon Lutheran Social Ministries from Ohesson Manor in Lewistown, plus a staff of Liberian physicians. The ELCA is working on hiring a surgeon.

The group saw road improvements, re-roofed churches, and Lutheran schools furnished with desks from the Upper Susquehanna Synod. People are grateful that the war has ended and are working to rebuild their country.

A View from the Pew

Lots of news from one of St. Mark's first families of music- Jeff Thayer, son of Fred and Pat , married Julie Fagan on the 9th of June. Jeff and Julie met at the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara, California. Julie is a French horn player who plans to take graduate work at Rice University in Houston, Texas, in the Fall. Jeff is concertmaster of the San Diego Symphony Orchestra.

Marc Thayer, vice-president of education and community partnerships at the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra, spent two weeks in Iraq this summer. His trip was sponsored by American Voices, a cultural organization that provides quality artistic experiences for artists and audiences in parts of the world newly opened to those experiences. Additionally, he worked with three orchestras.

He was part of a group of ten musicians who went to Erbil, Iraq which is in the northern part of the country and he was sent to work with string and chamber musicians, introducing the Suzuki method and giving both group and individual lessons.

His blog, which is fascinating to read, describes the weather, very hot and dry, 110-120 degrees; the food, quite good; and most importantly his interaction with the people.

Erbil is a Kurdish area and more secure than other places in Iraq and the orchestras he worked with were very eager to learn, very receptive to the training they received and "incredibly polite, courteous and patient". There were others there from Baghdad and Suleimanya who spoke other dialects so translation was a real challenge.

The group took instruments, parts and music with them as those things are hard to come by there. He talks of security, of bomb-sniffing dogs, sharpshooters and the like. But speaks of the people as the most sincere, honest and reliable group that he has known. Their manner he describes as "gentle appreciation for what Marc's group was doing mixed with frustration for what they don't have."

It is impossible to sum up all of his observations in these short paragraphs - I am going to put his blog on the bulletin board in Fellowship Hall and I would recommend it to all of you. It was inspirational to read of the efforts of this group to help the Iraqi people in a most unique way.

Other good news: Marc Kinney, son of Jackie and Mike, was invited to spend a week at Pennsylvania Free Enterprise Week at Lycoming College. He applied and was recommended by his accounting teacher. 1800 out of 3000 applications were accepted. Marc is a junior at Williamsport Area High School and hopes to study business management in college.

Several of our young people were off to college : Caitlin Butters, daughter of David and Carol, is off to East Stroudsburg; Jamie Larson, daughter of Ernie and Nancy, leaves for Bloomsburg University in August and Jeremiah Bittner, son of Scott and Brenda, is enrolled at Robert Morris in Pittsburgh. David Elkin is off to Duquesne for his final year of graduate school.

Rachel Clausen and her fiancé Joe Reiter leave in August for music teaching positions in Danville, Va. Both added their wonderful voices to the Senior Choir and we will miss them but wish them all the best. They are planning a December wedding at St. Mark's.

If there are other departing college students, please let me know and I will include them next time - also let me know if there is something else I should include! Till next time!

DID YOU KNOW?

An ELCA periodical *Seeds for the Parish* reports that a researcher, Thom Rainer has discovered some important things. After interviewing thousands of persons, he found that:

- Very few unchurched persons have had someone share with them how to become a Christian. And Christians have not been particularly influential in their lives.
- Many of the unchurched persons are far more concerned about the spiritual well-being of their children than of themselves.
- Most unchurched persons feel guilty about not attending church.
- **Only 2 percent of church members have ever invited an unchurched person to come to church with them.**

BACK to School

Tips for Parents & Grandparents



- Many students will head back to class this month. As you shop for school supplies, help your child choose additional supplies for needy children in your community. You can help little ones write a Christian note of encouragement to include with your donation.



- Take a few moments before school begins to type up several “Lunch Lines”—little notes you can tuck into your child’s lunch each day. Use the notes to encourage your child to live for Christ, share Jesus’ love, commit school work to the Lord, and so much more. Even nonreaders will appreciate simple sketches like a cross, heart, or the child’s name.
- Get a list of your child’s teachers and begin to pray for them. If you feel comfortable, ask the teachers what needs you might specifically lift up to the Lord on their behalf. Thank and praise God for the teachers who will guide your child this year.
- Begin a tradition this school year. On the first day of school, make a special breakfast or eat at a local restaurant to mark the special day. If mornings seem too hectic, plan a special after-the-first-day-of-school activity that the entire family can enjoy: miniature golf, backyard baseball, or dinner and an early movie. End the special time with a family prayer for the new school year.



