Advent without excess

Whether you are a young person just trying to break into the job market, a senior who is worrying about stretching your retirement money to cover yet more medical expenses, or anyone in between, this fall has been an anxious time. And so now the Advent and Christmas seasons are approaching, and we may become sad and overwhelmed that the usual pattern of excess will not be possible this year.



Rather than lamenting this, let's use the opportunity to go about things in a different way. This may be the push that we need to simplify our approach to things.

- (1) Each day our mailboxes hold yet more glossy catalogues, filled with things that none of us need and few can afford. Let's start emailing these companies and ask to be removed from the mailing lists. It will cut down on clutter at home, printing and mailing costs for the companies, and remove one level of temptation to spend money foolishly.
- (2) Advent calendars have often been used as part of the preparation for Christmas. This is not just for families with small children. Rather than a commercial calendar that focuses on Santa, use the one that has been included with this newsletter. It focuses on Christ Jesus and on caring for one another.
- (3) Why do we engage in gift-giving at Christmas-time anyway? It started out as an expression of joy at the wonder of the gifts God first gave us, beginning with creation and extending to the gift of Jesus born in humility in Bethlehem. St. Nicolas gave gifts, anonymously, to those who needed them, without any thought of repayment or a gift in return. The "Operation Christmas Child" boxes that we have just prepared seem to be closer to the original intent than do many of our other practices. Might you help with the mitten tree, the Selinsgrove Center party, the bear tree, and other such projects?
- (4) It is a wonderful time to communicate with family and friends, the ones that we don't see often or who are at a distance. Use some time to write a note to these persons. Hand-addressed things are not very frequent in our mailboxes these days.
- (5) Pick a project that helps you to look beyond your own family. Give a gift through Heifer International that will give animals to start a herd for persons around the world in difficult circumstances: from \$20 "flocks of hope" (chickens, ducks or geese) through various other animals to a heifer for \$500. These are gifts that can change lives of families and villages. See the catalogue at the office or on-line at heifer.org/worldark.
- (6) Excess is always a great temptation. Gregory Nazianzus, bishop of a town in Asia Minor (the place is in Turkey today) urged his flock in 380AD to "Not strive to outdo each other in excess" especially "while others are hungry or in need." To Gregory, people were missing the joy that comes from remembering whose birthday was being celebrated: "Run with the star, bear your gifts with the Magi. With shepherds, glorify Him; with angels join in the chorus!"
- (7) Let nothing get in the way of joining with your fellow believers in regular worship, where we focus on the most important gifts of all. Holy Communion continues each Sunday at 8:00 and 10:30. Morning Prayer is sung at 9:00 on weekdays. Evening Prayer is sung at 6:30 on December 4, 11, and 18.

Let's have a thoughtful, outward-looking, joy-filled Advent, leaving aside the things we don't need.



Christmas at Danville State Hospital



Kay Poliska has recently become a volunteer at Danville State Hospital. She is overwhelmed by the positive attention she receives from the residents each time she walks in.

At Christmastime, DSH gives each patient three gifts from a specified list, and they solicit donations from the community to match these requests. This year is especially difficult for DSH in securing presents for the patients because of the economy. As you will see from the list below, no one is asking for anything extravagant. In fact, there are many requests for basic clothing.

Can you help to make this a more pleasant Christmas for these folks in need? On a tree in the narthex there will be tags, each bearing the wish of one of the residents. Congregation members are invited to take a tag, purchase the desired item, return the tag and item (unwrapped!) to the container beside the tree by December 7th, after which Kay will take them down to Danville and assist in wrapping them there. They are simple gifts, but to the residents, they will be wonderful things.

Here is a sampling of some of the desired items: sweatshirt – 3X, sweatpants – 2X, phone card - any amount, pj's – 2X, nightgown – 1X, underwear – medium, watch – inexpensive, 4 packs of AA batteries. Prayer in Advent



It is difficult for Christians to celebrate or pray through the Advent season. The history of Christmas insistently wants to intrude. Many are apathetic about going through the motions of Advent, often understood as pretending to be waiting for that which never again needs to be the burden of human prayers. While there is appreciation for the faithful impatient waiting of Abraham and Sarah and their long line of descendants, which allowed God to set in motion the advent of his savior Son, why take a whole month to hope for what we now have?

