### For our thought and action in this Advent season:

National news bulletin: "Business researchers in the US predict a 2% increase in sales in November and December, leading to the best year for retailers since 2006."

International news bulletin: *Ireland asks for a multi-billion bailout for its banks which are in danger of failing because of the collapse of the real estate market.* Spain and Portugal are not far behind.

Local situation: Man interrupts himself asking the pastor for assistance in order to take a text message on his fancy cell phone.

Local situation: Woman, truly distraught, can't decide which bill to pay first.

The word that one never hears uttered when we discuss these situations personal and international is "sin." The old-fashioned sins of wrath, greed, sloth, lust, gluttony, pride, and envy are still very much with us, and active in our lives. Advent would be an excellent time for us to acknowledge this truth and to consciously engage in the ongoing struggle against them. One does not need a personal therapist to begin asking questions such as: What is the balance between what I want and what I truly need? Can I do some push-aways now so that I don't have to waste money on another failed diet plan later? Is my motivation in gift purchasing the secret wish that I receive something of equal or greater value in return? Is a 42" TV better than a 32"? Do I really need to get out of bed for worship? and...and....

In whatever situation, personal or international, everyone tries to push off the fault for the problem onto someone else. From the youth who says "not me" to the business or na-

tion that is "too big to fail", the first step needs to be accepting responsibility for sin. Yes, it is painful for us all, but necessary. Then we can move to the second step which is asking the Lord God and each other for forgiveness. Yes, that is embarrassing, and also necessary. And the third step can then proceed, amendment of life, changing our ways, backing up and trying again, reconciling with those whom we have wronged. Yes, it is complicated, but necessary.

When I sat down to write this message, I had intended to focus on the St. Nicholas, the one who lived in the 4th century in Asia Minor and who is commemorated on December 6. But we cannot really appreciate what he did (at least according to the legendary accounts of his life) until we come to grips with personal responsibility and our ongoing battle with sin. Then, things which he did will make sense: such things as arguing for the truth of the Gospel at the Council of Nicaea, or quietly slipping enough gold to a poor family so that they would not be forced to sell their daughters into slavery.

May the words "sin" and "responsibility" resonate in our lives this Advent season. May we engage them thoughtfully as we work and play and shop and worship and give. May the seven vices of wrath, greed, sloth, lust, gluttony, pride, and envy not be the definition of our lives, but instead may seven virtues be in the front of our minds: chastity, temperance, charity, diligence, patience, kindness, and humility.

- ended the session with Prayer at the Close of the Day led by Dinah Labenberg.

### HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

I've heard it said that the only people who enjoy a change are babies; however, I would tend to disagree. Sure, there are those of us who long for the good-old-days, when life was slower, but there are just as many of us who relish the idea of facing new challenges, learning, and using the energy born of change to try something we've never tried before ... whether it be surf sailing, sky diving, moving to a new town/location, or replacing the old family car. Change can feel threatening, however, I would suggest that there are a number of ways that we can take the fear of change, and turn it into something new and meaningful in our lives. Here are just a few general guidelines to make dealing with change a little less stressful:

- Acknowledge and accept that change is inevitable! It comes faster and faster, and no one is exempt from it. Changes will occur whether you like it or not. Denying, disliking, or trying to ignore it will not make it go away. If you are one of those who dread change, acknowledge it to yourself, your loved ones and God. Do an internal check are you telling yourself negative thoughts, or thinking in an unbending way? When it cannot be stopped, we need to work at accepting the outcome, adjusting to it, and integrating it into our lives as best we can.
- Whenever possible, plan for change. Changing is so much easier when it is done voluntarily. It allows us to feel more "in control" and able to make the adjustment on our own terms. Examples include retirement, an "empty nest", caring for a loved one planning allows us to approach the change in an organized fashion. Yes, there will be times when change is forced upon us, so we need to learn to cope as best we can. Talk it through with your pastor, parish nurse, a good friend or mentor. You might be surprised to learn, upon examination, that there are still small ways we can take control of the situation.
- Learn about change and the process of adapting to it. The more we understand, the better equipped we are to deal with, and adapt to it. It prepares us to understand what is or is not normal in our emotional responses to the change. The more you are aware of what can help or hinder it, the more in control you have over adapting.
- Build and care for social support. Relationships offer the opportunity for us to release stress, relax and have fun. There is a direct link between having and maintaining friendships and well-being. Being able to talk about the disruption helps to reduce tension, anxiety, and uncertainty.
- Don't be afraid of mistakes and failure. You can guarantee that some things will not work out the way you planned, and there are some things you won't know exactly how to handle. Making mistakes is a vital part of learning, growing, and maturing. Give yourself permission to make mistakes learn and move on.
- Mourn your losses. Change is often accompanied by a loss of some kind. All meaningful losses need to be mourned. When we face the loss of something or someone important to us, we give up a part of our lives as we knew it. We need to allow ourselves some time to assess the impact, and time to adjust to the new reality we face after the loss. Mourning is not an option; it is a necessity for healing to take place.
- Keep traditions alive. When the familiar becomes disturbed by change, our sense of continuity is rattled. It can make us feel disoriented, confused and anxious. Traditions play a vital role in giving us meaning and purpose. You might say they serve as a link between our past and future. Some things need to remain the same for us to feel grounded, to buffer us from the negative effects of change.
- Maintain a sense of humor! Being able to laugh at ourselves and the absurdity of life is a great stress reliever. It releases physical and mental tension and anxiety. It can serve as an outlet for anger and a defense against depression. It decreases the production of stress hormones, leaving you feeling more relaxed and better able to cope.

Change sometimes forces our lives into a direction that is different from what we had envisioned. Sometimes it does not happen in a manner which we would prefer. The world simply cannot be how we want it to be no matter how long or hard we wish it were so. Accepting reality doesn't mean we can't have hopes for the future! It means we have to give up illusions, inflated expectations, and preconceived images of a perfect life, in the midst of a culture where we are constantly bombarded by change.

Over two thousand years ago, a field of shepherds heard a voice and saw a light which would impact both their, and our, worlds forever. They were aided in their adjustment by the words, "Do not be afraid!" A change had come, in the form of a tiny, vulnerable baby, who would grow to model a lifestyle that would threaten some, and be adapted by others. Today we wait – not always patiently – his coming to us again, when I believe, we will once again hear those words - "Do not be afraid!" May God strengthen and comfort you during the changes you will face throughout the coming year!
