A Year-end Procedure

T he accounting process every end of the year includes the preparation of the annual financial statements. T hus, year-end is the time when most of the adjusting entries are recorded for the fair valuation of assets, liabilities and equity, and for the proper recognition of income. T his involves the process of writing-off bad debts from the accounting records because it has been reasonably expected that these bad debts cannot be collected anymore. Probably, the circumstances indicate that keeping a particular amount of the receivables in the books will only overstate the actual figure which is collectible from debtors.

The process of writing-off bad debts reminds us of forgiveness. While in accounting, bad debts are written-off as part of the year-end routine, for Christians like us, we forgive because we have experienced the overwhelming love of Jesus when He came to earth and died on the cross for us. We forgive because we have faith in a loving and merciful G od. We believe that since our Father has forgiven us, we should allow Him to wash away the stain of guilt from our hearts. We believe that since He has forgiven our family and friends, we should also learn how to forgive and forgive and forgive.

God is constantly watching us. Let us not wait for another year to end before we open our hearts to receive His mercy and start forgiving. Besides, we do not need to send "reports" to Him annually. He already knows, and He can see if our hearts are resentful and unforgiving... everyday, every hour, every minute.

"T hen Peter came up and said to him, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? A s many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy times seven." (Matthew 18:21-22)

They provide comprehensive training and support. In addition, all of the children who live in their homes attend their school/day treatment programs, creating a consistent therapeutic environment for young people to make positive changes. Their program has a proven track record in helping troubled young people find a positive path in life. 
The weather was much more cooperative this year! Two groups totaling eight adults, three teens and three children visited as many of our homebound as they could on the afternoon of December 14.

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"A cheerful heart is good medicine, but a downcast spirit dries up the bones." (Proverbs 17:22 NRSV)

Winter can be an incredibly fun time of year for those who enjoy outdoor activities such as skiing, skating, snowboarding, sledding and snowmobiling. There is nothing like taking a big gulp of the crisp, cold air, and working up a sweat while bundled under all that winter gear! However, for those of us who are not winter sport enthusiasts, getting through winter can present a challenge.

For the rest of us, the credit card bills are coming due, the Christmas tree is bald, and most of the packing peanuts and bubble wrap have been cleared from the sofa cushions. It's at this point that we may begin to feel that what we would *really* like, is to become a like a bear and hibernate! In spite of the dozens of Christmas cookies, and the inevitable fruitcake that has been consumed, some of us may find ourselves *craving* still more carbohydrates, not unlike a bear, fattening up for the long cold winter. But before you run outside to locate a cave or hollow tree log, you need to know that these are normal responses to the shorter days of sunlight – a brain chemical called serotonin begins to decrease as we get less sunlight – triggering the cravings (carbs release serotonin), while at the same time we can experience an increase in melatonin – a natural tranquilizer. (Now if you find yourself wanting to stand in a stream and catch fish with your 'bear' hands, or develop a longing for grubs dug from old tree stumps, you just might be too far along to rescue!)

For the rest of us, here are a few tips for getting through the "winter blahs":

- Get as much sunshine as possible take a brisk walk; if you have limited mobility, open up those drapes during the day; close them again at night to help conserve energy;
- read a good book while sipping on some tea, flavored decaf coffee or low-fat and/or sugar free hot chocolate (which might help stave-off the carb craving);
- be intentional in keeping in touch with family and friends; go beyond the holiday/ family crush, while combating winter isolation;
- don't oversleep; once-in-a-while sleeping indulgence is okay, but don't allow it to become a habit; getting up and getting the blood flowing helps combat daytime sluggishness and a tendency to put on extra pounds;
- let in some fresh air; take a walk, or just open a window for 15-20 minutes; stale winter air can harbor germs and toxins that build up indoor;
- challenge your brain with crosswords, sudoku, word search, board games;
- ladies, set aside a day for pampering; if you cannot afford to schedule a manicure or pedicure, get a "free" makeover at the local department store beauty counter;
- feeling really ambitious? now might be a good time to sort and label accumulated "stuff" for a spring garage/yard sale; if it hasn't been used in a year, get rid of it; donate the money to a local charity or put it in your offering plate!
- parents do something fun and unexpected, like making popcorn for breakfast or pitching a home-made tent in the living room and 'camp-out' in sleeping bags
- don't forget your pets can get the blahs too; schedule regular exercise time for Fido; we sometimes forget that many dogs were born to hunt or work and we don't allow them to do that; schedule an indoor obedience class, or teach him a new trick. Our feline friends also benefit from regular games and attention!

Hang in there! Spring will have arrived before you know it. This year greet it with renewed physical, mental and spiritual energy by blitzing the winter blahs!


