FAMILY PROMISE OF LYCOMING COUNTY OPENING!

It was a cold night in February three years ago when the public first gathered to hear about the possibility of Family Promise becoming active in our community. The Lutheran Pastors of the area had first heard about this program and encouraged its introduction. An interest group gradually coalesced and began the process of recruiting congregations to eventually be hosts for homeless families.

HOSTS St. Mark's was the first congregation to officially say Yes to hosting. At present, there are 13 Lutheran, Methodist, Presbyterian, and Roman Catholic congregations on board to become hosts, as well as four more as supporting congregations. We are continuing to search for additional parishes in both categories, but we have enough to begin the work.

DAY CENTER The headquarters for the network is the parsonage given rent free to the network by Redeemer Lutheran Church on Washington Blvd. This fine house has been cleaned, a second bathroom will be added shortly, appliances have been installed, and equipment and supplies are being gathered. There are small repairs to complete, and everything should be in readiness for our opening.

TRANSPORTATION The way for our guests to get from the hosting congregations to the Day Center is by 15 passenger van. After an extensive search, an excellent van was located and purchased using grants from the Plankenhorn Foundation and the Lycoming Community Foundation. It is parked at St. Mark's in readiness for use.



LEADERSHIP The development process has been undertaken by a Core Committee. In due course the Core Committee elected a Board to be the official governing body for Family Promise of Lycoming County, which was officially registered as an IRS501c3 charitable organization. The first officers of the Board are Kristi Hammaker of Messiah Lutheran as president, Pastor Kenneth Elkin of St. Mark's as Vice-President, Donna Maxwell of First United Methodist as Secretary, and Colleen Klinger of Lycoming Centre Presbyterian as Treasurer. The Board in turn has interviewed candidates and at length has selected the first Director for the network, Sarah McCloskey, a licensed clinical social worker now residing with her family in Lock Haven. This is the only paid position in the network. Sarah began officially on March 22 to organize all of the persons and materials needed to operate the organization.

FINANCES The big and continuing problem will be securing sufficient funds to operate. Each hosting congregation needs to contribute significantly to the network, and each supporting congregation will find appropriate ways to do so also. We need to increase the number of supporting congregations dramatically, for even a congregation that is small or whose building does not lend itself to being a host can still lend a hand by way of financial giving, as well as offering volunteers in another congregation's week to host. Individuals also can contribute directly to *Family Promise of Lycoming County*, 142 Market Street, Williamsport PA. Any who can are urged to become a member of *Club 180*, offering a gift of 50 cents per day toward the cause, or \$180 per year. (allowing 5 ¼ days vacation per year). Gifts in any amount are welcome, either through a hosting or supporting congregation, or directly. One can also take part in various fund-raising activities such as *Iron Chef Williamsport* on April 25, 2010 by purchasing a ticket and /or becoming a patron of the event. (Call 323-4619)

TRAINING It is crucial for the success of the network that everyone understand and apply the appropriate procedures for operations. Family Promise is active now in 163 communities around the nation and has thus gathered considerable experience in how best to organize. Locally, everyone who participates in any capacity will be trained in these best practices. Led by a representative from the national organization, training for Board members took place on March 22, for the volunteers in the first hosting congregation St. Mark's on March 23, and for the coordinators from the 13 congregations on March 24. Subsequent training will be led by the new Director, Sarah McCloskey. Anyone who has contact with the guests will be expected to participate in training.



OPENING It is anticipated that the network will be ready to open on April 12. There is still much to do in preparation, but enthusiasm and energy for this new congregational ministry of hospitality have the congregations, volunteers, board, and director on the move toward that end. The first three weeks of hosting will be St. Mark's Lutheran, Messiah Lutheran, and Covenant-Central Presbyterian. The entire first rotation schedule will be announced soon.

Are You A Fool?



Both Psalm 14:1 & 53:1 reads, "The fool has said in his heart there is no God." On the first of April, people will be trying to make fools out of others for fun. But when one makes a fool of oneself, by disbelief in God, that is serious. This is the fool nobody can laugh at. Why is a person a fool not to believe in God?

Creation Declares God: The creation leads a sensible person to acknowledge God's existence. The heavens are telling the glory of God, and the sky is declaring the work of his hands" (Psa 19:1 Rom 1:19-20). We may not be able to know or to prove the certainty of God's existence if we look only at the natural world. But the hypothesis at least cannot be denied, except foolishly. There is exquisite design and order in the created world, all the more remarkable when we observe it emerging from chaos. It is foolish to say categorically in the

face of this, "There is no God."

God Declares Himself: God has revealed himself to mankind. God's truth was placed in the world. Paul asserts that, since the creation of the world, "they knew God" (Rom 1:21). Even pagan peoples retain some of that revelation in recognizable form. Then of course there is the Holy Bible which reveals God and his purpose for mankind.

Jesus Christ Reveals God: In an even more special manner, God revealed himself in Jesus of Nazareth. The testimony about his existence, his crucifixion and resurrection from the dead, is in the form of written eye-witness documents. The story of Jesus Christ is a matter of fact, not of superstition. "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld his glory" is one eye-witness's testimony (1Jn 1:1-4 John 1:1,14). There are no reasonable grounds for rejecting such evidence.

