FROM THE MONEY COUNTER CREW

Our job while counting the money handed in by congregation members is twofold. First, we want to make sure that you get proper credit for all monies you contribute. Second, we want to be sure that your money goes to whatever you designate, such as Regular, Capital, Hunger, etc.



You can help to ensure that those two things happen correctly by giving in <u>your</u> envelope, which is marked by <u>your</u> member <u>number</u>. If you don't use a regular church envelope, <u>please</u> put your member number on whatever envelope that you use. Also, please indicate on the outside of the envelope the amount of money you are enclosing. Should you have privacy concerns, simply turn the envelope over prior to placing it in the collection plate.

Be sure you indicate where you want the money to go by clearly stating it on the outside of your regular church envelope in the event that it is for something special. Use the

blue envelope whenever possible for specific donations. Also, it would be wise to note on the memo portion of your check re specific places, such as Lent, Shepherd of the Streets, etc.

Following the above directions would help us very much to accurately record the amount and designation of your gifts, so that you receive proper credit.

Pastor Volland Wins Hunger Award!

Rev. Carla Volland (Clarkstown/Lairdsville Parish) was recognized with one of three ELCA Hunger Awards. She attended the 2006 World Hunger Leadership Gathering and left inspired. Determined to do more to fight hunger, she returned to the Upper Susquehanna Synod and proceeded to recruit and organize an entire hunger committee. Pastor Carla and the synod hunger team started a campaign using a caterpillar to raise awareness of hunger issues throughout the synod.

What's a Conference Cabinet?

This past summer, the Synod in assembly adopted a new structure, rearranging responsibilities and adding some more assistance for the Bishop. The reorganized Cabinet meets five times a year and is slated to deal with a particular area of common interest in each session. Recently the topic was the adult catechumenate and Christian education. Pastor Elkin spoke to the group about The Way at St. Mark's and fielded many questions. The next session will be on campus ministry, and Pr. Huckfeldt will be the presenter. Our representatives to the Cabinet are Bud & Joyce Hershberger and Pr. Elkin.

At any of the church dinners, funeral luncheons, bazaars, etc. she was chief cook, buyer and supervisor of the preparation. When she became ill, she continued to help for as long as she was able, never complaining about he work and always cheerful.

How painful for us to lose these saints of the church but I am reminded of a verse from Revelation: "They are before the throne of God and the one seated on the throne will shelter them."

We entrust them to God's loving care but we will miss them 'in the pews' but will keep them in our hearts.





HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness ... therefore I am content with weakness ... for whenever I am weak, then I am strong. (2Corinthians 12:8 & 10 – NRSV)

Paul is of course referring to a "thorn in his flesh" – exactly what that was, we do not know for certain. His appeal to God for its removal, was not answered in quite they way he would have liked. Instead Paul comes to recognize that this constant irritant somehow served to make him a stronger person. We witness this type of inner strength in those who have managed to control their Type 2 diabetes.

For the diabetic, this time of year can be especially trying, since many of our holiday celebrations seem to center around sharing food with friends and family. For all of us, eating a balanced diet high in complex carbohydrates and low in saturated fats, sugar, and salt seems almost impossible as we attend parties and family gatherings. Here are a few tips we can all benefit from, that may make holiday dining less of a challenge for friends and family members who are diabetic. Better yet, keep them in mind when preparing food for your next church dinner/pot-luck:

- ★ whenever possible, substitute low or no-fat products in meal preparation for example, fat-free salad dressing, yogurt instead of sour cream, fat-free mayo, or salsa instead of dip
- ★ offer foods that are considered "complex", fiber-rich carbohydrates fruits, vegetables, whole grains, beans, lentils, low-fat dairy products
- ★ be aware that diabetics should consume carbs spaced throughout the day, so rather than have one huge meal, provide healthy snacks of vegetables, fruit, nuts throughout the day
- ★ buck the trend of deep-frying turkey stick to roasting
- ★ stay away from alcohol
- ★ use canola or olive oil in dish preparation
- ★ desserts need not be off limits, but try to offer healthier choices such as fruit salad, angel food cake with berry puree, or why not try this holiday cookie recipe from the American Diabetes Association:

Ingredients:

½ c. stick margarine1 1/3 c. all purpose flour1 cup Equal Sugar Lite¾ tsp. baking powder1 med. egg¼ tsp. salt

1 tsp. Vanilla 1 pkg. Sugar Free Fruit Flavored Gelatin

Beat margarine and Equal in medium bowl on medium speed of mixer until well combined. Mix in egg and vanilla until blended. Add combined flour, baking powder and salt. Mix to blend. Drop dough by rounded teaspoon onto cookie sheets sprayed with non-stick cooking spray. Flatten slightly using the spoon. Sprinkle with sugar-free flavored gelatin. Bake in pre-heated 350 degree oven for 10-12 minutes. Cool and store at room temperature in covered container. **Nutrition information:** 87 Calories; total fat 4 g.; total carbs. 10. Exchanges per serving: ½ carbohydrate; 1 fat; **Serving size**: 2 cookies.
