Family Promise: Personal reflections from the Pastor

It is a bit amazing and wonderful that Family Promise of Lycoming County, Inc. is in full operation this winter. The need is quite clear; many people are struggling at the edge of homelessness these days. Local rental prices have risen sharply as the supply of affordable housing has dropped and the job market is very tight. But in this difficult situation, 13 congregations have opened their doors to offer overnight hospitality on a rotating basis, one week at a time, 4 times a year. One of the most startling statistics to me is that we have over 600 persons who are involved as volunteers in some aspect of Family Promise. This goes completely against the expectations of those persons who said that we couldn't do this task in Williamsport, that we would never find enough people to staff it, and there isn't much need for it anyway. Lutherans got the effort started, and we have been joined by Methodists and Presbyterians especially, and supported by many others as well.

At St. Mark's, we have the distinction of being the first congregation to sign the agreement to be a host, we have taken the lead in recruiting other congregations, especially through the efforts of Becky Miller Pryor with me, and had a number of folks serve as volunteers under the direction of Becky and Jane Zimmerer here and also several serve as volunteers at the Day Center. The financial support we have offered to Family Promise has been instrumental in persuading others to get aboard. I have just been elected to my final year as Vice President of FPLC before I leave the Board.

And then there is our third annual Iron Chef Williamsport competition. It is a very visible way to keep the public conversation going about Family Promise and to raise significant funds for the organization as well. Last year we raised \$8,000, four times the amount from the first year. What can we do this year? I hope that the total will rise again. Tickets will be available shortly, and a major publicity event will take place here at St. Mark's on March 16, 11 days before the event. Watch for details shortly. Our competitors this year will be from St. Joseph the Worker (Annunciation parish) led by Fr. Bechtel. I am proud that we have been able to develop this event. Of course the pressure is on for our team to do well again, but we need to remember that the focus is not on the team, but on the goal of supporting the mission of Family Promise.

Thank you to all who serve in person during our hosting weeks, to all those who assist in any way with Iron Chef Williamsport, to those who volunteer at the Day Center, to those who contribute items needed for the program, to those who contribute financially. Every facet of these activities is needed. What wonderful things we can accomplish when we hear Jesus words and take them to heart:

I was hungry and you fed me, I was a stranger and you welcomed me...; just as you did it to the least of these my brothers and sisters, you did it to me. [Mt. 25]

Almost....

We hope to finalize arrangements shortly toward the hiring of a new parish musician. The Search Committee (Carl Hieber, Karen Boone, Deb Buckman, Joyce Hershberger, Bernadette Jones, and Pastor Elkin) clarified our aims, arranged for publicity, communicated with inquirers, interviewed candidates, and finally made recommendations to Mutual Ministry and the Council. We are currently in final negotiations. Look for an announcement very soon.

The Congregation Council met in regular session on January 18 in the Crossways room. The council:

- Received the reports of the Pastor, officers, and committees.
- Received the report of the Search Committee and approved the hiring of a candidate as Parish Musician, pending completion of negotiation by the Mutual Ministry Committee within the parameters set earlier by the Council.
- Noted that Gary Stackhouse has joined Faith United Methodist in Montoursville.
- Moved to welcome Dan Zeigler family into membership by Letter of Transfer from Christ Church, Lewisburg.
- Ratified the use of Fellowship Hall for the 90th birthday party of Larry Bair and the annual banquet of the Wmspt. Dog Training Club, both on January 29.
- Approved the use of a room for the Suzuki violin class twice a month through April, and a concert by that group in April in the nave, pending receipt of a certificate of insurance from the group's organizer, and the presence or supervision of a member of the parish.
- Noted that the President has appointed additional members of the Nominating Committee.
- Heard that the Ken Sawyer radio program will originate from St. Mark's on March 16, promoting Family Promise and the other homeless programs now underway in the city, and Iron Chef also.
- Engaged in a brainstorming session for directions for the coming year, and asked the secretary to circulate the list of ideas for further thought, to move toward action.
- Concluded by joining in Prayer at the Close of the Day in the Chapel.

