A Second Archaeological Adventure

Pastor Elkin spent two weeks on an archaeological dig on the island of Menorca in the Mediterranean. The island is located about an hour flight southeast of Barcelona. It has one main two-lane road that crosses the island, connecting the largest town of about 30,000 people with the second largest town on the western end of about 20,000. There are several other villages and a number of coastal resorts scattered around the southern coast. The work groups had a residence in the western town and traveled by van about 45 minutes over some very winding, narrow roads to the northern central coastal area called Sanisera. In Roman times it was an important port which provided a safe ship anchorage from the fierce winter winds of up to 100 mph that blow down from France. The Romans first established a military camp there, and after about 100 years of use, dismantled it in 45 BC and moved just a bit further and built a town. The town was abandoned in the 6th century, and nothing has ever been built on the site since then. This is a unique situation. In every other port-town around the Mediterranean, there are modern cities on top of ancient ruins, making excavation impossible. Because of its windy location, and the silting of the harbor, later peoples used the other ports and didn't bother with this one. Fortunately for us, the ancient things are only under a few inches of overburden.

This is the final year for excavation in the military camp, and next year they will move over and work on the town. There should be a significant number of finds there. We were assigned the unglamorous but needed job of excavating the perimeter ditch and finding whatever odds and ends had been thrown in it before it was filled up. My crew found lots of broken pieces of pottery storage jars called amphorae, some bronze nails and spikes, some pieces of lead, and a small amount of animal bones.

We also had classes to begin to learn how to identify the origin of the pottery, to mark and catalogue the items that were to be kept, and to care for the site for the future. It was physically demanding work, but the 16 persons enjoyed working together. The directing archaeologist has been working here for 10 years, and several grad students were there for a second season. One of the fascinating things is meeting people from around the world. One man was an engineer who designed the tracking stations for the Apollo moon program. Another sold cancer-fighting drugs in California. One grad student was from Germany; another from Portugal. Others were from all across the US and Canada.

In addition to work for two weeks at the dig, Pastor also spent a few days with daughter Katy. They flew to the Spanish city of Granada and visited the Alhambra, the great Moorish palaces built during the 12th -- 15th centuries. They are architectural wonders yet today.

Pastor Elkin will present a program of photos and commentary on Wednesday evening, November 14 in Fellowship Hall at 7:00 P.M. All are invited to enjoy things about the dig and the other places that were visited during October.

Hunger Awareness in November

Action and advocacy regarding hunger and poverty in our community began with our annual CROP Walk on October 14, 2007 and will end with the Shepherd of the Streets Thanksgiving Basket Collection November 19th and 20th.

Plans are under way to provide Thanksgiving Baskets to 450 families in our community, but Dr. Smith expects the need may be greater this year. Each Thanksgiving Basket will have approximately 28 – 30 pounds of food for each family and will cost at least \$31.50.

Non-perishable items needed are canned juices and fruit, pasta, rice, cereal, Bisquick, cake mixes and frosting, pasta sauce, canned vegetables, canned soup, peanut butter, jelly, baby food, and formula. Money to purchase turkeys and other perishable foods is being accepted. Checks can be made payable to St. Mark's designated for Thanksgiving Baskets. 3. Self care is deteriorating, bathing, tooth brushing grooming become problems
4. Drastic mood changes; loss of interest in favorite activities
5. Having physical difficulty with walking, standing

Talk about your concerns, and help them come up with solutions to the problems. Speak to his/her doctor and close friends to compare concerns. Your local agency on aging can serve as a vital source in offering support services.

Bishop Driesen Announces Staff Appointments

Pastors Karl-John Stone and Beth Ann Stone will be serving as assistants to Bishop Robert L. Driesen, and Mrs. Virginia Frantz will be administrative assistant to the bishop. Staff positions in the synod have been restructured with new responsibilities and an additional assistant to the bishop, as approved by the synod assembly last June.

Beth Ann Lechtenberger Stone grew up in Lincoln, Nebraska, and attended St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota, where she sang in the St. Olaf Choir. After being the North Carolina Synod youth ministry coordinator, she became a full-time lay associate at Christ Lutheran Church of Bethesda, Maryland. She earned the Master of Divinity degree from Trinity Lutheran Seminary of Columbus, Ohio. She completed her internship at Bethany Lutheran Church on Chicago's South Side in the Horizon Internship Program of the ELCA. She has served as pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church in McClure from August 2001 to the present.

Karl-John N. Stone grew up in Queens, New York. He also attended St. Olaf College. While in college, he studied abroad at University College Dublin, Ireland. He received the Master of Divinity degree from Trinity Lutheran Seminary of Columbus, Ohio. He completed his internship at Augustana Lutheran Church of Elkhart, Indiana, and has been pastor of Messiah Lutheran Church in Troxelville since August 2001.

