Concert proceeds support patients at the Susquehanna Valley clinics of the North Central Pennsylvania Dialysis Clinics. Dialysis is a lifesustaining treatment which, despite technological and clinical advances, requires patients to spend three hours a day, three days a week, connected to a machine that cleans their blood. The treatment is rigorous for the patients and their families. With your help, the physical discomfort and psycho/social impact of treatment can be minimized for the nearly 200 patients per month receiving care.


Your participation in the concert isn't limited to your attendance. Sponsorships are available. Tribute gifts, in honor or in memory of a loved one, are especially welcome. All sponsors will be listed in the program. Concert proceeds provide the "extras" that sustain dialysis patients throughout the length of their treatment. In the very first year, distribution exceeded 240 cookbooks, necessitating a second order be placed to meet ongoing demand. The Continuing Reformation

[The following is adapted from a paper prepared by The Rev. Frank Senn, Senior of the Society of the Holy Trinity.]

Ecclesia semper reformanda.

"The church must always be reformed."

Martin Luther didn't say it; it was a medieval slogan. As Heiko Oberman pointed out, reformation was "a medieval event". It grew out of the experience of the monasteries, which were always growing lax with regard to the observance of its Rule, and which required calls for reform and renewal. Sometimes this led to splits in monastic communities: for example, the Cistercians split off from the main body of the Benedictines. Martin Luther belonged to the "observant" branch of the Augustians rather than the "conventual" branch. And, by the way, Luther was not, strictly speaking, a monk; he was a friar. Monks are cloistered religious; the friars were out and about on the streets and highways. So calls for reform were not new by the 16th century; and schism had been experienced-not only in religious communities, but in the papacy itself. The Protestant-Catholic schism was not the first schism in church history; but it was a pretty major one.

"The church must always be reformed." Once Luther's reform movement settled into being a church established by law in the cities, territories, and nations of central and northern Europe, it too needed reform. Two major reform movements within Lutheranism were Pietism in the late 17th and early 18th centuries, which set out to "convert the outward orthodox profession into a living theology of the heart." And then, after the period of rationalism during the Age of Enlightenment, there was a confessional revival movement which sought to recover the confessional identity of Lutheranism.

Our Evangelical Lutheran Church in America came into existence on a wave of ideologically-based culture wars. The idea was to transcend the differences between the merging church bodies by creating a "new" Lutheran Church which cut continuity with preceding traditions, sometimes in silly ways. For example, when pastors receive a letter from the ELCA they are addressed as "rostered leader," not "pastor." If you're trying to be relevant to the contemporary world, who in the world knows what a "rostered leader" is? But there have been more serious issues raising the concern among many about whether "this Church", as they use the language, takes seriously the Scriptures, creeds, and confessions.

Not surprisingly, almost from the very beginning of the ELCA there has been agitation for reform. In the early 1990s there were two "Call to Faithfulness" conferences sponsored by three independent Lutheran journals held at St. Olaf College, that attracted nearly a thousand participants paying their own way, people whom Presiding Bishop Chilstrom insinuated didn't love the Church. (Pastor Elkin attended the second of these.) Then the 9.5 Theses came out, claiming a crisis of faith" in the Church. More than 800 pastors and lay people subscribed to them. The leaders appealed to Presiding Bishop Anderson to at least have the Theses discussed in the Conference of Bishops, but he refused to put it on the agenda, saying that he would be proposing his own faith formation initiatives. Did he ever do that? Out of this intransigence, the Society of the Holy Trinity was born as an inter-Lutheran ministerium that seeks to renew the ordained ministry, a Society which Pr. Senn serves as leader (the title is Senior-that was Henry Melchior Muhlenberg's title, "senior of the ministerium") and which now numbers about 250 pastors in six different Lutheran church bodies in North America.

The task that the church needs to do remains the same: worship, study the Bible, discuss mission strategies and congregational life, and move beyond the culture wars that have dominated ELCA assemblies for twenty years.

In the 1530s there were a lot of ideas about reforming the Church. Luther had been calling for a free synod under the presidency of the emperor rather than the pope, to deal with the differences in theology and proposals for reform. He called for such a synod one last time in his 1539 treatise On the Councils and the Church. People were confused about where the true church was found. He said, "not in Rome; not even in Wittenberg," but where the word of God is preached and the sacraments of Christ are administered. In other words, not in the church-wide structure, and not even in the local judicatory, even if that local judicatory is more to your liking. He expanded this to discuss seven marks of the Church. Here is the basis of church reform and renewal, based not on human effort but on the divine means of grace. In a time of crisis when reform is needed, you go back to the basics. Here are the basics, said Luther, but in their fullness. He wrote:

The Children's Catechism teaches us that a Christian holy people is to be and to remain on earth until the end of the world. This is an article of faith that cannot be terminated until that which it believes comes, as Christ promises, "I am with you always, to the close of the age." But how will or how can a poor confused person tell where such Christian holy people are to be found in this world?

