# Consecration Sunday - October 24th

Consecration Sunday is October 24 this year. We understand the concept that, from a biblical perspective, financial stewardship is not money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, we know that financial contributions are a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes. Since this goes against our natural tendencies to want to regard everything as our own possessions, we must continue to think about this and make it a part of our life a bit at a time.

Consecration Sunday is a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving. We are not members of a social club who should pay dues, we are followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. We must look into our hearts and ask ourselves: "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

Every attendee and member who completes an Estimate of Giving Card, does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday, October 24. We urge everyone to attend, even those who are hesitant to complete a card, because the procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend worship on Consecration Sunday, October 24. In the coming weeks, please think prayerfully about the blessings God has given to you, and about how you are called to share those blessings.

The other part of the event is the celebration meal that follows each worship service on October 24. At services on October 10 and 17 we'll be asking for your reservation for the breakfast following the 8:30 service or the lunch following the 10:30 service on Consecration Sunday. It is important that every member take part.

Our guest speaker is our own Lou Kolb. We know him as a skilled speaker, regular lector here at St. Mark's, popular radio announcer, and husband of Kathy who runs Kolb Networks from their home/office. We also know him as a committed, caring Christian leader who has important things to say to us, his brothers and sisters in the faith at St. Mark's.

# Go With God, Dick Lakey!

Dear Friends:

For some time, I have been struggling with the decision to leave St. Mark's for the part-time position of organist and choir director at St. Luke Lutheran Church. It has been an extremely difficult decision, and after an enormous amount of thought and prayer, I have decided to accept the position at St. Luke.



In early August, upon learning of the death of the organist and choir director Elaine Erhard, I approached the members of the search com-



mittee at St. Luke Lutheran Church. Neither the committee members nor the pastors pursued me. As a matter of fact, they were concerned about possible problems that might arise because of my approaching them concerning the music position. They did not want in any manner to damage the relationship between the members and pastors of St. Luke and the members and pastor of St. Mark's. The decision to

leave St. Mark's is completely mine, and of course I will not encourage people to follow me to St. Luke.

I wish to express my feelings of gratitude for the many years that I have been privileged to spend with the members, the family of St. Mark's. I find that many good memories abound when looking back on the years spent together. Just to mention a few would include the children's musicals and all the joy and hard work that went into them; watching the kids grow into adults and then seeing their children having a similar



joy with music; the Senior Choir anthems and larger choral works, along with the picnics and choir dinners; 20 years of the Dialysis concerts; the



organ and spacious sanctuary; the Handbell Choirs and the joy of having 11 people ring the same piece of music at the same time; the Lunch N' Fellowship group and our monthly meals, and some really fun bus trips. Most important in this very brief list would be all of the people and their commitment to rehearsals and the music at St.

Mark's. Adding one more to this list is my gratefulness to so many people who were so patient and kind during the medical challenges I faced over the years.

Although I feel it is time for me to walk down a new path, the people of St. Mark's will remain close in my heart and thoughts.



Dick's resignation is especially poignant to me because I was one of those on the search committee who helped to bring him to St. Mark's thirty-three years ago. I met him at the airport and sat with the other committee members to listen to him play the organ – we were convinced from the start that he was the one.

Fred Snell had been a mainstay in our church for decades and we weren't sure he could be replaced. But it was clear from the beginning Dick had his own special style which very quickly captivated all of us. My daughter remembers that all the young ladies were smitten with him and with his warm personality he endeared himself to us very quickly. I couldn't begin to list the youth productions he directed running the gamut from Joseph's Technicolor Dreamcoat to Noah's Ark to the Wizard of Oz. Some of the productions were composed by Dick.

He is a brilliant composer and has given us many anthems which have been performed by the Senior Choir and also the Lycoming College Choir. In addition, each week of the church year we use verses which have been composed by Dick.

Beyond all of these special talents, he has a warmth which is contagious to everyone he meets. His lunch and fellowship events, the multitude of meat loaves and spaghetti, have provided great fellowship opportunities.

So many years, so many memories – we have laughed with Dick, we have cried with him in his struggles with his health issues but most of all we have loved him as a member of our family. He will take a part of all of our hearts as he goes into a new congregation. We wish him well but I know I speak for all of us when I quote these lines:

"And yet I'm glad our lives have touched,

That we have come to meet.

I'm glad for every dream we shared

The bitter and the sweet.

And years cannot erase the joy

The gladnesses sublime;

Dear friend, please know within my heart

I'm glad your life touched mine.


