

Nurse's Notes

August 3 Office Yoga? Sure! Begin by sitting on the edge of your chair with your feet placed squarely on the floor about hip distance apart. Place your palms flat on your thighs and become aware of the length of your spine – head balanced over heart, heart balanced over hips. Inhale and exhale evenly for five counts each. Repeat as many times as you would like.

August 10 People with diabetes need to pay close attention to the condition of their feet, due to poor nerve sensation and blood flow. Here are a few "do's" of diabetes foot care:

- Inspect your feet every day; look for any cuts or scrapes if you have trouble seeing the bottoms, use a hand mirror.
- When you go to your doctor, take off your shoes he/she should be checking your feet at each visit.
- Wash your feet daily, but not in hot water. Use lotion [that your doctor has approved] on dry areas, however
 do not apply it between toes
- Your diabetes doctor should screen you for any nerve damage
- Wear soft breathable socks he kind that wick moisture away from skin (not 100% cotton).
- Trim nails straight across without damaging skin. If this is difficult, see a foot doctor regularly.
- Don't walk barefoot.
- Don't smoke! (it decreases circulation)
- Don't cut corns or calluses yourself, or use chemical irritants meant to remove them.
- Don't wear open toed shoes, particularly sandals or flip-flops with thongs between toes!

- statements that the product is a quick, effective cure-all or a diagnostic tool for a variety of ailments
- suggestions that the product can treat or cure serious or un-curable diseases
- claims such as "scientific breakthrough", "miracle cure", "secret ingredient", or "ancient remedy"
- impressive sounding words like "hunger stimulation point" and "thermogenesis" for weight loss products
- · claims that the product is safe because it is "natural"
- · undocumented case histories or personal stories by people who have tried it or by doctors claiming amazing results
- promises of no-risk, money-back guarantees
- easy "fixes" for problems such as excess weight, hair loss, etc.

August 24 Leaving a whole watermelon on your kitchen counter for 5 days increases its lycopene and beta-carotene content by as much as 20%. Cut fruit should be should be refrigerated.

August 31 Cooking raw vegetables? Bring the water to a boil **before adding the vegetables**. Allowing the water to heat up slowly with the vegetables in it destroys more nutrients.

Community Service, a Thank You and a Great Time

As many of you may know—or just now are finding out—we are working very hard to move St. Mark's into the 21st century by developing all the means of communication available to us. Most recently, we have produced nine short segments of video on YouTube (go to the St. Mark's home page and click the link in the bottom, right-hand corner). These came from filming about four-to-five hours of conversation with Pastor Elkin.

Carlos Saldivia, executive producer of First Contact, conducted the interview and, along with his crew, filmed and edited the entire process. They have donated, to date, over 100 hours of diligent work to St. Mark's.

Carlos and crew have been working extensively in the Williamsport area for 4 years now: filming commercials, pro bono, for the Williamsport Symphony Orchestra; assisting students with senior projects, and, among myriad other things, filming the definitive documentary, Michael Pilato: Mural Canyon, about the Inspiration Lycoming Mural on West Fourth Street, across from the Community Arts Center.



The Williamsport-Lycoming Arts Council has taken the production of this enterprise under its wing as a not-for-profit organization. For two years, the film crew and friends have staffed the concession stand through several days at the Little League World Series, as a fundraiser for the documentary. Angel Food Ministries



With the high cost of fuel most of us are looking for ways to save money. One way is through Angel Food Ministries which offers high quality food at only \$30 per box regardless of income.

Faith Wesleyan Church prints a monthly menu which will include about 14-15 lbs of meat, 5 lbs of vegetables, shelf-stable milk and other food staples. With each \$30 box you may add on as many of the 3 specialty boxes of meat that are available each month. (ex. 5 lbs of rib-eye steaks for \$20).

There is a deadline for placing your paid order and one distribution Saturday each month when your food must be picked up. You may mail your order with payment or you may drop it off at specific times which will be listed on the monthly menu. You must bring a large box or cooler and your receipt to pick up your food.

