A Holy Week to Remember

I have been volunteering with United Campus Ministry at Penn College for a little over a year now, and it was my privilege once again to serve the homeless with this special group of young adults. We spent four days in New York City and worked in churches, soup kitchens, food pantries and even an elementary school. It was a week of hard work and service, but a week that was well worth it!

On Saturday, we traveled to New Jersey and participated in the service at Zion Lutheran Church. The students did an excellent job of reading Matthew's account of Christ's Passion. At St. Paul and St. Andrew United Methodist Church where we stayed we were part of a Palm Sunday parade, complete with a donkey and man portraying Jesus. The congregation heard a scripture reading on the outside steps of the church. The children rang bells while the adults waved palm branches. The entire congregation of about 250 people marched around the block with Jesus and the gentle donkey leading the way. It was a very memorable experience for everyone who participated in it.

The physically demanding work started on Monday. One group went to a church to help prepare and serve lunch for the homeless. This was no regular soup kitchen. A chef from the Marriott Marquise Restaurant used his talents to prepare a five star meal for these people. Many of the students were culinary students at the college and were able to work alongside the chef. It was also our job to serve the meal to everyone in courses. The people who were there for lunch were very grateful for the excellent meal and the service that was provided with a smile. Another group worked in a food pantry, stocking items for the people shopping there. What struck me the most was that it was not a hand out. The people had to earn points in order for them to purchase what they wanted. It gave them a sense of dignity to have the opportunity to do their own shopping.

On Tuesday, one group went to the food bank, where they sorted, taped and cleaned up discarded packages from local grocery stores. It was a process that took most of the day. The other group had an opportunity to work with children at an elementary school in Brooklyn. One of the Penn College students had gone to school there, and she wanted to do something for her school. It turned out that this year was their 100^{th} anniversary, so the college students made a large tree banner and worked with the kids to paint 100 handprints on it to celebrate this special time. The art teacher in me just loved this project, and we all came home with green paint under our nails and the memory of all the children's smiles.

Although going through the process of raising their own funds and traveling to New York City to serve was an amazing way for the students to spend their spring break, they also realized that service can happen right in their own backyard, in many different ways. There is the Shepherd of the Street Ministry, St. Anthony's Center, Journey House, and Providence House, just to name a few. These ministries all need willing volunteers to make a difference in the community. How can you serve in your own backyard? No one can do everything, but everyone can do something. What can you do to make a difference?

April 13 Many migraine headaches may be triggered by foods we eat. If you suffer from migraines, you may want to eliminate the following foods from your diet, or begin keeping a food diary to determine precise triggers: caffeine; chocolate; cheese; MSG (found in many Chinese dishes, and food seasonings); yogurt or sour cream; nuts (especially peanuts); processed meats (aged, canned, marinated, or containing nitrites – hotdogs, sausage, bacon, salami, bologna), alcohol and vinegar (white vinegar is okay); citrus fruits and juices; certain fruits – bananas, raisins, red plums, avocados) certain vegetables (lima, Fava and navy beans; pea pods; sauerkraut; onions); certain breads (fresh baked/yeast risen from a bakery, donut shop or home); aspartame (Nutrasweet)

April 20 Need more reasons to quit smoking:

- 8 hrs. after quitting, the carbon monoxide level in your blood drops to mormal
- 24 hrs. after, your chances of having a heart attack decrease
- 2 weeks to 3 months after, you have better circulation and lung function can increase up to 30%
- 1 yr. after, you reduce your risk of heart disease by 50%
- when you stop smoking, your pets will be happier did you know that secondhand smoke increases the risk of lung cancer in dogs? (www.4woman.gov/QuitSmoking/reasons_list.cfm)

April 27 Flower power – Texas A&M reported on a study examining the mood boosting ability of plants. Women who worked in a room decorated with two potted plants and a bouquet of flowers reported 13% more ideas than women working in a room containing abstract sculpture. A good mood increases the level of dopamine, which helps in information flow of the brain. (April 2008, *Prevention*, pg. 176)



Browsing through the local papers in the past weeks I have found several members of St. Mark's who are "in the news."

Debra Buckman, assistant professor of environmental technology, was nominated for the 26th edition of "Who's Who in American Women" (her second consecutive selection) and for inclusion in "Who's Who in American" for 2007-2008.