# HARVEST HOME SUNDAY OCTOBER 10, 2010



# Opportunity for Women to Minister at Muncy Prison

The Pennsylvania Prison Society, a non-profit organization dating to 1787, is looking for about 20 women to volunteer as mentors at Muncy Prison with their "Building Bridges-Second Chances Initiative." The mentors would help women transition to living a proper life back in their home communities (mostly in

Philadelphia and Pittsburgh). The mentor would begin meeting with a mentee about 9-12 months before her release, visit her twice per month in prison, and then follow-up with her for one year afterwards. During the follow-up period, the mentor would help her mentee in connecting with resources, including faith communities, back home.

The ability for a mentor to maintain healthy interpersonal boundaries is a must. This is a great opportunity as we consider Jesus' words of Matthew 25:36, "I was in prison and you visited me."



On Friday and Saturday, December 3 and 4, 2010, Lutheran Shared Ministry (LSM) will present <u>A Christmas Carol</u>, dinner theatre style, in Fellowship Hall at St. Mark's Lutheran Church. All donations will go to United Campus Ministry.

On Sunday, September 26, at 1:00 p.m., and Monday evening September 27, 2008, at 6:30, auditions and a volunteer sign-up will be held in the Nave at St. Mark's. Willing folk from all the congregations in LSM are welcome to audition and sign up to assist with meal preparation and service, scenic construction and painting, costumes, props and other technical needs.

## HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"He called a child, whom he put among them, and said,
'Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.
Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven.
Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me'." (Matthew 18:2-5, NRSV)

Well, it's been one and half months since you've dropped Junior off in front of his college dorm. Before you know it, it is mid-October, and time for your young scholar to make his first visit home for the weekend. Just enough time has elapsed that the clothes he took with him can no longer be recycled (desperately need to be washed), and need to be replaced with gear for cooler weather. You've adjusted well to the empty nest— transformed that empty bedroom into a great exercise area, with free weights and elliptical machine. Sure, those first few weeks were tough for you! Sometimes the silence seemed deafening, but you've adjusted to it well — you are now able to hear the clatter of the dog's toenails on the linoleum floor — the whomp, whomp, whomp sound of clothes tumbling around in the dryer, and the phone actually ringing because no one is constantly tying up the line! Yes — things have changed, and you both know it!

Since he's been gone, and has tasted the sweet nectar of independence, it is unrealistic to think that the same home rules that kept chaos at bay six months ago, still apply. So, it's time to re-think, and re-negotiate the potential minefield of this first visit. Hopefully your channels of communication have been open (both ways) over the past six weeks, however, you can still expect some awkwardness when it comes to living under the same roof again, even if it is only a weekend. Who is this person who now has the sleep habits of a vampire? This young man you rarely actually see – because he's spending time comparing notes with his buddies who are all home for the weekend as well? Well, parents— congratulations! You've done your job admirably and there is no going back. He is breaking away, and becoming an independent young adult!

Now, if you've done *your* homework, you've taken some time to sit down with Junior (if not in person, at least by email), and discussed everyone's expectations prior to this time of brief re-entry to the mother ship. Here are just a few things you may want to consider and negotiate, before someone's expectations bump up against someone else's rules of common courtesy during the visit:

- Above all, let him know that you are very happy to have him home, and, at least inwardly, acknowledge that this is a time of redefining roles for everyone.
- Expect some differences of opinion and respectfully acknowledge them. Some teens need an opportunity to share
  what they have learned. Conversely, don't turn the visit into Are You Smarter than a Fifth Grader, or Deal or no
  Deal!
- If you haven't already done this, prepare him for the change in his bedroom (some folks recommend not changing the room at least for the first year or two), he may be thrilled to have his own home-gym!
- Discuss things such as curfew, being present (or not) for meals, letting you know where he will be, and what his schedule may be (as a release from the grind of studying, paper-writing and test taking, some kids need to crash/sleep till noon, while others want to constantly be on the go ... catching up with as many friends as possible).
- If he uses the family car, who is responsible for re-filling the gas tank? Who pays for entertainment (movies, eating out with buddies or girlfriend)? If he has his own wheels, where should he park?
- Will there be friends dropping by? Spending the night?
- What about chores? Is he expected to take up where he left off with taking out the garbage, and feeding the dog? What expectations are there regarding keeping his room in order?
- Who is responsible for the laundry?
- Is there an expectation that he will be attending worship with the family?

This really *isn't* the same kid you dropped off six weeks ago – he's been replaced by a young adult, eager to make his own decisions, and just as ready to make his own mistakes. It's time for you, as his parent, to step back and admire the foundation that you've laid for him, as he continues on this new journey in life.
