Annual July Fourth Celebration



It's hard to believe that we have been living here for almost 6 years and that I have been working with the youth at St. Mark's for over four years. When I first moved here, I just assumed I would find a teaching job and work for a school district. But the Lord had other plans for me.

No teaching jobs were available and I was content to be a stay at home mom for the kids. They were young, and they needed me. After being here for nine months and with no job prospect in sight, I remember praying, "Lord, if this is what I am supposed to be doing, it's ok with me, but financially, things are a little tough." About two weeks after that, Pastor Elkin

called me out of the blue and asked if I was interested in working part time for the church. It was an answer to prayer.

Working here at St. Mark's has been a blessing. It gave me the financial resources our family needed and the flexibility to still be home when the kids got out of school. My teaching background came in handy in ordering Sunday School curriculum and getting everything ready for the teachers on Sunday morning and my art background was helpful for VBS and the Milestone ministry. I have enjoyed working with all of you through Sunday School, VBS, and other activities with the youth.

Now that the kids are older, heading off to middle school and high school, I feel the need to get back to doing what I really love...teaching. I miss the students' enthusiasm and their creativity in the Art room. While I am sad to be leaving the staff at St. Mark's, I am looking forward to the challenge of getting back in the classroom, because deep down, I think once you are a teacher, you are always a teacher and it is important to do what you love.



- 1 pack of hand needles
- 1 spool matching thread
- 6 1/2" buttons on a card

or

6 1/2" buttons tied on string
**Wrap inside of fabric and
secure with yarn or ribbon**

ELCA, Synod & West Branch News

Synod Assembly highlights

The Upper Susquehanna Synod met in annual Assembly on June 19-20, 2009 at Susquehanna University in Selinsgrove. William Hill, Harold Hershberger and Joyce Hershberger joined Pastor Elkin in attendance this year.

- +++ This year's gathering was the second under the leadership of Bishop Driesen, and proceeded with good organization and scheduling.
- +++ Sandy Grier had many items for folks to browse and select in her Walk Along the Way bookstore. Augsburg Fortress no longer comes to Synod assemblies, and so Sandy had the field to herself!
- +++ There were the usual elections to a variety of posts including Synod Secretary and Treasurer as well as various committees and boards.
- +++ Minor amendments were made in constitutional matters, as is frequently done.
- +++ Installed as an Assistant to the Bishop was Beth Yenchko, whom we remember as assisting us several years ago in the Mission at the Crossroads process..
- +++ There were a number of workshops available on Friday.
- +++ More than 20 lay worship leaders, catechists, and evangelists (accompanied by their pastormentors) were installed.
- +++ The representative of the ELCA was the Secretary of the ELCA.
- +++ Our discussion about human sexuality which has been going on for more than a decade, was not able to reach any resolution this year either. The one motion that we forwarded to the national assembly that will be held in August was that we felt that any policy changes should be made only with a 2/3 vote in favor.
- +++ A Ministry Fair was held on Saturday, giving everyone a chance to browse 20 different tables of ministry ideas and projects that are in operation around the Synod's congregations. Participants were then able to choose one area that they could investigate more closely in a workshop that followed immediately. Jane Larson presented information about Stephen Ministry, and Pastor Elkin presented information about our successful joining of old and new technologies, especially in our website, our Iron Chef publicity process, our invitation to college students, our You Tube channel, our Twitter account, and our hospitality efforts.
- +++ The book of reports is available for anyone to read and see what has gone on during these two very busy days. Members of the congregation are invited to approach any of the representatives for reactions and impressions, for more details and information, and for thoughtful encouragement

WHY THE NURSERY??

from Managing Your Church Nursery Volunteers by Tony Kummer

Too often, serving in the church nursery can seem like a thankless job. One of the key tasks for children's ministry leaders is to help volunteers understand their importance. With that in mind, I offer these following seven reasons why serving in the church nursery is important.

Reason #1

God is in the church nursery. This may come as a shock, but the Bible has specific promises about God's presence when children are welcomed and loved in Jesus' name.

Reason #2

Service in the church nursery allows churchgoers to focus on worship, rather than worrying about their children. In a very real sense, the nursery ministry makes it

possible for the pastor to fulfill his ministry.

Reason #3

The first (and sometimes lasting) feelings a child will have toward church are formed in the nursery department. While not everyone may agree, I believe that a positive experience in the church nursery is essential.

Reason #4

When you serve in the nursery, you are being entrusted with the most important (and vulnerable) members of the church family. There is no greater treasure on this side of Heaven than the little ones God has given us. You must be someone special to have a job that is so important.

Reason #5

Your service is essential for your own spiritual growth. You may have never looked at it this way, but a growing Christian is always a serving Christian. Jesus was known for putting others first. When you serve in the church nursery, you are walking in this example.