Campus Ministry

The students at Penn College have headed back to class, and our Monday evening Faith Talks are centered around our Spring Break Mission Trip to Washington D.C. from March 6-9. We will be working with the Center for Student Missions. The mission of CSM is to provide an effective urban ministry experience that transforms lives, influences churches and communities, and honors Christ. We are very excited to be going on this trip. UCM will be staying with Star of Bethlehem Church of God in Christ while we are there and the students will have the opportunity to experience first hand the many needs of the poor in the D.C. area. During our mission trip, we will work with the following groups:

Brother's Keeper ministers to the poor and needy in northeast Washington. Sister Jean Campbell runs Brother's Keeper, which strives to meet a variety of physical, economic, and spiritual needs on a 24-hour-a-day basis.

So Others Might Eat (S.O.M.E.) serves breakfast and lunch seven days per week to 500-1,000 persons. S.O.M.E. also provides medical and social services to Washington's poorest of the poor. CSM groups help with food preparation and distribution. **Martha's Table** runs both a day care center for poor moms as well as a kitchen that prepares food for McKenna's Wagon, a food-for-homeless program on wheels. McKenna's vans distribute food to five different locations in D.C. CSM groups help in the day care and kitchen at Martha's Table.

We have been doing a lot of fundraisers for our trip and our next fundraiser will be a soup sale at Sam's Club in Muncy on Sunday February 13, from 12:00-4:00 pm. If you are at Sam's that day, please stop by our table and stock up on some homemade soup.

Please keep the students in your prayers. We thank you for your past support and look forward to working with you again this semester.



HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

"When you care enough to give the very best!", may have been intended as a catchy slogan to sell cards, but it may be truer than we realize. The Bible has many references to the heart – over 600, according to Vine's Expository Dictionary. God's acceptance of man is based on the whole heart (Ps. 9:1, Prov. 3:5), God knows the secrets of the heart (Ps. 44:20-21), and God's law must be in our heart (Ps. 37:27-31). Man is taught to keep his heart (Prov. 4:23), and to be pure of heart (Matt. 5:8, Tim. 2:22). Our very existence is meant to mirror the love that God has shown us through the life, death, and resurrection of His Son. When we care for ourselves and for those we love, we can give our *very best* in return to Him.

In addition to Valentine's Day, February is traditionally American Heart month. Just as we often associate a valentine with love, we sometimes automatically associate cardiovascular disease strictly with diseases of the heart. However, cardiovascular disease can affect just one blood vessel, a group of vessels, an organ [such as the heart], or the entire body. Often, one problem will lead to another and another, becoming chronic and progressive, and can ultimately lead to heart attack, stroke, heart failure, or kidney failure. Congestive heart failure, peripheral artery disease, and venous thrombo embolism, are three examples. Here is a brief description of each:

<u>Congestive Heart Failure</u> – a condition in which the heart can't pump enough blood to the body's other organs. The heart keeps working, but not as efficiently as it should. The individual becomes short of breath and tires easily.

<u>Peripheral Arterial Disease (PAD)</u> – in PAD, fatty deposits build up along artery walls and affect circulation, mainly the arteries leading to the legs and feet. In its early stages, a common symptom is cramping or fatigue in the legs and buttocks during activity.

<u>Venous Thrombo Embolism (VTE)</u> – a blood clot that moves through the bloodstream until it lodges in a narrowed blood vessel and blocks circulation. Pulmonary embolism can occur when the clot breaks away, travels through the bloodstream, and lodges itself in a vessel in the lungs.

It is possible to reduce your risk of cardiovascular disease – by eliminating the risk factors you can control, and managing the risk factors you cannot control. These include:

- Eliminating all tobacco products,
- Controlling blood pressure and salt intake,
- Controlling weight,
- Controlling cholesterol,
- With your physician, developing a regular exercise program,
- If diabetic, controlling your blood sugar level, and finally,
- Committing your health and lifestyle choices to the Lord, and asking for His strength in making and keeping your healthy changes.

As we begin our Lenten journey, may we use this time to reflect upon and prepare our hearts ... to emotionally, physically, and spiritually ... in give our very best to Him.