The Lycoming Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution recently elected **Lucille Weaver** as delegate to the 111th

conference of the Pennsylvania State Society DAR to be held in Scranton April 3 -6. Lucille is the librarian of the Pennsylvania State Society.

Shelby Weber, president of the Junior League of Williamsport, recently attended a leadership conference sponsored by the Association of Junior Leagues International in San Antonio, Texas. Shelby is serving her second term as president of the local group.

IRS Says Seniors Must File Taxes to Receive Economic Stimulus Payments

Seniors with limited means who normally don't need to file a federal tax return must do so this year in order to receive their payment under the recently enacted economic stimulus package, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) announced. This includes 20 million seniors who rely primarily on Social Security who are eligible to receive \$300 per individual or \$600 per couple under the plan that NCOA supported. The IRS says it will work with the Department of Veterans Affairs, Social Security Administration, and beneficiary groups to inform these individuals that they must file a tax return to receive their payment. To help ensure that all eligible seniors receive their payments, NCOA has developed a fact sheet with more detailed information, and free tax help is available through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program (1-800-906-9887) and AARP's Tax-Aide program.



HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

The skin disease, leprosy, was greatly feared in ancient Biblical times. Chapter 13 of Leviticus describes the diagnosis and subsequent treatment of those with the ailment. Scholars believe the term leprosy was actually used for a number of skin diseases, some of which would prove to be fatal. Isolating the sufferer from healthy family and group members was the primary preventive 'medicine' in keeping these diseases under control. Only the priests had the power and authority to determine if one was "clean" or "unclean", thereby serving as the gatekeeper for re-entry into community once again. Along with being banished from the community came the belief that skin disease was a form of punishment from God, so one can only imagine the sense of isolation and desperation these folks must have endured.

Ask many teenagers and in some cases, adults, who suffer from acne, and they may describe similar feelings of being "unclean" and of being ostracized by peers. Unlike our ancient ancestors, we know better. In the majority of cases, acne has little or nothing to do with whether or not the sufferer is clean. Instead, skin eruptions are actually linked to physiology over which we have little control – the body's release of hormones, known as androgens (found in both men and women), a subsequent increase in oil production, and its effects on pores of the skin.

Skin care lines, in TV and print ads, would have us believe that if we would only switch to XYZ Brand of soaps, cleansers, toners, masks and exfoliants, we too could have soft, clear, glowing and blemish free skin. In reality, what many of these products actually do is further irritate already inflamed pores, causing them to release yet more oil. Instead of vigorous scrubbing several times a day, acne responds best to washing twice daily with warm (not hot) water and a mild cleanser. Counter to two commonly held beliefs, there is no scientific proof that food or stress lead to breakouts.

Treatment for acne is an individualized process that should be supervised by a family doctor or skin specialist (dermatologist). Depending upon the treatment, you should begin to see results within 4 to 8 weeks. Below are some additional tips that promote clearer skin and overall well-being:

- Eat a balanced diet. This insures that your body is receiving the proper vitamins and minerals needed to speed cell repair and healing.
- Drink plenty of water 6 to 8 oz., 8 times per day. This will keep skin hydrated and help to eliminate toxins.
- Get regular exercise, which increases circulation to the skin.
- Wear sun-block daily, and take extra precaution when spending extended time outdoors, not only to
 decrease your risk of skin cancer, but also because some acne treatments trigger unwanted sideeffects when in the sun (rashes, hypersensitivity, etc.).
- Wear sunglasses they not only protect your eyes, but also the delicate skin surrounding them.
- Get enough rest down time for the cells of your skin (and body) to rejuvenate and repair daily wear and tear.
- Choose cosmetics and cleansers carefully. Look for those that are formulated for sensitive skin.
- Do not pick at acne lesions or pimples. Squeezing and manipulating only drive infection further into surrounding tissue, and often leads to scarring.
- Toss away toners, scrubs, and abrasive pads they only aggravate already irritated and 'angry' pores and follicles.
- Some oral medications may lead to birth defects or other serious health issues, and should only be used under the supervision of your physician. Learn all you can about any medication, and use only as directed!