The problem with such faith is its assumption of a reality that we still don't have -- the future promised to Abraham and Sarah. Our now having the Son of their prayers still leaves for us to pray as faithfully and impatiently as they for the future that was fundamental to their longing -- our prayers for salvation are not yet obsolete.

Advent is a season to pray for the not-yet future only set in motion by the Christmas event. It's a time to think about and pray more broadly about our present struggle to be faithful, and dare to hope in the eternal future under God. We can assuredly pray Advent prayers in hope because all that God has ever said and done, including Christmas, makes no sense without the underlying promise of his future. With Advent, we mean to hold God to bring to us the specific future over which Abraham and Sarah stretched their faith.

Dates for the 2009 U.S.S. work team to travel to the Lutheran Church in Liberia are Jan. 13 to Feb. 26 (6 weeks), although a 4-week term of service is also possible (Jan. 13 to Feb. 13). The participation fee of \$2950 covers virtually all costs. A U.S. passport valid at least through mid-July 2009 and a Liberian visitor's visa are required. Volunteers are most needed in the areas of construction; nurse, midwife, and medical technician instruction; teacher training; adult literacy instruction; and home economics and crafts instruction. News from the ELCA's Mission Investment Fund

With the global financial crisis, ELCA ministries and individual church members can take comfort in knowing that the Mission Investment Fund is stable and strong.

- The fund has built up capital of more than \$160 million, reflecting a net worth of nearly 30 percent of assets. That percentage is almost triple the amount required by regulation and much higher than what most banks maintain.
- The fund maintains strong underwriting standards, and did not engage in subprime lending or other risky loan practices. It focuses all its efforts and resources on helping to build the church and advance God's mission by providing ministry loans, investment opportunities, and supporting services for ELCA members, congregations and related institutions.
- The fund invests cash not currently required to underwrite loans in a diversified portfolio of highly rated, liquid, fixed-income securities and deposit instruments, and continuously monitors credit quality and market conditions.
- The fund maintains a highly efficient cost structure. With low operating expenses, it operates conservatively -- and still provides exceptional rates and services to investors and borrowers. In addition, in the 90-plus-year history of the Mission Investment Fund and its predecessors, the fund has always paid investors their principal and interest in accordance with the terms of the investment. So no one has ever lost money on an investment.

Thrivent Builds in Lycoming County

The Lycoming-Sullivan Chapter of Thrivent Financial for Lutherans has been approved for a Thrivent Builds with the Greater Lycoming Habitat for Humanity. In 2009 Lutherans of all congregations in the area will build a house for a low-income family. Volunteers will work in partnership with the homeowners to build a decent, simple and affordable home. Thrivent Financial for Lutherans will provide 65% of the funding. The goal is that Lutheran congregations will raise about \$14,700.00, and that 50% of the volunteer work will be done by Lutherans, 25% of them Thrivent members. At this point every congregation is asked to have a contact person, also named "champion." Our person will be Todd Smith.

The Board said that it presented the award "in deep appreciation for the many ways you have extended the mission of our Churches through your leadership and support, making a more abundant life possible for everyone," and then listed his contributions as a leader in the community.

Family Promise

We're Up to Ten!

Family Promise of Lycoming County is continuing to add Host Congregations. Recently, Balls Mills United Methodist Church and St. Paul–Calvary United Methodist Church became the latest to sign on for this exciting task. We're in the search for at least three more congregations willing to serve the Lord Jesus by caring for homeless families in our community.



Family Promise seeks to provide temporary shelter and assistance for these families, so that as quickly as possible they may move to permanent, affordable housing. We want to have at least 13 host congregations, so that each parish can have a turn one per quarter-year. During that week of hosting, evening and morning meals are provided, as well as companionship and overnight accommodations. Each morning, a lunch is packed and the guests will go to school, work, or to the Day Center to make progress on their housing and other problems.