In conclusion, the natural universe, the general knowledge of right and wrong and Jesus himself, combine to lead anyone but a fool to believe in God, and in his scheme of redemption for life everlasting through his Son.

On April Fools' Day, or any other day, don't be the silliest fool of all —the fool who, in his heart or hers, says, "There is no God."

The Scholarship Program

The St. Paul Lutheran Church Scholarship Program was founded by the congregation of the former St. Paul Lutheran Church in Williamsport, Pennsylvania. St. Paul Lutheran Church, prior to its closing, established this special scholarship program to benefit Lutheran students in Lycoming County, Pennsylvania, in perpetuity.

Eligibility

Eligible candidates will be graduating seniors of a high school, or a high school graduate equivalent, located in Lycoming County, Pennsylvania. Candidates must be members of a Lutheran church, and eligible candidates also include those individuals who were members of St. Paul Lutheran Church in Williamsport, Pennsylvania, at the time of its closing. Candidates must be attending, or plan to attend in the 2010-2011 academic year, an institution of higher education (academic, technical, or vocational). Eligible candidates must also have a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale and demonstrate involvement in church and community. Candidates may reapply in successive years for scholarships available from this program.

Scholarship Awards

Scholarships awarded in 2010 will be available only for the 2010-2011 academic year. Scholarship awards may be used only for educational expenses, including tuition, books, laboratory expenses, or other education-related expenditures that are approved by the Foundation.

Selection of Recipients

The number of scholarships awarded, the amount of the scholarship awards, and the selection of scholarship recipients will be determined by the Foundation.

Application Process and Deadline

Students who wish to apply to the scholarship program must complete an application and required letters of recommendation and submit materials postmarked no later than **April 15**, **2010**.

HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"Then he took curds and milk and the calf that he had prepared, and set it before them; and he stood by them under the tree while they ate." (Genesis 18:8, NRSV)

Some Biblical scholars believe that the *curd* with which Abraham fed his heavenly visitors, might actually have been a form of what we now call yogurt (NLV). Indeed the word yogurt comes from the Turkish for "thick milk". Both curds and yogurt come from milk; however, there is a slight difference in the way each is produced. Yogurt is produced by introducing certain types of edible, helpful bacteria [probiotics] to milk and allowing fermentation to occur (breaking down the sugar lactose). Curds, on the other hand, are produced by the curdling of milk with an enzyme called 'rennet' or by adding an edible acid, such as lemon juice or vinegar, to the milk. These acids cause milk proteins to tangle into solid masses, or curds. Milk and milk products – from a variety of sources [goat, cow, camel] played a vital role in the daily lives of the Hebrew people, and are mentioned numerous times throughout the Bible.

Perhaps you have seen ads on TV or in magazines for a "new" type of yogurt which promises "to be scientifically proven to help with slow intestinal transit when eaten daily for two weeks as part of a balanced diet and healthy lifestyle" [it relieves constipation], thanks to the introduction of something called *Bifidus regularis*. *Bifidus wha-is?* Bifidus regularis is a probiotic – helpful bacteria that when added to food (in this case, yogurt) and ingested, helps to maintain the natural balance of organisms in the intestines. Helpful bacteria are "vital to proper development of the immune system, to protection against microorganisms that could cause disease, and to the digestion and absorption of food and nutrients." (www.nccam.nih.gov – *Get the Facts: An Introduction to Probiotics*). Foods containing probiotics include yogurt, miso, tempeh, and some soy beverages. The National Center for Complementary and Alternative Medicines (NCCAMM) reports that sales of probiotics in the US nearly tripled from 1994-2003.

For years, doctors have encouraged the use of regular yogurt as a means to correct diarrhea that is linked to antibiotic use (antibiotics tend to eliminate both good and bad bacteria in places such as the digestive track). A decrease in beneficial bacteria can also lead to other infections within the urinary tract, and trigger yeast infection in women. Scientific studies of probiotics continue. The NCCAM indicates that there is "some encouraging evidence" that specific probiotic forms may be useful in:

- treating other types of diarrhea, especially rotavirus (the plague of daycares)
- treating irritable bowel syndrome (IBS)
- · reducing recurrence of bladder cancer
- shortening how long an intestinal infection lasts when caused by a bacterium called *Clostridium difficile* or *C.diff* (a particularly nasty bacteria that causes intestinal infection in some long-term-care settings)
- preventing and managing atopic dermatitis (eczema) in children. (Get the facts ...)

So... does it really work? More information is needed, in particular in probiotic use by small children, the elderly, pregnant or nursing mothers, or by folks who have a compromised immune system. But there is promise. Tufts University School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine is studying the possibility of certain probiotics being used to treat diarrhea in undernourished children of third world countries.

Side effects of use are typically mild, but can include allergy, gas or bloating, and there is always the potential for adverse interaction with prescription and over-the-counter medications. The bottom line is this, always consult your health care provider before you plan to use <u>any</u> form of dietary supplement, including probiotics.