Beth Ann and Karl-John, while both alumni of St. Olaf College, did not attend at the same time. According to Beth Ann, "[We] met in summer Greek class at the seminary. We were engaged on internship, and married just before senior year began. We lived together for one week prior to marriage, on separate floors, in the well-chaperoned home of Dr. Walt and Jan Bouman. Dr. Bouman married us at the seminary, and the newlywed Stones housesat for the Boumans upon returning from our honeymoon."

The Stones have two children: Henry, who will be three in January, and Liam, age 1. They also have a "naughty but sweet dog

named Theo...a 'beaglador' (beagle-labrador)" who showed up at their house on their first Good Friday in their new call.

Virginia Frantz is well-known throughout the synod, as she has been employed by the Upper Susquehanna Synod since December 7, 1987, serving under different titles over the years. She was commissioned as an Associate in Ministry in 2002, having received a Letter of Call from the Synod Council as Administrative Assistant. She also serves as an Authorized Lay Worship Leader. A resident of Winfield and member of St. Paul's (Erdley's) Church, Frantz and her husband Earl have three children, one daughter-in-law, and three grandchildren.

Beth Ann states that she brings to the position a passion for the Kingdom of God, a lifelong love for the Church, more than 12 years of full-time, ELCA ministry experience, half as a layperson and half as a pastor, and gifts for organizing, visioning, and working with people, along with a sense of humor;

Stone expresses excitement about how the synod may be growing and changing and a sincere interest in helping people discern God's callings in their lives. "Having served on the Strategy for Mission Task Force, it's exciting to be a part of implementing this vision our synod affirmed back in June," she said.

"I understand how important a good support system is for rostered leaders. The relationships we've built with our colleagues in the Middle Creek Conference made all the difference for us as pastors new to this synod in 2001. In my role as the Assistant to the Bishop working with Leadership, I hope to help foster strong, supportive relationships among our church leaders by building on what's working now, and trying many new ways to carry out this ministry. I also want to raise up the concept of vocation among all our synodical ministries. 'How is God calling you to serve today?' should be a guiding question for lay and rostered folks alike as we discern God's will for the Church and our individual parts in it."

Staff Appointments (cont'd)

Karl-John says this about his position: "As in parish ministry, I believe my call as assistant to the bishop is an incarnational ministry, grounded in the Word and Sacraments, which are the heart of all ministry. I have spent most of my life in small churches, similar to so many of the congregations of our synod, six of those years as pastor of Messiah, in the rural community of Troxelville. In the parish, I encouraged the members to grow in their understanding and practice of discipleship, the priesthood of believers, stewardship of spiritual gifts, and hospitality, in order to carry out the ministry and mission of the congregation."

He added, "In pastoral ministry, I emphasized preaching, the sacraments, worship, pastoral care, teaching, and reaching out to others for the sake of Christ. Because the Church is evangelical, we need to continually discern how to faithfully present the good news of Jesus' death and resurrection to our community and world. Because the Church is catholic, we need to continually call upon the Holy Spirit to strengthen our connections among our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ, congregations, synod, and the wider Church, encompassing the saints of every time and place."

Virginia Frantz reflects that "God is and always has been number ~~one~~ in my life; my wonderful husband is number ~~two~~, along with our three children, daughter-in-law, and three grandchildren. My closely-knit extended family is also a very important part of my life, as we support one another in all that life brings to us. A most important additional love in my life is Bible study and teaching God's Word, whether it be to children, teenagers, or adults."

Her vision for her work is this: "Whatever I do in my call and in my life, may it be for the glory of God and for the uplifting of God's Kingdom. That is my focus!" She adds, "I believe the job description in the Strategy for Mission statement pretty well sums up what is expected of me. By the grace and guidance of God, I hope I am able to fulfill these responsibilities in accord with God's desires."

Frantz assumes her position immediately; the Stones begin on November 1.

Pastor Daniel May will continue serving on the synod staff until December 1, after which he hopes to receive a call to a congregation. Bishop Driesen expressed that "All of us owe him a debt of gratitude, not only for his past service but also for the churchly manner in which he is assisting me and the synod during this time of transition."

The staff is being installed along with Bishop Driesen on Sunday, October 21, at Susquehanna University in Selinsgrove.

With peace restored, there is a concern not to create a relationship of "dependency," as well as the cost of nearly \$10,000 to sent a container. With only a few exceptions, donated items are not being accepted as space is limited. Each congregation received information on this project.

+ **St Mark, Williamsport** honored more than 50 members who are 75 years of age or more, "single and still praising God." A hymn sing and a lunch served by the youth of the congregation were among events marking this milestone.