We're not ready to operate yet, even though the need is pressing on the community. The Family Promise steering committee meets monthly, on the fourth Tuesday (except December), and there is need for several representatives from each of the host congregations to help on one of the four working committees as we search for more host congregations, search for a day center site, search for the most effective transportation, and raise funds for the whole program. It is ironic that in these difficult economic times when it will be most difficult for us to start this work is when the need for our services will be the greatest!

What can each of us do at this point?

- (1) Pray for those families in need, for those who are already serving on the steering committees, for the board and officers, for the signed-up host congregations, for those congregations who are still considering becoming hosts.
- (2) Offer to be one of your congregation's servants on one of the working committees.
- (3) Begin to set aside money personally and in your congregation, so that soon we can begin to build up the treasury for the many expenses to come.
- (4) Begin to plan how you can be a servant during a week when your congregation will be a host.
- (5) Call one of the officers to hear what specific tasks you might undertake right now:

Consecration Sunday report

The Treasurer is pleased to report that the Consecration Sunday totals exceeded last year in significant ways. 103 cards were returned this year, compared with 93 last year. There were 31 increases in estimates compared with 21 last year. The dollar figures for estimates of giving total \$217,112 this year and \$182,042 last year. The more cards returned, the better, so that the Treasurer does not need to do as much guesswork concerning those who do not fill out the estimate cards. It is never too late to give an estimate card, and if the figure needs to be adjusted during the year, a phone call to the Financial Secretary can make the needed change.





HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"If as Herod, we fill our lives with things, and again with things, if we consider ourselves so unimportant that we must fill every moment of our lives with action, when will we have time to make the long slow journey across the desert as did the magi?

Or sit and watch the stars as did the shepherds?

Or brood over the coming of the child as did Mary?

For each one of us there is a desert to travel ... a star to discover ... and a being within ourselves to bring to life." Michael Podesta

The above quote is found on a piece of artwork that my husband purchased for me several years ago. Currently it hangs in my office, but because it is trapped behind a pile of prayer shawls, I have to take it down periodically to read it, and ponder its message.

We are in that time of year when it becomes so easy to be distracted by activities, family, shopping, gift-giving, travel, *things*, etc., that we lose sight of the most important event that happened so many centuries ago. As I re-read the text recently, I find myself thinking of the popular story called "Footprints". If we stop to think about the journey of Joseph and Mary – from Nazareth to Bethlehem and from Bethlehem to Egypt – surely they would have left the imprint of their passage in the sandy soil. But how many footprints were there ... sometimes 6 ... sometimes 8 ... sometimes none? Could Herod's men have tracked them if they tried? Did God himself, lift up and transport the young family from the stable to Egypt – a way to throw a jealous and spiteful king off the trail? Herod was furious upon his discovery that the magi had tricked him, so he let his rage boil up and spill out on innocent children of a certain age in and around Bethlehem! So many questions to challenge me spiritually

I invite you to make some time during advent to read and re-read the text of Jesus birth as found in the first two chapters of Matthew's gospel. Try to envision what that time must have like for Joseph ...Mary ... the baby ... the shepherds ... the magi ... yes, even Herod. Joseph and Mary were in a distinctly difficult point in their relationship. By rights, Joseph could have left her ... she was going to bear a child, and he knew it wasn't his! Yet he stayed, and more importantly he *trusted* what he believed God was asking of him in his dreams!

What are the desert places in your life? Where are the places to which you go when you want no one to "find" you? Is your life so full of 'stuff' that you cannot get a focus on what is *really* important? Have you at some point, become so angry with the way that your life has turned out that you bellow and manipulate and make threats – in an attempt to have things your way? Or has your path been slow and steady – sometimes alone – sometimes carried?

We are entering the season of advent. There is a light that has the power to move us forward as we travel our separate journeys, but first we have to slow down ... even stop ... so we can better envision what God is calling us toward in our lives. I pray that we won't be distracted by the 'stuff' surrounding this sacred time of year, and that we ask ourselves, "How do I discover/ rediscover the light of God inside me?", or "How do I give birth to a renewed desire for Jesus presence in my life?" No one has promised that this journey will be an easy one, but someone – Christ himself - has promised to be yoked to us! During this holy season set aside some to wonder as you wander toward that light which is beckons you, and may you experience a rebirth of the Christ child within!