Then Luther goes on to list seven marks of the church. Where these things are happening, one can be assured that the church is living there.

- 1. The Holy Word of God
- 2. The Holy Sacrament of Baptism
- 3. The Sacrament of the Altar
- 4. The Office of the Keys publicly exercised
- 5. The Office of the Holy Ministry
- 6. The exercise of worship, prayer, and study
- 7. The participation in Christ's suffering

The seven marks are signs of the true visible Church. Where you see and experience these marks, you see and experience a real church. But these marks may also serve as the basis for reform and renewal. Renew the preaching of the Word, the practice of Baptism, Holy Communion, and Penance, the holy Ministry, and public prayer and worship, and experience the cross of Christ in our common life, and the church will be reformed.



HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"For he will command his angels concerning you to guard you in all your ways. On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone." (Ps. 91:11-12NRSV)

The psalmist reminds us of God's unceasing love and desire to protect us, but let's face it, he needs our cooperation - particularly when it comes to avoiding unnecessary risk to the health and safety of his people.

It is already November, and time to think about the holidays, and visits with our families. With so many people traveling, driving safety takes on critical importance at these times, especially for those drivers who are carrying precious cargo – their children. Below are ten mistakes parents too often make when installing a child's car seat::

- Using a car seat without knowing its history. It is tempting to borrow a child car seat from a family member or friend, or to purchase one at a yard/tag sale, but think twice before doing so. The seat should be labeled with the manufacturer date and model number. Check for any recalls by going to: http://www.odi.nhtsa.gov/recalls/childseat.ftm Do not use it if the seat is more than six years old, has visible cracks, or has been in a crash.
- *Placing the seat in the wrong spot.* The safest place is in the back seat, away from active air bags. For those cars equipped with sidecurtain air bags, be sure to read the car seat instructions and car owner's manual for any additional precautions.
- Using the car seat as a replacement crib. [According to MayoClinic.com] A study from 2009 indicated that sitting upright in a car seat to sleep, may compress a newborn's chest and lead to lower levels of oxygen. Be sure the infant seat is always reclined. Even mild airway obstruction can have developmental consequences.
- Not Reading instructions carefully. Make sure the child seat is secure allow no more than one inch of movement from side-to-side or front-to-back and that it is facing the right direction! If using an infant or convertible seat in the rear-facing position, be sure to use the harness slots described in the car seat's instruction manual. Thread the [harness] straps through the car seat shell and pad. Place the harness or chest clip even with your child's armpits not at the abdomen or neck, insuring that it is lying flat against your baby's chest and over his/her hips with no slack. Position the car seat's handle according to manufacturer's instructions. Don't hang things from the handle.
- *Improperly trying to keep your child upright.* Recline the car seat according to manufacturer's instructions so that your infant's head does not flop forward. You can place a tightly rolled towel, or "swim "noodle" at the vehicle seat bight (curve), then position the car seat on the raised object. If the baby slouches down or to the side of the car seat, place padding around (never under or behind) him/her.
- *Moving to a forward-facing car seat too soon.* It is tempting to face the car seat forward so you can see your child's face, but don't do this until the child weighs 30-40 pounds. Start with a convertible seat, or go from an infant seat to a different seat as the child grows. Always install the seat according to the manufacturers and car owner's manual instructions.
- *Dressing your child in bulky outerwear.* The child's chest harness may not be as effective when placed over padded clothing. If it is cold, dress the child in a lightweight jacket and hat. Buckle the harness snugly, then tuck a blanket around the child for warmth.
- *Moving to a booster seat too soon.* Older kids need a booster seat to allow for an adult safety belt to fit properly. You will know this when: your child has topped the weight height limits of the current (often 40-80 lbs.) seat; your child's shoulders are above the car seat's top harness slots; your child's ears have reached the top of the car seat.
- Using a booster seat incorrectly. Booster seats without a harness must be used with a lap and shoulder belt never a lap-only belt! Make sure the lap belt lies low and snug across your child's upper thighs and that the shoulder belt crosses the middle of your child's chest and shoulder (not the neck). Some booster seats have no back. Backless seats also must be used with a lap and shoulder belt never a lap-only belt. If your vehicle has low seat backs or does not have a headrest to protect your child's head and neck in a crash, consider using a high-back booster that fits your child's height and weight.
- Using the vehicle safety belt too soon. Most kids are ready to safely use an adult seat belt/shoulder harness between the ages of 8 and 12. Your child is ready when he/she reaches a height of 4 feet 9 inches, and your child sits against the back of the vehicle seat with his/ her knees bent comfortably at the edge of the seat. The lap belt rests flat across his/her upper thighs, and the shoulder belt rests on you're child's shoulder not on the neck or throat!

Finally, do not allow your child to tuck the shoulder belt under his/her arm or behind their back. Stay away from products that promise to make the belts fit better, and *never, ever* buckle 2 children in one seatbelt. If you have questions, contact your state highway safety office for information on how to safely use a child seat. In addition, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration can help you find a child car seat inspection station in your area. 
