- Made a nursing home visit.
- Stopped off for a guick sandwich for lunch.
- Made a hospital visit and also saw the patient's relatives.
- Greeted a person in the hospital hallway at whose wedding I officiated several years ago and at whose son's funeral I officiated only a few weeks later.
- Gave directions to a lost driver.
- Set tables for the evening's American Guild of Organist dinner at church which Donna is to host, since she was at the hospital for tests.
- Caught up on the day's emails.
- Attempted a phone call to a member, not available.
- Made a birthday telephone call to a member.
- Caught up on information about the local Albright Care facility.
- Had an extended conversation with a member.
- Sometimes after 3 PM, went home.
- Watered the landscaping we planted yesterday.
- Two loads of wash.
- Supper alone since Donna was at AGO.
- Repaired a recliner chair.
- Prepared for the arrival of Donna's sister and her husband and family conversation time.
- Actually had to run the whole-house fan because it was such a warm evening.
- Got to bed sometime before 11 PM



Holiday Visiting Tips: A Message for the Faith Community and Friends of Alzheimer's Families.

People with dementia continue to relate to the world even without words. Most crave the company of people and conversations, even if they cannot participate as well as they once did. They often understand much of what you are saying, or at least pieces, even in later stages when they may be living in a care facility. KEEP TALKING! Become a good storyteller (or story reader). Reminisce out loud about shared memories. When you tell someone your stories or details of your life, the person listening feels important. They feel as if they still matter to others. For those of you who are social magpies ... after years of politely sharing conversation time, and not dominating discussion, THIS IS YOUR CHANCE! Feel free to help fill the gaps of the conversation. Enjoy yourself – the more you do it the easier it gets!

Alzheimer's and dementia families often look to the church as a special source of emotional and spiritual strength. For some caregivers who have been forced to give up other interests and activities, the church may be the last source of social contact and respite. These folks suggest a number of ways the church community can be supportive:

- Provide occasional relief from care tasks. Some churches provide meals for a month, or a summer of yard work, or minor home repairs for others in need.
- If you are delivering a meal, plan to share an occasional meal together.
- Transportation for the caregiver who does not drive.
- Assure non-judgmental acceptance of the family caregiver's style of managing.
- Cultivate community. Spend time, but on the caregiver's terms.
- ♦ Offer small surprises a book you read and found meaningful, a box of herbal tea.
- Accept feelings without judgment, and maintain confidences. Recognize their need to grieve.
- Offer specific help. And check with the caregiver before initiating it. Circumstances can change from day-to-day. New needs arise, so be flexible they know their situation best.
- Be dependable. Never offer any type of help unless you truly plan to follow through.
- Visit regularly if you can. If the loved one with dementia seems to enjoy the time with you, your visit was a lovely gift to him/her.
- If you will be making several visits, start a project that you can work on together with the person needing care. Wrap yarn balls or stack quilt pieces together.
- Persons in long-term-care facilities may miss touch, and enjoy having their hair brushed, or a gentle hand massage. Ask staff before offering the massage, and ask permission of the person with dementia as well. Remember that skin is often fragile, joints may be painful, or the care receiver may bruise easily. Ladies may also enjoy having their nails painted.
- Try to consciously balance your concern for both the caregiver and the care receiver.

Changes in memory and thinking can be frightening to the person with dementia. It is reassuring to know that despite his declining abilities, the church community still care and will not turn away from him. Remember, "An ear is worth a thousand tongues." Sometimes just listening is better than talking ... but not always!