- Many morning routines will change as school begins. Call a family meeting to discuss ways to make the mornings go smoothly. Need suggestions? Encourage children to choose school clothes the night before. Give each child his or her own alarm clock. Plan lunches ahead of time or purchase



HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

“My son shall not go with you, for his brother is dead, and he alone is left. If harm should come to him on the journey that you are to make, you would bring down my gray hairs with sorrow to Sheol.”
(Gen. 42:38)

Jacob of course, is unwilling to even think of allowing his youngest son to accompany his brothers back into Egypt; he had already lost two sons, so the idea of letting this one – Benjamin – go, terrified him! It's never easy letting go. For those of you who are feeling a little empty after depositing your child at the college/university of his/her choice, this article is for you.

Missing your child is normal, particularly if you and were used to spending a great deal of time together. Single parents, in particular, may find those first few weeks a bit distressing. However, separation from our parents is exactly what we raise our children to do, and is a vital part of becoming a mature, confident adult. Be proud of the fact that your child can be independent of you - you've raised him/her well! Linger with them too long, and you are in danger of becoming what is affectionately referred to on campus as a “helicopter parent” – one who hovers just a little too much!

Life is full of changes and transitions, and going off to school means that both parent and child will need to navigate role and boundary changes. Here are a few tips that may help you make the adjustment:

- ♥ Chances are that your child went to college accompanied by a cell phone with “the family plan.” Avoid the urge to call during those first few weeks. If he/she contacts you with a problem, avoid the desire to jump in, and solve the problem for them. Instead, suggest who they might contact on campus to help deal with the issue – RA, academic advisor, counseling service. Allow him/her to determine the rhythm of contact with home.
- ♥ Stay out of roommate, grade and friend disputes. If you rush to rescue, you risk your child having more difficulty taking responsibility and learning to manage conflicted situations.
- ♥ Use email. With this mode of communication, you can expect a fairly quick response, plus there are fewer parental negative undertones, and it allows both parties to reflect before responding.
- ♥ Prepare yourself for that first visit home – you both have changed. Try to negotiate home rules before this time arises – it'll be less stressful for both. In addition, be prepared for him/her sleeping late. The bed at home is likely to be much more comfortable than the one in the dorm!
- ♥ Do not hesitate to step in if your child has experienced a physical or emotional trauma, or if you begin to suspect depression or disturbing behaviors. Every kid needs to feel that they have someone “in their corner.”

Finally, congregations can show their support for teens by introducing them to campus ministry, or by acknowledging this milestone with a quilt or prayer shawl; by providing goodie boxes during mid-terms or finals; or by sending birthday cards, holiday greetings, and the congregation's newsletter. Parents, learn about the services your child's college has to offer, so when that inevitable phone call comes regarding a disappointing grade, a roommate squabble, or doubts about a major, you will see your child, not as in need of rescue, but as an adult who is growing into making competent choices!

Before You Sell

Are you thinking of cashing in some of your stocks or bonds? Do you have a vacant lot, a vacation home or some other piece of real estate you may sell soon? Whether securities or real estate, if you have owned the asset for more than a year and the value is higher than your cost, you may want to consider placing the property in a charitable trust.

The trustee of a charitable trust can sell appreciated assets without incurring tax on the capital gain. Then the entire proceeds, less selling costs, can be invested to provide a flow of income to you as an income beneficiary of the trust. At the end of the trust, normally upon the death of the income recipient(s), the principal will then be distributed to one or more charities.

If you sell your property yourself, a significant amount of the sale proceeds could be lost to taxes. With this trust, the full value (less selling costs) is invested to meet the goals of the trust. Think of the extra income this could mean to you during your lifetime.

Because the trust is irrevocable (you can't undo it) and the remainder eventually goes to charity, you receive an immediate income tax charitable deduction when you establish the trust. And, if you can't use all of the deduction the first year, the IRS allows you to carryover the unused deduction up to an additional five years.

The beautiful thing about a charitable remainder trust is that it allows you to make a deferred gift now to one or more ministries of the Church and yet retain a lifetime flow of income to help you through your retirement years. There are other benefits as well.