HOW TO USE YOUR CAR KEY ALARM AS A PERSONAL SAFETY ALARM OR A BURGLER ALARM

Put your car keys beside your bed at night. If you hear a noise outside your home or someone trying to get in your house, just press the panic button for your car. The alarm will be set off, and the horn will continue to sound until either you turn it off or the car battery dies.

This tip came from a neighborhood watch coordinator. Next time you come home for the night and you start to put your keys away, think of this: It's a security alarm system that you probably already have and requires no installation. Test it. It will go off from most everywhere inside your house and will keep honking until your battery runs down or until you reset it with the button on the key fob chain.


It works if you park in your driveway or garage. If your car alarm goes off when someone is trying to break in your house, odds are the burglar or rapist won't stick around... after a few seconds all the neighbors will be looking out their windows to see who is out there and sure enough the criminal won't want that.

And remember to carry your keys while walking to your car in a parking lot. The alarm can work the same way there. It would also be useful for any emergency, such as a heart attack, where you can't reach a phone. A wife suggested to her husband to carry his car keys with him in case he falls outside and she doesn't hear him. He can activate the car alarm and then she'll know there's a problem.

This is something that should really be shared with everyone. Maybe it could save a life or prevent a sexual abuse crime.

The Milestone Celebration of 70, Single and still Praising God!




Last year, a joyous celebration was held for the first time, honoring valued members of our congregation who had attained 75 or more years of age, were single, and still praising God!

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"He will deliver you from the snare of the fowler and from the deadly pestilence; he will cover you with his pinions, and under his wings you will find refuge; his faithfulness is a shield and buckler. You will not fear the terror of the night, or the arrow that flies by day." (Ps. 91:3-5)

No matter what your personal attitude toward war, one thing is certain, no one emerges unchanged, none more so than the soldiers and their families. This conflict is different in some ways, because National Guard and Reservists were called up from everyday lives (not from bases with some built-in support systems). As they return, tens-of-thousands will be dealing with the physical, emotional and spiritual trauma, and will be returning to families and communities in which life and its inevitable changes went on [for a while] without them. One of the determining factors in readjustment will be resilience – that ability to bounce back after life has been traumatized – those who possess it may fare better, because they have had a solid system of friends, family and community actively supporting them during deployment. For others, the road may be a bit more rocky. The church can be a powerful source of healing as veterans and their families make their transition into a "new normal" life.

Many congregations have already laid the groundwork by supporting veterans and their families throughout their deployment with care packages, email, letters of encouragement, and prayer. Here are a few additional ideas for congregations to aid in becoming sources of assistance in transition:

- continue to pray for those deployed and those who are returning praying for healing and wholeness in all aspects of their lives.
- consider inviting a military chaplain or representative from the Veterans Administration to educate the congregation regarding the needs of returning troops and their families, then compile a list of community resources that may help meet these needs (housing, job services, counseling, etc.)
- sponsor an event or events to bring together vets and families throughout the community, and provide childcare so adults can share their experiences and establish mutual support
- develop a special time of worship, thanking them for their service; consider incorporating a service of healing; reassure them of God's unfailing love for them;
- pastoral staff should be intentional in outreach to the veteran; privately offer opportunity
 for confession and hearing God's forgiveness. Become familiar with signs and symptoms
 of traumatic brain injury and be alert for signs of distress (lashing out, unable to focus, inability to complete tasks, self-medicating, depression, over-spending)
- because many deployments and re-entries occurred rapidly with little time for reflection, consider training trustworthy congregation members in being non-judgmental listeners; older veterans may be especially helpful since it may be easier to talk to someone who has "been there"; reflection and grieving are necessary steps toward healing
- at the same time, try not to overwhelm them— be mindful that there will be role adjustments, and relationships that require some renegotiation; trust may need to be reestablished. Chaplain John Morris suggests that we "give them the same pastoral care you'd give a fire victims, a ministry of presence meet practical needs, and be agents of grace and healing" (Veteran Ministry, *Christianity Today*, July 1, 2008).