Reason #6

The church nursery is the first contact young families will have with your church. Your friendly greeting and exceptional care for their children can make a great first impression for your church. If they don't feel like their children are safe, they will not return—and rightly so.

Reason #7

Your service in the church nursery is a powerful opportunity for prayer. If every nursery worker would spend several minutes praying over the children in their care, imagine how God might begin to change this coming generation. There is no better way to create an environment of spiritual nurture than to pray while you serve in the nursery.

Nurses notes

- It's picnic and family reunion time, which can be a real challenge for folks with diabetes. But you can do it! Look for high fiber, low-fat dishes, such as beans, peas, broccoli, spinach, or a pasta salad that contains lots of fresh vegetables. If necessary, offer to bring the rolls whole grain rolls! Watch out for dishes with a lot of dressings/mayonnaise, sour cream or butter. Stick with lean meats, fish or chicken (skinned) to fit approximately ¼ your plate. Top it all off with dessert of fresh fruit peaches, watermelon, cantaloupe or fruit salad. We can all benefit from eating like this! Add a tall cold glass of water with a twist of lemon. Does life get much better than this?!
- First Drug to Treat Cancer in Dogs Approved! The U.S. Food and Drug Administration recently announced the approval of Palladia (toceranib phosphate), the first drug developed specifically for the treatment of cancer in dogs. Palladia is approved to treat canine cutaneous (skin-based) mast cell tumors, a type of cancer responsible for about 1 out of 5 cases of canine skin tumors. All cancer drugs now used in veterinary medicine originally were developed for use in humans and are not approved for use in animals. Cancer treatments used in animals are used in an "extra-label" or "off-label" manner as allowed by the Animal Medicinal Drug Use Clarification Act of 1994. The most common side effects associated with Palladia are diarrhea, decrease or loss of appetite, lameness, weight loss, and blood in the stool. http://www.fda.gov/NewsEvents/Newsroom/PressAnnouncements/ucm164118.htm

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"Soon afterwards he went to a town called Nain, and his disciples and a large crowd went with him. As he approached the gate of the town, a man who had died was being carried out. He was his mother's only son, and she was a widow; and with her was a large crowd from the town. When the Lord saw her, he had compassion for her and said to her, "Do not weep." Then he came forward and touched the bier, and the bearers stood still. And he said, "Young man, I say to you, rise!" The dead man sat up and began to speak, and Jesus gave him to his mother." (Luke 7:11-15, NRSV).

If I were to ask you, "Who was healed in this story?", the logical answer would be, "Of course, the man!" That would be true, however a closer look at the gospel text would reveal that indeed two people were healed on that day. The son ... and his mother.

Those involved with health ministry have come to understand that the abundant/whole life that Jesus was sent to usher in, includes a variety of facets of our lives, both as individuals, and as congregations. There are many different models for health and wholeness. Probably the most familiar model is when we talk about a balance in mind, body and spirit. Indeed Moses is to have proposed this paradigm when he shared the commandment "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might." (Deuteronomy 6:5, NRSV). We hear it again, when a young lawyer asks Jesus, "Teacher, which commandment in the law is greatest?", and Jesus replies, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment" (Matt. 22: 36-38).

Beyond the obvious physical healing, this story – from the perspective of the widow of Nain – demonstrates other facets of wholeness as well. To be a widow and childless in Jesus time meant the possibility of a rather dire existence. With no husband, and now no son to support her, life would be pretty bleak. She was most likely past the age for bearing children which would rule out remarriage, and unless a close relative were to step in, it is likely that she would have been reduced to begging for food and money. Though many turned out to mourn her son's death, once the funeral had ended and the mourners gone back to their lives as usual, her newly acquired social standing would place her on the fringes of society.

Through the son's resurrection, the widow attains wholeness of mind (easing the emotional worries that loomed in her future & the pain of grief), body (having a son to provide support her physical needs), spirit (as a recipient of Jesus power to resurrect from the dead), but also in relationships (to the son, family, friends and society in general), and in financial security. The story pulls us into a deeper understanding of how we as the church, foster wholeness in our individual as well as our corporate lives.

You may ask, "Will we ever attain this wholeness – the perfect balance?" To that my response must be, "Probably not." We are human, so health and wholeness are on a continuum, but we are charged/challenged with the responsibility of being stewards of the life which God has given us. As with the widow of Nain and her son, only on the day of our resurrection through Christ will we attain and understand complete health and wholeness. That being said, I leave you with a few questions to ponder as you re-read the gospel text:

- In what aspects of mind, body, spirit, relationship to others, or finance, do you feel you are most strong? What are your weaknesses where do you need to grow?
- How is the wholistic health/balance of your congregation, and its leaders?
- How can you personally contribute to a climate of support and growth for all members of Christ's body

 the church?
- Are there additional factors that contribute to health and wholeness? and.

How do we individually support one another when life-as-we-know is turned upside-down? Who is left standing to help after the initial dust settles?