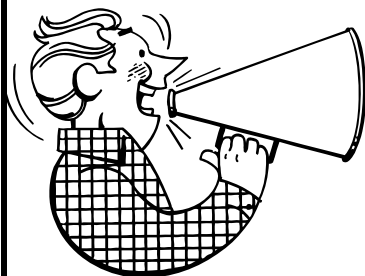
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News from the Pews

A Note to Hunters ...

Small game season is just around the corner, and although avian (bird) flu is not yet an immediate threat here in the US, your state's Game Commission offers tips to decrease exposure to all types of microorganisms and parasites that can be transmitted through small game.

- Do not handle or butcher game animals that are obviously sick or found dead.
- Do not eat, drink, or smoke while cleaning or handling game.
- Wear rubber or disposable latex gloves and washable clothing when cleaning game.
- Wash your hands with soap and water or alcohol wipes immediately after handling game.
- Wash tools & work surfaces with hot soapy water, then disinfect with a 10% solution of chlorine bleach (1 c. bleach to 10 c. water)
- Place uncooked game in a plastic bag or container for transport to home.
- Cook all game meat thoroughly; poultry should reach an internal temperature of 165° Fahrenheit.

Viruses and microorganisms can be transmitted through animal and bird droppings or torn intestines, so always use caution when cleaning game.

In addition, be sure to carefully examine clothing and any exposed skin areas for ticks to lower your risk of Lyme Disease. For additional information regarding avian flu and other wildlife diseases, check out <http://wildlifedisease.nbio.gov/> or contact your state Game Commission.

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning? O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer; and by night, but find no rest." (Ps. 22:1-2, NRSV)

Here we are at the beginning of yet another November! The stores have already been trumpeting the Christmas holidays, though Thanksgiving has not yet arrived. It's the time of year that everyone anticipates, full of fun, family, and very soon, the first Sunday of the season of Advent – and yet you may be asking yourself, "Why do I feel so tired and sad?" If you have noticed a persistent change in mood and loss in energy around this time of year, you may be one of the millions of people affected by a form of depression called Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD).

The cause of SAD has not been isolated, however it appears to be connected to the amount of daylight we receive. It is believed that as the seasons change, and days of sunlight grow shorter, our 'internal clocks' readjust as well. Scientists theorize that this type of depression is linked to a change in the sleep-related hormone melatonin, or the decrease of the brain chemical serotonin. Symptoms include fatigue, sleep problems, craving for sweets and starches, headaches, and problems in personal relationships (increased rejection sensitivity). What makes this form of depressed mood different is that typically the sufferer experiences full remission during the spring and summer months. Though most common in women aged 20 – 40, it can occur in teens and children as well.

We all have intermittent days when we feel down, however, if you begin to notice those feelings lingering for two or more weeks, see your doctor or behavioral health specialist. Only a trained professional can determine whether you have a physical problem or some form of clinical depression. An actual diagnosis of Seasonal Affective Disorder may depend on whether:

- You've experienced depression and other symptoms present during at least two consecutive years, during the same time of year;
- These periods of depression have been followed by non-depressive seasons;
- No additional causes can be identified (illness, grief, loss) for the change in mood.

Treatments may include medication, counseling, and/or a special form of light therapy (NOT a sun-tanning bed!). Let your physician know if symptoms persist, or if they become more severe. ***If you find you are having thoughts of suicide, immediately contact your physician, your therapist, or go to the nearest emergency room.***

If you have been diagnosed with SAD, here are some recommendations from the experts at www.MayoClinic.com: increase the amount of light that filters into your home – open blinds and drapes – add skylights – trim overhanging branches that block light; walk outdoors on sunny days; exercise regularly; learn more about stress management; if possible, take a vacation in a warmer climate; eat a balanced diet to improve your energy and combat cravings. Finally, maintain your social contacts, including worship!

"And God said, 'Let there be lights in the dome of the sky to separate the day from the night; and let them be for signs and for seasons and for days and years, and let them be lights in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth', and it was so ...and God saw that it was good." (Gen. 1: 14, 18b, NRSV).

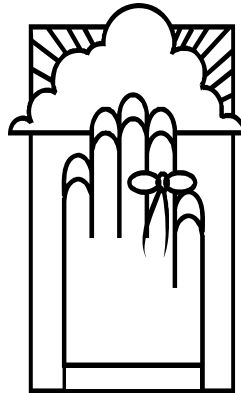

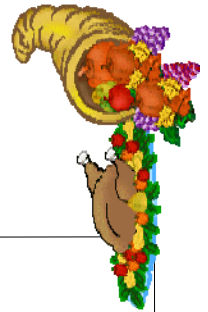
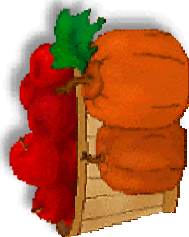
