From the Pastor: Sermons

Have you wondered how the sermon comes to us each week? What authority does it have? What difference does it make? Dr. William Willimon has some thoughtful comments:

When a sermon is preached, it is based on external authorization. The integrity of the preacher, the preacher's rhetorical gifts, and the setting of the sermon may all be possible sources of homiletical authority. Yet none of these sources of authority are as significant as scripture. Christian preaching has always been Biblical preaching. Our earliest sermons in the book of Acts and bits of sermons in the letters of Paul all show that gospel speakers do not begin with the present, in the speaker's experience, or in an astute assessment of the current

situation. They begin with the bible, with citation of and remembrance of scripture. Jesus spoke of that wise scribe who brings forth from the treasure of the tradition what is old and what is new. (Mt.13:52)

We begin with the assumption that the Bible is a gift of God that uniquely illuminates human life in the present, and that uniquely, indispensably speaks the promises of God and the truth that is God in Christ Jesus.....We realize that we are entering a difficult and demanding world, not because the Bible is ancient and Jewish, but because it is a world that is based upon convictions and assumptions (i.e. Jesus is *Lord) that are quite different from our own.*

....So many times for us a text has been a vessel that carries us from one place to another, a door that opened to us, leading us into a new existence.

....The Biblical preacher proclaims as the text proclaims, confident that the text is still quite capable of evoking a good hearing, despite either the limits of either the preacher or the listener. As Acts says it, the word of God is so lively, interesting and explosive that, even through our pitiful efforts, by the grace of God, "The word of the Lord grew and prevailed mightily." (Acts 19:20) "The word of God increased and the number of disciples multiplied greatly." (Acts 6:7)

....The preacher is the one who is ordained by the church to engage in listening to the text on behalf of the church. ["The Authority of the Word," an article from Homiletical Resources., Winter 2009-10]

Pastor Elkin's sermons are available most weeks in print in the narthex before the service and have been made available online for the past three years as well on our congregational website, stmarkswilliamsport.org. When a question is "what was said?", look it up on the site; when the question is "what does that mean?" please call Pr. Elkin for a conversation.

Nurse's Notes

Nurse's Notes, December 2009

December 6 There has been some confusion regarding how long one should stay out of work or school after flu-like illnesses. According to the CDC, individuals "with influenza-like illness [should] remain at home until at least 24 hours after they are free of fever (100 degrees F), or signs of fever without the use of fever-reducing medications". (http://www.cdc.gove/h1n1flu/guidance/exclusion.htm)

December 13 Pull-cords on drapes continue to pose a threat of strangulation for infants and toddlers. The Consumer Product Safety Commission [CPSC] offers the following safety tips to prevent deaths and injuries associated with window covering cords:

- * Examine all shades and blinds in the home. CPSC recommends the use of cordless window coverings in all homes where children live or visit. Make sure there are no accessible cords on the front, side, or back of the product.
- * Do not place cribs, beds and furniture close to the windows because children can climb on them and gain access to the cords.
- * Make loose cords inaccessible.
- * If the window shade has looped bead chains, install tension devices to keep the cord taut.


Note: Most window blinds sold prior to November 2000 have inner cords (for raising the slats of the blinds) that can be pulled by a child and form a loop in which the child's neck can entangle. Consumers should immediately repair these types of blinds. For a free repair kit, call the Window Covering Safety Council at 800-506-4636 or visit www.wondowcoverings.org In addition, ask your child-care provider to check their blinds and window coverings as well.

December 20 Liquid potpourri can harm your pet. "Filling your house with the smell of pine or peppermint may seem inviting, but if you're partial to heating your scented oil in a simmer pot, know that it can cause serious harm to your cat. These oils are toxic to cats, and even a few licks can result in severe chemical burns in the mouth, fever, difficulty breathing, and tremors (shakes). Dogs aren't quite as sensitive, but it's still wise to scent your home with a non-toxic candle kept safely out of your pet's reach." (*Prevention Magazine*, December 2009, pg. 126)

December 27 Did you know that only 2 tablespoons of sunflower seeds can supply nearly 40% of the recommended daily allowance of Vitamin E – an antioxidant that helps prevent sun damage? For a healthy crunch, sprinkle them onto your salad instead of croutons. (*Prevention Magazine*, December 2009, pg. 36)

Consecration Sunday Report

The Treasurer is pleased to report that the Consecration Sunday totals exceeded last year in significant ways. 99 cards were returned this year, compared with 103 last year. There were 32 increases in estimates compared with 31 last year. The dollar figures for estimates of giving total \$212,959 this year and \$217,015 last year. The more cards returned, the better, so that the Treasurer does not need to do as much guesswork concerning those who do not fill out the estimate cards. It is never too late to give an estimate card, and if the figure needs to be adjusted during the year, a phone call to the Financial Secretary can make the needed change.



HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

(W)holy, (W)holy, (W)holy Health, Healing and Wholeness Article December 2009

"Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good...All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses." (1Corinthians 12:4-7, 11)

Here we are, once again, in the season of gift-giving. For some, Christmas may be a little different this year, because economics have shaped the way we celebrate. Many have found it necessary to limit the amount of money spent on gifts to loved ones; some may have eliminated gift giving altogether. Some may be finding themselves celebrating at home vs. traveling by car or plane to loved ones in other states. This is not a bad thing! Perhaps it is time that we give more deliberate time and thought toward celebrating the season more simply, for when we don't make the connection between Christ and our gift-giving, Santa becomes the spirit of Christmas.

Throughout the past month, I've been gathering a few non-traditional ideas for gift-giving this Christmas, and I would like to share them with you.

- * Instead of putting them away or tossing them, keep cards and well-wishes in a small basket where they can be savored throughout the year. Meditate on the words announcing the coming of the greatest gift that has ever been given.
- * Instead of buying gifts, make donations to your local United Way or charity/charities that are significant in the lives of your loved ones. Mother Teresa once said, "It is Christmas every time you let God love others through you ... Yes it is Christmas every time you smile at your brother and offer your hand." These gifts keep on giving long after the garland and tinsel are put away!
- * Give handmade gifts this year.
- * Give your children a Shepherd's pouch a simple drawstring bag in which to collect loose change throughout the month use the money to purchase a gift for someone in need. Worship together before setting out to do so.
- * Instead of a tree this year, arrange gifts under a crèche [manger].
- * During a meal together, ask one another, "If Jesus were sitting next to you, what would you give him this Christmas? Why?"
- * Buy baby items, wrap and place them with the other gifts donate them to a social service agency that deals with infants.
- * Host a baby Jesus Christmas/birthday party for your family and neighborhood kids. Have each family bring a gift to be donated to a service agency, or shelter that houses children.
- * Give your children an age-appropriate crèche to play with. Tell them the Christmas story and have them act it out with the figures. Remember though, the Wise Men came *after* the birth of the baby Jesus!
- * Throughout the coming year, have Jesus "grow up" What qualities did he possess? Pick Bible verses to read and discuss as a family.

Finally, one of the greatest gifts we can give is to be patient and merciful to others. For "to each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good". Be the light of Christ to others not only on December 25, but throughout the coming year. Let others come to know him through your words and deeds.
